SATURDAY, JANUARY 1, 1876.

Mrs. Ann Thorley's near Eldersville

We took breakfast at Robert J. Cooper's and Lydia went with us over to Will Melvin's where we took dinner with Father and mother, and spent the afternoon there. Will and I went down into the hollow to where there was a shooting-match, to see John Amisette but he was not there. Helen, Charlie, Alex. and I went to Thorley's in the evening and spent the night very pleasantly there. Weather very warm. Very much like Spring.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 2, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

We took breakfast at
Thorley's and got ready and
went to Eldersville where
Charlie and I attended the
re-dedication of the Methodist
Church and heard Rev. Wm.
Collier preach from John
I 16" 17" About \$7.60
paid to pay off the debt.

Helen took Alex to Hugh
Patterson's and remained
during service and we
took dinner there.

Got home about dark.

Weather warm and
roads quite muddy.

We brought home with
us from Thorley's garden
some Johnny-cake up in
full bloom.

MONDAY, JANUARY 3, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Spent most of the day
about the house.

Helped Helen to take care
of the babe while she
was washing. Stewart and
I moved some sheep in
the afternoon. Stewart
and Cal. attended the
funeral of Nicholas Crib
in the forenoon. Roads
so very muddy that the
hearse was drawn by
four horses.

Weather very fair.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 4, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

Spent the day mostly about the house. Made some pickle and poured it over our pork.

The babe seemed to be very croop in the afternoon and would not allow me to nurse him much. Weather very fine. Roads muddy.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 5, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose a few minutes after six O'clock and attended to feeding before breakfast.

Attended to cleaning the stables and fed some sheep after breakfast and then got ready and went to C. M. Stephenson's and bargained for a cow and eight pigs, for which we will pay \$30.00.

Helped to raise a hog pen and got home about dusk. Weather fine with some appearance of rain at night.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 6, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

We attended to our feeding as usual and then commenced to repair our boxes but Mr Davis Buxton came in the forenoon and after dinner Luther Buxton and his cousin came and he did not get much done.

Weather very fine and warm.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 7, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Stewart took young Mr. Buxton to the Station in the morning and I attended to most of the feeding.

Went to David Hutton's to borrow his box to bring our cow and pigs home in.

We spent the afternoon re-roofing our pigpen. Stewart and Cal spent the evening at Geo. Morrison's. We intended to have gone but Stewart left his fore in such condition that Helen was afraid to leave the house and we could not get into his pen - so he remained at home.

Geo. Morrison sold his farm for \$65 per acre. Weather fine.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 8, 1876.

Home Rear Haulin' Sticks

After doing our feeding in the morning, Stewart and I charmed the team and prepared our wagon and went to C. M. Stephenson's for our sow and pigs which we had bought.

Got home about four o'clock. Sarahtha Buxton and Mary Crip at Stewart's over night.

Weather fine.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 9, 1876.

Home Rear Haulin' Sticks

Spent the entire day at home. Had intended going to Eldersville to Church but it commenced raining before we got, feeding done and piled all day. Stewart took Sarahtha Buxton and Mary Crip to the station in the evening.

MONDAY, JANUARY 10, 1876.

Home Near Hamilton Station

While we were feeding
in the morning, Henry
Erwin came and got 88
lbs of flour in part pay
for coal digging.

I repaired Charley's boots.
The weather very cold and
blustry. Change of weather
very sudden and quite
severe.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 11, 1876.

Home Near Hamilton Station

After doing the feeding in
the morning I spent most of the
day in the house helping Helen
to take care of the babe.

Charlie was not well and did
not go to school. Will.

Melvin came about noon
and he and I went to
G. S. Hamilton's on an errand
in the afternoon.

Babe had a bad spell of
Cholic in the evening.

Auntie Redelle with us
over night. Charlie very
unwell at night.

Weather cold and snow
on the ground.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 12, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Stn.

Spent most of the day
feeding and moving sheep
and preparing sheep shelter
and racks. Charlie quite
unwell all day and not
able to be out of the
house. Spent the
evening mending my
gloves. Weather cold
Snow on the ground.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 13, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Spent most of the day in the
house mending a pair of
Buckskin gloves. James
Bratson spent most of
the day with us. He came
down to hire with us for
another season.

Maggie Piddle came in
the evening and went with
Stewart and Cal. to visit
Mrs Emma Fulton who
was seriously ill with
consumption.

Weather cold.
Charlie kept in the house
all day.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 14, 1876.

Home near Hartin's Old Pa.

After doing the feeding in the morning we humped steam and hauled about two sled loads of corn fodder for the sheep.

We spent the evening in at Stewart's wrapping eggs in paper to send to market. Weather cold with some snow on the ground.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 15, 1876.

Home near Hartin's Old Pa.

After doing the feeding we shelled some corn and I took it to Mill in the afternoon. The mare fell down with me and threw me over her head but did not hurt me much.

Weather somewhat warmer. Will. Thorley with us over night.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 16, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Will. Shortley took
breakfast with us and
he and I went over to
Eldersville to church together
and heard Rev. Wilson
preach from Mat. XVIII
32^d. Weather somewhat
cloudy with some
appearance of rain.
Rained in the evening.
Charlie quite unwell at
night.

MONDAY, JANUARY 17, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta Pa.

Spent the day preparing a
shade to shelter a cow under
the stable. Stewart took
some produce over to Robt
Riddle's to sent to Pittsburgh
Weather warm and
cloudy.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 18, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

We were aroused at 4th o'clock by Mr. Robert Fulton asking for help to get two of his horses up that had got down through the stable floor. The boards had been put in crosswise of the stall and the horses got down between the sleepers and we drew one out with ropes, the other one got up and we took the manger out and bridged with sheaf oats until he walked up into the barn. We took breakfast before we came home. Spent the day attending to a young calf.
Weather very wet.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 19, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station

We attended to the feeding in the morning as usual, then Helen and the babe and I went to George Morrison's on a visit. George and I went to Robert Riddle's and got our market baskets from Pittsburgh. We got home a little before sunset. We got some good ashes from Wm. Morrison.

Weather cloudy and roads muddy.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 20, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta

Arose at half past
six o'clock and attended
to feeding as usual
then came into the
house to help Helen
to wash. About eleven
o'clock Mrs. Peters and
Miss Tilly, Blavier with
Robert Kiddle and Liz.
came to Stewart's, and
we ate dinner with
them. I took the two
strange ladies to
Florence in the evening
in the Spring wagon.
Roads very bad and
somewhat frozen.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 21, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta Pa.

Helen was unable to get break-
fast in the morning and Charles
and I ate with Stewart and Cal.
I went to Paris and got Kate
Brabson to come and do our
work for us. Stewart attended
George Morrison's sale
and sold his little Lucy
Muzz for 77 dollars.
Weather very fine.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 22, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Spent most of the day
about the house after
attending to the feeding.
Helped Kate Brabson to
do a churning. Helen
was much better during
the day. Stewart went
to the Station for the
mail. Rained
considerably during
the day.

Spent the evening at
home. Stewart learned
at the station that
the butter which we
had sent to Temper-
anceville had been
returned in the box for
want of sale.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 23, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station.

Attended to feeding as
usual in the morning
then got ready and
went to Eldersville and
heard Nolen preach
from Luke VIII part of
'50' Congregation, not
very large. Raining and
roads muddy.

Man Morrison and
Robert and Liz Riddle
here to see Helen in the
afternoon.

Kate Brabson here doing
housework. Helen's health
improved

MONDAY, JANUARY 24, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta Pa.

After attending to the feeding as usual, Stewart and I went to the woods, cut down a tree and made a logtrough and about ten rails.

Repaired the logpen some in the afternoon.

Tried to get a calf to drink milk in the evening but it would not drink.

Weather fine. Helen was troubled much with toothache at night.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 25, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Attended to feeding as usual then walked to Florence and got Joseph Bell to come and draw two teeth for Helen and fill two.

Weather very fine.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 26, 1876.

Home Near Harlin Sta Pa.

Attended to feeding as usual
then we harnessed a team and
put the Grain carriage on
on the wagon and hauled
four loads of straw to
the stable.

I wrote a letter to E. W.
Bruce at night.

Kate Brabson with us.
Weather fine and warm.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 27, 1876.

Home Near Harlin Sta.

Attended to feeding as
usual and then took
Charlie to school and
spent the day there.

Heard Charlie speak
a poem "Carrying Tompkins
over the brook". He did
right well. School spelled
on sides about 3/4 of an
hour in the evening and
just mixed an even
number of words.

Rained nearly all day.

Kate Brabson with
us.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 28, 1876.

Home Near Haulin's to

Attended the feeding as usual and made some repairs about the stable. Cleaned out a drain above the house in the forenoon. Spent most of the afternoon reading the newspapers.

Rained nearly all day. Stewarts went to the station for the mail and spent the evening making a bracket,

SATURDAY, JANUARY 29, 1876.

Home Near Haulin's to

Spent the morning feeding. Wrote a letter in the forenoon to Mr. R. Haulin.

Went to the station and got the mail. Spent part of the afternoon reading, and put some pieces on my boots. Spent the night at home.

Weather very fine and warm. Got cold at night and froze up.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 30, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Stw.

Stewart Charlie and I attended Church at Tucker's in the morning and heard Rev. Woodruff Bible Agent, preach from Numbers 23^o & 10^o. Good sermon and hour and a quarter long. Attended young men's prayer meeting at the church at night. Spent considerable time in devising means for advancing the interest of the meeting and when I came home at a late hour found Helen very uneasy about me. Felt very much encouraged to hope for a revival of religion. Weather clear and cold.

MONDAY, JANUARY 31, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Stw

After feeding in the morning Stewart and I hored some cows for my. Uncle G. S. Hanlin came and paid me some interest on some money for Will Melvin. He and I had quite a conversation on the subject of Secret Societies. I loaned him "Lipton Masonry".

Stewart and I hauled three loads of straw and two sled loads of corn fodder.

Weather very fine ground frozen. Kate Beabson still with us.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 1876.

Home Near Hankin Station

Stewart and I shelled
about 46 bushels of corn
during the day beside
attending to our feeding
and milking.

Commenced panning
about the middle of
the day and continued
to pan hard at night.
Kate Brabson still
with us.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 2, 1876.

Home Near Hankin Sta.

Spent part of the forenoon
feeding stock. Mended
my buck skin gloves during
the day. Willie Gracey
came in the evening
and spent the night
with us. Brought us
some money for some
marketing.

Weather very cold
during the day.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 3, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta

My 37th Birthday.

After attending to the feeding as usual Stewart and I attended to changing the rigging off the wagon and

put the bed on and took about 38 baskets of chopping to mill. Rev. Woodruff Bible A's here when we came home and I went with him to Stone Church and heard him preach from Rom. 12th & 13th. He spent the night with us. Much pleased with his company.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 4, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Arose a few minutes before five and greased some boots. Attended to feeding, prepared team and took Kate Brabson home. Took Rev. Woodruff to Paris and met Melting his colleague there he came back home with me and just as we were done eating dinner his colleague, ^(the minister) came and spent remainder of day and night with him here. Stewart and Cal. went to Mr Burton's in sled. Slidding not very good. Evening cold.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 5, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Stewart being away, I had all the feeding to attend to. Did not feed any until near nine o'clock, Bible Cysts Woodruff and Dempster here for break-fast.

Hauled three loads of corn fodder and scattered two of them out to the sheep. Was getting ready to go to Eldersville to church when Mitchell R. Haulin' came in just fresh from Iowa and I did not go.

Robert Riddle and family come and sat until bedtime with us.

Our babe very cross all until bedtime.

Snow melting some. Maggie Riddle with us over night.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 6 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to feeding as usual and then rode over to Eldersville and heard Rev. Palmer preach from Heb. VIII 12^d. Took dinner at Stephensons and attended church at the Protestant church at night and heard Rev. Willson preach from Isaiah ~~XXXVIII~~ ^{pl of 16}

Weather fine. Roads getting muddy in the evening.

Got home a little after ten o'clock.

Maggie Riddle with us over night.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 7, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Slept until late and spent most of the forenoon feeding stock.

We were expecting Reverend Palmer and Nolan to visit us during the day but they did not come and Helen did a washing in the afternoon and at night I rode over to Eldersville and heard Rev. Palmer preach a good sermon from ~~Mat. XVIII~~ 3.

Got home between ten and eleven o'clock.

Helen sitting up waiting for me.

Weather warm and roads muddy.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 8, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

After doing the feeding in the morning we harnessed the team and went to mill taking some wheat with us and bringing some hopping back. Charlie went with us.

We hauled some fodder in the afternoon and I rode over to Eldersville at night and heard Rev. Palmer preach from ~~Luk. XIV~~ 1st part of 18.

Got home a little after ten. Helen sitting up as usual.

Weather warm. Roads very muddy.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 9, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta Pa.

Stewart attended the
rearing of a sawmill at
Haulin's mill, and I drew
our meat from the barrel
and hung it up to smoke.

Attended to the babe
part of the day.

Rained very hard in
the evening and we
put two lots of our
sheep in shelter.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 10, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Attended to feeding as
usual. Made a trough
to put up an ashopper on.

Did a churning for Helen

Stewart took some
butter and eggs to the
station in the evening to
send to Pittsburgh.

Weather fine.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 11, 1876.

Home Near Hamilton Sta

After attending to the feeding, I saddled a horse and rode over to C. W. Stephenson's for wool packing arrangements.

Rained very hard on me while on the way.

Got home a little before four o'clock.

Attended Literary Society at Hamilton's School House.

Exercises pretty good.

Got home about half past ten o'clock.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 12, 1876.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

After feeding in the morning we prepared for packing our wool and I went to Fulton's, Barber's, Geo. Hamilton's and Saml. Provinces in search of our beam before I found it. We sacked four

sacks of wool in the afternoon. Stewart went to Florence to attend Primary meeting, but did not stay for it but came back and attended meeting of the grange.

Weather fine and warm.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 13, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' St. Par

After attending to feeding as usual, Charlie and I walked up to Tucker's church to prayer meeting. Mr. R. Haulin came home with us.

In the evening when cleaning the stable and looking at John's foot, he knocked me down some way and tramped two of my fingers and made them very sore.

I attended young mens prayer meeting at Tucker's at night. Meeting very interesting. New bell rung on the Eldersville church for the first time.

Was heard on the banks of King's Creek.

Weather fine;
Helen did the milking.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 14, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' St.

My fingers being sore, Helen attended to the milking in the morning. David Fulton came along and I gave him some of our newspapers. We finished packing our wool. Had something over 2400 lbs. Sold at '42 cents per lb. Commenced smoking our meat.

Weather very fine.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 15, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Stn.

Arose a few minutes after five o'clock and attended to breakfast before attending to feeding. We then harnessed four horses and took our wool 249 lbs to the Station for C. M. Stephenson. Sold it at 42 cents per lb. We got home between three and four o'clock. Snowed very fast in the evening.

Roads very muddy.

Getting cold and freezing at night.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 16, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Stn.

Slept until quite late. Mitch. Hanlin with us for breakfast. The day was so cold and stormy that we did not do much, but attend to the feeding.

I spent most of the day in the house caring for the babe. Helped Stewart to grind his axe and did a churning at night.

Ground frozen hard. Much went to mudway in the evening.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 17, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Stewart and I hauled
twentyone shocks of corn-
fodder for the stock.

Alex. Haulin' and
Rocna visited us and
took dinner. Two of the
children with them.

Some snow on the
ground and rather cold.

Mitch Haulin' and
Margaret Deane from
Midway and were with
us over night.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 18, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Crossed between six and
seven O'clock and did
part of the feeding.

Cal. was poorly and
went to Haulin' Station
and telegraphed for
Dr. Riddle. Cal. was
very poorly until five
O'clock when her child
was born and died
before it drew a
breath a caryel.

Attended Literary
Society at Hamilton
School House as usual
and sent for Florence
for a coffin and told
the folks about Stewart's
misfortune. Dr. Riddle
got here about ten O'clock.
Quick trip.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 19, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Sta

Work came from Florence in the morning that Alex. Scott could not attend the funeral of Stewart's child until tomorrow and I went to Paris and ordered a coffin at Lebouts.

Went to dinner at Cycle James Haulin's.

Quite a number came in to attend the funeral, did not get started from the house until near

four o'clock. Subgetting along very well.

Weather very fine.
Roads very bad.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 20, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Sta Pa.

Found in the morning that dogs had been among our sheep and partly eaten one, although it was still living. None of the rest of the flock much hurt. Attended church at Tucker's and heard Rev. Pierce preach from 7th Chron.

XXII 20. Several in during the day to see Cal. and found her getting along very well. Attended prayer meeting at Tucker's at night and led the exercises.

Weather very fine.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Stn

Attended to the feeding
in the morning as usual
and pulled the wool off
a dead sheep. Prepared
some Corn and oats and
took it to the mill
in the afternoon for
Uncle John Broome's.
Spent the evening at
home. Mr. Buxton
at Stewart's.

Cal. getting along
well. Had a spell of
Palpitation of the heart
while I was shelling Corn.
Weather cloudy and
stormy at night.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 22, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station Pa.

Attended to the feeding in
the morning as usual and
then got ready and drew
\$1030.²⁴/₁₀₀ for our wool.

Called on J. C. Keston.
And called in to see old Mr
and Mrs Kiddle and found
Mrs Kiddle very low.

Got home about
five O'clock.

Roads getting very
muddy. but air very
rare in the evening.
Cal's health improving.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 23, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Slid Pa.

Attended to milking the cows and feeding the horses as usual then went out and hauled out and scattered five sled loads of corn fodder to the stack. Visited the Hamilton school in the afternoon taught by Andrew Henderson. He had had trouble in his school and some of his scholars left. Weather very cold, Margaret Haulin with us.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 24, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Id.

Attended to feeding in the morning as usual. Mr. R. Haulin and I walked over to father's and I rode from thence to Cassidy Scott's and paid some debts. Called at ~~Wm~~ Cassidy's. He took tea at father's, called at Ann Thorley's, A. Lawther's and Robert Cooper's and got home about eleven o'clock. Found A. Lawther very sick. The rest of the folks generally well. Weather very fine.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 25, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to feeding as usual. Attended the examination of Miller's school during the day. Well pleased with the exercises. Had a good dinner furnished by the scholars. Mr. Jackson teacher, Rev. David Pierce and Mr. Tucker called on us in the evening. Called in to see Maggie Prosser in the evening. She was sick of fever. Attended church at night and heard Rev. Pierce preach from II Kings 18:21. Stopped a short time at the house of Robt. Fulton where Miss Emma Fulton has a corpse.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to the feeding as usual. Then harnessed a team and fixed the spring wagon some and attended the funeral of Miss Emma Fulton. Our wagon and team was used by ^{some of the} friends in going to the graveyard. I went to the house in the evening and brought team some and we hauled two loads of fodder to sheep. Mr. R. SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 27, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to feeding as usual then Mr. R. Haulin, Sarintha Burton and I went to Aldersville to Church and heard Rev. Wilson preach from Rev. XXXI ps of 4th

He went to C. M. Stephenson's and took dinner. Rained nearly all day. We got home about the time it was getting dark.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 28, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to feeding as usual, then Stewart and I took a team and got some poles and forks and fenced our strawstack. Uncle Frank Haulin was with us for dinner and spent most of the afternoon here.

Cal still in bed but improving. Snowed in the evening.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 29, 1876.

Home Near Hudson St.

Stewart was away during the day and I spent most of the forenoon in the house taking care of Willie while Helen and Grandma were washing. Hauled three sled loads of corn fodder in the afternoon and attended prayer meeting at George Morrison's at night. Very few professors of religion there. Did considerable of singing. But two prayers.

Weather fine.
Some snow on the ground

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 1, 1876.

Home Near Hudson St.

Spent the morning feeding as usual. Stewart and I removed the grain carriage from the wagon and put the bed on it. I cleaned some cobs out of the barn and we shelled some corn in the afternoon. Snowed some at night.

THURSDAY, MARCH 2, 1876.

Home Near Harlin Sta

Crossed a few minutes
before five o'clock and
after breakfasting I
took Mitchell R. Harlin
to the station on his
way to Iowa. Took
him on the sled,
sledding not good on
account of the mud.
Stewart and I shelled
some corn and I took
some chopping to the
mill in the evening.

Roads very bad.
Snow on the ground but
ground muddy.

FRIDAY, MARCH 3, 1876.

Home Near Harlin Station

Attended to feeding in the
morning as usual. James
Brabson came while I was
mending my glove and
we hired him again at
\$15⁰⁰ per month. He spent
most of the day hauling
corn fodder. Borrowed
D. S. Fulton's "Hay coop" in
the evening to take over,
row away. While feeding
in the evening two small
deers were seen running over
the sheep and we went out
with the guns but could
not shoot them. Sent with
John McConnell and got
Stove-backwall and ends.
Cost two dollars. Day fine.
Some snow on the ground.

SATURDAY, MARCH 4, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Spent the morning feeding
stock and looking after
some sheep that had been
scattered by dogs.

Stewart and I took
our cow to C. M. Stephen-
son's in the wagon.

Expected to have brought
our cow feed home from
the mill but the miller
was sued for slander
and attending the case
he could not grind.

Weather fine. Roads
quite muddy.

SUNDAY, MARCH 5, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta Pa.

Helen was quite unwell during
the day and spent part of
the day in bed. I did not
attend church anywhere
during the day. Spent day
reading and attending to
the babe to relieve Helen.

Haddon Buxton was at
Stewart's. Van Morrison
Myrtle Kiddle and the
Provins girls stopped
on their way home from
church.

Weather fine with
some appearance of rain
in the evening.

MONDAY, MARCH 6, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Sta.

Spent part of the forenoon
making a wash boiler.

Will Thorley called with
a part of the day.

Hauled in a load of
wood and went to mill
in the afternoon.

David L. Pulton and
family visited us at
night and I helped
them carry their babe
part of the way
home at night.

Weather fine.

TUESDAY, MARCH 7, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Sta.

Spent most of the day
putting up a boiler
and pulling ashes in it.
Stewart attended a sale
of property on Binger's farm.

Prayer meeting at our house
at night. United Presbyterians
Methodists and Presbyterians
united. Song Psalms.

Quite a number present
Considering the kind of
weather not many to take
part in the exercise.
Lockhart, D. S. Fulton
and Sarahtha Pulton
lead in prayer.
Burned nearly all evening.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 8, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Spent most of the forenoon
doing feeding and chores.

Harnessed a team in the
afternoon and went to the
station for our market-
boxes. Came home by
Riddles and got some
onions and by Morrisons
and Alex. Hanlin's and
got some ashes.

Got home about dark
and attended to milking
the heifer and washed
the horses legs to cure
the scratches.

Ad. Beabeon with us
over night.

Weather fine.

THURSDAY, MARCH 9, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Spent the forenoon
feeding and putting up
ashes to make soap.

In the afternoon Helen
and I went to Florence
in the spring wagon and
bought something over
seventeen dollars worth
of groceries and
dry goods. Got home a
little before dark.

Stewart tapped two
sugar trees and gathered
about a barrel of water
from them and boiled
it in the afternoon.

Weather very fine
but roads very muddy.

FRIDAY, MARCH 10, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Arose about six o'clock
and took a turkey down
to the forks of the road
and sold it to John
McConnell for \$1.20

Stewart and I spent
part of the afternoon
hauling cornfodder.

While I was milking
the cows in the evening
Father and Ann Thorley
came and spent the
night with us.

Rained some in
the evening, Roads very
muddy.

SATURDAY, MARCH 11, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Arose a few minutes
before six o'clock.

Spent the morning feeding
and talking to father and
Ann Thorley. Pulled
the wool off a dead
sheep in the afternoon.

Stewart went to
Burgessstown. I went
to the station in the
evening, intending to go
to Mill but learned
that our grinding was
not done and

came home with an
empty wagon.
Roads very bad,
Weather very warm.

SUNDAY, MARCH 12, 1876.

Home Near Hankin Station

Attended to the feeding as usual in the morning, then Charlie and I got ready and went to the U. P. Church in Paris expecting to hear Rev. May preach but he did not come. Had Prayer meeting. Costner, Sutton had one of the single trees of their spring wagon broken on the way to Church and I held one of his horses while he took the other one and went and borrowed a single tree. Forenoon fine and warm. Rained in the evening.

MONDAY, MARCH 13, 1876.

Home Near Hankin Station

Attended to feeding as usual and spent most of the day repairing Charlie's boots. Put on two patches and two halfsoles.

Weather cold. Snow on the ground.

TUESDAY, MARCH 14, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Attended to feeding as usual and then got ready and went to the station to go to Steubenville but was too late for the train and waited there and saw A.C. McKee and Louis Bushfield Car 735 bucks and 125 ewes to take to Mexico. Came home and hauled three loads of fodder for the stock.

Attended Prayer meeting at night at Elder James Sutton's. Weather very fine. Charlie not well at night.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 15, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Arose at six and attended to the usual amount of feeding, then went to the station and from thence to Steubenville on the local freight and bought quite a number of articles among which was 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ bushels of cloverseed at 9.50 pr bushel, a satchel for Helen, a hat for myself and other things.

Wrote a letter to John A. Egan at night and enclosed a check for \$33 $\frac{55}{100}$ their pro rata of the pens of the farm for the past year. Weather fine with some appearance of rain at night.

THURSDAY, MARCH 16, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Stn.

Attended to the feeding
as usual. Turned neighbor
Johnson's sheep out of
our lower field. Called
at Geo. Morrison's a few
minutes in the forenoon.
Stewart and I went to
C. M. Stephenson's in the
afternoon and brought
our sow home. A storm
came on when we were
at Rettenhouse Crk.
and we turned in there
and unbatched until
after it was over.
Hauled considerably,
got home a little
before night.

FRIDAY, MARCH 17, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Stn. Pr.

Spent most of the fore-
noon feeding stock.
Took dinner at Robert
Kiddle's. Robert's father
some better. Robert and
I went to Aunt Inge's
Haulin's. Found her very
pleasant. I went from
thence to James Caldwell's
and saw John Caldwell
who was lying sick of
meningitis. Doctor
there. Got home a
little after five o'clock
and helped to do the
feeding and milking.
Day cold and stormy.
Snow on the ground.
Expended to the the
Eggnectal storm.

SATURDAY, MARCH 18, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Sta.

Spent most of the forenoon feeding stock.

Put poles on my boots and went to the station in the afternoon for the mail. Got into a controversy with J. N. Scott about the terms Ceres, Pomona and Flora as used by the grangers.

I asserted they were heathen goddesses and he denied it. I found proof of my assertion in a Latin dictionary furnished by John F. Cosgrove.

Scott became angry and as good as called me a liar. Weather very cold. Snow on the ground.

SUNDAY, MARCH 19, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Sta.

Spent the entire day at home. Maggie S. Kiddle called with us and took dinner. I wrote an article of agreement for her to raise a school on in Holidays Cove. I expected to go there tomorrow. Weather cold. Some snow on the ground. Cal. Haulin' and Carantha Puxton both sick with diphtheria.

MONDAY, MARCH 20, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Sted Pass

attended to the feeding as usual. Stewart took his horses to the shop and got them shod. I spent part of the day in the house and the remainder of the time sheltering stock from the storm. Snowed all day. Snow in the evening was, at least six inches deep.

Ad. Brabson came in the evening to sew for us and made me a pair of overalls.

TUESDAY, MARCH 21, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Sted Pass

attended to feeding as usual, then harnessed a team and went to the mill, and to the station. Our grinding not done. Got Cord shod all round. Came home and put a sole on the sled before feeding. Geo Morrison came in the evening to get us to haul a load of mowing for him to the Cove.

Snow about eight inches deep. Day quite blustry. Sledding tolerably good. Wind in some places. Ad. Brabson with us sewing.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 22, 1876.

Home near Hanlin's Sta.
At Father's.
Arose at five O'clock
and attended to some
of the feeding and milking
then took Helen and the
babe to Aunt Nancy Hanlin's
on sled. Hauled a load of
George Morrison's wood to
the Cove. Got back to
Aunt Nancy Hanlin's about
four O'clock. Came home
ate supper and attended
to feeding and milking
and then we went to
father's on the sled.
Got there about eight
O'clock as night.
Father very poorly with
the cold.

THURSDAY, MARCH 23, 1876.

Home near Hanlin's Sta.
We took breakfast at
father's. Helped Will.
to do some of the feeding.
Took dinner at father's
and came home in the
afternoon. Roads getting
quite muddy. Mother
gave me a pair of
pants to get made
for myself.
Rev. Willson visited
at Stewart's.
Evening cloudy.

FRIDAY, MARCH 24, 1876.

Uncle James Melvin's Puytlow

Arose at five Greased my boots, cleaned my teeth and did some feeding before breakfast. Went in the cars to Port Homer, crossed the river in a skiff and walked out to Uncle James Melvin's. Found Uncle James suffering from partial Paralysis. Spent the night there. Fayer Melvin there also. The weather fine until evening when it became stormy and snowed and rained. Wanted to lit up with uncle during the night but family would not hear to it.

SATURDAY, MARCH 25, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Took breakfast at Uncle James Melvin's. Uncle no better. Left Puytlow at eight O'clock with Judge Melvin in the Mail Wagon and went to Cumberland. He paid my fair in sack and ferrage. Got to Hanlin's Station about two O'clock. Came up on the Local freight with Susan^{ne} C. Melvin. Left a letter with her for father and learned afterward that father had come to the station to meet me. Weather cloudy and rained some.

SUNDAY, MARCH 26, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Attended to the feeding
as usual then got
ready and went to
Eldersville to Church.
Rev. Wilson was sick
and they held prayer meeting.
Weather rather stormy.
Roads very muddy.

MONDAY, MARCH 27, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station.

Spent the morning feeding
as usual and when we
got through he shelled some
corn before dinner and
Stewart took some choppings
and some wheat to the
mill in the afternoon
and I went with
Grandma Hamlin
to Uncle John Hamlin's
to pay the interest
on some money which
Uncle Hamlin and Maggie
Scott had received of
their grand father's
estate. Roads very
muddy. Weather very
fine. Stewart had
feeding nearly all done
when we got home.

TUESDAY, MARCH 28, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Stn.

Stewart went to Steuben-
ville in the morning and
I attended to the feeding.
Got through a little
after eleven o'clock
and then wrote a letter
to M. K. Hanlin and
one to Robert Hamilton.
Looked two horses and
went to the station
and met Stewart.
Sleeted and rained
nearly all day.

Father and John
Melvin went to Pughtown
to see Uncle who was
lying sick.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 29, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Spent the morning attending
to the feeding as usual then
Stewart and I harnessed the
four horses before dinner
and went to mill in the after-
noon and brought home
some chop and some flour.
We weighed our chopping
and found that the miller
had not taken out his
toll by 93 lbs. Did not get
enough the first we took
before and told him of
it. Weather very stormy
Snow on the ground.

Wrote a note to Mr. Pance
concerning the shipping of
our butter and eggs.

THURSDAY, MARCH 30, 1876.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Spent most of the forenoon feeding. In the afternoon I went to the station and met father and John on their return from Pughtown. Uncle James Melvin no better.

Maggie Kiddle and Willie Gracey with us over night.

Weather cold. Ground frozen a little on top.

FRIDAY, MARCH 31, 1876.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Attended to feeding in the morning as usual and hauled two loads of cornfodder to the sheep.

James Carothers and Frank came when I was turning out the cows and remained until afternoon and I took them to the station. Stewart was at Uncle Grant Haulin's and at the station.

Weather cold and raw. Roads very bad.

SATURDAY, APRIL 1, 1876.

Home Near Hamilton Station

Attended to the feeding as usual and then changed some clothing and prepared to go to Florence on an errand; got part of the way there and met Andrew Provines who informed me that neither of the gentlemen whom I wished to see was at home and I turned about and came home with him.

Spent most of the afternoon in the house taking care of the babe while Helen was doing up her Saturday's work. Weather fine but the air was very cool. Some snow drifts still on the North Hillsides.

SUNDAY, APRIL 2, 1876.

Home Near Hamilton Stn Pa.

Spent the entire day at home. Roads too bad to ride to church and did not feel much like walking to Eldersville.

Geo. Hudson preached at Ricker's Church. Stewart was there.

Weather rather fine.

MONDAY, APRIL 3, 1876.

Home Near Hardin Sta. Pa.

Spent the morning attending
to feeding as usual and
skinned the wool off a
dead sheep. Went to
Florence in the afternoon
and had some teeth
filled by Joseph Bell
and took supper there.

Roads very muddy.
Stewart took some
marketing to the station.
Ad. Brabson here
sewing some for us.

TUESDAY, APRIL 4, 1876.

Home Near Hardin Sta. Pa.

Attended to feeding as usual.
Then Stewart and I put
the carriage on the wagon
and hauled in a stack of
hay to the stable.

Hauled four large loads.
Helen and the baby,
Charlie and I went to
Uncle Sam. Provinces at
night and remained
until after ten o'clock.
Ad. Brabson and
Grandma Hanlin here.
Weather fine.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 5, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Attended to feeding as usual then harnessed a team and took one of the Cultivators and a plow to the station for repairs. Charlie went with me.

Weather fine. Roads, very bad.

THURSDAY, APRIL 6, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station Pa.

After attending to the feeding as usual Stenest and I repaired the gate some near the stable, and also repaired an old Flax brake for Margaret to break some flax that was raised during the late war. We pulled the wool off of five dead sheep in the afternoon and at night I and my family and Ad. Grakon visited at Robt. Sutton's.

Had a very pleasant time. Weather very fine.

FRIDAY, APRIL 7, 1876.

Home near Hanlin Stn

Spent the forenoon doing feeding and chores. Saw S. S. Pulton and squared books with him. Paid Ad. Brabson five dollars for sewing for us.

In the afternoon I took our side meat out of the old pickle and prepared some new to put on it.

We set some new posts and staked up our grapevines.

Spent some time trying to get a calf on its feet that had got down with the scowers.

Weather very fine.

SATURDAY, APRIL 8, 1876.

Uncle James Melvin, Pughtown

Spent the forenoon putting away some meat in pickle and cleaned the yard off at the back of the house. Started to Pughtown at fifteen minutes before three o'clock and arrived there about seven. Thought Uncle James a little better. Aunt Phelena very poorly with bad cough and cramp in her limbs and did not sleep any through the night and sat nearly all the night by the fire.

Weather very fine
Roads very much improved but a little rough.

SUNDAY, APRIL 9, 1876.

Uncle James Melvin's ^{Daytown}

Took breakfast at Uncle James Melvin's and went with John Henry to the Presbyterian Church and heard Rev. Porter preach a very fine sermon from John II 9.

Took dinner at J. H. Melvin's and attended Sabbath School in the Methodist Church at three o'clock. Took tea at J. H. M.'s and heard Rev.

Porter preach in the School House at night from Numb. XXIV 17. House full. Spent the night at Uncle James Melvin's. Weather very fine.

MONDAY, APRIL 10, 1876.

Home near Hartsville

Took breakfast at J. H. Melvin's in Daytown. Cut John Henry's hair and started from Daytown about eight o'clock. Stopped a few minutes in Florence and got home at twelve o'clock and found James Brabson here at work.

He commenced plowing for oats. Stewart and I pulled the wool off of nine dead sheep in the afternoon. Some appearance of rain in the evening. People generally plowing for oats.

TUESDAY, APRIL 11, 1876.

Home Near Haulvi St. Pa.

Attended to feeding as usual.
Prepared some wood for
making soap. Took Charlie
to school at Hamilton's
S. H. Plowed from ten
o'clock until evening.
Attended prayer meeting
at James Magill's at night
Had a very pleasant
meeting.
Rained at night a
small shower.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 12, 1876.

Home Near Haulvi St.

Arose a few minutes
after five o'clock.
Spent the day until
luncheon plowing for
oats. After supper I
plowed in the garden.
Ad. Provines and
Rebecca were with us
during the day.
Weather fine with some
appearance of rain.
Jacob Yates came in
the evening and got
25 bushels of oats
for which he paid us
ten dollars.

THURSDAY, APRIL 13, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta Pa.

Attended to feeding as usual in the morning. James Brabson harnessed the teams but it came on to rain and we did not plow. James rode the Colt for the first time.

He runs very well. I half soled a pair of old boots to plow in. James Brabson and I hauled two loads of coal in the evening.

Learned from Dr. Ginn's work that I had strong symptoms of Dropsy.

Weather warm and cloudy with nice showers.

FRIDAY, APRIL 14, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta

After feeding in the morning we made some repairs in the springhouse and then we built a cart for Charlie to play with.

We hauled three loads of coal in the afternoon. Rained a hard shower about noon, and got quite cool in the evening.

Suffering with a boil on my eyebrow and felt strong symptoms of heart disease. James Brabson got me some Lendation root in the evening.

SATURDAY, APRIL 15, 1876.

Home Near Hardin's Sta

After feeding in the morning
James Brabson and I
hailed two loads of coal.
We spent the afternoon
until supper time clearing
off logs and stumps
from our cornfield.
I went to the station
in the evening and
got our mail, some
plowpoints and some
boxes. Snowed some
in the morning.
Most of the day fine
Evening stormy.
Boil on my eyebrow
no better.

SUNDAY, APRIL 16, 1876.

Home Near Hardin's Station Pa.

Attended to feeding as usual
and prepared to go to Eldersville
to church, but when Charlie and
I had our horses out to go there, we
concluded there was no preaching
there on account of Conference
and we went to Paris and heard
Rev. May preach from Romans
XIV 14. Very good sermon.
While we were eating dinner
Hill Meloni came in and
stated that Plummer had
preached in the Wesleyan
Church at Eldersville in
Polaris's place.
Weather somewhat cool
and cloudy. Rained a
little through the day.

MONDAY, APRIL 17, 1876.

Home near Hauelin Station

Arose at the usual time and attended to milking and feeding as usual. Went to Paris and bought Charlie a spelling book and called on Ape. Brabson and engaged her to go to Will. Melvin's to keep house for him when called on. Spent the rest of the day plowing. Stewart went to the station in the evening with marketing and I put a note in the box asking to have a landside shipped but failed to state expressly what kind and went to the station and corrected it. Cora took sick with Stewart on the way. Day fairly cool.

TUESDAY, APRIL 18, 1876.

Home near Hauelin Sta.

Arose a few minutes after five O'clock and attended to the milking before breakfast. We sowed 22 bushels of oats and got pretty nearly through harrowing it. Major Hauelin at Stewart's for dinner.

Weather very cloudy and cool. Spitting snow some during the day.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 19, 1876.

Home Near Hardin Sta. Pa.

Arose at five. We harrowed about half an hour, in the morning and finished field on the hill. David Tucker came in search of a sheep thief dog, as David Hillier Sr. thought he had heard our dog bark. Two of Tuckers sheep badly wounded. James Brabson and I spent the day plowing for oats. Weather fine.

THURSDAY, APRIL 20, 1876.

Home Near Hardin Sta

We sowed about seven bushels of oats in the morning makin 29 bus. in all sowed and got through harrowing about eleven o'clock. Spent the afternoon manuring the garden and marked it out. Rev. Wilson at Stewarts a short time in the afternoon.

James Brabson planted a few early potatoes and I got two poles to put bows in our furrows.

Appearance of rain in the evening.

FRIDAY, APRIL 21, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to the milking before breakfast. Sam Brabson and I spent the forenoon preparing garden ground and he planted some onions and some other seeds. Chickens scratched the garden badly in the afternoon.

Mr. rolled some logs in the afternoon and set fire to them.

I wrote a letter at night to Rev. Woodruff a bible agent.

Weather very fine but somewhat windy.

SATURDAY, APRIL 22, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Attended to the milking before breakfast. Put a new point and new landside on my plow and then we spent the remainder of the day clearing off one of the lower fields to plow for oats. Tried out quite a number of stumps and burned them. Stewart went to the Station in the evening and got the mail.

Weather very fine. Threatening rain some.

SUNDAY, APRIL 23, 1876.

Home Near Hardin Sta

Spent the entire day at home. Grand ma Hardin went to Paris to church, Sarintha Buxton went from Stewarts to Eldersville to church and Stewart and Cal. went to Robert Kidd's as Cal. thought she would not be able to sit in church during service.

Another of our yearling calves was found dead in the morning - the second one dead this spring. Weather cool and cloudy.

MONDAY, APRIL 24, 1876.

Home Near Hardin Sta.

After attending to the milking in the morning Stewart and I skinned a yearling calf that had died and buried it. We commenced plowing in the small field at the lower end of the farm. Tried to plow with Bess but she refused to work and did some kicking and we had to give her up.

We brought some brush and put it on the garden. Stewart and James Grabson hauled a load of wood in the evening. Weather cool and cloudy. Did not rain any of any account.

TUESDAY, APRIL 25, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Sta

Did some chores in the morning and then spent the forenoon plowing sod in the lower field for oats. Quit at supper-time and James Brabson went to the station and I attended Prayer meeting at Mr. Robert Sutton's. Not very many present but he had a very pleasant and profitable time.

Weather cool and cloudy.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 26, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Sta

Attended to milking before breakfast and carried some water for Helen then Stewart and I plowed until dinnertime when we finished plowing sod for oats. We sowed about twelve bushels in the afternoon, and Stewart took his wife and Luratha Buxton to Mr. Buxton's. I went to the station and got some prunes and some fish.

Weather considerably warmer than heretofore although there was quite a white frost in the morning.

THURSDAY, APRIL 27, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Attended to milking and feeding in the morning. Stewart being away with my team, I spent the forenoon doing chores. Salted and fed the sheep and pulled the wool off two sheep that had died.

James Brabson finished harrowing in our oats.

Stewart got home about noon and we moved some stone and stumps off our cornfield and plowed road in the evening.

Stewart's wife being away he boarded with us. Rained some in the afternoon. Weather warmer.

FRIDAY, APRIL 28, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station

After feeding as usual James Brabson and I went out and plowed a short time when a rain shower drove us to the house. I commenced patching Stewart's old boots but it cleaved off and we plowed in the afternoon. Shower seemed to revive vegetation.

Grass growing nicely. Wrote a letter at night to M. R. Hanlin.

SATURDAY, APRIL 29, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Attended to milking before breakfast. We emptied a Kettle of soap for Helen. Spent most of the day plowing. Stewart went to the station for the mail. Robert and Liz Riddle and Nancy Morrison came in the evening and took supper with us. Nan. remained over night with us.

Margaret Hanlin got a letter from Bella Carothers stating that she was poor and Margaret got ready and went to Midway to keep horse for her. Rained in the evening.

SUNDAY, APRIL 30, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station.

Nancy Morrison took breakfast with us and we all attended Church at Tuckers. Robert, Liz, Riddle, Rebecca and Miss Groves and Miss Riddle took dinner with us and I took the spring wagon back to Church in the evening. Helen and Charlie did not go in the afternoon. Heard Rev. Geo. Hudson in the morning from John ~~the~~ Cat. Ch. 32^o. and again in the evening from Heb. III 34^o. Weather very cold and freezing at night.

MONDAY, MAY 1, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Sta.
Hard freeze.
Ice, about half an inch
thick on the water at the
side of the house in the
morning and ground
frozen. Went to
McConnell's in the morning
to get Harriet to help
Helen keep house but
she could not come.
Spent most of the day
doing chores.
Went to Uncle Sam
Provinces in the evening
and secured the
services of one of
the girls to do housework.
Weather very cool.
James Brabson broke
the beam out of my
plow in the evening.

TUESDAY, MAY 2, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Sta.
Heavy frost.

old beam in my plow

Brabson and Stewart plowed
in the forenoon. I went to
mill in the afternoon and

home with me in the

Home Near Hauku Station

Frost in the morning.
Attended to milking
and feeding as usual.
Stewart and James

the bows in two
harrows and did
some other chores.

Stewart went to Mill
and to the Station and
brought home some
groceries.

Mizzie Provines with
us doing housework.

Belle Carothers with
us not feeling very well.
Day very fine.

THURSDAY, MAY 4, 1876.

Home Near Hauku Station

Attended to milking, and
feeding as usual, then
took Belle Carothers on
horseback to Uncle Sam
Provines. Attended to the
sheep in the forenoon and
did chores. Stewart was
quite unwell with the cold
in the afternoon I plowed
in his place. Near supper-
time Will and Clyde came
and Will informed us that
they had a young daughter

Stewart got home from
Mr Buxton's in the fore-
noon. Plow worked well
with him. He plowed
some in the stalk field
but did not get quite
done. I took our marketing
to the station in the
evening. Weather fine
Rained a small shower
at noon.

TUESDAY, MAY 9, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station

James Brabson and I finished plowing in the forenoon and harrowed in the afternoon. I pulled the wool off a dead sheep, the 24" one we lost during the winter and spring. Stewart took Belle Carothers to Robt Riddle's in the forenoon. Rained light showers during the day.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 10, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Attended to the milking in the morning and shelled a bushel of corn and took it over to father's and traded for a bushel of corn for seed. Rained hard on me while I was on the way. Stewart and James Brabson put rings in our pigs noses while I was away. Weather in the evening quite cool.

THURSDAY, MAY 11, 1876.

Home near Hanlin Sta.

James Brabson and I spent the day harrowing cornground. Father, Mother and Nannie Melvin came from Puytown and took dinner with us.

Stewart Hanlin helped David Fulton plant corn. Grandma Hanlin came back from Midway. Weather fine.

FRIDAY, MAY 12, 1876.

Home near Hanlin Station

Arose about five in the morning, and attended to milking as usual.

We set out about fifty tomato plants which we got from Joe Carothers. Robert Reddle brought his team and helped to prepare our corn ground for planting.

I went and helped David Fulton to finish planting corn. Got through a little before sundown. Rained some during the day.

SATURDAY, MAY 13, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Attended to milking before breakfast as usual. Had some trouble with the lambs and did not get to work soon as the rest of our help. We commenced planting corn. S. S. Bullock, Robt Kiddle and Willie Gray helping us. Stewart went to Mr. Burton's for his wife. I took the large wagon and Charlie and it went to the station and got our market boxes.

It was very late when we got home. Went out to the sheep after I got through feeding.

Will Hamlin came and stayed over night with us. Weather very fine.

SUNDAY, MAY 14, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Will Hamlin took breakfast with us. After feeding about the house we went out to kill the sheep and found five dead lambs. The night had been cold and a heavy frost.

I attended church at Eldersville and heard Rev. C. J. Palmer preach from James III 1st Clause of 17th Verse.

Came home for dinner. Stewart and Cal were at home. Grandma Hamlin with us. Day fine.

MONDAY, MAY 15, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta

Went to the sheep in the morning before breakfast and found a lamb but could find no mother for it and brought it to the house to raise by hand.

Spent the day planting corn & J. Linton and Robert Kiddle helping us. We did not get through with the large field near the old barn. Rained in the afternoon and evening.

TUESDAY, MAY 16, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Spent most of the forenoon attending to the sheep and lands. James Branson and Stewart set a turkey hen and Stewart went to the station. We built a dam for washing sheep in the afternoon.

Rained considerably during the day and I got a patch on Stewarts boot.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 17, 1876.

Home Near Hankin's Station

Spent part of the forenoon
repairing our clock
but did not succeed
in getting it to run
well. In the afternoon
we finished building
a dam and built
a pen and washed
one lot of sheep.

Rained considerably
during the day.

Helen did a washing.

THURSDAY, MAY 18, 1876.

Home Near Hankin's Station

We spent the forenoon
repairing our eyes and
lamps and washed our
eyes. In the afternoon we
finished washing sheep.

Mr. J. C. Calmont and
Uncle Sam Provinces' folks
each washed a lot of
sheep in our pool.

Miss Samantha Fulton
and Miss Laura Bigger
took tea with us.

Weather fine.

FRIDAY, MAY 19, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock and attended to milking as usual. Samantha Patton came and went with Helen and me to Steubenville in the Spring wagon. We left our babe, Willie with Man Morrison in the Cove until we came back and took supper there and brought Maggie Reddle home with us. She was teaching school in the Cove. I helped Samantha & Cary her purchases home at night. Rained considerably on us during the day.

SATURDAY, MAY 20, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

I spent most of the forenoon setting our clock to running and doing some other chores. In the afternoon James Brabson and I marked out our last piece for corn and he planted some on the sod ground after supper. Rebecca Bampton went home and Sarintha came to Stewart's in the evening. Grandma Haulin with us. Weather fine and warm.

SUNDAY, MAY 21, 1876.

Home Near Hurdin Station

Attended to part of the milking in the morning and Grandpa Hurdin and I went on horseback to Paris to church and heard Rev. Waddle preach from John XIV 26. Treated of the Holy Ghost as a Teacher, an advocate and as a Comforter. Was well pleased with his address. Heavy rain came on us on our way home and we took shelter in James Caldwell's wagon shade. Were there perhaps more than an hour.

MONDAY, MAY 22, 1876.

Home Near Hurdin Station.

Spent the morning attending to the lambs. Took Charlie to School and went to Florence and exchanged a pair of shoes for Charlie. Cleland would not take the ones we had in exchange as they had not been bought there but Robt Scott did. Spent the afternoon attending to the lambs and made a bow for a spring wagon tongue and put a bottom in a coal bucket. Rained very hard a little before noon.

Rev. Palmer and I went to Robert Cooper's and saw Mrs Foggy who was very sick and not expected to live long. Weather very fine.

SUNDAY, MAY 28, 1876.

Home near Hawkins Sta.

We took breakfast at father's. Attended church at Eldersville and heard Rev. Palmer preach from Isaiah ~~XXVIII~~ 15.

We had William Alexander baptized. We took dinner at C. M. Stephenson's. Attended church again in the afternoon and heard Rev. Fosmirey preach from ~~Mat~~ 16.

Went back to Stephenson's and brought my family home in the cool of the evening.

We castrated our lambs in the forenoon and hauled fifty bushels of ears of corn and fifty bushels of oats to C. W. Stephenson in the afternoon, and in the evening Helen and I went to Florence and got some wall paper. Called in to see Billy Jackson to get him to settle father's account but he failed to settle not having his book there.

FRIDAY, JUNE 9, 1876.

Home near Haulin Station

Spent the day papering our kitchen. Garrison and Bufston helped me most of the time.

Liz. Riddle brought Belle Carothers about noon a clock and Stewart took her to the Station in the afternoon.

We had not quite enough wall paper and I went to Florence at night and got another box. Weather fine.

SATURDAY, JUNE 10, 1876.

Home Near Hankin Station.

Spent part of the day
papering a room and
putting down carpets.

Helped Jos' Stephenson
to load some corn which
he bought from us.

Talked a short time
in the evening with
Lammie Sholly and did
not get through putting
down carpet. Put
down the carpet in
the kitchen after night.

Brought home the butter box with a return of 19¢ per pound for his butter and 18¢ for ours as they said there was no chance on our part of the box. Weather very warm and he had a very heavy rain in the evening.

TUESDAY, JUNE 13, 1876.

Home near Haulin's Stn.

Spent the morning doing some repairs about the house. Papered two fire-boards and hung up some pictures. Took two backs to father's which we had sown from them. Got my hair cut. Stopped at Cooper's store in Eldersville and got a check partly cashed and got a dub bill for the balance \$14.76. Got home at 5 $\frac{1}{2}$.

Prayer meeting at our house. Pretty good turnout. Subject of Conference Romans III 2. Weather fine.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 14, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Spent the day hoeing corn
and thinning it out.
Just after we had
eaten supper Mr. Nolen
came along on his way
to Columbiana Ohio.
He spent the night
with us.

Day very warm.
Rained a small shower
at night.

THURSDAY, JUNE 15, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Arose at 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ O'clock and
we got breakfast over
and Nolen started on

Rained two or three small showers during the day.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 21, 1876.

Home near Haulin' Sta

Attended to the milking in the morning before breakfast. We finished thinning out our corn in the forenoon and plowed through the small field next to Antons in the afternoon.

Weather cloudy and rained small showers.

THURSDAY, JUNE 22, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

I took our butter to the station in the morning and sent it to Pittsburgh. Got Uncle John Provinces to make me a new shovel for the shovel plow and we plowed corn during the remainder of the day. Weather very warm.

FRIDAY, JUNE 23, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Milked two cows before breakfast. We spent most of the day plowing through our corn and potatoes. We got through just at supper time. We found that our bucks had some worms in their heads. One of them had died. We spent about an hour attending to them at noon. Rained a nice shower after supper. Weather very warm during the day.

SATURDAY, JUNE 24, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Spent the morning about as usual. Rained a small shower soon after breakfast and Stewart and I set out some Cabbage plants. I went to Steubenville on horseback and bought goods to the amount of \$3.08.

Took dinner at George Morrison's in the Cove. Got home about six o'clock. Uncle James Hamlin called here in the evening and chatted until bedtime.

Weather very warm.

SUNDAY, JUNE 25, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Attended a meeting as usual. Stewart brought in the horses, we harnessed three of them and attended church at Tucker's church and heard Rev. Geo.

Hudson preach from Job. XLV pt of 14". Spent the afternoon at home. Weather warm with some appearance of rain at night.

MONDAY, JUNE 26, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock and milked the cows as usual. Moved some sheep in the forenoon and spent most of the forenoon talking with Uncle James Hanlin. He being unwell spent most of the day here. Plowed ten rows of corn in the afternoon. Broke the foot off of the double shovel plow and spliced it. Helen went to the station on horseback. Appearance of rain in the evening.

TUESDAY, JUNE 27, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station.

When going to the cornfield in the morning John Melton came and called to me that Willie Stephenson, son of Cyrus and Mary Stephenson had been killed yesterday evening by a stone falling from a loaded wagon. James Jackson was driving the team.

We got ready and went to Stephenson's for dinner. Found Mary taking it very hard. Funeral took place at three o'clock. Service held in the church. Rev. Willson officiated. Very large procession. John Melton of Burgettsboro came home with us in the evening and spent the night with us. Weather very warm.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 28, 1876.

John Melvin of Burgett's

Exercises somewhat entertaining. Charlie did not have any performance prepared and felt somewhat ashamed as he had thought to make use of an old performance.

Dinner was served in the grove.

Weather very fine

SATURDAY, JULY 1, 1876.

Father's

Spent the forenoon cooking up hay. After dinner we finished plowing our corn the fourth time.

After supper I went to Ellersville to get some stoving done. Left Doll at Station to get shod. Heard in Ellersville that Wood Meloni was at father's not expected to live. I got James Provines to take Doll home from the station and sent word with him to Helen, then I went to Father's to see Wood and found him suffering terribly with heart disease.

Went to the station for a good christen that was to have been sent him but did not get it. Sat up with him all night. He got better a little before day.

SUNDAY, JULY 2, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station
About four o'clock,
Wood Melon, with
whom I was sitting up
got easier and fell asleep.

About half past
five I laid down
and slept until eight.

Wood still much better
and able to sit up.

I stayed at father's
until afternoon.

Storm came on me
at Johnson's and I
took refuge in their
stable. Heavy rain
and wind.

Found folks all well
when I got home.

Spent an hour or so talking to Uncle James Hankin. Karned was hard in the afternoon. Great parade in Stubenville. Different orders marched. Singing of Channon, speeches and music and dancing was the order of the day.

Great crowd said to be there.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 5, 1876.

Home Near Hank's Station

Repaired some grain cradles in the morning and ground our cythes.

Cut about 29 dozens of wheat in the afternoon. Mr. Buxton brought a heifer over and we traded her a young cow and calf for her.

James McCabe was here and offered us thirty cents for our wool in the evening. We agreed to let him know on Saturday whether we would take or not.

THURSDAY, JULY 6, 1876.

Home Near Harlin's Sta

Took some marketing
to the station in the
morning, and some
grinding to the mill.

We spent most
of the day cutting
wheat with
the cradles.

I put an arm in
the reel of the reaper
after supper.

Weather fine.

FRIDAY, JULY 7, 1876.

Home Near Harlin's Sta.

Milked the cows before
breakfast as usual.

Wield some hay in the
forenoon and toed
some in the garden.
Thinking it would
rain, I commenced to put
up a bench-screw in
the razor shade. We
set up the reaper in
the afternoon and
cut a few dozens of
wheat.

Wrote a letter to
Uncle James Melvin
at night.
Evening cloudy.

He spent the day airing and putting up a stack of hay. It was given out and James Brabson was not very well so that the stack moved up slowly.

At supper time I got in two horses and took Grandma Haulin to the Station on her way to Holliday's Cove.

Weather was excessively hot 96 in the shade in the evening.

Attended to the milking as usual.

Attended church at Eldersville and heard Rev. Spear preach from Gen. ~~XXVIII~~ ~~22~~. He preached nearly two hours and at the close of his sermon \$15.05 were raised for missions.

Spent the afternoon at home. Weather very warm. Called in to see Henry Cooper and found him no better.

MONDAY, JULY 10, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station

We spent the day cutting
wheat. Billy Provine's
helping us. I was
not able to do much
during the day. Weather
was very hot.

Then I started from home and went to Father's and sat up during the night with Wood Melvin who was to all appearance near unto death's door.

Will. Sat up with me but slept most of the after part of the night.

Wood quite flighty. His limbs very much swollen.

Weather fine.
Billy Proovies with us.

TUESDAY, JULY 25, 1876.

Home near Hankin's Sta.

Went to bed at five o'clock at father's and slept until eight. Wood Melvin no better. At breakfast and went to the Station - and wrote cards to S. S. Taylor, Will. Melvin, Sam. and J. H. Melvin. Then went to C. M. Stephenson's and helped to ease his back. Quite a number of men there did not get entirely through.

The side plates not put on. No person seriously hurt. Got home about nine o'clock.

Rained at night.
Billy Proovies with us.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 26, 1876.

Home Near Hankin's Sto

Repaired our Cradles
in the morning and
commenced cutting oats.
Sled fifty six doz
by the evening.

Melvin until after three o'clock and then awaked Will Melvin and S. L. Gayler. Had very restless in the forepart of the night but rested easy after midnight. Weather very wet during the day.

SATURDAY, JULY 29, 1876.

Home Bear Haulin Station

Slept from 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ until seven o'clock at father's, then came home and we cut some oats and fed it up in the afternoon.

James Brabson and I went to Aunt Nancy Haulin's and helped to thresh their grain. We got home about sunset. Stewart had just got home from Pittsburgh at bed time although we had looked for him yesterday.

Rained a shower about the middle of the day.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 31, 1876.

Attended to the milking before breakfast as usual. Harnessed a team and went to Eldersville and got Sall shod, went to Robt Cooper's and took dinner and got about four bushels of wheat, then went to father's and got enough wheat to make out ~~three~~ ^{two} bushels. Weather very fine. Grandma Hamlin went to Reddell's in the evening and spent the night there.

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 6, 1876.

Arose a few minutes
after five o'clock and
chilled for and
milked before breakfast.
James Brabson and
I plowed until
supper time when the
rain stopped us.
Neddy Jackson had
some cattle to break
past him at night
and we turned them
into our field over
night

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 7, 1876.

Home Near Hardin Sta. B.

Attended to milking as
usual before breakfast.
James Brabson and
I plowed in the fore-
noon. While catching some
flies on Jack's forehead in
the afternoon he struck
me in the mouth with
his knee and I was
bed up with headache
during the evening.

Uncle James Hardin
ate supper with us.
and he sent \$3.50 with
him to buy cattle at
Sturgis for us.
Settled with Stewart
in the evening for
Wool, Sheep Etc.

Went to father's and bought 41 lambs and a buck at 1.50 pr head.

Ate dinner at father's Mill's and Stewart ate at father's. We got home a little before dark. F. H. and Rebecca Buxton at Stewart's at night.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 10, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station.

Spent the entire day at home. J. H. Buxton and Rebecca were at Stewart's during the day. Did not attend church on account of the rain. Rev. Stockton had an appointment in Eldersville and we had intended to have gone there but it was too wet.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 11, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Did some chores in the morning and prepared a fire for Helen to do a washing. John Haulin came along in the morning and we cleared out the barn and threshed a few dozens of rye and he took most of the straw. I went to Florence in the evening and brought home our spring wagon. Repairs cost seven dollars. Night very dark. Met John P. Lanther and his wife as I came home and we had some difficulty passing on the narrow road. Rained considerably during the day.

We spent the forenoon cutting apples to thicken applebutter and did some chores.

James Brabson and I made a barrel of cider and I took Robert Cooper's cidermill home in the evening. We broke the feeder but did not injure the grinding apparatus.

I brought some barrels home from the station to put apples in.

Grandma Hardin went with us to the station. We got home a little before nine o'clock.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to milking as usual before breakfast. Attended church at Eldersville and heard Rev. Wilson preach from Jer. ~~1~~ ^{pp of 23^d}. Spent the afternoon at home.

Will. Haulin and three of his children came in the evening and spent the night with us.

Weather cloudy.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 25, 1876.

I gave her twenty dollars for her services during the summer. Day literally fair. Cool in the evening.

We spent the day sowing and harrowing wheat. Stewart sowed twelve bushels and James Babson and I did the harrowing. We got through a little before sunset. John Melvin and Grannie came with John Elliott and his family to our house about dusk. John and Grannie went home at bed time. Weather fine with a good prospect of frost at night.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 28, 1876.

Uncle Jas' Melvin's Puytstown.

Arose about 5¹/₂ O'clock and did some chores. I took the Springwagon and took John Elliott and family to Uncle James Melvin's where we spent the night. Uncle James very poorly. Elliott's Children coughing considerably and very croak at night, just getting over whooping-cough. Weather fine in the forenoon but got quite cool in the evening.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station.

Arose about six O'clock at Uncle James' and took breakfast there.

Spent most of the forenoon at Uncles and took dinner at Saml. Moore's and called at G. H. Melvin's a short time in the afternoon. Came home through Frankfort and got home about seven O'clock. Left Puytstown about 3¹/₂. Morning was wet. Afternoon very fine. Elliott family with us over night.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 30, 1876.

Robert Riddle and Willie Gracey came along breaking a colt to work in the wagon. Cloudy all day and very unpleasant for the fair.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 6, 1876.

We spent most of the day cleaning up wheat screenings and timothy chaff in the barn.

I went to mill in the evening and took five bushels of wheat.

We found that we had lost about ten bushels of wheat and rice by its being mustered in the sacks.

Had some trouble at night with Charlie about taking Carpet tacks to fix his flag and then he went in to Stewart's end of the house and got tacks at the instance of Jas. Brabson. Weather cloudy and rained some.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 7, 1876.

We spent the day picking apples. We picked twelve barrels of Baldwins and two barrels of Spitzenburg. I suffered considerably with a broken rib.

I went to mill and to the station in the evening.

Cool and windy all day.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 8, 1876.

Home Near Hawlin's Sto

We attended church at
Eldersville and heard
Rev. Robinson preach from
Mark. VIII 34

We took dinner at
John Melvin's and got
home a little before
five o'clock.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 12, 1876.

The ground was frozen very hard in the morning. We moved our milk-cows to the lower field and commenced feeding them pumpkins. James Brabson hauled pumpkins in the forenoon and Stewart and I worked at the chimney of a kiln, or stack to dry apples. Mr. Brabson and Robt. McCready came and picked some apples. Willie Maxwell with them. We sowed timothy seed in the afternoon and finished our kiln in the evening and put a board roof over it. Weather very fine. Appearance of rain at night.

I illuminated Paris before

Took some butter to Hanlin Station in the morning and then attended the Presidential election at Florence and cast a vote for Rutherford B. Hayes of Ohio, Wm. A. Wheeler of N. Y. Spent the afternoon making a shirt for my saddle. Stewart and Cal went to Mr. Buxton's to eat turkey with J. H. Buxton and his newly married wife. They remained there over night. Weather fine.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Spent the day at home. James Brabson went to the station in the morning and heard there that Tilden (Democrat) was elected President but did not regard the news as settled.

Stewart went in the evening and heard that Hayes had one electoral vote ahead. Rained nearly all day and we cut some apples at night and cored them to make molasses of.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 9, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

James Branson and I hauled three loads of pumpkins in the morning and spent part of the day cutting apples to boil for molasses. Stewart worked with the apples nearly all day. At noon Fletcher Telly came and told us that Mrs. Sarah Pogue had died about five o'clock this morning and was to be buried at ten o'clock tomorrow.

He ate dinner with us. Weather cloudy and rained snowed a little. News of the election of Tilden a Democratic President confirmed.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 10, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station

I did some chores in the morning and put the prep on some boiled apples of which the women were making molasses then attended the funeral of Mrs Sarah Pogue, nine Buggies and twenty two couples on horseback in the procession. I came home without my dinner as Helen and Willie were both very poorly with the cold. "Boz" Watts helping us to husk corn. I brought home a sack from the mill thought he corn meal but it was chop. Took it back and got the meal.

Weather cool and cloudy. Election returns doubtful.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 11, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

James Brabson and I
filled up a load of
corn in the forenoon &
hauled it in. "Booz"
Matt helping us to husk.
We all husked in the
afternoon in the shock
and covered it up.
Commissioner Jackson
came to get us to
repair a piece of road.
Election returns
still unsatisfactory.
Florida, Louisiana
and South Carolina
uncertain. Both parties
claiming the victory.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 12, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Spent the forenoon at
home. Stewart and Cal.
attended church at Tucker's.
I went to Eldersville in the
afternoon and heard Rev.
Kuttese preach from
Heb. ch 14. Heard
that Annie Riddle was
sick and I came home
that way and found
Willie Gray sick
also. Weather very
fine.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 13, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

James Wadd and John Jackson helped us to husk corn during the day. James Brabson and I spent the day hauling and we cribbed about 250 bushels of ears. Husked about 200 bushels. Stewart husked with the boys and they are about ready for grain.

Weather very favorable with appearance of rain at night.

Stewart and Jim went out goose hunting at night but caught nothing.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 14, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

It is raining when I arose in the morning and rained nearly all day. John Brabson dug some coal for us.

We moved some oats from the cool room and put some eye in it out of the corn crib. I helped Helen to wash in the afternoon and night.

The ninth anniversary of our wedding day.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 15, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

We spent the day husking
and cribbing corn.

We cribbed 250 bushels.
"Boz" Gatt, James
Matt, John Jackson
and James Brabson
helping us. We kept
the teams going all day,
hauling fifty bushels
at a load. Weather
fine. Boys went
home at night.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 16, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

We spent the day,
husking and cribbing
corn. Cribbed about
250 bushels during
the day. Had the
same help that we
had yesterday.

We finished the
long field near the
old house. Took about
fourteen hundred
bushels of ears off
it. Weather very
favorable.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 17, 1876.

Home Near Hardin Sta.

Arose a few minutes before six o'clock and attended to the milking before breakfast as usual. "Boog" and James Watt and John Jackson helped us to husk corn during the day and we cribbed about three hundred bushels of ears.

We got through a little after sunset.

Weather fine. Stewart and "Boog" went to the station at night.

We heard that the prospects were favorable for the election of Sen. Hayes to the Presidency, Louisiana being to be heard from.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 18, 1876.

Home Near Hardin Sta.

We hauled three loads of pumpkins with morning and got some juice out of the old house to put over the hay shade to put corn on. Hauled three loads of coal in the afternoon about 78 bushels.

Settled with James Brazos at night for 7 months and six days work. We paid him 108.46. Stewart and I did some figuring at night in the way of a settlement.

Cloudy all day and rained at night.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 19, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

The morning was wet
and I spent the entire
day at home.

No one attended
church from our place
during the day.

Spent the day reading
in the Bible and the
American Wesleyan.

Evening became cool
yet cloudy.

Principal study of
the day was how to
entertain Charlie and
teach him those
things which make
for his eternal peace.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

Spent the forenoon doing
chores, cleaned up Liz. Keddles
copper kettle and took it
home. At dinner at Kiddle's.

Fulton to kill a beef.

We got one quarter of it
which weighed 165 lbs.

Home Near Hanlin Station.

The forenoon has cloudy and misting rain. I gathered some pumpkin seeds and Stewart and I put up some sleepers and floored the loft of our wagon shade to put corn on.

In the evening as Charlie was coming from school Willie Jackson came and told us that a bull had met him on the road and was fighting his oxen. We went to the lower part of the place and found that the boy had got the oxen loose from the cart and when he came for us they had started home and we got them at Johnson's.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 22, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station.

Attended to feeding and milking in the morning as usual. Stewart and I went to Robert Reddies and helped him to buck fifty two shocks of corn. When I came home in the evening I found Mary McKee here and J. H. Buxton and wife in at Stewart's. Willie walked two or three steps alone without the hold of anything, the first we had seen him walk. Willie Tracy was with us over night. Our Willie would not let us sleep until near two o'clock. Weather cool and cloudy.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 23, 1876.

Home Near Haulin^g Sta

Spent the forenoon doing
chores. Repaired some
fence that the horses
had knocked down
and moved some corn
in the crib in the
wagonshade.

The day was quite
cool and snowed
some in the evening.
Mary MacKee with
us over night.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 24, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

Spent the forenoon feeding and
doing chores. Moved some
corn from the crib and put
it over the wagonshade.

We moved 37 barrels of
apples from the barn and
put them in the cellar
in the afternoon.

Willie took to walking in
the evening and seemed to
learn very fast.

Weather cold with
some snow on the
ground and freezing.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 25, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Attended to feeding and milking as usual in the morning, then I harnessed the horses and took Mary McCree and my family to Robert Riddle's where we spent the day. I went to the station and got the mail. Robert went and brought Maggie home from her school near Frankfort and brought with her one of her small scholars. Snowed much all day and was very disagreeable. The election not decided in Florida and Louisiana and great suspense and anxiety experienced by all parties.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 26, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta. Va.

Attended to feeding and milking before breakfast. Attended church at Ellersville and heard Rev. Palmer preach from Isa. XLV 14

Took dinner at home. Stewart and Cal. attended church at Tucker's at night.

Weather quite cool and cloudy. Some snow on the ground and roads very splashy. Palmer's subject, "Preparation for death". Thought most about the training of our children during the evening.

Felt that Charlie was fast growing out of reach of our parental influence and what is done for him to make impressions must be done soon.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 27, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta Pa.

Spent the forenoon feeding and doing chores.

In the afternoon I went to Florence to see about getting my under teeth which were in the hands of the dentist but found that I would have to have a new impression taken.

Did not get home until dusk.

Weather cold.
Snow on the ground.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 28, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

We spent the day doing chores. We scraped some broom, corn and brought in a lot of sheep and separated them and trimmed their toes and clipped some of them.

Mary McKee and myself and family visited at Isaac Sultors until bedtime and had a very nice time.

We got home between eleven and twelve o'clock. Emarantha Sultow was not at home.

Weather very fine.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 29, 1876.

Stewart and I went to the station at night and brought our market box home but got no money.

Weather chilly and freezing. Some snow on the ground but not good sledding.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 6, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Station

Stewart and I hauled corn-fodder until after two o'clock, then I took my family and Mare C. C. Lee to Single Dam Province to stay until bedtime. I came home and helped to do the feeding and milked our cows, and helped Stewart to put the grain carriage on the wagon to haul hay. Remained at Wmch's until after nine o'clock.

Snow on the ground but not enough for good sledding.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 7, 1876.

Home near Haulin Sta.

We spent the day hauling
hay to the stacks.

Andrew Trovines
helped us and charged
us seventy five cents.

We worked until after
dusk and put in
nearly two stacks.

I felt quite unwell
at night was chilly
and chilled in my
breast and throat.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 8, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta Pa.

Stewart and I hauled a small
load of hay in the morning
then I took my two horses
and one of his and went to
Eldersville and got them shod all
around. Got eight new
shoes put on my two.

I took dinner at father's
walked down and rode up
with him in the buggy.

Stewart took John to
Paris and got him shod
so that we had our team
well prepared for hauling.
John Bralson and James
were digging coal for
us. Day cold and night
very stormy.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 9, 1876.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

The day was exceedingly cold and stormy and we spent it moving sheep and sheltering them and hauled a sled load of coal. I walked to the station for the mail at night and learned from the papers that Rutherford B. Hayes was elected President and William A. Wheeler Vice President of the United States with a majority of one electoral vote. Gilman and Hendricks receiving 184 vs Hayes & Wheeler 185 electoral votes. Democrats talking of throwing out the votes of the disputed States.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 10, 1876.

Home Near Hamilton Station.

The morning was so cold that I deemed it imprudent to go to Eldersville to church and remained at home during the day. After doing the feeding I spent most of the day reading and trying to interest Charlie. Read from the Bible and from some papers intended for the young. ~~Mary~~ McKee still with us.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 11, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Attended to feeding as usual then Stewart and I attended to solving our sled and prepared a load of grinding to take to the mill. Spelled about five or six bushels of corn and mixed with oats and filled up about seven bushels of ryeat. Stewart and Cal went in the sled to Mr. Buxton's in the evening and took the grinding with them as far as the mill.

Weather was fine. Snowing at bedtime.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 12, 1876.

Home Near Haulin' Station.

Stewart being away I had all the feeding to attend to and it kept me busy nearly all day. Put a backwall in Stewart's fireplace, made it of clay, salt and woodashes.

Mr Beabson and James were here for dinner. They were digging coal for us.

Sledding tolerably good. Snow melting some. Stewart and Cal were not at home at bed-time.

Mitchel R. Haulin and Miss Rachel Morgan were married at John Elliotts in Senkessville Lewis Co Iowa at 11 P.M. A.M.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 13, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin's Sto.

Stewart being away, I spent
the forenoon feeding.

Stewart got home about
noon and we put the
grain carriage away and
put the bed on the wagon
and hauled two loads
of coal in the afternoon.
Weather fine and
snow melting off the
ground.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 14, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin's Sto.

After attending to the
feeding Stewart and

Weather moderating some. Cloudy at night. Mary McKee still with us.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 18, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock and we attended to our feeding, then took six hogs to Burgettstown which weighed 15-05 lbs. Keed five cents per pound. We walked across the country and rode part of the way home with Joseph Crip on the sled. Snow on the ground. Joseph Bell and family and David Bullock and family were here until bedtime. Forenoon very stormy but the evening was more pleasant.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 19, 1876.

Home Near Hamlin St.

Carried a young calf
from the field
in the morning and
worked with it for an
hour or so to keep it
from freezing.

Mended Charlie's boot
in the afternoon and
took some things in

We saw a wonderful phenomenon about nine o'clock. About fifteen or twenty meteors traveling like a flock of wild geese. Were in sight perhaps a minute and ~~advancing~~ moving nearly east. Had the appearance of sparks flying from them forming trains. Moved steadily.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 22, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Stn.

While I was milking in the morning John Provine came to buy one of our cows but we did not deal.

Alex. Culbertson and his wife visited at Stewart's. Stewart and Alex went to the station in the sled. I spent the day helping to hid up our butchering. We got our lard nearly all rendered and our sausage ready to cut. Showed some during the day and made the sledding pretty good. Charlie wanted me to write that he was a good boy all day.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 23, 1876.

Home Near Huntin Sta.

Attended to feeding as usual. I got a sledsole in the morning.

Spent most of the day cutting our sausage. Made an arrangement with Harp. Provins to sell him what milk we had to spare at 12 cts per gallon at the door.

Weather fine and sledding good. Mary McKee went home with Harp in the evening.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 24, 1876.

Home Near Huntin Sta.

Attended to feeding as usual. Attended church at Eldersville and heard Rev. Palmer preach from "Pro. ~~XXIII~~ pt of 26" "The son give me thine heart". I went to father's and took dinner with Mr. Palmer and Mr. Plumer. Heard that Bro. McKee was buried on Friday.

Got home about dusk. Weather cold sledding good.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 25, 1876.

Home near Hardin Station

Attended to feeding as usual. We prepared a load of grinding and I took it to mill in the evening. Bought a box of collars.

Weather fine.
Sleeping good

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 26, 1876.

Home near Hardin Station

After doing our feeding we harnessed a team and hauled a load of hay into the barn. I had intended to have gone to mill at night but Robt Riddle and family and Charlie Grace came when we were eating supper and stayed until near twelve o'clock and I did not go.

Weather cloudy, and good sleeping. Van Morrison and family came in the morning and were with us over night.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 27, 1876.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Attended to feeding as usual. Took Mary M'Kee in sled to Saml Duncan's. Charlie Gray went with us. Stewart and Cal went with Alex. Culbertson and wife to Jacob.

Crep. Will. Haulin and family & Jacob, Bampton and family visited at Stewart's at night.

Robert Sutton's house was burned down in the evening. Quite a number of neighbors gathered in and saved most of what was down stairs in the cellar.

What was up stairs including Costner's clothes was burned.

Good sleighing.

I walked down by Thorley's and Riddle took the sleigh to father's where I met him and we went to Stephen Perine's to learn if he wanted a cropper but his houses were all engaged and we got home about dusk.

I milked our cows & fed the calf after night.
Sleighing good

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 29, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Attended to the feeding as usual. Stewart and Cal. Nan Morrison and family went to Robert Riddle's in the sled. Snowed all day and the snow was very deep in the evening and still snowing at bed time. I spent part of the day in the house doing chores and attended to all the feeding in the evening. Stewart and his load got home about dusk.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 30, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Attended to feeding in the morning as usual. We had thought of visiting at Geo. Morrison's at the Cove but as it was so stormy and snow so deep, I took Nan and the children home in the sled and Helen did not go. I got home about sunset. About a foot of snow on the ground. Roads not well broke, and snow drifting in the lanes. Received a letter from Mitchell Hanlin stating that he was married on the 12th of Dec. to Miss Rachel Morgan. Married at John Elliott's in Drakeville, Davis Co. Iowa.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 31, 1876.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Attended to the feeding
as usual. Stewart and
Cal. went to Eldersville
