MONDAY, JANUARY 1, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Attended to the feeding
as usual in the morning,
then Stewart Haulin and
I put the wagon bed on
the sled and took seven
small hogs to Buzzettown.
They weighed 1040 lbs and
we sold them at 05 cts per
lb. Got home in time
to do our feeding and
took our beehive box
to the station to be
shipped tomorrow to
Pittsburgh. Weather
cold and snow deep.
Snowed nearly all
afternoon but cleared
off at night.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 2, 1877.

Home near Haulin Station

After feeding in the morning, I shelled some corn and mixed with oats for sheepfeed and took it to the old barn in the evening.

Stewart brought Robt Riddle's boar home in the sled. Charly Grace came home with Stewart feeling very unwell.

Stewart went to the station at night and brought our butterbox home.

Weather very cold and snow deep.

Liz Riddle fell and got pretty badly hurt.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 3, 1877.

Home near Haulin Station

Spent the day doing chores. Mended some horse blankets and at night I took my family in the sled and he visited at Alex. Haulin's until bed-time. Had a good time. Miss Vine Sugar in there.

Weather clear and cold.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 4, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Attended to the milking
in the morning then
walked to the station
and went to Steuben-
ville on the cars.

When I came back I
saw the butchers at
work dressing some
cattle belonging to
James Stewart that
had been thrown off
the track by the
mail train going west.

Some lead had been
so badly hurt that they
had to be killed.

Stewart estimated his
loss at eight hundred
dollars.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 5, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to the usual
amount of feeding in
the morning and then
Stewart and I helped
David Fulton to butcher
his hogs in the forenoon
and killed his father's
hogs in the afternoon
over six in all and we
went up to Mr. Fulton's
at night and helped
to cut them up.

Got home a little
after ten o'clock.
Snow melted some
during the day.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 6, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

After attending to the feeding as usual, I took my team and went to Thorley's for my new sled but it was not completed and I brought their sleigh with me in its place. Took Mrs Cochrane home in the evening and went to Paris to get Ad. Brabson to do some sewing. Charlie went with me. Snow soft during day. Snowed very fast at night.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 7, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Attended to feeding as usual in the morning and then took my family in the sleigh to Eldersville and heard Rev. Plummer preach from III Cor. II. Had latter part of 11th. Expected to have heard Rev. Palmer but he was unable to come being afflicted with something like inflammatory Rheumatism.

Snow very deep and melting

MONDAY, JANUARY 8, 1877.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

When I went to the sheep in the morning I found one badly eaten with dogs and still living, one down among the stalks unable to rise. Skinned the wounded one in the evening and put some strychnine on it. Butchered four turkeys and twenty chickens and prepared them for market.

Snowed nearly all day. Very hard riding about through the deep snow.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 9, 1877.

Home Near Hamilton Station

Attended to feeding as usual. Found that the dogs had not protected our sheep again.

Stewart and I prepared some chopping to take to mill. Stewart and Cal. went in the sleigh to Mr. Buxton's and I had the feeding to attend to in the evening.

James Provins came for the milk at night and told us that Uncle John Provins was not expected to live and some of the other members of the family quite unwell. Stewart took our poultry to the station before breakfast. Day very cold.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 10, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Stw.

Stewart being away I had the feeding all to attend to. Went to mill in the afternoon and called in to see Uncle John Provins and found him very low and Aunt Jane very sick. Stewart came home in the evening Mr. & Mrs. Burton came to Stewart's and staid over night. Weather fine.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 11, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Attended to the feeding as usual, then went to Paris and brought Ad. Brabson to sew some for Helen. Attended Sabbath School convention at Tucker's Church in the afternoon and at night.

Wesley Robinson and his daughter and Mr. Devore were with us for supper. Convention quite interesting and quite a number of questions discussed. Rained nearly all afternoon and evening and was very disagreeable. John Mitchel and family at Stewart's over night. Snow deep but melting. Uncle John Provins died at six P. M.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 12, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Stw.

Attended to feeding as usual. Learned while feeding that Uncle John Provine had died last evening at six o'clock.

C. M. Stephenson came in the evening to get Ad. Brabson to go to Thos Stephenson's their child being sick and not expected to live. Took Ad. to Paris at night to get her clothes.

Charlie went with us in the sleigh.

Rained some during day and evening. Stewart and I went to mill on the sled.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 13, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Stw.

Attended to feeding as usual then took the team and sled and took my family to the station to attend Uncle John Provine's funeral. Did not go to the graveyard. He was buried at Burgettstown. We got home about two o'clock. Shauled a little load of hay for the sheep. Will Hamby and his daughter Kez. with Grandma Haulin' came at night.

Good sleighing. Weather fine

SUNDAY, JANUARY 14, 1877.

Home Near Harlin Stn

Steps mistle later and did not get feeding done in time to attend church. Will. Harlin and Grandma went to Provinces a short time. Robert Riddle and Liz. were here for dinner and went home in the evening. Did not seem much like Sabbath day as I did not get time to read much.

Sleeping good and weather fine.

MONDAY, JANUARY 15, 1877.

Home Near Harlin Station.

Found it raining in the morning and it rained all day. Attended to feeding as usual and hauled a small load of grain and hay to the sheep at the old barn in the evening. Snow melting rapidly and waters rising.

Healthy good.

Aunt Jane Provinces lying low and not much improvement. Jos. Cosgrove very sick also. Disease supposed to be erysipelas fever.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 16, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

Attended to feeding as usual and moved a lot of sheep to a haystack. Was obliged to ride on account of the rise of the water. Commenced freezing soon after day-light. Hauled three sledloads of corn fodder. Stewart came to the Station to see the sick folks.

Ann's Jane Province reported better. Thos' Cozgrove no better. I snophon Haulin, Mary and Angeline came to Stewart's at night to stay until bedtime. Weather fine. Drizzling good.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 17, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Attended to feeding as usual. In the afternoon Stewart and I put some repairs on an old wagon shade for a sheep shelter.

Wrote a letter to Mr. R. Haulin at night.

Mrs Cochran was with us in the evening. She washed for Cal. during the day. Weather fine. Considerable of ice on the roads. Sledging good.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 18, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station.

After doing our feeding
in the morning, Stewart
and I shelled some corn
and mixed a load of
chopping and took it
to mill.

Weather fine and
sliding good with
some appearance of
a thaw.

Willie quite unwell
at night.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 19, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Spent the forenoon
feeding and attending to
Willie who goes quite
unwell. Put up an
ash-barrel in the
afternoon. Stewart took
Mrs Buxton to Kittenhouse
Cris' in the sled.

Geo. Griffiths came and
collected our school tax.

Weather moist.
Snow melting off.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 20, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to feeding as usual and spent most of the forenoon cleaning out stables and making the stock comfortable.

Samuel Thorley brought us our new sled in the afternoon. Snow melting off very fast until about three o'clock when it commenced freezing and getting Willie quite poorly. Getting his stomach teeth

SUNDAY, JANUARY 21, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to the usual amount of feeding in the morning then I went on horseback to Eldersville and heard Rev. A. J. Wolff preach from Gal. IV 26.

Good sermon and a tolerable large congregation. Rev. Palmer not able to be present on account of Inflammatory Rheumatism. Willie some better in the evening. Roads very icy.

MONDAY, JANUARY 22, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

After doing the feeding
Stewart and I hauled
some rails and fenced
two haystacks to keep
the sheep from them,
and hauled a small
load of hay.

I attended church at
Eldersville at night and
heard Rev. A. J. Wolff
preach from Mark II
12" 13" 14" Good sermon
and good feeling in
the audience.

Roads very icy. Rev.
Wolff came home with
me from church in the
sled.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 23, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

When I went to
milk in the morning,
I found Stewart, Mooly
Cow, down sick. He went
to Paris for medicine
for her and I attended
to the feeding. Uncle Frank
Haulin' came in the evening
and bled her.

I attended church at
Eldersville at night
and heard Rev. Wolff
preach from II Cor.
v 21" Congregation
large and attentive.

Charlie went with us
in the sled to church.
Roads icy and dangerous.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 24, 1877.

Home Near Hankin Stn

Found Stewart's Morky
cow dead in the
morning and after
attending to the feeding
it was the principal
business of the day
to skin the dead
cow and haul her
away. I attended
church at Eldersville
at night and
heard Rev. H. J.
Wolff preach from
St. John II 29.
Went to church
in small sled.
Took a bunch of
hay to station for
Aunt Jane's provisions.
Roads very icy.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 25, 1877.

Home Near Hankin Stn

Attended to feeding
as usual then
Stewart and I took
a small load of hay
on the sled to the
station for Aunt Jane's
provisions. I took the
large sled to church at
night and took my
family and Ad.
Brabson along.
Aunt Jane was very afraid
of the ice but we
got along safely and
heard Rev. Wolff preach
from Acts 26 & 28.
He came home with
us after church.
Weather fine.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 26, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Arose a few minutes before six o'clock, ate breakfast and took Rev. Wolff to the station on his way home after closing a very interesting meeting.

We killed our beef during the day and took part of it Mr. Suttons.

Weather fine. Sawed some wood the Sun shone.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 27, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

After doing my feeding I prepared to go out and circulate a petition for the re-enactment of the Local Option Law. but Belle M. Carothers came and I did not go. Spent the day doing chores.

We visited at Robt. Reddell's at night and got home about midnight.

Weather fine. Snow melting off very gradually.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 28, 1877.

Home near ^{Sty} Haven

Spent the entire day
at Home. Helen
very poorly. Seemed
to be threatened with
fever and remained
in bed all day.

Chilled, had sore throat
and headache.

Did not rest well
at night.

Belle Carothers here
and attended to the
Cooking.

Weather fine.
Snow melting off
very gradually.

MONDAY, JANUARY 29, 1877.

Home near ^{Sty} Haven

Attended to feeding as
usual & some papers
to David Fulton's in
the morning. Helen's
health improved but
she was not able to
work much during the
day. Stewart and I
shelled some corn and
mixed some feed.
He took some shopping
to mill and took
Belle Carothers to the
station on her
way home.

Still thawing and
weather fine.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 30, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Attended to feeding as usual. We hauled rails and fenced a haystack. Got some straw and filled soya beds. Cut and hauled three loads of wood.

We heard by Dan Butterfoss that Robert P. Cooper's little child Annie Bethel was dead and to be buried tomorrow.

Weather very fine and snow melting off slowly. Roads getting slightly muddy in some places on the south side of the hill.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 31, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Stn. Pa.

A little before six o'clock in the morning Will Melvin came to tell us about Anna Cooper's death. I attended the funeral. Rest of my family did not go on account of the ice on the road. Lydia took the death ^{of her daughter} very hard. Four sleds and twelve couples on horseback in procession. I took dinner at Charles Scott's, called at Will Melvin's. Robert Cooper's and Alex. McConnel's on my way home. Paid out \$49⁵⁰/₁₀₀ interest on money. Got home about dusk and attended to ~~feeding~~ ^{milking} after night. Weather fine with some appearance of rain.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to feeding in the morning as usual. Went to "Major" Haulin's and got \$3.50 which we had given him with which to buy us some cattle but he failed to get them. Carried some water in the afternoon for Helen to put on the ash boiler. Weather fine and snow melting off more rapidly than for some days back.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 2, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Made a mud backwall for the stove in the morning before putting the fire in it. Attended to feeding as usual and then spent the remainder of the day doing chores about the house. Remained nearly all day. Wrote a letter to Rev. E. W. Bruce in the evening.

Night foggy.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 3, 1877.

Home Near Havelin Station

My 38th Birthday.

Attended to feeding
as usual and Stewart
Havelin and I gathered
about fifteen bushels
of apples in the orchard
to make cider of.

Many of them were
found as when they
fell from the trees.

Snow on part of
the orchard.

Weather fine -
Snow melting off
slowly. Colder in
the evening and
froze somewhat
night. Charlie not
very well.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 4, 1877.

Home Near Havelin Sta.

Attended to milking and
feeding as usual and
then attended church
at Eldersville and
heard Rev. Plymmer
preach from Heb. 11th
1st Chasse 6th Verse.
Rev. Palmer not
able to be there on
account of Inflamma-
tory Rheumatism.

Charlie quite unwell
all day. Had some
fever on him.

Weather fine. Roads
getting muddy.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 5, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to feeding as usual and talked a short time to Alex Haulin then spent the day taking care of Willie while Helen did a washing. Weather very fine. Fields bare, roads muddy.

Stewart went to the Station in the evening and met Sarrintha Buxton with the Spring wagon

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 6, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

After attending to our feeding Stewart and I took about fifteen bushels of apples to Mr Robert Sutton's and made nearly a barrel of Cider. Sarrintha Buxton called in with us a while at night. I headed up a barrel of apples and a barrel of potatoes taken by Rev C. G. Palmer at West Middletown. Weather cloudy, Roads muddy.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 7, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Arose at the usual time and attended to part of my feeding then got my team ready and took aboard of apples a barrel of potatoes, a roll of butter, some cream and some jelly and went to West Middleton to visit Rev Mr. Palmer our minister; when I got there I found that he had died about an hour and twenty minutes before I got there. Left my load and returned home by way of father's and telegraphed at the station to Mr. Palmer's friends at Blairsville Indiana Co. Pa. Got home about eleven o'clock. Roads bad.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 8, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to feeding and milking as usual, then shelled some corn for sheep feed. Went to Haulin Station, but got no answer to last night's dispatch. Will Thorla at station with team which scared at train broke loose and ran away. Were caught on the hill above station. Wagon broke some but horses not hurt. We shelled some corn in the afternoon and hauled a small load of hay to stable. McArthur gone.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 9, 1877.

Home Near Hankin Station

Arose about the usual
hour and attended to milking
and feeding at the stable,
then got ready and went
on horseback to Middletown
and attended the funeral of
Rev. Cyrus Palmer.
Two Presbyterian preachers
and one United Presb.
preacher there. and
conducted the services.
The only relatives of
the deceased there was
his mother, his wife
and two children.

Got home about
ten o'clock at
night.

Weather fine,
Roads somewhat
muddy.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 10, 1877.

Home Near Hankin Station

After feeding in the
morning Stewart went to
the station with the wagon
and took Sarah the Buxton
on her way to Eldersville.
I spent the day doing
chores. Repaired one of
Helen's shoes. Did a
churning and cut some
wood.
It cutters very fine!

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 11, 1877.

Home Near Hardin Station

Spent the day at home.
Helen called at Uncle
Sam Provine's to see
the sick and found
Harp better but aunt
Bell was not much
better. Father and
Summie Horley came
past on their way to
Pughtown to see
Uncle Cannon.
Weather very fine

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 12, 1877.

Home Near Hardin Station

Spent the forenoon feeding and
doing chores. We killed
thirteen chickens and
prepared them for market.
Summie Horley and father
came from Pughtown
about three o'clock
and ate dinner with us.
Weather changed and
got quite cold in the
evening.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 13, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Arose at 5 1/2 o'clock
and took our boxes
of marketing to the
station before
breakfast. While we
were doing our
feeding in the morning
Mr Blypton came
and Stewart spent
the remainder of the
day with him.

I hauled some fodder
for the cattle in the
afternoon and Stewart
went to the station for
the boxes in the evening
but did not get them.
Was cold all day.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 14, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Attended to feeding as usual.
We prepared the wagon
and hauled in three loads
of hay to the stable, hauling
from a stack that had
stood over year.

I took some wheat to
the mill in the evening
and brought home our
marketing boxes.

Willie had got his
little finger burned
just before I got
home. Not very bad.
Weather very fine
but cool.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 15, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to feeding as usual, then Stewart and I spent the remainder of the day hauling hay.

At night I wrote a letter to J. F. Miller on business connected with the Thorley estate. The weather very fine.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 16, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

While we were feeding in the morning I found our boys tearing up one of our old bucks which they had nearly killed and not killed and skinned him. We took a load of hay to the station for Aunt Jane Provier and hauled a small load to the barn. John Provier came in the evening and got a can of milk and paid us 85 cts for it.

The weather fine but cloudy and windy in the evening.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 17, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Attended to feeding as usual and then spent the remainder of the day doing chores.

Did a churning and cleaned up my Sunday clothes. Near midnight our dog Pete came onto the porch and aroused us by scratching on the floor. Got up and found him very sick with evidences of having taken poison. Suppose he got it on a sheep which we had poisoned for sheep thief dogs and we failed to tie our own at night and he died before morning. Weather cold & windy!

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 18, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Arose at half past six and attended to feeding. We attended church at Elderaville and heard Rev. Wolen preach from John. III 33. Congregation about as large as usual. We took dinner at father's & Will's. I wrote a letter to Rev. H. S. Childs for Mr. Wolen and put it in the office as we came home.

We met with Mrs Palmer and her mother-in-law at father's on their way home. Weather very fine.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 19, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to the usual amount
of feeding in the morning.

Shelled some corn in the
morning for the sheep
and Stewart and I hauled
a load of hay for the
calves. Brabson's were
here digging coal for
us and took dinner
with us. I repaired
some chairs in the
afternoon and attended
to the feeding and
milking, Stewart being
at Biggletown.

Snowed some in the
morning but nearly
all melted off.

Wind Cold

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 20, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

After doing the feeding we
put the bed on the wagon
and hauled five loads
of coal. Stewart went
to the township election
in the afternoon and I
went in the evening.

Weather very fine and
roads as smooth and
dry as summer time.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

While I was feeding in
the morning James Cassidy
came along with a patent
corn planter. He hitched
up the team and
hauled four loads of
cegal during the day.
John Melvin came
just before dinner
and stayed with us
until after four
o'clock. Grandma
Haulin came home
in the evening.
Weather remarkably
fine & roads very good.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 22, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Spent the day clearing out
the smokehouse and
preping off some apples
that had frozen to make
some vinegar of the
cider. Attended a
Sabbath School convention
in Florence at night
and had a good time.
Got home about eleven
o'clock. Weather very
fine.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 23, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Sta

Arose a few minutes before six o'clock and attended to the usual amount of feeding and milking then got ready and took my family to ~~the~~ Morrisons in the Cove and I went to Stembenville on an errand. Man. Morrison has at church when we went down and we stopped at Doctor Griffiths. Helen remained there until she came home. Weather cloudy and rained as we came home. Grandma Hamlin threatened with Syphtheria at night.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 24, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Attended to feeding and milking in the morning and then lifted our meat from the barrel and hung it up.

Grandma Hamlin was quite unwell all day and at night we gave her a corn sweat and she slept pretty well. Weather cloudy. Rained and snowed nearly all day. Snowed fast at night and ground became very white.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 25, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Attended to feeding
and milking as usual.

Attended Church at
Paris and heard
Rev. May preach
from Rev. ~~AVII~~ P. L.
Clause 14th verse.

Congregation small
and roads very
splashy. Snow melting.

Grandma Haulin
some better but still
poorly.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to feeding and
milking as usual, then got
ready and went to Eldersville
to get some Blacksmithing
done. Got Cora shod all
around and some harness
repaired. Went to Mr.
Cassiday's and was qualified
concerning a bill for a coffin
for Mrs. Metcalf.

Stopped a few minutes
at father's and a few
minutes at Ann Fosdy's
and learned that Mary
Cooper was very sick
with Diphtheria. Got
home a little after dark.
Weather very fine.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 27, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Arose a few minutes before six o'clock and harnessed my team and Stewart took our marketing to the station before breakfast. Attended to our feeding as usual and shelled some corn for the sheep and finished cleaning our broom corn. Grandma Haulin, Cal. and Willie all, quite poorly during the day.

Stewart went to the station for the box in the evening. Weather fine.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 28, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Arose about six o'clock attended to feeding as usual, took some grain to the old barn on the sled. Stewart and I built a few panels of fence and made some rails. Made a new mall in the evening and I half soled my boots at night. Grandma Haulin not getting well very fast. Weather very fine.

THURSDAY, MARCH 1, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Stn

We attended to our feeding as usual then spent the day making rails and cutting rail timber.

In the evening Uncle Grant came and invited us to his logrolling on tomorrow.

Weather fine with some appearance of rain.

FRIDAY, MARCH 2, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Attended to feeding as usual. Was wet in the morning and we did not go to the logrolling until

after ten o'clock then Stewart and I both went to Uncle Grant Haulin's and helped to bolt logs until evening.

Ate supper there and came home and did feeding.

Three ox teams and a horse team and about eighteen hands at the rolling; did not get entirely done.

SATURDAY, MARCH 3, 1877.

Home Near Hardin Station.

After feeding in the morning we finished hauling our corn fodder then Stewart and Cal went to Cpr. Buxton's in the Springwagon.

I went to the Station and got the mail.

Aunt Sarah Hardin and Granty visited us in the afternoon.

And took supper with us. Read in the

Pittsburgh Commercial Gazette until after ten o'clock, of the proceedings in Congress counting the Electoral votes.

Weather somewhat cloudy.

SUNDAY, MARCH 4, 1877.

Home Near Hardin Sta

Stewart being away I attended to all the feeding and then got ready and went to Eldersville and attended prayer meeting in the Wesleyan Church.

Took dinner at home.

Very cold during the day and froze very hard at night.

MONDAY, MARCH 5, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Sta

Attended to feeding as usual, hauled a load of hay for our calves and took two horses and a pole and broke down our corn stalks preparatory to plowing for oats.

John Bigger came along in the evening and notified us that the young folks of the neighborhood intended to come to sing at our house tomorrow evening. Weather very cold and windy.

TUESDAY, MARCH 6, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Attended to feeding as usual then Stewart and I took our white faced cow to Uncle G. S. Hanlin's. Spent the afternoon doing chores. At night quite a number of young folks came in and sang until after ten o'clock. Had a very enjoyable time. Weather very cold. No snow on the ground.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 7, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station.

After doing our feeding
we went to the woods
and made some rails
enough to make out
200. Weather more
moderate. Wrote
out the multipleca-
tron table for
Charlie at night
and pasted it in
his book.
Bobs all well.

THURSDAY, MARCH 8, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station Pa.

The day was wet all through
and I had a hard time
getting one lot of our sheep
to their feed in the morning.
Spent the afternoon
mending harness.
Waters pretty high in
the evening. Wind rising
after night and some
appearance of getting colder.

FRIDAY, MARCH 9, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Felt quite unwell with
pain in my back all day.
Attended to feeding as
usual. Helped Robert
Riddle to shell some
corn. Sold him some
corn and oats and
sent two bushels of
corn with him to mill.
Had intended going to
Eldersville to an exhibi-
tion but it was so
cold and stormy that
I did not go.

SATURDAY, MARCH 10, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to feeding
as usual and took some
corn to the old barn to
feed to the sheep there.
Hauled a sled load of
straw for the cows in
the stable. I went to
the station in the evening
and from thence to Eldersville.
Got home a little before
dark. Luther Buxton
at Stewarts over night.

snow on the ground.

After I had done my
feeding it commenced
raining and rained
nearly all day and I
spent the day in the
house reading the
Pittsburgh Commercial
Gazette and some
other papers.

Spent the evening at
home. Wrote a letter
to Rev. A. S. Wolff.

TUESDAY, MARCH 13, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Attended to feeding as usual. Stewart went to Mr. Geo. Miller's to see a cow for which he wanted to trade a mare. Made a few rails during the day and went with John Haulin at night to Isaac Fulton's to a singing. Not many there. Got home a little before twelve o'clock. Had a good time. Roads bad.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 14, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Attended to the usual amount of feeding and just when I was through Robert Riddle came with a stray dog and as we had none I made a collar and chained him up. Helped Stewart to chop a little before dinner. Rained and snowed nearly all afternoon and we did chores. Riddle stayed with us until evening. Grandma Haulin still with us.

THURSDAY, MARCH 15, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

After doing the feeding in the morning Stewart and I cut down some timber and made some rails until dinner time when Will, Shorley and Jimmie came and Will and I spent the afternoon making up our accounts in settlements of the estate of David Shorley deceased. Will and Jimmie stayed with us over night. Weather very fine.

FRIDAY, MARCH 16, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Attended to feeding as usual. W. H. Shorley and Jimmie started home and Charlie and I went to Miller's Schoolhouse and attended the closing exercises of the school taught by John Biggs. Nice. The nice and claf recitations. Charlie recited the poem "Harrison Learns". We attended a singing at Uncle Sam Provine's at night. Quite a number there but the singing was not good for want of independent Bass singers. Snowed nearly all day and evening. We went in sled.

SATURDAY, MARCH 17, 1877.

Walter Melon's ^{Will} Bear Eldersville

Attended to feeding as usual and took some grain to the old house.

In the afternoon we got ready and went to Will Melon's and spent the night there.

Sledding pretty good. Some mud in places. Father & Mother at Middletown.

We slept at father's night quite cold.

SUNDAY, MARCH 18, 1877.

Fathers near Eldersville

Took breakfast at father's and I helped Will to do his feeding. Priscilla and Willie Cosgrove went with Charlie and me to Bethel in the sled and heard Rev. Hos. Cullen preach from Rom. IX 13 & 14 inclusive. Ate dinner at Will's. Father and Mother came home in the evening and we spent the night there.

Will and I attended Church at Eldersville and heard Rev. Cullen preach from Isaiah IV 13 & 14 inclusive. Sledding pretty good. Night quite cold.

MONDAY, MARCH 19, 1877.

Took breakfast at

No. Money in it. Weather very fine.

Arose at five O'clock and fed the horses and other stock about the stable and harnessed my team. Mr. Buxton and his wife and daughter went home in the forenoon.

We plowed until supper time and then planted our early potatoes. Planted nearly three pecks of early rose.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Arose a few minutes after five O'clock and attended to the usual amount of feeding and harnessing before breakfast. Milked one cow and then we spent most of the day plowing sod ground. Hauled off some rails and repaired some fence in the afternoon and hauled some straw and put in some washes in the meadow.

Rained in the evening.

Helen and Grandma were cleaning house expecting Aunt Patsy Stephenson and her daughters from California.

SATURDAY, APRIL 28, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Eto

Awoke in the morning
and found it raining.
Spent the day doing
chores. Cleaned off
the old garden.

Put down the carpet
on our kitchen in
the afternoon and took
a trip to take a cow
to G. S. Haulin's and
parled. Rained very
hard in the evening
and I got some water
net.

SUNDAY, APRIL 29, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Eto

Attended to the usual amount
of feeding in the morning
and milked the cows.
Harnessed the team and
Grandma Haulin, Annie,
Buxton, Charlie and I
went to Paris in the spring
wagon. Heard Rev. May
preach from III Sam
5: 4, 6 verses. Were there
for Sabbath School.
Lesson: Subject "Elisha
at Dothan" found in III
Kings. Elmer and Charlie
went to Robert Kiddle's in
the evening. Billy
Provine's infant child
was buried. Took
Willie with me over the
hill to see the lambs.
Weather fine but cool.

MONDAY, APRIL 30, 1877.

Home near Hanlin's Station

Greased my shoes in the morning and fed the horses and calves before breakfast. Robert, Riddle and Willie, Gracy helped us to haul manure during the day and we hauled with three teams. Mary and Angeline Hanlin ate supper with us. I felt very small during the day with boils on my back. Weather very cool and cloudy.

TUESDAY, MAY 1, 1877.

Home near Hanlin's Station

Arose a few minutes after five o'clock and attempted to ease a bit and got so sick that I was obliged to lie down again. Stewart and I spent about two hours attending to the young lambs. Robert, Riddle and Willie, Gracy finished hauling manure and we plowed with three teams during the remainder of the day. Got through plowing for corn about dusk.

Snowed nearly all day and was very disagreeable by times.

Nelson commenced weaning Willie and he was very cross in the afternoon and evening.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 2, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Attended to the feeding in the morning as usual. Robert Riddle and Willie Gracey were here with a sul with two teams we hauled manure from about our stable.

Willie Gracey and I went to Eldersville at night and attended a temperance meeting. Some of Murphy's Croakers were expected from Tipton but they did not come and Rev. W. S. Kendig addressed the meeting to the edification of those present. We got home about twelve o'clock. Weather cool and private.

THURSDAY, MAY 3, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

We attended to our feeding and our young lambs in the which were considerably troublesome. And we spent the forenoon hauling manure on the corn ground. Robert Riddle continued with Stewart hauling in the afternoon and got through. My family went with me in the spring wagon and we attended a Sabbath School Convention in Eldersville and found it very interesting. Session at 2 P.M. and also at night. Took some part in the discussion of the question. "Should persons be retained in the school as officers or teachers who persist in the use of alcoholic liquors or tobacco." We got home a little after twelve o'clock. Had a good time.

FRIDAY, MAY 4, 1877.

Home Near Hamilton Station

Arose a few minutes after five o'clock and found the ground white with frost. We attended to the young lambs and the feeding. Took the teeth out of our harrows and sent them to the shop with Robert Kiddle to get them sharpened. I pulled the wool of two dead sheep. We made our garden in the afternoon. Willie had the car ache in the evening. The morning was quite cool and frosty but the day was very pleasant.

SATURDAY, MAY 5, 1877.

Home Near Hamilton Station

Arose a few minutes before six o'clock and went out among the lambs before breakfast and found two dead and one or two chilled. Having bad luck, Stewart went to Steubenville. I did chores all day and attended to the lambs. Went to mill in the afternoon and took four bushels of wheat.

Bought some things at the store. Did not get evening work done until quite late.

Had to go to the barn to the lambs after supper.

Received a good long letter from 'C. H. Patterson'. Rev. May brought our mail from the station. Rained in the evening.

SUNDAY, MAY 6, 1877.

Home Near Harlin Sta.

Spent the forenoon at home. Wrote a letter for father to Mr. Johnston Palmer, of Black Lick, Indiana Co., Pa.

Attended church at Eldersville in the afternoon and heard Wolen preach from Acts 11:21.

Weather somewhat cloudy in the forenoon evening very fair. Our young lambs very troublesome.

MONDAY, MAY 7, 1877.

Home Near Harlin Sta.

Spent the morning attending to the lambs. Put the teeth in our harrows in the forenoon and cleaned out a ditch in the afternoon and commenced harrowing our corn ground. At Supper time it commenced raining and we put our cows and lambs in the shelter again.

TUESDAY, MAY 8, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Spent the morning attending to the sheep. Considerable trouble with the young lambs. We cut a tree to make ~~a~~ a lumber for box to wash sheep in. Took the log to the mill in the afternoon. I went for the market box in the evening but it did not come.

Rained considerably during the day and was very cool.

Spattered our lines and lambs at night.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 9, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Attended to the sheep in the morning then we harnessed three horses and went to the sawmill and brought home the lumber of which to make our box to wash sheep in. 152 ft of it sawing cost \$83.

Stewarts went to Burgett's town in the afternoon to see the doctor concerning his rheumatism.

I spent the afternoon attending to the lambs. Eric refusing to own them.

The weather cool and cloudy. Rained during the day some.

THURSDAY, MAY 10, 1877.

Home Near Hankin Ste

Spent some time attending
to the lambs in the morning
then got up a team and
got some timbers for our
box to wash sheep in.

I went to the mill in
the afternoon and to
the Station.

Stewart and I spent
the evening framing
some timbers for box
for sheep washing.
Weather cool and
cloudy.

FRIDAY, MAY 11, 1877.

Home Near Hankin Station

Found the lambs all
right in the morning.
We spent the day
harrowing corn ground.

Stewart suffering some
with rheumatism in his
feet and legs.

Weather fine with
some appearance of
rain. Frost in the
morning and cool all
day.

SATURDAY, MAY 12, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Station

I spent most of the forenoon working with the young lambs.

We harrowed corn ground with two teams. Stewart was not able to walk and harrow so he rode his lead horse. Alex. Culbertson and his wife were at Stewarts for tea.

Weather fine with some frost in the morning.

SUNDAY, MAY 13, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Attended to the lambs in the morning before breakfast. Stewart took Jimmie Bupton to Bethel in the forenoon and took Cal. with him to Robert Kiddles.

We went to Suckers Church to hear preaching but found there was only Sabbath School. Weather fine and warm. No frost in the the first morning without for several days.

MONDAY, MAY 14, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Brought in the horses and fed and harnessed them before breakfast. Got some elm bark for Belle Carothers. Robert Riddle and Willie Gray helped us during the day and we harrowed our corn ground over and marked it out one way before supper and planted eight rows after supper. Took Grand-ma Hanlin to the station on horseback on her way to Washington. Bought some prunes and some other little articles. Weather very fine. Woods thickening up very fast.

TUESDAY, MAY 15, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Stn.

Arose at 5 1/2 o'clock, kindled the fire and milked the cows before breakfast.

Went to G. D. Hanlin's to try to get a hand to help Robert Riddle plant corn, but failed to get one. Helped Robert to plant while Stewart was helping David Fullers and mother got through.

Riddle's ground very hard and we could not come much speed. Rained some at supper time and again at night.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 16, 1877.

Home near Hanlin Station

Arose a few minutes before five and attended to feeding & milking before breakfast. Helped Robert Reddle to finish planting corn in the forenoon and we planted a little before dinner and then planted the remainder of the day. Mr. Hanlin, David Sulter, Robert Reddle, and Willie Gray helping us. Weather fine but threatening rain home. Grandma Hanlin away at Jas Carothers'.

THURSDAY, MAY 17, 1877.

Home near Hanlin Station

Arose a few minutes before six and milked the cows and brought John in and fed and harnessed him before breakfast. When we were about ready to sit down to breakfast, two tramps came and wanted breakfast. I told them if they would cover corn, or how I would give them breakfast. They did well for an hour, I then hired them for 25 cts a piece for the rest of the job and it took us until supper time. Robert Reddle and Willie Gray were helping us. Weather very warm.

FRIDAY, MAY 18, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to the usual
amount of feeding and
milking in the morning.
Robert Riddle and Willie
Gracy came to help prepare
a lot for potatoes.

Stewart and Cal went to
Mr. Buxton's in the after-
noon. I spent a good
portion of the day working
with a cow that was
trying to pig. Took two
from her. Was fearful
that she might not
live. Weather very
warm.

Willie Gracy with us
over night.

Milked Stewart's cow
at noon.

SATURDAY, MAY 19, 1877.

Home Near Haulin St.

Attended to milking before
breakfast. Attended to
the sick sow some
during the day. Took two
dead pigs from her. Salted
two outside of sheep.

Robert Riddle and I
hauled some sails and
built a fence along
one side of our
potato patch. Caught
some fish with a
coffee sack line.

Weather very hot.
Grandma Haulin came
some about dinner
time. Milked Stewart's
cow at noon.

SUNDAY, MAY 20, 1877.

Home Near Hankin Station

Milked two cows
before breakfast attended
to the stock. Dick row
seemingly better.

Attended to the milking
of Stewarts cow in his
absence. Cow giving
so much milk that she
had to be milked three
times per day.

Read some in bible
and American Wesleyan
Weather very warm.

MONDAY, MAY 21, 1877.

Home Near Hankin Sta.

Spent the morning attending
to stock. Salted some
and milked one of Stewarts
Cows which had a young
calf. Helped Robert
Riddle to clear off some
elder roots from our
potato patch and
plowed some of it
after supper.
Weather very warm.

TUESDAY, MAY 22, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Took the market boys
to the Station in the
mornng. Helped Robert
Biddle to plow our
potato patch. Got
through at noon and
Biddle harrowed it. I left
to frame the sheep washing
box in the afternoon.
James P. McAlmont
was helping me all
day. Stewart was not
able to work in the
afternoon. Afflicted
with rheumatism.
Drove to the Station in
the evening and got
our market boxes.
Rained home and got
cool during the day.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 23, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Helped Robert Biddle to load
a saw log on the log wagon
and he and Stewart took
it to the sawmill for Agent
James Proomes with four
horses. Spent nearly
all day putting in a
box to wash sheep in.
Could not get the water
into it as deep as we
had it made. and had
to take it down some.
J. P. McAlmont washed
one lot of sheep.
Weather cool.
Stewart poor.

THURSDAY, MAY 24, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Spent the forenoon putting
the spouts to the box and putting
a bridge in it for the sheep
to get out on. Willie
Gracy and I spent the
afternoon trimming
our yearling lambs.
Found it a large job.
Weather very cool
with appearance of
very heavy frost.
Stewart Hanlin not
able to do much.
Did not work any
scarcely during the day.

FRIDAY, MAY 25, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Helped to milk the cows in
the morning and fed the
horses, then Willy Gracy and
I spent the day
"tagging sheep".

Grandma Hanlin sent
to see uncle James Hanlin
and found him some
better.

Weather very cool
some frost in the
morning.

Arrive Reddle with
us over night.

SATURDAY, MAY 26, 1877.

Home near Hanlin Station

Brought the horses in and fed them before breakfast. Went to Robert Riddle's and took some pine straw to put under carpets. Robert and Willie Greer helped me to take a lot of sheep and castrate our lambs and washed our ewes. Stewart and Cal visited at Aunt Nancy Hanlin's. Stewart not able to work. Frost in the morning. Weather fine.

SUNDAY, MAY 27, 1877.

Home near Hanlin Station

Went out to see the lambs and brought in the horses and fed them before breakfast. Charlie and I rode over to Eldersville on horseback and heard Wolen preach from Nehemiah, V, 3. Came home and took dinner and Grandma Hanlin and I rode up to Tucker's church and heard Rev. Ross Stephenson preach from St. Peter III 18. He preached a very good and interesting sermon. Congregation tolerably large and weather fine but some what cloudy in the evening.

MONDAY, MAY 28, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Spent the forenoon
washing sheep. Mr.
goes through about noon
and planted some
potatoes before supper
and Robert Riddle
and I platted one of
the felves of our spring-
wagon after supper.
I took the team to
Riddle's in the evening
and brought Helen
and Annie Riddle
and left home with
me. The weather fine

TUESDAY, MAY 29, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Arose about the usual
hour and brought in the
horses and fed them
before breakfast.
Left Riddle, Helen and
I went to Stuberoville
in the springwagon.
Took supper at Dev.
Morrison's. Had some
trouble getting there.
Had Mr. Connell come
with us from Stuber-
oville to Paris.
Weather very warm
and dry.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 30, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Attended to feeding as usual and set out some tomato plants in the forenoon.

After dinner we found that the dogs had been among our sheep and killed eleven and mortally wounded three.

We pulled the wool off some of them in the evening. Robert Crispwell, Swift Patton and S. D. Lockhart were here as messengers & committee to prepare a programme for a Sabbath School Convention and we did not get to bed until after twelve o'clock.

THURSDAY, MAY 31, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Spent most of the day pulling wool and shearing wounded sheep. We buried fourteen sheep that we had killed by dogs. Stewart went to Florence in the evening. Robert Patton jr. Reared a sheep house.

Weather quite dry and warm during the day.

FRIDAY, JUNE 1, 1877.

Home Near Hamilton Station

Went out among the sheep before breakfast. Spent the forenoon preparing ground and planting sweet potatoes. Set out some tomato plants in the evening.

We took the sheep washing box out of the run and set it up in the barn to put grain in.

Weather very fine but quite dry. Some appearance of rain in the evening.

SATURDAY, JUNE 2, 1877.

Home Near Hamilton Station

Put some nails in the toe of my boot before breakfast.

We got in our sheep in the morning and doctored some that were bitten with dogs. Sheared one. Salted the sheep in the afternoon and put hinges on a box to send marketing in to Pittsburg. Stewart went to the Station and sold brake horse and left him.

Took per back and met him.

Maggie Riddle here through the day.

Some appearance of rain in the evening.

SUNDAY, JUNE 3, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Went out before breakfast
and saw the sheep.

We attended church at
Eldersville and heard Rev.
Willson preach from John
III 17. We took dinner
at father's and got
father's and mother's
pictures. We were coming
home and stopped at
Mr Cosgrove's during a
shower. Got home
about dusk. Did not
rain very much.

MONDAY, JUNE 4, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Brought in the horses before
breakfast and fed them.
Stewart took Sall and Cora
to Robert Redell's and put
them to his horse.

We spent a good portion
of the day preparing to
shear sheep.

I was out among the
wounded sheep and cut
one throat that was
being eaten up with
worms. Robert Redell
set out some sweet potato
plants in the morning.
Rained a very light shower
during the day.

TUESDAY, JUNE 5, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Arose at five O'clock brought
in the horses and fed them
and harnessed two of them
before breakfast and took
the marketing to the station.
Went to Eldersville and
got some crocks. Got
my boot mended and
got the Spring wagon
mended some. Stewart
and I built a pen for
sheep shearing and I
plowed a ditch below
the house to carry
the water. Cut down
some meat which
Helen was frying away.
Went to the Station at
night for the boxes but
did not get them.
Rained a nice shower in
the morning.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 6, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Spent the day doing chores
Went out among the
sheep in the morning
and found two lambs too
weak to get along and brought
them to the House Pound
Another sheep which the
boys had killed.

It is made a strap of
walking for the wool-rolling
box. Rained most
of the day.
Margaret and
Charlie went to Provinces
in the evening.

THURSDAY, JUNE 7, 1877.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Spent the morning repairing
our wool rolling loom and
finished preparing for
sheep shearing. Stewart
went into the neighbor-
hood of Paris to hunt
sheep shearers and I went
to Eldersville and to
Churchland's. Carried a
dispatch to John Church-
land for Ulysses Wheeler.
Did not see John Church-
land, but got the promise
of Agnew Robertson
to shear tomorrow.
Got home about nine
o'clock. Weather fine

FRIDAY, JUNE 8, 1877.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Arose a few minutes before
five o'clock and brought
in a lot of sheep before
dinner time. L. Robertson
S. S. Fungton and Robert
Riddle helped me during
the day. Stewart was not
able to do much. We put
out 56 sheep during the
day. Rained in the evening
and some of our sheep
got wet. L. Robertson
remained with us
over night.

We put up two lots of
sheep for tomorrow's
shearing

SATURDAY, JUNE 9, 1877.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock and brought in a lot of sheep before breakfast. We spent part of the day shearing sheep. John Murkland, Leurgos Robertson, Alex. Haulin and Thad. Worstell helping us to shear and Robert Kiddle rolling wool. Stewart was able to work mutton.

I went to Eldersville at night and heard Nolan preach from Acts 17th & 6th. Got home after ten o'clock. Weather wet.

SUNDAY, JUNE 10, 1877.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Went out to see the sheep before breakfast and when I let the horses out they went to McCalmont's and I had to bring them back. We went to Eldersville and attended sacramental meeting. Heard Nolan preach but did not hear his text. Took dinner at C. M. Stephenson's. Attended Sabbath school and heard Rev. W. L. Willson preach in the Wesleyan church in the evening from Isa. VII 14th. Congregation large. Weather cool. Some appearance of frost.

MONDAY, JUNE 11, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock and went out to see the sheep before breakfast.

Spent the day shearing sheep. John Murckland had Worstell and Alex Hanlin helping us. Robert Riddle rolling the wool.

We did not get quite through. Had six bucks left to shear. We shored 156 during the day.

Weather fine. Sheep were somewhat wet in the morning.

TUESDAY, JUNE 12, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

A little before five o'clock in the morning Margaret heard the dogs on the hill and thought they were on our sheep. Went out and found a hound and shepherd in the wheat field. Went to Robert Fulton's place to see if his dog was at home and found that he was. Our cattle got into Fulton's field and I had some trouble getting them out. Had Worstell helped us to finish shearing sheep. We shored 6 bucks in the forenoon, and plowed our early potatoes and garden in the evening. Patrick Cowan cutting blowwood for Stewart.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 13, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Arose at 1 1/2 O'clock & went
to see the sheep and brought
in the horses before
breakfast. Horses ran
away from me & had some
trouble to get them.

Commenced working our
Corns. Mr & Mrs. Buxton
& Mr. & Mrs. Kellenhouse
Crew visited at Stewart's
during day.

Weather fine & warm
Re-planting our corn as
we worked it. Willie
Tracy with us.

THURSDAY, JUNE 14, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and
brought in the horses &
fed them before breakfast.

Helped to milk the cows
and Stewart and Willie
Greer took Blop W
Wyle Grant Haulin's
He spent the day
working corn & replanting.

Stewart was down at
Riddle's in the evening
and got our mail
letter from Rev. Wolff
and notice of our
regimental reunion
on the 27th inst.

Weather fine.
Some appearance of
rain.
Wrote a letter to Rev. A. S.
Wolff at night.

FRIDAY, JUNE 15, 1877.

Home Near Hank's Station

Arose at five o'clock and brought in the lois before breakfast. We spent the day working corn and replanting. Willie Gray was with us.

I took the two mares to Riddle's in the evening. They were not in season.

Rained some after supper and rained pretty heavy sometime through the night.

SATURDAY, JUNE 16, 1877.

Home Near Hank's Station

Ground wet in the morning and we could not work corn. Went to see two sets of sheep before breakfast and salted them.

Salted all the stock and mended my boots and shoes. Washed some tags of wool in the evening. Rained some during the day.

Stewart went to Eldersville and got his horse shod.

SUNDAY, JUNE 17, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Slept until near six o'clock.
Helped to milk the cows
and brought in the horses
before breakfast. Went to
Robert Kiddle's and got
Grandma Haulin's Bonnet
and we went to Paris
to church with the Springago.
Heard Rev. Graham
preach from Ct Psalm
1st verse. Heard a dog
barking in the afternoon
and fearing he was after
our sheep went to him
and found Kiddle's dog
with a groundhog on a
small tree which I
shook off and he killed.
Weather very fine. Spent
the evening at home. Felt
very sleepy.

MONDAY, JUNE 18, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Arose at half past four
o'clock, kindled fire, brought
in the horses and took some
in the garden before break-
fast. Robert Kiddle and
Willie Grace came and helped
us in our corn during the
day. James Carothers and
his two little boys came
along and Willie took
them to John Carothers.
We brought in our
bucks in the morning
and doctored for worms
in the head. I plowed
our early potatoes in the
evening and plowed our
garden. Day very warm
I threatened rain in the
evening.

TUESDAY, JUNE 19, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Station

We packed our basket in the evening and Robert Kiddle came and took the box to the station. Stewart and I hoed our potatoes, garden and truck patch. We went to Florence in the afternoon and bought about seven dollars worth of goods. Took supper at Jos. Bells and I got one of my teeth filled. Stewart and Robert Kiddle cut at tree supposed to have bees in it but it was empty.

Somewhat appearance of rain. Mowed some weeds in the old garden in the evening.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 20, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Arose at five and mowed some weeds in the old garden before breakfast. We got some wheat ready and Stewart took it to mill and brought some the market box and some salt. I plowed corn part of the day. Stewart did chases, mowed sheep &c. Picnic at Criss Creek Village Presbyterian congregation. Rev. J. W. Stockton tendering or resigning his pastorate after 50 years charge. Presented with a good headed cane and a nice reading chair. Weather very warm.

THURSDAY, JUNE 21, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock, brought in the horses and fed them before breakfast. Some appearance of rain. Looked out one horse and worked corn until 10 1/2 o'clock when Will Meloin and his family came on their way to Paris to Sabbath School Convention. About half past twelve when we were nearly ready to go Uncle Charlie Hanlin and his two daughters and Miss Bell Johnston stopped out of the rain and remained here until evening when he attended the evening session of the convention and had a good time. Will and family here over night. Heavy rain in the afternoon.

FRIDAY, JUNE 22, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Will and his family here until two o'clock. I did not work and during forenoon went out among our stock and hens to D. S. Lutten's and got some sweet potato plants & some cabbage plants. In the afternoon Stewart and I hauled some staves and have a swarm of bees with which we had considerable trouble and did not get them all in. I got stung several times. Weather fine but quite cool at night.

SATURDAY, JUNE 23, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Spent most of the day
plowing corn. Bees swarmed
just before dinnertime
and Annie Riddle and
Charlie followed them to
the tree into which they
went on our own place.

I quit work at supper-
time and Helen and I
went to Mill and to the
station. Got some ice
cream at H. F. Provinces
and he called a short
time at Aunt Jane's
and got home a little
after ten o'clock and
Helen ironed until near
twelve. Annie Riddle here
and Grand ma Haulin also.
Weather very fine.

SUNDAY, JUNE 24, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Arose about six o'clock after
Grandma Haulin had milked
the cows. Brought in the
horses and we attended church
at Tucker's and heard Rev.
Robinson preach from Mat.
XVII of 24". Had intended
to have gone to Eldersville
to prayer meeting at the
Presbyterian church but Helen
did not think she was able
to go there and did not want
to stay at home alone, so
I had to go handier to home.
John Haulin went with us

she came home. She went

MONDAY, JUNE 25, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Sted.

Attended to the milking
and cut some elders
before breakfast.

Stewart went to Paris
and got his horse shod
and found out certainly
that Frank Mahon had
stolen his buggy whip. Charles
Bratton was with him and
acknowledged it. Ann Holly
and Johnie came in the fore-
noon and spent the day
with us. Stewart and
I engaged with Uncle James
to put in two culverts.

We took a cow to the
buck in the afternoon
and I got some sweet
potato plants at D. S. Hutton
for Ann. Thimble ~~at~~ sixteen
rows of corn. Rained some
at night. Have a swarm of
bees in the afternoon.

TUESDAY, JUNE 26, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Arose a little after five
o'clock and found it raining,
rained very hard. We put a
lock on our boot room door.
Spent the day making a
culvert on the road.
Cut timber to cover two
culverts did not get
through with the one
we put in.

Day very warm and
neither of us felt very
well. I was troubled
some with birds.
Charlie Bratton and one
of Mahon's boys brought
home Stewart's stolen
buggy whip in the
evening and gave it to Charlie
to give to Stewart.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 27, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

We sprinkled our early potatoes with Paris Green in the morning and spent the forenoon finishing a culvert. Worked until supper time removing a dip in the road and making a drain.

Boof. Platt plowed corn for us all day.

Stewart and I shelled two bushels of corn after supper and he took it to mill. I plowed a few rows of corn after supper. Appearance of rain in the evening.

THURSDAY, JUNE 28, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station Pa,

We spent the day plowing corn. David Platt with us and we run three teams until supper time when it rained and we were obliged to stop.

I went to John Griffiths with Tho's Marshall to ascertain whether he was wanting our meadow to cut. Got home about nine o'clock.

FRIDAY, JUNE 29, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Spent the day until supper-time putting in a culvert. "Booze" Watto and I put it in while Stewart was taking a cow to Muddy Jackson's and bringing a heifer back for which he had traded. Joseph Bell came in the evening and pulled a tooth for Call, and then went from here to Paris to attend a Temperance meeting. Weather very fine with some appearance of rain in the evening.

SATURDAY, JUNE 30, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

The ground has too wet to plow corn and we spent most of the day thinning out corn and cutting out weeds. After supper I salted the sheep and Stewart went to the station for the mail and brought home some corn meal from the mill.

Heavy thunder and wind storm at night. Booz Watto with us during the day.

SUNDAY, JULY 1, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Spent the forenoon at home. Helen did not feel well enough to attend church. Charlie and I rode over to Eldersville in the afternoon and heard Golen preach from Exodus XIV pt of 13. Congregation larger than common.

Heard that the storm of last night had blown down part of the Court-house in Stebensville.

Weather fine but windy

MONDAY, JULY 2, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station.

We spent the day working corn. Booz Watt was helping us we run three teams until supper time and got through the corn and part through the potatoes. I finished plowing the potatoes after supper and Booz and Stewart thinned out corn.

I sent to Robert Riddles in the evening for some beef but was disappointed. Heavy thunder and hard storm at night and rained considerably.

TUESDAY, JULY 3, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Arose a few minutes before five and kindled a fire and brought in the losses before breakfast. Heavy thunder and rain storm. Took the market

me to the station.

Went to Eldersville and got Cora shod.

Spent the afternoon chopping out corn. Had a swarm of bees to go away in the forenoon. They went into a tree on Mr. Fulton's place. Appearance of rain in the evening.

Signed some papers to come to Uncle Frank Haulin the deed for his father's farm.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 4, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station Pa.

Moved some grass in the yard before breakfast. Spent most of the day pulling out corn and weeds in our cornfield. Father and mother, John Melvin and Mamma and Frankie attended a picnic at Florence. Father and mother ate supper with us and we walked out over the farm after supper and sold some stock. Stewart, Cal. and Lurinta Buxton went to the station in the evening for ice cream. Robert Reddle brought our market box home and took some grass home with him for his horse. Weather very fine.

THURSDAY, JULY 5, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Robert Reddle and Willy Caracy came in this morning and we plowed and boxed the potatoes. Rained very heavily in the evening when we had about seven rows to hoe and we did not get done. I opened some some drains on the road to the barn, helped to milk and went to Reddle's after some beef for which I had sent to Buzzell's store. Met Robert starting up with Mr. Corbfields washed with the hair. Rains very high.

FRIDAY, JULY 6, 1877.

Home,
Haulin Station Pa.

Spent the forenoon putting our pigs in different places for feeding. Mr. McCalmont got four pigs in the morning at five dollars per pair. Mr. moved some sheep and put a pair of holes out the side at supper time he brought the reaping machine from the barn and took it to the wheatfield set it up and cut five dozens of wheat. Rev. J. D. Carroll came in the evening and spent the night with us. He was a very unexpected and get very welcome visitor. Weather very fine with prospect of being clear.

SATURDAY, JULY 7, 1877.

S. J. Golen's West Middletown

Arose about the usual hour
brought in the horses and
fed and harnessed before break-
fast. Rev. Carroll did not
get up for breakfast.
We cut wheat with the
reaper until eleven o'clock.
Took Rev. Carroll in the
spring wagon to West
Middletown to Quarterly -
meeting. Heard fine
message from Prov. IV.
Took supper and spent
the night at Golen's.
Weather very fine.
Enjoyed the meeting
well. Willie Snare
and Annie Kiddle being
at our house while I
was away.

SUNDAY, JULY 8, 1877.

S. J. Golen's West Middletown

Took breakfast at Golen's.
Rev. Carroll and I started
at Mr. Denny's before
church time and at Mr.
Campson's. Lovefeast
was quite interesting.
Carroll preached a good
sermon from Cor. II
23 & 29. We took dinner
at James Denny's. Attended
the funeral of the wife of
young Dr. Semas. Made
a call or two after funeral
and took tea at Mr. Sam-
son's with Rev. Carroll and
J. P. Miller. Called at D
Boyd's before church, and
at Mrs. McKee's and Mrs
Ackison's after church. Heard
Rev. Carroll preach from I Thim.
5 & 6. We spent the
night at S. J. Golen's.
Enjoyed the services very well.

MONDAY, JULY 9, 1877.

Spent the forenoon cutting
wheat. Got through about
eleven o'clock. Ground
up the scythes and
knives of mowing machine
and commenced mowing.

Robert Beddle and

Robert cut some
up in the afternoon.

Had a warm

Weather very warm.

MONDAY, JULY 16, 1877.

Arose a few moments before five o'clock and kindled fire, brought in the horses and went to Robt Riddle's before breakfast. Robert and Willie Grace helped us to haul our wheat during the day.

We put up 316 dozens in a sack my first attempt at haiding.

Did not have enough wheat to top it out and put ten cocks of hay on it.

Weather very warm. Got through stacking at dark.

TUESDAY, JULY 17, 1877.

Arose at five o'clock
kndled fire, brought in
two horses and harnesed
them and Stewart took
us to the station with
the marketing. Helen

Wally Gray helped them to haul during the day Stewart and Robert Riddle had some among the potatoes in the forenoon and put up some hay in the afternoon.

Grandma Haulin went to Riddle's on her way to Midway. News of Railroad men burning Pittsburgh and Steubenville striking for higher wages. All freight trains stopped and stock unloaded. Weather fine.

TUESDAY, JULY 24, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Arose at five and milked the cows before breakfast. Stewart and I ground a set of knives in the morning. Robert Riddle and Willie Gray helped me and we put up a stack of hay in the forenoon. I mowed in the afternoon and they stooked up hay until supper time and then put up another stack. Grandma Haulin went to Midway.

Some appearance of rain during the day. Did not hear much news concerning the Railroad strike. A stranger named Morrison took dinner with us.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 25, 1877.

Home Near Haulins St.

I milked the cows before breakfast. Spent the forenoon and part of the afternoon mowing Stewart, Riddle, Willie Gray and Millie Mahon and Charlie put up a stack in our meadow in the forenoon and stooked up hay in Riddle's meadow in the afternoon.

Weather very warm and some appearance of rain.

Took a walk in the river in the evening.

THURSDAY, JULY 26, 1877.

Home Near Haulins St.

Arose at five and milked two cows before breakfast. Spent the day mowing for Robert Riddle. So hot that the horses could not go steady. Stewart and Robert put up two stacks with Will, Lacey, Charlie and Annie Riddle hauling.

Wrote a letter in the morning to the Commercial Gazette concerning my subscription.

Read some in a daily paper concerning the great Railroaders' strike. Peace and quietness being restored in many places. Pittsburgh getting quiet.

FRIDAY, JULY 27, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

As it was somewhat wet
in the morning I put a
sole on one of my shoes.
Helped to milk the cows.
We made two stacks bottoms
and helped Robert Riddle
to put up hay until three
o'clock when it rained
and stopped us. C. M.
Dufferson and his little
girls came and got 24
bushels of ears of corn.
Stewart went to the
station and got the
Lafayette which was
entirely filled with the
history of the Great
Rail Road strike and
how law was kept
through. I had a supper
on the sled in the
evening.

SATURDAY, JULY 28, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to the milking
before breakfast. Latted
the sheep and turned up some
hay in the forenoon. Susannah
shewin here for dinner and
supper. He spent the after-

bushels of oats and corn

Got some wood for washing in the morning. Went down and helped Robert Reddle to repair a bridge. We stacked Robert's hay in the afternoon. In the evening I went to John Johnson's to the mill, to the station and to Eldersville intended to have gone to father's to get Will to help us to harvest, but met father in town and made arrangements to go and help them to haul oats tomorrow.

Arose a few minutes before six o'clock and helped Annie Riddle to milk the cows before breakfast. I helped Robert Riddle with his oats during the day.

Stewart stacked some hay which Thos' Marshall had cut on the shares and helped Riddle the rest of the day.

We got through cutting up suppertime and tied up 42 dozens after supper.
Weather very fine.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 8, 1877.

We spent the forenoon and part of the afternoon trying up Robert Riddles' Cat; about half past two o'clock we commenced hauling our gear and bats, John Haulin helping us. A little after sunset we heard that Matthew Cassidy had got almost killed while breaking a colt and John Haulin and I went to see him and found him unconscious and his life despaired of. He was thrown out of the wagon and the wagon all crushed against a tree. There were injuries connected with the case unresolvable. His foot and sock were found on the road several rods behind the wagon while

As soon as nearly the rods in front of the station were

THURSDAY, AUGUST 9, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Went to see Matthew Cassidy before breakfast and found him still lying though unconscious. Family in great distress. His wife had arrived. Doctor thought there was some hope of saving his life.

We spent the day stacking oats finished that stack begun yesterday and stacked Robert Riddles in the afternoon, John Province helping us in the afternoon. Stack leaning when we got through. Threatening rain in the evening. Eip Riddle and Annie with us over night. Annie helping Helen for a few days.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 10, 1877.

Hugh Cassidy's.

Spent the day hauling
and stacking oats!
Got through after supper
I went to Mr. Cassidy's
about dark and got
up all night with
Math who had been
thrown from a wagon
and almost killed.
His life still despaired
of. Was very restless
during the night but
he slept about two
hours.
Weather very fine.

Came home from Mr. Cassidy's
about half past four
o'clock, kindled a fire and

Riddle went to Steubenville
in the spring wagon
and got home about
half past four o'clock
I went to Haulin Station
and bought some gro-
ceries and dry goods
in the evening.
Math Cassidy no better.
Weather dry and warm.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 12, 1877.

Home Mar Haulin Station

We got ready partly in the morning to go to Eldersville to church but there was an appearance of rain and we did not go until evening. When we heard Rev. Gilliam preach from III Kings III 12

Rained on us as we came home. Wrote a recommendation for Miss Riddle as a school teacher at night to be signed by the patrons of the school which she taught last winter.

Math. Cassidy no better.

MONDAY, AUGUST 13, 1877.

C. M. Stephenson's.

Arose about half past four o'clock and got the horses in and harneped them to some apples in a sack and took them to the station for Carothers, sent them with Miss Riddle. Took my team to Eldersville and got four shoes driven. We threshed at Sam Stephenson's during the day. Threshed 245 bu of oats and 88 bu of wheat and moved the machine to Hos Stephenson's barn. Will and I spent the night at C. M. Stephenson's. Rained a small shower at night.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 14, 1877.

Home Near Amherst Sta

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock and brought in the horses and harneped before breakfast. Set up the machine at Jas Stephenson's barn and threshed 278 bu of oats then moved and set at his hear black and threshed 96 bu and moved the machine to Eldersville in the evening. I went to the station and bought 18 yards of ticking to spread down about the machine. Left the power in Eldersville and when I got home found Stewart's child sick and Dr. Riddle called in Weather fair

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 15, 1877.

Thompson Crip

Took breakfast at home and took my team and went to Eldersville and met Will Melvin. And we took the machine to Thomas McCarrells where we threshed 48 bu of wheat and 139 bushels of oats and moved to Thompson Crip and threshed 33 bu of wheat and about 9 bushels of oats. Spent the night there

THURSDAY, AUGUST 16, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Took breakfast at
Thompson's place and
spent the day threshing
his crop of grain.
Rained on us and we
had to cover up the
stack three times.
Mrs Robert Osburn
died about eleven

that Moth Cassidy was
dead and to be buried

and two of Cassidy's girls

MONDAY, AUGUST 27, 1877.

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock and spent the forenoon separating sheep and lambs. Made a whip stalk. Mr. Brabson and Charlie came and dug some coal for us.

We went to David Dylton's to help to thresh and I borrowed his team and hauled a load of coal before the machine came. We threshed two hundred bushels of oats there after four o'clock and ate supper in the mean time. Weather quite warm.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 28, 1877.

Father's near Eldersville

Arose about four o'clock and brought in the horses before breakfast.

Took a pig in the spring-wagon with the market boxes and took it to father's. Willie Gray went with me and we threshed 404 bushels of oats and about 40 bushels of wheat during the day. Slept at father's over night with Silas Crip. Slept in the little room on the end of the porch where I used to sleep when at home.

Gathered some apples for boiling in the morning and picked a few winter apples until noon. Then hucked a load of corn in the afternoon for the hogs. Robert Kiddle was with us. Rained in the evening.

Grandma Harlin and Ellen were making some fruit butter during the day and boiling in some cider.

Rained in the evening.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 20, 1877.

Home Near Harlin Station

Spent the day doing chores. Fed the lambs in the morning. Made a strap for my new spur. Satted all the stock in the afternoon. Robert Kiddle came and got his wagon in the afternoon and hauled some pumpkins. Stewart went to Paris and brought home our wagon which we had repaired.

I went to Eldersville at night and got Charley an Arithmetic and some warm-medicine for Willy.

Weather cloudy and getting cool at night. Made a short settlement with Stewart at night & credited him with \$47⁰⁰/₁₀₀.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 21, 1877.

Home near Hanlin St.

Day was wet and cloudy and I did not attend Church anywhere. Spent nearly all day in the house reading in the bible and the American Freeman. Charley and I went to the orchard and brought in some good eating apples. Was raining hard at bedtime.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 22, 1877.

Dani McCrackin's Washington Pa

Took breakfast at home. Took cars at Hanlin's a 7-20 for Washington as jurymen. Arrived at Washington about eleven o'clock and returned to our former boarding house. Was on a jury in the afternoon between three darkies for a settlement and we rendered a verdict in favor of defendant. Weather in the morning cool and cloudy. Heavy rain before daylight. Alex. Hanlin with me at Washington

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1877.

San. Mc Crackins, Washington Pa.

We brought in a verdict in the morning when Court called, for the defendant in the case which we were trying yesterday and did not have to go on a jury again during the day. Attended the African Church in the evening and heard a sermon from Luke XXIV 22. Sermon was good considering who delivered it. Congregation made up of Colored people, and they did some very good singing and made a great amount of noise and did a great deal of pumping about. One mourner forward and proffered conversion after we left. Was very much impressed with the services as belonging to the African race and compared well with what I had read in history.

Weather fine

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 24, 1877.

San. Mc Crackins Washington Pa.

Spent the forenoon about the Court House. Took a walk with Alex. Hauls in the morning and College bell rang and we thought it the Court bell and we had a fast walk as Alex. was on the jury. Was called on a jury in the afternoon on a case between Levy and Patterson. Heard all the evidence but did not hear any pleading. Case laid over until morning. Called at J. P. Muller's in the evening and took tea. Heard some very fine music. Wrote a letter about noon to my wife. Our boarding house full at noon and at night. Witnesses on a case of Hayes' against Matthew Rankin. Weather very fine.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 25, 1877.

San Mc Crackins, Washington Pa

Took breakfast at McCrackin's and Mr. Dawson and I took a walk. Jury in the case of Simon Shusher vs J. K. P. Shusher, were out all night and agreed about seven o'clock in the morning. We were sent to the jury room in our case in the afternoon and decided in a short time in favor of the defendant for a small sum. Jury was empannelled in the case of Hayes' administrators against Matthew Rankin and my name scratched off. Alex. Hanly and I visited Dr. Lemoyne's Crematory on Gallows Hill and and got discharged by the Court in the evening and got our pay.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 26, 1877.

Home Near Hamline Ct.

Took breakfast at Dan's McCrackin's in Washington. Settled board bill \$ 3.00. Left Washington at 6-30. And got home in time for dinner. Helped to get in some corn for hog feed and helped to gather some apples. Read some in the Ohio farmer in the evening. Sibs Riddle here with us. Weather cloudy and drizzled rain some during the day.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 27, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station Pa.

Arose about six o'clock
and fed the lambs and
the horses before breakfast.
Spent most of the day
gathering our winter apples.
I took Will^m Melon's coat
and vest some which I
had borrowed. Took
lupper at Father's and
got home a little after
nine o'clock and found
the folks all in bed.
Weather somewhat
cloudy. Rained some
in the morning.
Got a letter from Helen
which I had written
to her while I was in
Washington.

We attended church at Eldersville

MONDAY, OCTOBER 29, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Spent the day doing chores. Gathered some apples in the forenoon and brought in some straw to fill bed with. Satted all the stock in the afternoon and moved one lot of sheep into another field. Loaned my Sunday suit of clothes to Robert Riddle to wear to Cannonsburg to his Regimental Reunion tomorrow. Went down with sis. Riddle at night and cut Robert hair. Charlie stayed over night. Was quite cloudy all day.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 30, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Spent the day doing chores. Gathered some wood for an out door fire. Attended to Stewart's Milling. Father, Mother, Aunt Nancy, Bushfield, Man Jackson and Maggie were here for dinner and father took Man and Maggie to Florence and left them to visit. Gave father some apples home with him. I went to Proving at night and brought home one razor bolster. Sis. Riddle was here during the day forling apples for jelly. Robert Riddle and some of his companions went to Cannonsburg to attend the reunion of the 140th Regiment. Weather fine.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 31, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station.

Attended to feeding and part of the milking in the morning. Then put the bed on the wagon and Helen helped me to fill up some wheat which I took to mill. Went to J. Ferguson's Coal-bank and got about 25 bushels of coal for 75 cents. Put the press on some apples for Liz. Riddle and pushed loose corn in the evening. Robert Riddle got home from the reunion of the 140th at Cammotsburg. Weather very fine. Some appearance of rain in the morning.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 1, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Attended to the usual amount of feeding in the morning, then Stewart and I went to Robert Barber's and helped to raise a cow stable and sheep house. We got through about two o'clock and came home. Stewart took the spring wagon to the station and brought home his Arrotters and Belle and the baby. They spent the night here. There was a very heavy frost in the morning the first heavy frost of this season. Weather fine during the day with some appearance of rain in the evening.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 2, 1877.

Aunt Belle Provinces.

Spent the morning doing chores. Stewart took the spring wagon for Aunt Belle Provinces to come over but John was sick and they could not come. Took James and Belle Carrothers to the station by the evening and learned that John Provinces was not expected to live. Went with Stewart to see him as I came home. Went back at night & sat up. Came home & got a message. Came home again between one and two o'clock and went to bed. Herb Kiddle came about four o'clock in the morning & said John was dying and Stewart and I went with him. Weather very cold & stormy.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 3, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Station
Went to Provinces about four o'clock expecting to find John dead but he was still living and lived until I saw him again in the evening. Called Dr. Kiddle in to see Helen and get some medicine for her cough. I also got some medicine for leapt disease for myself. Rev. S. J. Holm and Dr. Kiddle took dinner with us. We mood some sleep in the afternoon and Grandma Hamlin and I went to see John Provinces at night and found him about as he had been. I came home at eight o'clock. Dr. Donnan sent for also. So cold and stormy. Came home about eight o'clock and spent the night at home.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 4, 1877.

¶ 83 ¶
Aunt Belle Provines.

Attended to feeding in the morning. Helen and I called in to see John Provines and found him about as he had been. I attended church at Eldersville at night and heard Nolan preach from Colossians II 28. Congregation large. Came to Provines and spent the night sitting up with John Provines and found him coming to his senses and he began to talk some having lain insensible since Friday morning last. His life was despaired of during the day but he kept most of the time and in the evening hope was inspired. Weather fine. Heavy frost

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 5, 1877.

¶ 84 ¶
Spent the early morning watching John Provines recovering his proper senses and administering to his wants. Was great relief to his family and friends to find him able to talk and take nourishment in the morning. Two doctors met for consultation. Took breakfast at Provines then came home and Stewart and I husked a load of corn for dinner and hauled it in after dinner in the rain. I went to John Melvin's in the afternoon and found his health somewhat improved. Wrote a card to Geo Crothers at the station. John Provines health improved considerably. Weather wet in the afternoon.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 1877.

Aunt Isabelle Provines

Attended to the feeding in the morning as usual. Took some butter down to kiddles to put in their box to send to Pittsburg. Called in to see John Provines and found him better. Attended Election at Florence and voted the Republican ticket. Brought Mary and Maggie Jackson home in the spring-wagon. Will came over in the wagon and gathered some apples and took them home with him. Took Mary and Mag home with him. Heraphim Hardin and I sat up with John Provines through the night. He rested very well and seemed to be recovering.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 7, 1877.

Home Near Hardin Station

Very heavy frost in the morning. Ground frozen. We finished repairing the foundation of the little corn-crib and hauled a wagonload of corn during the day and brought it in. Stewart went to Provines at night to see how John was getting along. Weather fine during the day.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 1877.

Isabelle Provins'

The day was wet. Robert Riddley borrowed my team and brought his grinding stone from Hyndman's Mill. I went to Riddley and brought some groceries which he had there.

I spent the night with John Provins taking care of him. He was troubled some with disease of kidneys. I did not sleep any until after four o'clock. John rested very well. Weather very wet and unpleasant.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 9, 1877.

Home Near Hankin' Sta.

Spent the after part of the night with John Provins who was sick. Slept from four o'clock until after six then arose and ate breakfast. Remained there until near eleven o'clock. Came home and we shelled thirty bushels of last year's corn and put it in the granary. Stewart went to see John Provins at night and found him some better. Slept sleepily in the evening.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 10, 1877.

Isabella Province near Hanlin Sta

Spent the day doing chores.
Killed a pig in the fore-
noon which weighed 129
pounds before it was
skipped. We ~~shipped~~ 30
bushels of coal in the
afternoon from the
Stewart's bank for
which he paid 60.
Charlie and I went
for the coal and
got home about dusk.
I went to Province
and sat up with John
during the night. Sam
sat up part of the time.
John rested much better
than he had done the night
previous but did not sleep
much. Pain in his side.
Erysipelas fever his trouble.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 11, 1877.

Home near Hanlin Station

Took breakfast at Province
Waited until the Doctor
(McCarrall) came and
then I came home
and spent the day at
home. Slept a short
time in the afternoon.
Did not attend
church any where
during the day.
Stewart and Grand ma
Hanlin attended
church at Tucker's.
Stewart went to Province
at night but returned
at bed time.
Weather very fine but
cool

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 12, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Did some chores in the morning. Went to Provinces before breakfast and John some better. He spent the day husking corn. We husked twenty two rows across the field but did not haul in any. Stewart went to Provinces to sit up with John. David Fulton came at night to get some help to butcher a beef tomorrow. We peared some apples to make some apple-butter. Weather very fine.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 13, 1877.

Home Near Haulin Station

Got some wood for the out door fire in the morning. Stewart helped David Fulton to kill a beef and we went over at night and got 22½ lbs of it. I hauled a load of pumpkins for the cows and hauled in a load of corn in the forenoon. David Stewart and I hauled in another load in the afternoon. Robert Kiddle husked a load in his field during the day and brought it to our crib. His corn quite small. Weather very fine.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 14, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station.

When I fed the lambs in the morning I went to see John Proves and found him better. No one sat up with him overnight. Stewart and I husked corn during the day. Put in a full load of good corn and a piece of a load of about corn. Robert Kiddle put in a load of corn for us also. My hands somewhat sore. Peared some apples at night to thicken some apple butter with. Weather very fine.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 15, 1877.

Home Near Hanlin Station

The day was wet and I spent it doing chores. Repaired Charlie's wagon and repaired a stool for Willie Stewart and I shelled some old corn and carried it to the stable. Spent the evening reading a book entitled "A woman's experience in Mormonism" or something like this, written by Mrs Stenhouse, & worked great interest. Tell is all the true title. Read until after ten o'clock and then talked about the book until after twelve o'clock.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 16, 1877.

Home Near Hamilton Sta

We spent the day husking Corn. Stewart and I husked 26 boxes, a crop our field but did not haul in any. Will Hamilton called in a few minutes in the evening and went with me to the station for mail. Learned that John Proves had not yet well and called in to see him. Doctor called in but thought he was not dangerously worse. Heard from the Doctor that Benton Sawyer had been thrown from a wagon and almost killed. Proves had a corn husking got through.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 17, 1877.

Home Near Hamilton Sta

The forenoon was wet and I repaired a scow shovel. We hauled in about one hundred and fifteen or twenty bushels of ears of corn and hauled a load of pumpkins for the cows. I went to father's at night and got home about eleven o'clock.

Bought Helen an ornament for her hat.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 18, 1877.

Home Near Hankin Stn.

Took my family to
Eldersville in the Spring-
wagon and heard Rev.
Willson preach from
Lk. 11:4. Took dinner
at Robert P. Cooper's and
called in to see Alex.
Lawther and Benton.
Found them both very
poorly. Benton had been
thrown out of the wagon.
Attended Church at
night and heard
Phinney preach from
Eph. 1:18.
We got home a
little after ten o'clock.
Night very frosty.
Weather very fine.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 19, 1877.

Home Near Hankin Station

When I fed the lambs in
the morning, I went to see
John Proves before break-
fast and found him some

to Proves to stay till

Home Near Hawlin St

Came home from
Provinces' about five
o'clock and slept

Then I hauled in
one load myself
and Stewart helped
me to fill up the last
piece of a load.

I went to Kidolle's
at night for cow
market money and
groceries, but the box
did not come.

Got a bid to John Lawther

Home Near Hankin's Store

Spent the day riding about. Went to father's and borrowed money enough to pay our taxes. Took dinner at father's. Went to Cassidy Scott's and had a lip put on one of my boots. Went to Rarigstown and got some medicine for myself and my wife. Came home through Florence and paid our state and county taxes. Got home about eight o'clock and found that John P. Lanther's sheephouse had been raised during the day notwithstanding the wet. Some Jimmy Fullerton died in the morning. Heard of revival at Bethel. Nathaniel Gillespie, John Sulherland and others converted. Day very wet.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 23, 1877.

Home Near Hankin's Store

Attended to the usual amount of feeding in the morning. Then attended the funeral of "Some Jimmy Fullerton" a man of about 90 years. Rained all day and heads very splashy. Got two slaves driven on Cora in Paris. Spent the evening at home reading a book entitled "Tell it all" a work on the horrors of Mormonism. Still raining at bedtime. Slewed went to get up with John Province at night and "Lip Riddle" played with Call.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 24, 1877.

Home Near Harlin Sta.

After doing the feeding in the morning, Will Harlin came and got one of our hicks. Stewart and I prepared some grain to get ground and I went to Mill in the afternoon and went to James Stewart's Coal-bank and got a load of coal. about 25 bushels for which I paid 75-cts and brought our grinding home with me. We squared up our accounts as to marketing in the evening. Weather fine and warm. Ground very wet and waters high.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 25, 1877.

Home Near Harlin Sta.

Charlie and I attended Church at Eldersville and heard Nolan preach from John ~~III~~ 16th. Came home for dinner. Wrote my letter to Rev. Henry Westlake and one to Rev. A. J. Wolff in the afternoon, concerning a quarterly meeting at Eldersville. Went to see John Proin in the evening and found him still a little better. Weather somewhat cloudy.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 26, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

I went to Riddle's in the morning for the Copperstette. It spent the forenoon killing some fowls for market, and I took to the station in the evening, two dozens of chickens, one Turkey, for ourselves and five ducks for Riddle. When I came home I found a Mr. Patterson, a quonware peddler had remained over night, seemingly a very fine man. Weather cloudy. Rained some during the day.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 27, 1877.

Home Near Haulin' Station

A gentleman named Patterson took breakfast - both he and his remained with us over night. Paid one dollar for lodging himself and team. Stewart and I spent the day huckling corn. We got almost through. Mr. Griffith was hauling hay home from one of our fields. Had another team beside his own and three hands.

Rained some in the evening. Had intended to be with John Proomes over night but found that it was not agreeable to my wife's notions for me to be away and I remained at home.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 28, 1877.

Home near Hurlin's Sto

Stewart and I finished husking our corn in the forenoon and helped David Lutton to husk some in the afternoon. My hands very sore and bleeding. Went to the station in the evening and set our market box. Our grocer did not send us our money. Paid us something like fourteen dollars for butter and fowls.

Weather getting colder snowed a little through the day.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 29, 1877.

Home near Hurlin's Station

Attended to feeding as usual. Spent the forenoon calculating some interest and writing some judgment notes for Stewart and Grandma Hurlin.

Threshed a bundle of rye straw for Robert Reddle and helped him to husk a load of corn in the afternoon. Mowed some young cattle and repaired some fence. Sabbath School Convention at Tucker's Church at night but I did not attend knowing that my wife did not like to have me absent from home. Cold all day and showing some seemingly the beginning of winter.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 30, 1877.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Spent the day doing Chores.
Did some feeding and
mooing of stock in
the forenoon and attended
to the feeding in the
evening Stewart being at
Provincs helping to cut
their hogs.

I attended Temperance
meeting in Paris at
night at which J. A.
Mc Swaine was expected
to speak but he did
not come. Sid. Lockhart
and James McCabe
did the speaking.
Not very large audience.
Weather cold. Some
snow on the ground.

and John Hamilton came and

and got a new barrel
to salt our beef in.
Got home about

but John threw up with
me and I was obliged
to leave it. Went
for Charlie to school
and brought him home
as it was raining very
hard.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 5, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Arose at six and attended
to part of the feeding; Stewart
finished it when Robert
Reddle and I hauled in
the load of coal which I
had staked with yesterday
evening. I hauled in three
loads of coal with me
Team and Reddles until
the basin stopped me
at dinner time.

Cut up our beef in the
evening. Read a speech
in the evening in opposition
to the abolition of slavery,
written a number of
years ago by James
Trickey found among old
papers. Rained nearly all
day.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 6, 1877.

Home Near Hardin Station

Feed and harnessed four horses before daylight. Had Riddles team here over night and kept them to haul coal with. Took 33 bushels of coal to Robert Riddles and went to the station and got the market box. Robert came and helped me to haul three loads of coal in the afternoon. Weather very rough in the evening. Roads muddy and freezing. Snowed some in the evening. Mended Charles' box at night.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 7, 1877.

Home Near Hardin Station

Spent the forenoon attending to feeding and making pickle for our beef. Hauled three loads of coal in the afternoon and went to the station in the evening and met Rev. Henry Westlake and brought him home with me where he remained over night. Weather somewhat stormy and road very bad.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 8, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin's St.

Rev. Henry Westlake
with us during the
day. I spent most
of the day hauling
coal. Put in about
133 bushels roads very
bad. Took Rev. Henry
Westlake to Eldersville
on horseback at night
and heard him preach
from Isaiah XLII 18.
He preached an excellent
sermon. I got home
before ten o'clock.

Night cold and
roads rough.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 9, 1877.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Arose about seven o'clock
and attended to feeding as

Home Near Hamilton St

After attending to the feeding in the morning we got wood and stones ready for butchering our hogs. Aunt Jane Provines came to see about getting a hog and I agreed to let her have one at five cents per pound. Then to Cassidy Scott's and got one of my boots repaired a little and paid for my boots. Called at father's and settled some business about the quarterly meeting expenses. Got home between ten and eleven o'clock. Weather very fine. Got Helen's shoes mended at Cozgrove's in Eldersville.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 16, 1877.

Home Near Haulin St.

Spent the entire day at home. Grandma Haulin was the only one who went to church from here. Stewart went and saw John Provine who had had an attack of Pleurisy and found him better.

Spent the day reading and resting.

Weather very fine.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 17, 1877.

Home Near Haulin St.

Helped Stewart to separate our hogs in the morning to take some to market.

He went with Andrew Provine to Burgettstown with the hogs. Traded with Andrew for one that was not likely to travel well. Robert Riddle, Will Grace and I finished preparing to butcher and they brought these hogs to butcher without me. I pulled the wool off a buck that had died.

Went to D. S. Futtoria and borrowed an iron kettle. Wrote a letter to G. P. Fuller and a card to Will Meloy and Will Grace took them to the station.

Ranched considerably during the day and evening.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 18, 1877.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Arose about five o'clock
and attended to the
usual amount of feeding.

We killed our two
six in number and
Robert Riddle's six also.

Robert Riddle, Gillie Gray,
Stewart and I constituted
the boon of hands.

We got through cleaning
the entrails a little
before sunset.

I attended a debate
at Miller's & Schoolhouse
at night and had rather
an interesting time.

Gas put on for discussion
two weeks from tonight.

Our white-faced cow had a
calf in the evening. Weather
very fine & warm.

away. We put down 585 lb
for our own use. Stewart put
