TUESDAY, JANUARY 1, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Station Pa.

Attended to most of the feeding in the morning then cut some poles to put the roof on part of the old barn. Stewart and Cal went to Mr. Buxtons in the morning and remained over night.

I attended debating society at Miller's School house at night and debated on the question "Is Corruption in our government more the result of our political system than of foreign emigration?" I spoke upon the negative. Annie Riddle here over night. Weather fine with some appearance of snow. Ground frozen.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 2, 1878.

Home Near Hamlin Stn.

Attended to all the feeding
in the morning as
Stewart was not at home.
Put down clapboards on
the shed roof at the old barn,
made a sled for
Charlie and scraped the
manure out of the
middle of the old barn
with John and the road-
scraper. Wrote a letter
at night to Rev. Henry
Chestnut of Millbrook
Mercer Co Pa.

Snowed some during
the day and was quite
disagreeable. Stewart and
Cal. came home in the
evening. A little snow
on the ground. Weather
getting cold.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 3, 1878.

Home Near Hamlin Stn Pa.

Attended to some of the feeding
and milking before breakfast.
Finished feeding and doped
the ends of some poles for the old
barn before dinner. Robert
Kiddle helped us to put up
the poles in the afternoon
and spent the evening
with us. Weather cold.
Snow on the ground but
not enough for sledding.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 4, 1878.

Home Near Harlin Stn.

Attended to the usual amount of feeding in the morning. Robert Riddle came up and we spent the day repairing the old barn for a sheep shelter.

We raised one corner of it and put in a piece of a log, and raised another corner and put in a post to hold it up, and cut out two places for the sheep to pass between one row to the other. Spent the evening going to the station ~~area~~. Snow on the ground and weather quite cold.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 5, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Station

Attended to feeding as usual and got another trough for one lot of sheep.

Robert Riddle and I cut some poles before dinner and cut a tree for axe handles. In the afternoon we hauled the poles and put them up to carry up the hay over the sheep.

Was very cold work.

About six inches of snow on the ground and weather quite cold.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 6, 1878.

Home Near Havelin Sta.

Attended to feeding as usual
then we went to Tucker's
Church in the sled. Heard
Rev. Hudsons preach from
Prov. VIII 12-17 inclusive.
Spent the afternoon
and evening at home.
Sledding pretty good.
Weather very cold
and frosty.

MONDAY, JANUARY 7, 1878.

Home Near Havelin Sta.

After attending to our
feeding we thought it
too cold to work out
of doors and I spent
most of the day mending
my buckskin gloves.
He visited at
D. S. Fulton's at night.
Grandma Havelin
went with us.
Sledding pretty good but
the air was very frosty.
Had a very pleasant
visit. Got home a
little after ten o'clock.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 8, 1878.

Home Near Hamlin Stc.

Attended to feeding and
milking as usual.

Stewart and I shelled
some corn and mixed
some chopping and I
took it to Hunters.

Went to get it ground.
Look Helen and Willie
in the sled to Provinces.
Charlie stopped there as he
came from school.

I came home and milked
the cows then Grandma
and I went to Provinces
and stayed until bed
time. Some of Crisp's
young folks there.

Left home a little before
ten o'clock. Weather mod-
erately some. Sledding good.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 9, 1878.

Home Near Hamlin Station

After doing our feeding in the
morning, Stewart and I
harnessed two horses and
commenced hauling manure
out of the sheep shelter under
the barn. Hauled out two
loads before dinner and three
after dinner. Alex and Mrs.
Calbertson were at Stewart's
in the afternoon and Stewart
did not get out until late.

William Hamlin and his
family came and sat with
us until bedtime.

Has raining when they
started home.

Snow thawed consider-
ably during the day.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 10, 1878.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Day was wet and we did not do much out door work but our feeding. I finished mending my Bucksfin gloves.

Went to John Mc Connell's at night and sent with him for a back wall for our stove.

Rained nearly all day. Grandma Hamlin with us.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 11, 1878.

Home Near Hamlin Station

Attended to feeding as usual. Pulled the wool off a sheep that had died. Put the roof on one side of the lower pen of the old barn. Put on all the clapboards we had.

Stewart went to mill and brought home a load of chop feed, then went to the station in the evening. Robert and Liz Riddle were here until bedtime. Weather somewhat colder but not freezing much.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 12, 1878.

Home Near Harlin Sta.

After doing our feeding in the morning we harnessed a team got some tools and went to the woods at the lower end of the place and cut some stuff for old boards. Robert Riddle with us ~~the~~ took dinner at Riddle's. John Provins there. We got home about feeding time. Robt put in his horses and helped me home with the load. Put a hole on one of my boots at night and wrote a letter to J. P. Miller on business. We sold some wheat in the evening to Thomas Cosgrove at \$1.15. To be cleaned over. Did not know how many bushels we had. Weather fine.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 13, 1878.

Home Near Harlin Station

After attending to our feeding Stewart and I went to Eldersville W Church and heard Rev. Willson preach from Matthew V 16. Last day of the week of prayer. Rev. Willson spoke to some of the young folks in a general way concerning some bad order that had been in the church. John Melvin and Charles Harlin appointed to see that the rules of the church so far as order was concerned should be carried out. Rained nearly all day and evening.

MONDAY, JANUARY 14, 1878.

Home near Haulin Sta.

After feeding the horses and our cows, I went to the station - for some grain sack and sent some money to Washington for Stewart, some for Margaret Haulin and some for father to pay for Recording judgment notes.

Went to Mr. Geo. Lutton's to borrow his windmill, thence to Robert Lutton's thence to Geo. McGill's where I found the mill and brought it home. Mill. Haulin here over night. We cleaned wheat until near eleven o'clock at night.

Stewart took our marketing to Riddle's in the evening.

Rained and snowed during the day. Freezing at night.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 15, 1878.

Home near Haulin Station.

Attended to some of the feeding in the morning, went to Provines and borrowed their large wagon, Robert Riddle brought up his horses and we took two loads of wheat (83 bu) to the station at 115 per bu. Tho's Cozgrove is the man for whom he was buying though it was not clean as it should be but we refused to throw any but the 24 lbs. Came home and attended to the feeding then went to Miller's School house to a debate on the question of reduction of salaries of Government officials. Interesting. Freezing at night.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 16, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Station

Attended to feeding as usual. Robert Riddle came up in the morning and split clapboards for us during the day. I drove about 100 on the roof of the sheep shelter and Stewart spent the day weatherboarding and putting up poles to put hay on. Settled with Robert Riddle at night and we considered our books square.

Weather fine but freezing at night.

Settled with Stewart our account of wheat taken from the pile.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 17, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Station

After attending to the usual amount of morning work Robert Riddle Stewart and I spent the day preparing our old barn to put sheep in. I drove roof until near dinner time when I finished it. Spent the afternoon stopping cracks and putting two pieces of logs in two corners of the building.

Weather very fine but the wind was somewhat cold.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 18, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

I attended to nearly all the feeding in the morning while Stewart was helping Robert Riddle to haul a hundred bushels of coal from our bank. I shelled some corn for sheep feed and did some work at the old barn.

Weather very much like spring. Worked in my short sleeves. Put a new back wall in our stove at night.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 19, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

After attending to our feeding Robert Riddle and I spent the day hauling hay and putting it in the old barn for the sheep. Stewart and Cal attended a granger dinner at Hulton's Schoolhouse. They got home about half past three o'clock. John Haulin came at night and sat with us until bedtime. Weather very fine. Snow nearly all gone off the north side of the hills.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 20, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Sta

Helped to attend
to the feeding in the
morning. Attended
Church at Eldersville
and heard Sumner
preach from Exodus
32 and part of 20.
Congregation very
small on account
of the rain. Helen
came with me to
feed at the old
barn in the evening.

Stewart went to
Eldersville at night to
church and took
Cora for Sarah the
Baptist to ride home
with him.

MONDAY, JANUARY 21, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Station Pa

Arose at half 12 o'clock
and went to the stable to
see if the horses were all
right. Arose at half past
five and greased our boots
and shoes. Skipped the wool
from a dead sheep while
about the feeding.

He helped Robert Riddle
to haul a stack of hay
during the day. Hauled
on two wagons and
double teamed going up
to his house. Sent Dip
Riddle to the station for the
mail. I took supper at
Riddle's and got home
after night.

Day somewhat cloudy
but warm.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 22, 1878.

Home Near Haulin' Station
Attended to milking and
feeding the cows before break-
fast. Took Charlie to school
on horseback and brought
Rebecca Provines home with
me to help Helen to fix her
drefs. John Melom, and
Euseannah came while I was
attending to my feeding and
I spent the day visiting with
them. Robert Riddle and
Stewart spent the day
hauling manure out of
the sheep shade at the
barn. Day was very
unpleasant. Raining some
and getting colder, until it
was snowing quite briskly
at bedtime and a very
rough night for stock to
be out.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 23, 1878.

Home Near Haulin' Station
Arose at six o'clock and
attended to feeding as usual.
Robert Riddle helped us
during the day with his
team and we finished
cleaning out the sheep shade
at the barn. Hauled out
four large wagon loads of
manure and put the
sheep in the shade at
night. I wrote a letter at
night to Geo. L. Bow for
Grandma Haulin, on
business. Weather cold
some snow on the ground.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 24, 1878.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After attending to feeding as usual I got ready and walked to Florence and got some cloth to make Charlie & myself pants. Spent \$4⁰⁰ Got home about three o'clock and Stewart and I shelled some corn before feeding in the evening. Robert Riddle came and told us that Aunt Jane Provinces wanted us to take her a load of hay tomorrow. I mended some harnesses at night. Weather somewhat moderated and snow melted during the day. Stewart was at Murray's sale a short time.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 25, 1878.

Home Near Haulin Station

Robert Riddle brought his team in the morning and after we had attended to our feeding we put a load of hay on the wagon then ate our dinner and took the hay to Aunt Jane Provinces. Robert and I went with the team and got some Blacksmithy done.

We got home about feeding time. Found that one of our young steers had trouble about making his water and was likely to die and Stewart and I doctored him. Some after night weather soft. Roads muddy. Raining at night.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 26, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin Sta Pa.

Attended to feeding as usual. Robert Riddle came to help us haul hay. Hauled two stacks during the day, one to the old house for the calves and the other to the stable. Hauled five large loads with four horses. Liz Riddle came up in the evening to get Robert to go to Frank Hanlin's to tell them that Mary Ferguson was sick. Took Helen and Willie to Riddle's in the morning and went after them at night as it was getting dark. Roads very muddy. Some appearance of rain at night.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 27, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin Station.

Roads very muddy and the weather unfavorable and we did not attend church any where through the day. Spent the entire day at home attending to feeding and reading in the bible and the American Wesleyan. Rained considerably in the evening.

MONDAY, JANUARY 28, 1878.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Attended to feeding all the sheep in the morning. Stewart was away from home looking for a horse to buy.

I cleaned out the hayrack and the calf shade and made some racks for the sheep shade at the old barn. Attended to the feeding in the evening and took our marketing. B. Kiddle's in the evening and found it very hard walking. Ground freezing and somewhat icy. Weather clear.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 29, 1878.

Home Near Haulin Station

Spent the forenoon hanging a door on the sheep shade, and spent the afternoon shelling corn and mixing sheep feed. Took some to each of the sheep shades.

Charles and I attended debate at Miller's School House. Question. Should a penalty be attached to the taking of usurious interest? I took part on the affirmative. Debate somewhat interesting. We got home about half past ten o'clock. Weather very fine.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 30, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Sta.

Attended to the usual amount of feeding and milking. Put a fastening on sheep shade doors, made and hung one door and put a rack in the hospital shade and put a lot of sheep in that night. Lured a stack of hay and attended to the feeding in the evening. Stewart was away during the day and got home in time to milk his cows before night.

Weather fine with some appearance of rain or snow at night.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 31, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

When I arose I found a deep snow on the ground and still snowing. Swept paths before breakfast. Brought a lot of sheep to the barn and helped Stewart to house them.

Attended to the usual amount of feeding and built a rack in the hospital shade before dinner. Spent part of the afternoon in the house. Took our red cow to E. S. Hanlin's in the evening and attended to feeding as usual.

Snowed all day. snow coming from the North East. About a foot deep at night.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Station

Arose a few minutes
after six o'clock attended
to the usual amount of
feeding and milking.

Separated some of the sheep
at the old barn and
put the weak ones by
themselves. We shelled
some corn and mixed a
load of chaffing and
Stewart took it to Hunter's
mill on the sled.

Stewart and Cal. went
to Sno. and ~~Wm.~~ Haulins
at night. I took care
of the station and had
a shoe driven on her.

Snow quite deep.
Should come through the
day but freezing at night
and sledding pretty good.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 2, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Station

While attending to feeding in
the morning, I trimmed some
sheeps toes and clipped some
of them. Half soled Charlie's
hoof before dinner.

Spent the afternoon
clearing out the snow
over the pantry and
putting a seat in the
little sled to go to
Church in tomorrow.

Snow melting some
during the day where
the sun shone.

Mended the buggy whip
at night and read some
Weather fine.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 3, 1878.

Home near Hardins Sta.

Attended to feeding and milking as usual, then took my family in the little sled to Eldersville and heard S. P. Proben preach from Isaiah 40 and last verse.

Congregation not very large. House cold for want of stove being cleaned out before firing up. Sledding not extra good in places because of the snow. Took dinner at home and spent the afternoon and evening there.
My 39th birthday.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 4, 1878.

Woke near Hardins Station arose about six o'clock greased some boots, attended to the usual amount of feeding, then took Charlie to school in the sled and Grandma to Province. Stopped at Hardins Station and in Eldersville, took dinner at Charlie Scotts, paid James Penn dollars interest and Cassidy three and a half for a pair of shoes. Called at fathers and borrowed ten dollars, stopped at Robert Coopers and paid him some interest and lifted a note and saw their boy a week old that we had not heard of. Stopped at Alex. Mc Connells and paid ~~12~~ interest. Stopped in Eldersville and got home at dusk, took supper and we visited at McCalmons until after ten o'clock. Snow melting some

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 5, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Sta

Slept until after daylight.
Attended to feeding.

Harnessed a team and
took a load of manure
to the wheatfield, and
ruffed on the hillside and
got my leg hurt slightly.

Hitched up the team
in the afternoon putting
the colt in the offside
at the tongue and went
to Hunter's mill for some
grinding. Colt worked well.
Stewart and Cal. visited
at Robt. Sutton's tonight.
I did not attend Literary
Society not feeling very
well and Stewart being
away. Snow melting
some where the sun shows.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 6, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station Pa.

Attended to feeding at the stable
and milking the cows before
breakfast, then fed
the sheep, harnessed a team
and hauled out three loads
of manure. Took Grandma
Hanlin to Robert Riddle's about
eleven o'clock. Robert Riddle
and Stewart Hanlin attended
a sale at the late residence
of David Culbertson.

They intended to have gone
to Mr. Fulton's on a visit
but did not go. Snow
melting considerably
during the day. Picked
out two barrels of apples
to send to Sturtevant and
helped Stewart to fill up
some potatoes.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 7, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Attended to nearly all the feeding in the morning as Stewart and Robert Riddle had gone to Steubenville with some produce. They got \$2.00 for one barrel and 2.50 a piece for three barrels of apples and 40¢ per bush for potatoes. John Melvin and I went to Uncle Frank Hamilton's to see a horse which John wished to trade for, but did not trade. I attended to the feeding and milking in the evening. Stewart and Robert got home about half past seven

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 8, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Station

Spent the day doing chores. Attended to feeding as usual. Made a rack to hang our beef on to dry. Went to Hamilton's Station in the evening and got our mail. Stopped at Robert Riddle's as I came home. Weather wet and cloudy.

Spent the evening reading. Luther Buxton came to Stewart's at night and told them that Mrs. Mary Crip's wife of the late Henry Crip was dead and was to be brought home from Massena to be buried.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 9, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Attended to feeding as usual in the morning. Stewart went to Stephen Watts to learn when Mrs. Criss was to be buried. The corpse did not come during the day. Helen Willie and I went to Robert Kiddle's and I sketched an article of agreement between the heirs concerning the selling to Robert Kiddle of the Trisly farm. Got home about dusk and found that Stewart had the feeding all done.

Weather wet and cloudy. Sis Kiddle came home with us at night.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 10, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Attended to the usual amount of feeding and was preparing to attend the funeral of Mrs. Criss when we learned that the corpse had not arrived from the west and the funeral would not take place until tomorrow.

Stewart, Cal, Helen and I attended church at Eldersville and heard Rev. Wilson preach from John ~~VI~~ 12.

Sacrament administered. Roads very bad and muddy. Maggie Kiddle kept Harry for Cal while she was away at church.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 11, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Attended to feeding and milking as usual.

They attended the funeral of Mrs. Anne Crisp. Went in spring wagon and broke the double tree when near the graveyard and put my load in other wagon. Liz. Scott in the wagon with us open the hoke. Robert Kiddle and Liz. took dinner with us. I wrote an article for them in the afternoon. Stewart Howell and I attended to all the feeding & news to Paris for medicine. I took our marketing to Kiddles in the sled after night. Roads very bad.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 12, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Attended to all the feeding in the morning as Stewart was not well. Shelled about four bushels of corn and mixed & shepfeed.

Changed fence some at the sheephouse. Went to Eldersville and got three shoes driven on Cora. Was at Alex Mr. Connell's to borrow some money for Grandma Hanlin but did not get it. Attended debate at Miller's School House at night. Question on female suffrage. Was home about the clock. Weather cloudy and cold.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 13, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Station

Attended to my feeding in the morning and then helped "Booz" Watt to attend to the feeding which Stewart usually attends to at the barn. Stewart was not able to attend to it himself. James McCall came along when we were eating dinner and we bought a few articles from him. Grandma Harlin and I attended prayer meeting at Provia in the afternoon.

David Fulton led the exercises. Tolerably good turn out there.

Got home in time to attend to feeding and milking. Weather mild. Snowing some

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 14, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Station

Did my feeding hurriedly in the morning and took Charlie to school. Spent an hour or so there very pleasantly. Went to Hunter's Mill and brought home some flour. Went to Paris in the afternoon and got Doll shod at Jo. Scott's. Fresh water was not at home. Visited the school taught by J. W. Polen and Miss Kate Harlin. Was well pleased with my visits. Roads getting muddy. Rained some in the evening. David, J. Fulton and family visited at Stewarts at night.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 15, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Station

Attended to the usual amount of milking and feeding.

Booz. Boat attending to Henry's feeding for him while he was unwell.

He spent a considerable portion of the day shelling corn and preparing sheep-feed. Spent the evening at home reading in the Pittsburgh Commercial Gazette. Read an account of a great Tariff Meeting in Pittsburgh. Supposed to be 15,000 men in procession of all classes of society. Weather damp and roads very muddy.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 16, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Station

Attended to feeding as usual in the morning then "Booz" Matt and I took three horses and hauled a load of hay to the old barn before dinner. Took a heifer to G.S. Hamilton's bull in the afternoon and hauled two more loads of hay.

Rained some during the day and evening.

Read some at night hunting matter for discussion on the question of restricting foreign immigration. Found some arguments in the Christian Statesman just to the point.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 17, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Station

Attended to the usual amount of milking and feeding in the morning. "Booz" Watto attended to Stewart's feeding as he was mudd. I attended church at Eldersville and heard Bro. Nolan preach from Roman's V 12"

Stopped at Aunt Jane Provins as I came home. She had her arm broken. Got home a little before three O'clock after the family had their dinner. Stewart helped to do the feeding in the evening.

Forenoon was very wet. Roads very muddy. Read about the deluge at night.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 18, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Station

Stewart helped to feed some in the morning and spent the day away from home. "Booz" Grabs came and helped me to finish feeding, we hauled a load of hay, took Provins wagon home, took Mr. Dalton's windmill home and cleared up some brush in the old orchard. Freezing pretty hard at night.

Put a sole on one of my boots at night. Robert Riddle brought forty dollars for me to take by Alex. Scott for Aunt Jane Provins.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 19, 1878.

Home near Hankin's Station

Attended to the usual Amos
feeding and milking in
the morning, then got the
team and wago ready
to go to Lorena. John
Provine took dinner
with us and went with
Stewart and me to
the election. We took
our wago to get it
repaired. I got some
blacksmithing done that
cost me fifty cents.
Got home late and
attended debate at
Pillar's School House
but was not on
discussion. Had a
good discussion on the
"Bland Silver bill." Weather
fine.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 20, 1878.

Home near Hankin Station

Attended to feeding and
milking as usual, then
Stewart and I took up
our meat and hung it up.
Stewart went to Seardner's in
the afternoon to borrow some
money for Margaret but failed.
I went to Robert Riddle's in
the afternoon and got my
axe ground. Attended to
all the feeding before he got
home. Spent the night
at home. Read some
and helped Charlie some
with his arithmetic.
Weather fine. Roads
very muddy.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Store

Attended to feeding and milking at the stable before breakfast then took Charlie part of the way to school. Stopped at Prognies and got a block for an anvil block. Finished feeding and repaired a sheep rack before dinner. We spent the afternoon trimming sheep's toenails. Rained hard in the evening. Studied some on the question of restricting foreign immigration.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 22, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

After attending to milking and feeding in the morning I spent most of the day in the house. Put a piece in the front of Charlie's book to make it larger and made him a pouch to carry his books in to school.

Liz Riddle was here for dinner and Mary Haulin here for supper.

Wrote a letter to Geo. A. Haulin in the afternoon.

Spent the evening fixing our lantern and writing a speech for Literary Society.

Rained some during the day and evening. Stewart trimmed some sheep's toes.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 23, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Sta

Attended to feeding and milking as usual and put smoke under the meat in the morning and spent most of the day trimming out the old Orchard at the old house. Stewart was away on business during the day and did not get home until quite late.

Weather getting cooler.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 24, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Station.

Attended to feeding as usual then walked to Paris and heard Rev. Erbaugh preach from Rev. V. C. Congregation not very large. Sacrament administered. Learned as I came home that Mollie Martin had died about one o'clock and stopped there a short time and did not get my dinner until after four o'clock. Roads very muddy.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 25, 1878.

Home Clear Hamlin Station

Attended to feeding as usual.
Shelled some Corn for the
sheep. Attended the funeral
of Miss Grollie Martin.
But very few there. Two
spring wagons and nine
persons on horseback.
Roads very bad. Some
snow on the ground.
Much like March weather.
Stewart and I took our
marketing down to Kiddle
at night. Got some
petitions to circulate
for the local option law
and a law to prevent the
violation of the Sabbath.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 1878.

Home Clear Hamlin's Station

Attended to feeding and
milking as usual and
spent most of the day
cutting brush and apple
trees and filling the hollow
with it - clearing out
the old orchard.
Took Helen and the
children to Provinces at
night and I attended
debating society at
Miller's schoolhouse
and took part in a
discussion on the
question "Should foreign
immigration be restricted."
Circulated petitions for
Local option and for
Sabbath laws. Well signed.
Weather fine.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 27, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's St

Greased boots before
breakfast. Attended
to feeding. Spent the
day clearing up old
apple trees and brush
in the old Orchard.
Stewart with me in the
afternoon. Some
of our neighbors
attended Sheriff's sale
of Billy McCabe's
property Paris.
Grandma Hanlin
visiting at Fintons.
Willie quite rested
in the evening.
Weather very fine.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 28, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's St

Shelled some corn for
sheep feed both morning
and evening beside attend-
ing to feeding & milking.
Chopped down some small
trees in the hollow by the
old house.
Mr. Buxton was at
Stewart's for dinner
Stewart went with
me to the station.
Weather very fine
Ground hard frozen
in the morning.

FRIDAY, MARCH 1, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Attended to feeding and milking as usual, then harnessed a team and hauled some corn to the stable and we shelled about 28 bushels and mixed with oats for sheep and cow feed.

We got through at late feeding time.

I intended to go to Florence at night for our wagons but did not go. Spent the evening at home. Weather here fine. Ground frozen some in the morning.

SATURDAY, MARCH 2, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Feeding and milking attended to, took breakfast by candle light first. Then prepared to go to Florence for the wagon but rain detained me some.

Brought the wagon here against dinner time.

Rained all afternoon and we did chores. Greased the wagon and put the double tree on the spring wagon before feeding time in the evening. Spent the evening at home.

SUNDAY, MARCH 3, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Sta.

Feeding milking and breakfast over I got ready and rode over to Eldersville and heard Nolan preach from the Corinthians 1st Congregation large for the kind of weather. Roads very bad.

Spent the afternoon at home.

Rained some during the day. Rev. Willson not able to preach at night and got Nolan to fill his appointment.

MONDAY, MARCH 4 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Feeding and milking attended to as usual before breakfast. Fed at the old house after breakfast then made some preparations for going to mill. Mr. Hanlin came along while we were harnessing our team and took dinner with Stewart. We put the Colt in the team the second time he was in and took 28 bushels of corn and oats and four bushels of wheat - St. Hunter's Shell with four horses. Roads very muddy. Lazing some and snowing some during the day. Colt worked exceedingly well.

TUESDAY, MARCH 5, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Stewart and I spent the day cutting our brush near the hollow at the old house. Got through clearing there. Attended Debating Society at Miller's School house at night and J. P. McCalmont deliver his inaugural address. Discussion on the question "Is popular government the true form of government?" D. S. Fulton being sick was unable to talk much and the discussion was pretty much one-sided. It rather very fine.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 6, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Attended to milking and some feeding before breakfast. Harnessed the four horse team and went to Hunter's Mill and brought home a load of chopping and flour which we had there.

Stewart attended the sale at Major Hanlin's. His team was only bid to \$30 per acre. Stock sold low. Some grain sold also. He took the bed off the wagon and put the hayrack on the wagon to haul some hay. Wrote twelve pages of letters to Mitch Hanlin and Maggie Scott.

THURSDAY, MARCH 7, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

After attending to our feeding
as usual Stewart and I
harnessed four horses and
hauled a stack of hay to
the old barn for the
lambs. Worked the cold in
the off lead in the fore-
noon and he jumped a
ditch and broke a single-
tree could not get him to
cross the hollow after dinner
and we put him in the
off side by the tongue and
took him across two or
three times. He worked
well in the afternoon,
Weather very fine,
much like spring.

FRIDAY, MARCH 8, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Attended to feeding as usual.
Took our white heifer to E.S.
Hanlin's in the forenoon.
Stewart and Cal. visited at
Redder's in the afternoon &
evening. I hauled the rails
off the meadow in the
afternoon and fenced
a stack. Brought a stone-
box from the old barn
to put our fork in.
Weather very much like
spring. Roads drying up
very fast.

SATURDAY, MARCH 9, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Station

After attending to feeding
and milking in the morning
I hauled up a box and
partly prepared to put
our meat in. Helen
papered it inside to
keep the flies out.
Stewart and I sowed
1/2 bu of cloverseed on
the large field near the
old house. Stewart went
to the station in the
evening and I fanned
some grapevines.
Weather very much
like May. So very
warm that we were
uncomfortable with our
winted clothes on.

SUNDAY, MARCH 10, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Station

Attended to feeding as usual
then harnessed our team and
took my family to Eldersville
to church and heard Rev.
Millson preach from Prov.
XXV 25 "Good congregation
out. Roads getting good except
in places where mud was
deep and stiff. We took
dinner at C. M. Stephensons
and got home about sunset.
Charlie was very careless
about his food clothes
and got them soiled some.
Thought it not very pru-
dent thro' to visit, walk
for dinner on the plowpath,
day especially on the childrens
account. Annie insisted on
us going today. Weather very
much like spring."

MONDAY, MARCH 11, 1878.

Home Near Huntus Station

Fed and milked the cows before breakfast. Shelled four bushels of corn and took it with some oats to the old house for some sheep feed. Took some rails and traded with Mrs. Fulton for some very good ones, and made some singletrees in the afternoon. Took our marketing down to Riddle's at night. Was thundering and lightning when we came home at ten o'clock. Weather almost as warm as May. Gaves coming out on tracks.

TUESDAY, MARCH 12, 1878.

Home Near Huntus Station

After attending to feeding and milking in the morning I gathered up some irons and took a doubletree and two pairs of singletrees to Paris to get crowned. Got one pair of singletrees home with me and some irons to fasten up chairs on the benches. Went for Charlie to school in the afternoon as it was raining hard.

Charlie commenced getting a speech from G. G. Good's Progressive Fifth Reader, supposed speech for Indian Chief, by Edward Everett. He did well ~~and~~ under the promise that I would get him a knife if he performed as well on the last day of school!

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 13, 1878.

Home near Haulin's Station

After doing the usual morning work I assorted out some potatoes for sale. Took a set of chairs to Paris to get repaired and brought home some single trees and a double tree which he had there getting mended. Went to the station in the evening and took five bushels of potatoes to David Mc Casland to sell for me. Bought some things in the store. Some young folks came in to Stewart and saw home while I was away and were just about leaving when I came home.

THURSDAY, MARCH 14, 1878.

Geo. Morrisons Holliday's Cove

Attended to feeding as usual and Stewart and I did some ditching to drain some water off a field which Robt. Riddle intended to put in corn. Helped Robt. Riddle to fill up some potatoes, some oats, and to put his meat in his wagon to take home. Heard that Geo. Morrison was poorly and I went down to see him and spent the night there very pleasantly. Found George all the better. Weather very fine for the time of year. Getting a little colder and a little snow a little.

FRIDAY, MARCH 15, 1878.

Father's. Near Eldersville.

Took breakfast at Leo Morrison's. Came with his children as far as the Cove as they came to school. Got home about eleven o'clock. Did some chores. S. J. Nolan came just as I got home. Went to Paris in the afternoon and came home in time to go with us to father's. I was troubled with two very sore boils. Did not get to bed until about midnight. Weather fine.

SATURDAY, MARCH 16, 1878.

Father's Near Eldersville.

Slept until late. Went to Cassidy Scott's and got some boot mending done. Got home in the afternoon and shaved Mr. Kofel and Uncle Matthew McKeever. We attended church in Eldersville and heard Nolan preach from Exodus ~~IV~~ 13. Congregation not large. Rained hard in the evening and roads very bad. Spent the night at father's. Suffered much with two boils.

SUNDAY, MARCH 17, 1878.

Home near Hanlin's

Took breakfast at father's
attended church at
Eldersville. Breakfast
a very cold affair.
Preaching at eleven
o'clock by Wolen from
John VIII 30. Came
home for dinner.
Attended to feeding.
Read in the wellian
and bible. Recd
letters from Geo.
A. Hanlin and
Maggie Scott. My
wife's Lona better.
Weather showery.

MONDAY, MARCH 18, 1878.

Home near Hanlin Station

Attended to feeding as usual
and spent the forenoon
doing little chores.
In the afternoon Stewart
and I commenced ditching
a swamp in the field
where Robert Rhoads pro-
posed to put corn.
Got along very well.
We went to the station
at night with the wagon
and brought home some
of the tubing of the oil
well to carry the water
in the new ditch.
Evening quite cool.

TUESDAY, MARCH 19, 1878.

Home Near Hurlin's Sto

Attended to feeding
as usual and shelled
some corn for sheepfeed.
Steward and I spent
most of the day digging
a ditch in the field
where Robert Riddle
proposed to put corn.

Attended debating society
at Sniller's school house
at night, and heard
a discussion on the
question "Should it
be right for Congress
to pass a law prohibiting
the manufacture, importa-
tion and sale of
alcoholic liquors."
Got home a little
after ten o'clock.
D. D. Lochart called in as
we came home.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 20, 1878.

Home Near Hurlin's Sto

Attended to the usual
amount of feeding in
the morning. Stewart and
I pulled the wool off of
some dead sheep in the
forenoon. Spent our
meat away in a storehouse.
We spent the after-
noon making ditch
in the field the old
house stands in.
Was very tired at
night. Weather very
fine.

THURSDAY, MARCH 21, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

After attending to seeding
and milking as usual I
harnessed my team and
hauled three loads of stone
to a ditch which we were
making. After dinner I
went to Uncle John and
Uncle Frank Haulin's
to attend to some business
for myself and some
for Mrs. Morrison but
did not get here attended
to. Got home about
nine o'clock Rained
and snowed some
in the evening.

David S. Fulton's youngest
child very sick with
Pneumonia

FRIDAY, MARCH 22, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Took a pair of shoes to the
forks of the road and sent
them with John McConnell
to Midway to get them mended
for Grandma Haulin.

Stewart and I spent
the day making a ditch.

We got almost through -
perhaps two hours work
filling in dirt - to do.

Spent the evening at
home. Weather very
fine and warm.
Evening cool.

SATURDAY, MARCH 23, 1878.

Home near Haulin's Station

Stewart and I spent the forenoon with the team filling the ditch which we had made and did not get quite through. Plowed a furrow to carry the water across the meadow below the road. Stewart and Cal. went to Mr. Ruston's in the afternoon with our team and spring wagon. I finished the ditches and attended to the feeding and milking.

Weather very fine & Willie did not sleep well at night and we did not sleep until three o'clock.

Grandma Haulin went to the station for the mail.

SUNDAY, MARCH 24, 1878.

Home near Haulin's Sta

Attended to all the feeding and milking morning and evening. Stewart being away. I spent the day at home except that I went to S. S. Ruston's in the morning to see the sick children. Found two of them in bed quite poorly with pneumonia.

Thunderstorm in the early morning and snowed considerably during the day. The ground white at night and quite cold.

MONDAY, MARCH 25, 1878.

Home Near Harlin Stn

Stewart being away I attended to feeding and milking in the morning and milked his cow in the evening.

Helped Robert Kiddle to separate his potatoes and took old Jack and helped him to take them home. Maggie Kiddle was with us over night.

Stewart and family did not get home. I went to John McConnel's in the morning for Grandma's shoes but they were not there. Stopped a short time at G. P. McAlmont's. Called at David Sutton's and found his children still poorly. Weather cold and snow on the ground.

TUESDAY, MARCH 26, 1878.

Home Near Harlin Station

Attended to all the milking and feeding in the morning as Stewart was still away from home. Got through about noon and took five weak sheep from a lot at the barn to the weak lot at the old house. Went to the station in the afternoon. Stewart and Cal. got home in the evening and I attended debate at Miller's School house & took part on the negative of the tariff question. Was elected President for the ensuing term. Weather cloudy in the evening and rained some.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 27, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Ste.

Attended to feeding and milking as usual. Stewart went to Burgettstown to borrow some money to pay a debt. I mended a collar and lamed the two horses. Plowed two furrows to drain a swamp. Hauled two loads of straw off our oat ground in the afternoon and a shower stopped me. Wrote a letter for Maggie Riddle to read at the close of school. Attended to the feeding in the evening 20/- the money for our marketing.

THURSDAY, MARCH 28, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Ste.

Drove a few minutes before eight, kindled a fire and attended to milking before breakfast. Attended sale of roads at Miller's School house and engaged to work a section for $8 \frac{25}{100}$. Went to Charlie Harlin's and took dinner. Found Jamie Harlin very poorly. Called at Robt Riddles as I came home. Maggie Riddle here with us over night. Rained in the afternoon and evening.

FRIDAY, MARCH 29, 1878.

Home Near Hankins Sta.

Attended to milking and feeding as usual. Stewart and I shelled some corn for sheep. I took Helen and Willie to Bob. Fulton's in the afternoon and went after them at night. I went to Paris in the evening and brought home a set of chairs which I was getting repaired. Weather fine. Roads bad.

SATURDAY, MARCH 30, 1878.

Home Near Hankins Sta

Attended to milking and feeding in the morning, then took Grandmother Hankins to the station in the spring wagon. She went on the local to the Cove. Stewart and I commenced working our section of road. Rained in the evening and I mended Charlie's boot some and had some at night.

SUNDAY, MARCH 31, 1878.

Home Near Hardin's Station

Attended to milking and feeding as usual then rode over to Eldersville on horseback and heard S. J. Holm preach from II Tim. III 6 "7" 8 verses. Congregation about as large as usual. Roads muddy. Rained some during the day and became somewhat colder.

MONDAY, APRIL 1, 1878.

Home Near Hardin's Station

Attended to feeding and milking as usual. Stewart and I spent the most of the day working on the road. A peddler stopped with Stewart over night. Weather fine with some appearance of rain in the evening. Wrote a letter to the members of the Allegheny Conference at night.

TUESDAY, APRIL 2, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Stn.

We attended to feeding and milking as usual and Stewart and I spent the forenoon working on the road. Stewart went to Burgettstown in the afternoon to borrow some money from the bank and I worked on the road until three o'clock then went to the station and brought Grandma Harlin home. Attended Literary Society at Miller's School house and as President of the Association delivered a short inaugural address. Good turn out of Ladies. Not many members of Society.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 3, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Stn.

Milked cows and fed calf before breakfast. Stewart and I worked on road until feeding time in the evening. Very tedious work in the mud.

Expected Albert and Alma Shorley with us at night but they did not come.

Weather very fine.

THURSDAY, APRIL 4, 1878.

Home Near Hamlin's Sta.

Hurried about and did
our feeding in the morning
then we attended the
examination at Miller's
School. Charlie performed
a declamation. Supported
speech of an Indian Chief
by Edward Everett's.
Examination was good
and the performances good.
Maggie Riddle read a
letter which I had written
for her. Had a super-
a Sunday of eatables
for all persons present.
Charlie and I attended
a singing at the school
house at night. It was
very good. We got
home at ten o'clock.
Very very fine.

FRIDAY, APRIL 5, 1878.

Home Near Hamlin, Stw.

Stewart and I spent
the day hauling hay to
the stable and shelling
corn and mifing with
cats for cowfeed.
Stewart took it to Hunter's
mill in the evening.
Father came over in
the evening and I wrote
another letter to the
Conference concerning
the appointment of a
preacher for our charge.
Weather very fine.

SATURDAY, APRIL 6, 1878.

Home near Haulins St.

After feeding and milking as usual Stewart and I spent the day working on the roads. We got along very well. Gos worked nearly to the raw. David Lyon & John McClurg stopped and talked with us a short time.

I studied some at night on the question "Should our present Road law be repealed." Expecting to argue on the negative on next Tuesday evening. Weather cool and cloudy.

SUNDAY, APRIL 7, 1878.

Home near Haulins St.

Spent the morning attending to the wants of the stock. As no one of the family proposed to attend church but Stewart I turned all the horses out but one. Spent the day at home reading in the bible and church papers. Helen and the children and I walked out over the fields in the evening when I went out to feed. Soot burned down in our chimney at night and we could not sleep until late. Weather very fine.

MONDAY, APRIL 8, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Attended to feeding and milking as usual. Pulled the wool off a dead sheep after feeding. Robert Riddle helped me to castrate two pigs. Stewart and I finished working our section of road. We put in a faithful day and made the road look nice.

Stewart and Gable took our marketing down to Riddles at night to ship in the morning.

Weather very fine

TUESDAY, APRIL 9, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Attended to feeding and milking as usual then we spent the day doing chores. I went to mill and got James Provine to cut my hair.

We spent the afternoon shelling corn and preparing sheep feed and took it to the places of feeding. Charlie and I attended the debate at Miller's school house. Question: Should our present road law be repealed. I took part on the negative. The affirmative debaters failed to appear. Helen seemed to be in a very displeased mood, but I could not ascertain the cause without it was on account of my being away at night.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 10, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Station

Pulled the wool off a dead sheep in the morning. Took the harrow and smoothed some of the road which I had worked. We commenced plowing in our stalk ground with two teams. I went to the station in the evening and got our market boy. Stewart's heather was not accounted for. Stopped at Robt. Kiddle's. I came home and got our money out of the box. Kiddle's young mare very sick with cholera. Helen in bed when I came home. Weather fine.

THURSDAY, APRIL 11, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Station

Attended to feeding and milking as usual. Got the team ready and Stewart and I spent the day plowing in the stalk ground. Robert Kiddle got our colts and harrowed with him in the forenoon. Nan Morrison and her children and Aunt Bell Provanes here for dinner. Robt. Kiddle took Nan and the children to the station on their way home. Day was spent pleasantly as a better understanding has had between me wife and myself and all difficulty seemingly removed and love and joy again restored. Thank the Lord.

FRIDAY, APRIL 12, 1878.

Home near Hamilton's Sta

Attended to the feeding
at the old house and
fed the horses before
breakfast.

Stewart and I spent
the day plowing Rattle
ground. Stewart drove
Blutster the first
day ever he plowed.

He did very well.

Cool bright sun and
ground getting quite
dry.

SATURDAY, APRIL 13, 1878.

Home near Hamilton's Sta,

Arose a few minutes after
five o'clock and attended
to feeding before breakfast.

Stewart and I spent the
day plowing stable ground

Grandma and Charlie
went to the station in
the evening and got the
mail. Weather cool
and dry. Grass not
growing very well.

SUNDAY, APRIL 14, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Sta.

Attended to feeding
and milking before
breakfast.

We attended church
at Eldersville and
heard Bro. Turner
preach from Mat.
XXII 13. Took dinner
at Will. Melvin's and
went to Thorley's in
the afternoon and
saw Will who was
very sick. Had
had the doctor to see
him. We got home
a little after dark.
Weather cool and
dry.

MONDAY, APRIL 15, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Sta.

After attending to feeding
and milking as usual
we spent the day
plowing 2 stalk ground.
We did not get quite
through. Young Alex
Haulin and Oscar
Brashear came in

two scaps of bees
which belong to Major
Haulin.

Ground dry.

Stewart and I marked
it out before dinner
and sowed our oats
in the afternoon.
Sowed fourteen sacks

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 17, 1878.

Arose about five O'clock

of rain at night.

L. Lorence.

Attended to feeding before breakfast. Milked one cow. Got team ready and went to Hunter's Mill with five bushels of wheat. Went to Hankin's Station to Eldersville. Got both horses shod all round. Went to father's and took supper. Called at John Ouelvin's and found him very poorly. Stopped at the Ouelvin's and got some groceries. Stopped at Robert Rydles and brought home our market box. Got home about nine o'clock.

SUNDAY, APRIL 21, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Station

Helped to milk the cows before breakfast. Attended to feeding after breakfast then I walked to Paris and heard Rev. Graham preach from Romans III 7-8 a good sermon. Helen and the children walked over to the old house with me when I went out to feed. Weather fine but dry. Leaves coming out fast.

MONDAY, APRIL 22, 1878.

Home Near Pauline etc.

Took some feed to the old house in the morning for the stock. We cut and planted our early potatoes in the forenoon. Spent the afternoon cutting briars and trimming up two apple trees which had blown down on our corn ground.

Attended to the milking in the evening and packed our eggs to take to the station in the morning.

Rained a fine shower in the evening. Was very much needed.

TUESDAY, APRIL 23, 1878.

Home Near Pauline etc.

Crossed a few minutes after four o'clock and brought in the horses, took our marketing to the station. Spent the rest of the forenoon clearing off our corn ground. Plowed some in the afternoon.

Spent the evening putting up some fence to keep our cows in and to keep stray cattle out.

Weather very warm after the nice rain of last night.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 24, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Attended to feeding in the morning as usual.

Plowed until almost dinner time when I broke a new point. Came on to rain just before dinner and we had rain nearly all afternoon. Robert Riddle here for dinner and made me some shoemakers wax. I mended my boots in the afternoon and mended some harness at night.

Ground quite wet.

Plowed in the afternoon. Ground in good order. Got one market hog home from the station.

Arose at five and attended
to feeding before breakfast.
Stewart and I spent
the day plowing and.
I quit at supper time
and went to the station
and met Rev. H. S.
Childs our new minister

Fixed a swarm of bees shortly after dinner and got stung once on the hand. Hauled a load of poles in the evening and helped Lee Childs to build some fence after supper. Weather very warm through the day but cool in the evening.

FRIDAY, JUNE 14, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Crossed a few minutes after five. Milked some of the cows and spent part of the forenoon plowing corn. Will Ouelvin and family, Robt Cooper and family came about half past nine o'clock and I spent the remainder of the day visiting with them. We had a good time. I got Lee Childs to plow corn for me in the after part of the day. Willie was not very well in the evening.

Killed a swarm of bees.
Addie Taylor, Mrs. Sholey

with us, and Geo. Taylor
came and took supper with
us. I spent the afternoon
flowering corn. Stearns

Awoke a few minutes after five and found it cold and raining. Put a lot of sheep in the shelter. Charlie and I went to Eldersville and attended quarterly meeting at the Chesleyan Methodist Church and heard Rev. Child's preach from John. VIII 15-16. Took dinner at C. M. Stephenson's and attended church at the brick church in the afternoon and heard Rev. Child's preach from Mark III. 13-14. Rev. Wilbur went to West Crippleton to preach for Rev. Childs at night. Day cloudy.

MONDAY, JUNE 24, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Sta.

Awoke a few minutes after five and helped to do the milking. Stewart and Cal. were away from home. Robt. Kiddle sent for me to attend to his horse while he was absent from home. Spent the day there and cut some stoverood. These mares tread bus some in season.

Got home about six o'clock and Levi Gardner came to see our wool and offered us thirty cents per pound but we did not sell.

TUESDAY, JUNE 25, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Arose at half past four
O'clock, got in the
horses and harnessed
two of them and took our
marketing to the station.

Got a shoe driven
on Doll. Came home
and hived a swarm of
bees then went to Hunter's
Mill with some sheep.
One of Mr Cassidy's horses
got out and gave our
two colts a long fast
chase. Hived another
swarm of bees in the
evening, worked our
garden through and
hauling a load of
coal from the bank.
Day very warm.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 26, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin Stn.

Arose a few minutes after
five O'clock, milked the
cows, helped Lee Childs to
harness the horses and
haul some rails. Stewart
and I spent most of
the day working potatoes.
After supper I hived
a swarm of bees and
went to mill and to
the station and got
our market box.

Arose a few minutes after five o'clock, attended to milking the cows before breakfast harnessed the team and Helen and Aunt Sarah Hanlin went to Mr. Lyons' and did not get home until late. Rained in the afternoon.

~~Uncle~~ Grant came for Aunt Sarah with their spring wagon.

Our young cattle got into our wheat and we put them out in the evening. Maggie Riddle here during the day and got sick planting beans in the cornfield.

FRIDAY, JUNE 28, 1878.

Home near Hanlin's Store

Spent the morning setting sheep and hiving bees.

Hived one swarm and had to catch the queen and bring her down off the apple tree after nearly all the swarm was in. Wrote a long letter to Mr. R. Hanlin.

Made some top boxes in the afternoon and cut some posts in the evening to put up a shelter for our bees. Night warm.

SATURDAY, JUNE 29, 1878.

Home Near Hank's ~~Station~~

We finished hoeing ³ our potatoes in the forenoon and helped Frank Coon to thin out a few rows of Robt. Riddles corn before dinner. Helen and Charlie went to provisions in the afternoon and got some cherries. Stewart and I spent most of the afternoon plowing corn. So very hot that I almost gave out before supper and did not go out after supper. Uncovered one spring and tried to discover where the water escaped. Very warm day.

SUNDAY, JUNE 30, 1878.

Home Near Hank's Station

Spent the entire day at home. Was quite unwell all day. Slept until late and slept some during the day. Stomach out of order and head aching. Limbs aching also.

Spent part of the day reading in the bible. Read some in the American Wesleyan, Children's Banner and Methodist Recorder.

Weather exceedingly warm. Stewart and Cal at home all day also.

MONDAY, JULY 1, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Station

Was quite small in the morning and took a dose of Castor oil. Took our young cow to S. S. Hamilton.

Repaired our spring some in the forenoon.

Felt very unwell after dinner and slept about an hour. Gathered about four gallons of cherries in the evening and helped to do the milking. Packed nine dozens of eggs and wrote a note to Mr. K. Polan to whom we sent our marketing.

Weather quite warm.

TUESDAY, JULY 2, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Station

Arose a few minutes after four o'clock and took our marketing to the station. Got two shoes driven on Cora came home and spent the remainder of the day plowing corn. Stewart and Lee Childs spent the forenoon cutting wheat but Lee being sick Stewart spent the afternoon plowing corn and Lee laid off. Frank Carother's came in the afternoon and he and Charlie had a good time punning about Helen, Charlie and Cal went to S. S. Fulton's in the morning and gathered some raspberries.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 3, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Arose about 4 1/2 o'clock
kindled a fire and
picked a few cherries for
Frank Crothers before
breakfast; then Charlie
and I went with Frank
to the station. I spent

Robert Riddle became very angry at me in the forenoon and called me a liar and said he would not believe me on oath. Charged me with being angry yesterday evening, which was not the case. Wanted me to come down off the load until he would whip me. All grew out of contest over the size of loads we hauled, he claiming that he could haul a much larger load on his hudders than we could on ours, and we thought we hauled as much as he.

was in fact a fairer man in half an hour than I am in a day.

before we had all our
grass cut. Put up a
stack of hay and
stooked up some.
Lee Childs did not come
until noon. Frank,
Coon came about nine
o'clock. Weather favor-
able. Some appearance
of rain at night.
Partial eclipse of
the moon.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 13, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Station

Arose about 4 1/2 o'clock and
took our marketing to the
station. We spent the
day putting up hay.
Stewart built two stacks
and we put three wagon
loads in the old barn.
Frank Coon and
Lee Childs helping us.
Weather very favorable.
Some appearance of
rain in the evening.

got a pair of fine boots
and got my coarse boots
mended. We finished
threshing at McCarroll's
and moved the machine
to Thompson's stacks
and set up. Got
home about nine
o'clock. Weather fine.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 18, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Station

Attended church at Eldersville
and heard Rev. Childs preach
from Acts. II / 3rd. Congrega-
tion tolerably large consider-
ing it was the day of camp
meeting at Independence.
Liz Riddle went with
Charlie and me in the
spring wagon, and Mrs.
Childs, Lee and Bassie
came as far as the
station with us to their
home. Greater fine
rained a little in
the evening. Lee Childs
came on home with us in
the wagon.

MONDAY, AUGUST 19, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Station

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and got
my team ready and went to
Thompson Crisp's and helped
to thresh his crop of grain.
Went to Carrick Scott's and
took back a pair of fine hots
for short for me. Helped
to move the machine to
Robert Riddle's stack. We
spent the night at
our house. Got home
about nine O'clock at
night. Stewart spent
the day preparing for
threshing. Rained a
hard shower in the
afternoon.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 20, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton St.

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock and brought in our horses and barned before breakfast. We threshed 26 bushels of oats for Robert Kiddle and set the machine and threshed 15 bushels of our oats in the evening. Riddle's oats in very bad condition. John Crip went home at night and took one of his horses for their folks to visit with and I agreed to put in one in its place. Weather fine. We killed a sheep in the evening.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 21, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton St.

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock and brought in our horses and barned before breakfast. We spent the day threshing. We had 45 1/2 bushels of oats and got out a little over 70 bushels of wheat. Thompson Crip went home at night. Started to ride my mare & Dolly and the colt ran back after he had gone a mile and he brought her back and left her and packed home. Weather very favorable.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 22, 1878.

Home near Hanlin's Store

Arose a few minutes before five O'clock and brought in our horses and fed and harnessed before breakfast. We finished threshing our grain & had 452 bu of Oats and 250 bu of wheat including Robert Keddle's $\frac{1}{4}$ and we had 15 bu of rye.

We put a price on the horse power ~~to~~ after night, to put the clevises on for staking down.

Weather ever favorable for threshing

FRIDAY, AUGUST 23, 1878.

Home near Hanlin's Store

Arose a few minutes after four O'clock and we got in our horses and fed and harnessed before breakfast then moved the machine to Hugh Cassidays and threshed until after sunset when we finished. Threshed 75 bushels of wheat after supper. Weather very fine. Stewart and Lee Childs helping Alex Hanlin to thresh.

SATURDAY, AUGUST 24, 1878.

Home near Hanlin's Station

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and
caught Coon and went to
Hugh Cassidy's and took
breakfast. Had trouble
getting the colts to follow.
I moved the machine
to the Miller place and
threshed 24 bushels of
wheat and 90 bushels of
oats, took dinner at Mr.
Stuntsbury's and moved
the machine in the
evening to Province
where we took supper
after night.

Cloudy in the forenoon
and rained a little.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 25, 1878.

Home near Hanlin's Station W.

Slept until late and Grandma
had the cows milked when I got
up. Attended church at Paris
and heard Rev. Dr. Kee preach
a splendid sermon from II Cor.
VIII 9th Communion Season.

About fifty persons Communed.

Spent the evening at home.
Lee Childs came in the
evening late. Morning very
cloudy, cool and raining some.
Afternoon very fair.

MONDAY, AUGUST 26, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Arose a few minutes before five O'clock and kindled fire and greased my boots and brought in the horses and fed before breakfast. Went to Provinces and rethreshed 385 bushels of oats and after supper I went with the machine to the top of the hill above the station on the way to Eldersville then brought Robert Riddle's mare home. Got home about nine O'clock. It rather fine.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 27, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and brought in the horses and fed before breakfast. Took some marketing to Robert Riddle's to put in the market box. Went to Uncle Geo. Cipe's and helped to thresh a stack of hay for timothy seed. Got home a little after dark. Brought a pair of shoes from the Station for Grandpa Haulin's sent from Chudway.

The cutter very favorable for threshing.

Stewart spent the day mending road and showing stock to the buyers & drovers. Lee Childs plowing.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 28, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Station

Spent most of the forenoon doing chores, changing wagon ladders and putting wagon bed on. Went to Hunter's Mill with ten bushels of wheat and brought home about fifteen bushels of coal from our bank.

Marked off some ground for Lee Childs to plow and went to the station in the evening and got two dozens of fruit jars and a barrel of salt.
Got home after dark.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 29, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Station

Stewart and I hauled manure part of the day. Stewart and Robt Reddle made a trade of some calves. Traded three heifers for three steers of equal accept.

Went to D. S. Suttons in the evening and helped to thresh some. I went to the mill and brought home some flour.

Weather fine.

Lee Childs plowing for us.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 30, 1878.

Home Near Hankins Station

Arose at five o'clock
brought in the horses
and fed them.

Lee Childs spent the day
plowing for us.

Stewart and I helped
D. J. Putters to thresh.

He had 410 bushels
of oats and 126 bu of
wheat.

They got home
just after supper
and I spent the evening
putting some irons off
the large wagon bed and
putting them on the small
one, sidelock.

Weather very warm.

SATURDAY, AUGUST 31, 1878.

Home Near Hankins S to Pa.

Spent the day doing chores.
Catted all the stock. Put the
irons on the side of the
wagon bed for sidelock.

Put seat on wagon bed.

Went to Station and to
Eldersville to get my
boots mended. Stopped
at Rev. Childs' and at
store as I came

home. Milked our
cows morning and even-
ing. Lee Childs went
home to pack up their
goods for moving.

Stewart and Cal went
to Mr. Baytons in the
forenoon. Harvest home
hucknick in Eldersville.
Rained some through today.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 1, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Arose a little before six
o'clock and milked our
cows, fed some hogs and
some sheep before breakfast.
Spent the entire day
at home reading
and sleeping some.
Read in Bible American

Recorder and a book

Cal. were away at
Napton. Grandma
Hanlin milked their
cows. A "tramp" called
and got a bowl of
milk a little after noon.
Weather cloudy and
showery.

Attended to feeding the
sheep, hogs and horses before
breakfast, milked our
cows and then went to
Uncle Grant Hanlin's to
thresh, but finding that
the threshers were not
there I went to Hanlin's
Station and got a pair
of strap hinges for my
trunk. Spent the remain-
der of the day helping
at the machine until
dark. Stewart and
Cal. got home about
noon. Weather fine.
Appearance of rain at
night.

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 3, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Station

Found it raining when I awoke in the morning. Attended to feeding sheep and horses before breakfast. Milked the cows and did some chores, and it quit raining and Stewart and I went to angle E. S. Haulins and helped to thresh the best of the day. Did not get through one peck of oats still to thresh. Weather cloudy.

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 4, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Station

Arose a few minutes after four o'clock, brought in the horses and harnesses one before breakfast took our marketing to the station and took a sack of flour some apples and ten bushels of oats to Rev. H. S. Childs and helped to move the Rev. and his family to Bury Station. David McCausland's stove was broken into at Haulins Station and goods to the amount of just up \$40 stolen. There's got through by boring a hole into a board window and taking out the nail which fastened it. Elsie Melvin came home with me at night. Got home about eight o'clock.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 5, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Slept until late. Brought
in the horses and fed them
and greased my boots
before breakfast. Harnessed
teams and tried to plow
but found it too wet.
Stewart plowed some
road and I studded it
out. Stewart went to
Martins to take dinner
with Capt. Crisp and his
new wife. Charlie and I
took Elsie Melvin to John
Melvin's, went to Ellersville
and got some things
thence to Stephenson's
and got some ashes,
to Hanlin's Station and got
some groceries and our
market boys. Stopped at
Riddle's and got home

Stephenson's cow died.

boots and brought in the horses

in fine order. I made a new
pad for one of my Colliers
at noon. Went to
Wm. Kelly's after I quit
work and engaged one
of his daughters to do
house work for us during
Melvin's contemplated
confinement.

Saw two harrows which
Martin Tucker had fastened
together to hitch four horses
to, to harrow with.
Weather very fine

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 7, 1878.

Home Near Hardins Station

Brought in the horses and fed them and fed a lot of sheep before breakfast. Stewart and I dug some potatoes and repaired our eyes and hands in the forenoon and assorted some doves in the afternoon. Sheriff served a notice that Geo. A. Hardins interest in the estate was attached by his father-in-law C. E. Green of Missouri. Felt quite worried in the evening. Weather fine.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 8, 1878.

Home Near Hardins Station

Spent the entire day at home. Stewart and Cal. went to Eldersville to hear "Curt" Crisp preach and I could not well leave the women folks alone. Read most of the day. Did not feel very well. Weather fine.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 9, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Sta.

Stewart and I took 42
sheep to Buzzetts town. 41 of
them sold at \$3.25⁰⁰ for hd.
I came home past Carrie's
and learned that Robert
Lultons had plums for
sale. Saw. Proves
and I went to Lultons
and got half a bushel
there, then went to Lawrence
and got two bushels more
at \$1.50 per bushel.

Bought some groceries.
Got home about
eight o'clock and ate
supper. It rather very
warm.

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 10, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Arose a few minutes
before five o'clock and
brought in the horses
ate a check of breakfast
in a hurry and took
over marketing to the station
in time for the morning
train. Got some fruit
and some corn for Stewart.
Came home and spent
the remainder of the day
helping J. P. The Calmont
to the lake. It rather very
warm. Rained a shower
after we came home.

Evening cool. Was very
much affected with the
dust in the evening and
felt somewhat chilly.

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 11, 1878.

Home Near Harbin's Station

Crossed a few minutes before five o'clock and got a team ready and took Stewart to the Station on his way to Midway. Went to Elderside and got some goods. Put some things & rights in the house. Put a bottom in a chair and did some chores. Went to the Station for the box and brought Stewart home. Rained considerably during the day.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 12, 1878.

Home Near Harbin's Station.

Milked the cows and brought in the horses before breakfast. Fed the lambs and salted the cattle then spent the remainder of the day getting a grate up stairs. Rained constantly nearly all day and was quite cool in the evening.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 13, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

The day was wet, and I spent the forenoon doing chores about the house and made a long whip for driving four horses.

Went to Mrs Neak's Coal-bank in the afternoon and brought home 33 hr. of coal for which we paid one dollar. Spent the evening at home.

Cleared off some in the afternoon. Was called on in the evening as a referee on a case of settlement between John McConnell senior and James Caldwell.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 14, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Milked the Cows in the morning then fed the lambs and went to Mr. Lockhart to attend as an arbitrator between John McConnell Jr. and James Caldwell. Did not get to work until after dinner and did not get through until after dark.

They found in favor of John McConnell. The dispute was with regard to a credit of 25 or 250 dollars with the cipher rubbed off as it was written and we called it 25 dollars. Weather fine and cool.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 15, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Station

Milked the cows in the morning then brought in the horses and fed them. Attended church at Eldersville and heard Rev. H. S. Childs preach from II Cor.

~~12~~ 12 Col. Lane 5th verse.

Congregation tolerably large. Stopped at Robt. Redells and came home and got some Erysipilus medicine.

Friend Mrs. Hamlin rode long behind me word was brought during the day. That Sue Hamlin had recently been confined and Mr. Redell was wanted there but she could not go.
Weather very fine.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 16, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Store

Arose at five. Attended to milking the cows. Brought in the horses and fed the lambs before breakfast. Stewart and I gathered about 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ barrels of peaches and I went to Paris and got corn shod. Hauled out three loads of manure and went to Daniel Martiny and bought a sow and five pigs and brought them home in the wagon.

Weather very fine.

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 17, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station
Arose a few minutes
After five o'clock and
took some butter to
Riddle's before breakfast
to send to Pittsburgh.
Stewart and I spent the
day hauling manure.
Weather very fine. Heard
in the evening that while
Geo. Crisp proposed to thresh
on Thursday and my services
required.

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 18, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station
After attending to the chores
in the morning then went to
Mrs. Kelly's and brought
Jessie Kelly home with me
to attend to housework.
Stewart and I spent
the day hauling out
manure. I went to
the station in the
evening and brought
home the butter boys.
Took a small box
of lygates and
shipped them to Rev.
H. S. Childs, Burgettstown.
Weather very fine.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 19, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station
Stewart went to help Uncle
Geo. Crisp to thresh to allow
me to stay at home.
Gathered some apples in the
morning to make molasses.
About ten o'clock Helen
took sick and we sent
Charlie for Liz. Riddle and
he remained there during the

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Station

Slept until late in the morning. Fed the lambs and brought in the horses. Attended church at Eldersville and heard Rev. Willson preach from II Tim. III pt of 8. Ann Thorley and Johnie came home with me in the spring wagon. Ann came to take care of Helena and the babe. John Johnson is driving a very fractious going mare and had trouble coming home. Thought there was danger of her spinning away and I led her part of the way home. We changed Helena's clothing in the evening. Weather fine evening cool.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 23, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Station

Cross near six O'clock and spent the morning attending to Helen's wants, as Ann Shirley was unable to lift her in bed. Stewart and I spent the day hauling manure from the old barn on to the wheat field. Rev. Curtis Criss and his wife took dinner at Stewart's. Robert Riddle helped us to haul two loads of manure in the evening. Was raining at dark. Did not sleep well all night. Had to be up frequently with the babe

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Station

Left home at near six.
Spent the day marking out our ground, sowing our wheat and harrowing. Robt Riddle helped us in the afternoon. We sowed about 15 bu of wheat harrowed it over once and about half over again. Weather cloudy and musty rain occasionally.

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 25, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Stn.

Arose a few minutes after five, brought in the horses and prepared for threshing. After breakfast I assisted Helen some and then went to father's and helped to thresh 106 bushels of wheat and 394 bu of oats. Sent Willie Crogrove to Cassville and got two pairs of boots for me. Got my hair cut and got home between ten and eleven o'clock. Bill Carothers here weather fine. Arm & Lory and Johnie here

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 26, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Station.

Slept until after six. Did the milking after breakfast and fed the lambs. Helped Grandma Hamilton to churn. Spent most of the afternoon repairing some road. Took Bill Carothers to the station in the evening. Mr and Mrs. Bapton at Stewart's over night. Weather hot in the forenoon, evening very cool.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 27, 1878.

Home Near Hardin's Sta. Pa.

Spent the day doing chores.
Fed the lambs and dug
some potatoes and mended
Charlie's shoes in the
forenoon. Put a crown
in my hat, sifted some
Tymothy seed and
helped Stewart to haul
a load of fence posts
in the evening.

Maggie Riddle came
in the evening and
spent the night with
us. It rather very
fine. I rest in the
morning

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 28, 1878.

Home Near Hardin's & later

Fed the lambs in the morning

noon. Spent most of the

to the station in the
evening and got him
a pair of shoes.

on a visit.

post and rail fence
for us.

I rest in the evening

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 1878.

Spent the forenoon at home. Horses out of their place in the morning and over in Fulton's field. Did not find time to read much during the day.

Took Mrs. Amy and John A. Shorley home in the afternoon and it was about night when we got back.

Millie and Charlie went up with me. Weather fine.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 30, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Sta.

Did the lands and brought in the horses. Hauled posts and broad rails in the forenoon. Sowed timothy seed until supper time then took Cora to the station and got one of her shoes mended as she was very lame. Loaned Robert Kiddle my saddle & bridle to go to the Burgottstown fair. Weather very fine.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 1, 1878.

Home Near Hamlin's Station

Arose about six O'clock.
and spent the day
digging potatoes. Dug
about eleven bushels
of Snowflakes and
Stewart helped me
gather them up and
haul them in in the
evening. Stewart helped
Parabson with the
fence ^{building} at Aspertine.
He went to the station
in the evening.
Weather very fine.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 2, 1878.

trundle bed into the

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 3, 1878.

In the morning as we were going out to work two stray cattle came along our dog ran the cow away but the steer jumped into our field and we had a long race after him and did not get him away. Spent most of the day digging potatoes.

Repaired our wagon home. Put on a new slide iron. Weather very fine. Last day of the Burgettstown fair.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 4, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Lts.

Fed the lands and brought in the horses before breakfast. Took four horses and went to Buffalo Lick and got 3 bushels of coal. Stopped at the blacksmith shop and got some repairs on our wagon wheel. Got home about two o'clock and Stewart and I dug about five or six bushels of potatoes in the evening. Stewart and Cal went to Florence in the forenoon. Weather very fine.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 5, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Spent most of the forenoon digging potatoes. Robert Kiddle with us. Put the potatoes in the cellar after dinner and Kiddle went home to entertain visitors. Charlie took grandma Haulin to the Cove on horseback. I salted the stock and went to the station for the mail. Afternoon wet.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 6, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Spent the forenoon at home. Susan Kelly went home in the forenoon and came back in time for us to go to church in the evening. Charlie, Willie and I went to Eldersville and heard Rev. Childs preach from - Psalm 17.
Rev. Childs came home with us and remained over night. I pulled some tomato vines at bed-time as they were very likely to be frozen before morning.
Heard that Uncle George and Aunt Mary Thorley were at Uncle Geo. Creps' a visit.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 7, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Sto.

Rev. Childs took breakfast and dinner with us and took home with him some apples and potatoes. I helped Robert Riddle and Stewart to finish digging potatoes.

Carried some Tomatoes in from the market and went to Riddles and got some bees wax for Helen and brought some of our young cattle home.

Helen was quite hoarse during the day.

Charlie started to school to Miller's school to Sam. E. Proves. Sleam frost in the morning.

Weather very fine.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 8, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's Sto.

Arose at five, kindled fire in stove, brought in the horses, ate some breakfast and took the market-fox to the station. Got three shoes driven. I creped some gravel to the ends of the bridge gratuitously.

Hauled a load of stones for putting under fence. Hauled a load of hay from Harlin's Station to Burgelstown for Rev. H. F. Childs. Ate supper there and got home about nine o'clock. Fed team and turned it out. Weather fine and warm.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 9, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Sto

After attending to the feeding
in the morning Stewart
and I went to James
Caldwell's and helped to
thresh his crop of grain.
Broke the horsepower of
the machine when they
had four bushels threshed
and delayed us until
after dinner. Moved
the machine to Hill and
John Hanlin's and set
and threshed fifty bushels
of oats in the evening.
Very windy nearly all day,
and rained a little.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 10, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Station

Arose at five O'clock and
attended to some feeding.
Went to John & Mary Hanlin's
and helped to finish their
threshing. Got home
about four O'clock and
found Robert Riddle &
Liz Home from Ohio.
Sammie Sherley here over
night. Wrote out an
advertisement for the
sale of the Hanlin farm.
Weather very fine.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 11, 1878.

Home Near Gardin's Station

Spent the forenoon doing chores. Sammie Thorley here to help us to pick winter apples. We took the grain-carriage off the wagon and put on the wagonbed and got ready for picking apples.

We picked some over five barrels in the afternoon. Stewart went to Paris in the evening. Weather fine but cloudy in the evening.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 12, 1878.

Home Near Gardin's Sta.

Got the horses in in the morning and had just commenced picking apples when father, mother and Uncle Geo. and Aunt Mary Thorley came to visit us. I spent the day visiting. Sammie Thorley and Stewart picked about eight barrels of apples and we put them in the cellar.

Weather fine. Uncle George and Aunt Mary here with us over night.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 13, 1878.

Home Near Haulins St.

Arose about six o'clock
and attend to feeding
and brought in the
horses. Took Uncle
Geo. and Aunt Mary
Thorby to Eldersville &
heard Rev. Childs preach
from I Peter III. ch. pt. 7.
Took dinner at John Melvins
with Uncle and Aunt
and Charlie and I
attended church again
and heard Rev. Willson
preach from Colossians
I. 19. We got home
just at dusk.
Heavy frost in the
morning. Day fine.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 14, 1878.

Home Near Haulins St.

Arose about half past four
o'clock and got the team
harnessed and fed the
sheep and cattle before
breakfast. Ate early
breakfast by myself, then
took Stewart to the station
on his way to Washington.
Took Dr. Johnson from the
station to John Melvins.
Took Uncle Geo. and Aunt
Mary Thorby to Uncle Geo.
Crisp's. Came home and
gathered a few apples in
the evening for Sammie &
Albert Thorby which they
took home with them and
then a horse to help them
home.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 15, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Arose about six o'clock and spent the day gathering apples. Robt. Riddle and Jas. Krovins went to Steubenville to engage lumber for Riddle's new house. Liz. Riddle helping Cal. to make jelly. Sammie Shorley came in the evening and helped us to pick a few apples.

I went to the station at night and sent a note to C. Ringler that he could have our cattle if he would come for them on Friday.

Weather fine & warm.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 16, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Arose a few minutes after five o'clock and attended to feeding some stock, then spent the day gathering apples. Riddle's folks here Liz. was helping Cal. to make some jelly. Sip and Robert gathering winter apples.

We cut some apples at night to make jelly of. Sip remained with us over night.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 17, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta

Arose at six O'clock and spent the day working with apples. Carried in apples to make jelly of and helped to manage the sheep. Mr. Ringler and Mr. Stroud came and got four head of cattle from us for \$110.

I took Susie Kelly home in the evening. Liz Riddle and Sep and Robert were here during the day. Rained in the evening and I went to the Cheolborge and brought Charlie home.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 18, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Arose a few minutes before six O'clock and spent most of the day helping to make jelly. Liz Riddle having the job. Afflested with to pick Stewart went to the station and got a horse shod and brought home a load of coal. Robt Riddle rode off down town and I took Liz home on care after night and brought the horses home. Mattie Crip and Cynthia McChery here for dinner. Meaned our colts. Ken Haulin and Angeline at Stewarts at night.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 19, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Arose a few minutes before
six O'clock. Attended to the
milking after breakfast.
Spent most of the day
making a sack to dry
clothes on. Cut Charles
Willie's and Harry's hair.

Rained considerably
during the day and
was quite cool.

Maggie Reddle with
us during the day and
night.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 20, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Station Pa.

Spent the entire day at
home. Charlie took Maggie
Reddle home on horseback.
Stewart and Cal. went to
Eldersville to church and
I could not well leave
Helen and the children
alone. Spent part of the
day reading and part
minding the baby.

Weather very fine.
Ground frozen some
in the morning.
Heavy frost.

Having no girl, I was
obliged to attend to the
milking.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 21, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton St.

Attended to some feeding
before breakfast and
milked the cows.

Went to the station
and got three dollars
worth of sugar.

Picked some apples
and hauled into the
cellar. Bought in
some pomantes which
Brabson's had picked
in the shares.

Wrote two letters at
night in answer to
inquiries concerning
the sale of the farm
on which we reside.

Liz. Kiddle making
some apple jelly at our
place. Robert with
us all day. Frettie and
Pye Hamilton here over night.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 22, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton St.

Arose a few minutes
before four o'clock
fed and harnessed
two horses and got
my breakfast and
took our breakfast to
the station. Went to
Mrs Kiddle's and helped
to thresh 86 bushels
of wheat and 200 bu
of oats. Put the
machine in Kiddle's
barn and got home
a little after dark
Amie Kiddle with
us over night.
Raining at bedtime

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Station

The day was very wet.
Attended to feeding and
milking in the morning.
Spent most of the
day helping Helen to
wash, attending to the
baby and making a
stand to dry clothes.
Wrote a letter to one
Robert Smith in
answer to some inqui-
ries concerning the farm.
Cleared off in the evening.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 24, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Station

Attended to feeding and
milking as usual and
then helped Helen to finish
her washing. Finished
a stand to dry diapers
etc. Baby was good
during the day and I
got to work out some
while Helen was washing.
Weather very fair.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 25, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Station

Stewart spent the day hauling coal. I attended to feeding and milking as usual. Put in a pair of bars by the coal-house and shoveled down the ash pile so the horses could get over it. Cleaned out one of the water troughs and stopped the leak in the other one.

Had Macstell digging coal for Stewart.

John W. Seaman jr. called on me in the afternoon and bid me for Prothonotary.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 26, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Station

Arose at six o'clock and attended to the usual amount of feeding before breakfast. Milked the cows and salted all the stock in the forenoon while Stewart was hauling coal. Went to the station for the mail and took dinner at Robt Riddle's.

Went to Hunter's Mill with some wheat in the afternoon and looked over the Miller farm some with a view of buying. Robt Riddle's car load of lumber came to Haulins Station and he came at night to get us to help haul it on Monday!

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 27, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Milked the cows before breakfast, then did the usual amount of feeding and went to Makers Church and heard Rev. Stephenson preach from Acts ~~XVIII~~ 36. Very eloquent and practical sermon, but the man unfortunately did not enjoy the confidence of all his hearers, a report being in circulation that he had acted imprudently with some of the funds of L. Lawrence.

Weather cloudy and damp. Caught a muskrat in the trap in the morning.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 28, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Arose 20 minutes before four o'clock, kindled fires and fed and harnessed the horses and fed the sheep and colts then ate breakfast and milked the cows then Stewars and I took our teams and helped Robert Widdle to haul his load of lumber from the station for his new house.

John Provier, G. S. Haulin and Charlie Haulin each had a team helping.

We got through a little after dark and I went to J. F. McAlmonts to borrow his wagon ladders for Robert to haul his door and window frames on. Weather fine, but very cold in the morning. Ground frozen.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 29, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta
Arose at five O'clock
and attended to the usual
Amount of feeding and
milking. Stewart went
to Steubenville with Robert
Kiddle for some doors
frames &c. I went to
Provincer and helped
to unload some lumber
off our wagon then
went to the station to
get some beef from Cha.
Haulin. Buried our
beets and cabbage in
the afternoon. Some
young folks at Stewart's
at night. Weather
fine but cool.
Heavy frost in the
morning

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 30, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Arose at six O'clock and
attended to feeding & milking.
Cut up a quarter of
beef and Stewart and
I put a flour in one
and one of our corn cobs
and shelled some corn
which Stewart took to
mill. Rained in the
morning and was
cloudy all day.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 31, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Ste.

Attended to feeding and milking as usual.

Stewart and I spent the day shelling our old corn. Shelled out about 65 bushels.

Snowed nearly all day more or less. Got quite cold and freezing in the evening.

Wild geese flying.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 1, 1878.

Home Near Hanlin's Ste.

Arose a few minutes before six. Attended to shoe greasing and stock feeding before breakfast and milked the cows after. Stewart and I hauled a load of corn and hauled it in.

Rev. Child's came in the afternoon and got some potatoes, apples, flour and vinegar. Stewart and Cal. went to Reddies at night with bedding. Ground hard frozen in the morning and remained cold all day.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 2, 1878.

Home near Hamilton's Sta.

Passed through the usual routine of feeding and milking in the morning and we cribbed about one hundred bushels of corn during the day. Booy & Matt helping us. I went to Hunter's mill in the evening and brought home some chopping. Went by the way of the station for the mill.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 3, 1878.

Home near Hamilton's Station

Spent the day at home reading. Attended church at Eldersville at night and heard Rev. Childs preach from 133 Psalm 1st verse. Robt Lij. and Annie Riddle went with me. When father was about ready to start to church. Champ scared at Rev. Childs' buffalo robe, ran away and broke the buggy. He was caught at the church just before service began. An one horse ran by the way of Laurel hill and Scott's run. Series of meetings commenced in the Wesleyan church.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 4, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Arose at six and attended
to feeding as usual.
Chirked the cows after
breakfast. Jim. Wats and
"Boozy" helping us to husk
corn. We cribbed about
.130 bushels during the
day. I attended church
at Eldersville at night
and heard Rev. Childs
preach from James V
16. "Congregation tolerably
large and attentive."
Got home a little after
ten O'clock. Helen
sitting up sewing.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 5, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Arose at six O'clock and
attended to feeding and
milking. Attended the
election - at Florence and
voted Hoyt for governor.
Got home a little before
noon and spent the
afternoon hauling in corn.
Put two fifty bushel
loads into the crib and
hauled one into the
wagon shade. Attended
church at Eldersville at
night and heard Rev.
Childs preach from Mat. VIII
30. "Boos. Wats Sip and
Annie Riddle went with
me in the spring wagon. Mr.
and Mrs. Supton and Mr.
and Mrs. Magee visited at
Stewart's at night."

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 1878.

Home Near Hankins Station

Attended to feeding as usual. After we had eaten our breakfast, the tramp who had slept in our barn came to the house and we gave him some breakfast and some old clothes for which he seemed very thankful. I arranged a place for some short corn in the forenoon and we hauled in two loads in the afternoon. Attended church at the Wesleyan Church, Eldersville at night. Rev. Riddle and Annie Boss Watt and Jim went with me. Heard Rev. Childs from Rome, Tenn. Sermon on the Christian. Tried to get all church members around the altar but they would not come out.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 7, 1878.

Home Near Hankins Stn.

Was raining in the morning and we let our cornhuskers go home. Stewart and I commenced preparing a place to put corn over the wagonbed. I attended church at Eldersville at night and heard Rev. Childs preach from Amos III. Ch. 12. "Hard matter to get professors to come to the altar. Quite a number of professed Christians remained in their seats while some came forward after hard coaxing. I agreed with the Rev. to fast tomorrow morning. Congregation as large as usual. Becky, Fannie and Annie Riddle went with me in the evening.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta
Arose at six O'clock and
attended to feeding and
milking as usual. Having
entered into an agreement
with Rev. Childs, I fasted
until noon, drank two
cups of coffee. Hauled
in one load of corn in
the forenoon and two
in the afternoon.
Attended Church in
Eldersville at eight
and heard Rev. Childs
preach from Jer. XVIII
9". Congregation attentive
Many professed Christians
refused to come out to the
altar. The day was a
peaceful one to me.

Weather somewhat cloudy and chilly.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 11, 1878.

Home Near Hartins ^{S.D.}

Spent the morning doing chores. Harrowed the horses and hauled in a load of corn in the forenoon. Shep got into the wheat and Ross Riddle and I put them out. Horses left the wagon shade and brought the wagon to the corral house without a driver and the women stopped them. Met in the afternoon and I mended my boots.

Attended church at Eldersville and heard Rev. Willson talk on the subject of religion. Speaking meeting after. Lee Martin spoke and confessed himself a sinner. Work keeping. Weather set. Sis Riddle with us.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 12, 1878.

Home near Hanlin's Sta

Spent the forenoon doing
chores and mending my
boots. After dinner we
unloaded some corn and
put some floor over the
hayrack to make room
for corn. Attended
church at Eldersville

Rained hard in the evening and at night but there was a fair congregation out and two were forward for prayers - Ernest Magill and Mary Crisp. I got home as usual about half past one o'clock.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 22, 1878.

Miss Nettie Stephenson the only one forward for prayers. Some going folks seemingly very serious. Night very dark and roads muddy.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 29, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Stewart went to Washington in the morning. I attended to the feeding and hauled two loads of pumpkins for the cows. Rebecca Trax was buried.

Went to church at Eldersville at night and heard Rev. Willson preach from III Kings V 14".

Preaching in the brick church. Only one forward for prayers and meeting seemed very dull.

Got home about half past ten o'clock. Weather fine.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 30, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Sta

Attended to feeding
before breakfast.
Took Maggie Riddle home
on horseback. Went to
the station for the
mail and helped Robert
Riddle to haul a load of
coal in the afternoon.
There was no preaching
at Eldersville at
night and I spent
the evening at home.
Day very fine.
Ground hard frozen
in the morning.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 1, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Sta.

Spent the day at home.
Did not attend church at
Eldersville in the forenoon.
Rev. Willson preached in
the brick church. Took
Maggie Provinces and Maggie
Riddle in the Spring wagon
to church at night and
heard Rev. H. S. Childs preach
from Hebrews III 12th Ch. 3^d
Mrs. Alington, Jane Cartner,
Ella Jones, John Robertson
and Mansfield Ferguson
forward for prayers.
Rained considerably as we
came home. Congregation
was very large. House very
nearly full, and congregation
very attentive.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 2, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Ste.

Stewart and Cal. went to Mr. Buxton's in the spring wagon with my team. I attended to the usual amount of feeding and milking in the morning and all of it in the evening. Gathered some apples to make cider of.

Day was quite un-pleasant. Rained some during the day and evening. Stewart and Cal. being away I could not leave home to attend church.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 3, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Ste.

Stewart being from home I had all the feeding to attend to. Took Charlie to school and helped Helen to do some washing and a churning in the evening.

Robert Kiddle came in the forenoon and we gathered some more apples to make cider of. Snowed and rained nearly all afternoon. I put two of the cows in the stable at night for the first. They went in very willingly and seemed to know their places. Snow covered the ground.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 4, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Stewart being away I attended to all our feeding then buried some turneps.

Attended to some feeding in the evening then attended church at Eldersville and heard Rev. H. S. Childs preach from Gen. VIII. A lot of Mt. Congregation was very large on account of the storm and the muddy roads. No one forward ~~at~~ prayers. 23 had already been forward since the meeting commenced. Stewart and Cal. got home a little after noon. Snowed considerably during the day.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 5, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

After doing up our feeding in the morning we moved some sheep and pulled some bars.

We killed our beef in the afternoon. Robert Riddle helping us. David Lytton could not come.

We unloaded some cider apples from the wagon and put them in the cellar to keep them from freezing.

Was too late getting through with my feeding to attend church at night. Felt somewhat drowsy. Snowed some during the day. Ground white at night and somewhat frozen.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 6, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Stn.

After doing our feeding and milking Stewart and I cut up ~~two~~ quarters of beef and filled up some corn and some potatoes and turnips for Rev. A. S. Childs and I took them to Burgettstown. Ate supper there. Came home by the way of Hamilton's Station and took Uncle Charlie's beef home and brought home a barrel of salt and some other things. Got home about 9 1/2 o'clock. Weather cold and ground frozen.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 7, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Station

Attended to feeding and milking as usual. Scalded out our beef barrel, cut up a quarter of beef and packed it in pickle. Took some hog-worn beef to D. S. Fulton's. Attended church at Aldersville in Wesleyan church and heard Rev. Childs preach from Rev. VII 17th No person forward for prayers. Some there under deep conviction. Weather cold Roads rough. Ground frozen and still there was a good congregation and heard that Jas Jackson and Adiseas Miller had said they were waiting until the meeting would close till they would have a dance and try the faith of the Swing Concert.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 8, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Sto.

Attended to feeding and milking as usual then went to Eldersville Church and heard Rev. Childs preach from John II pt of 29. Luther Noah, Andrew Walker, Ella Jones and Garry Ravenscroft joined the Wesleyan Church and eleven persons landed in their names as desiring to join M. P. Church. Sacrament of Lord's supper administered. Took dinner at father's and wrote a letter for him to Great Philinia Melvin. Attended church at night and heard Rev. Willson preach from the King's 15. Robert Allynham forward for prayers. Meeting in M. P. Church.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 9, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton's Sto.

Attended to milking and feeding as usual. As it was very wet I spent the day in the house. Put soles on a pair of my old boots. Took some marketing, to Riddles in the evening. Attended service at the M. P. Church in Eldersville and heard Rev. Willson preach from Mat XXIV 12 & 13 inclusive. No person forward for prayers and the protracted meeting closed after being in progress nearly 5 1/2 weeks, and 24 persons experienced religion. I was appointed to take charge of the young people's prayer meeting on Thursday night.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 10, 1878.

Gov. Morrison's Holidays Over

After doing my feeding
I took a letter to Liz
Ridelle which proved to be
from Nan Morrison
stating that she was sick
and wanted Maggie Ridelle
to help her to do her work.
Raining and snowing as it
was Maggie and I got
ready and went down
in the spring wagon. Found
Nan and George both
very poorly. Nan had had
dysentery and George
suffering with heart
disease. Evening very
stormy. Snowing very
fast.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 11, 1878.

Home Near Harlin's St

Took breakfast at Geo.
Morrison's then turned
up my team and took
Ettye and Alex to school.
Took a sack of corn to
Mill for Geo. Morrison.
Got home about 12
o'clock and took our
Whitefaced Cow to John
P. Leather's stall. Called
at Robert Widdles and
told them the news
from Morrison's.
Widdles butchered their
hog during the day
but I did not
help. Considerable of
snow on the ground.
Ground very soft.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 12, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Station.

After doing my feeding and milking, I helped Helen to do a washing. Attended a young people's prayer meeting at Luther Noah's at night the first held since the protracted meeting. Quite a number, but not all the new converts out but they were there did their duty. It was my duty to open and conduct the meeting. Read the 11th chapter of Matthew. It was good to be there. I got home about half past ten o'clock. Charlie sitting up until I came. Weather cold. Snow on the ground.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 13, 1878.

Home Near Hankin's Station.

Spent the day feeding stock and rendering tallow. Did not get quite through.

He sat up until half past ten o'clock. Did a churning after night. Stearns cut some wood to make a fire for butchering. Snow on the ground but weather somewhat moderated.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 14, 1878.

Home near Hankin's Station

Rendered some tallow
and put up some
shelves on a post in the
cellar to set crocks on.
Stewart helped Robert
Riddle to haul a load of
strew for his beasts.
Rained nearly all day
and was very disagree-
able. Did not get the
mail from the Post office
in the evening.
Shep and I killed an
Opossum about
bed time.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 15, 1878.

Home near Hankin's Station

Spent the entire day at
home reading and attending
to the stock. Studied some
on the 8th chapter of the
letter to the Romans.
We sat a short time
in Stewart's end of the
house in the evening.
Weather quite unpleas-
ant. Rained some during
the day and froze as it
fell. Snowing at night.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 16, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Stn.

After doing our feeding and milking Stewart and I hauled stone and wood and prepared for butchering our hogs. I attended to the feeding in the evening and Stewart went to the station and got the mail. I spent the evening reading Congressional news in the Gazette after doing a spinning. Read speech of James S. Blaine of Maine on a resolution to enquire into election fraud in the last Presidential election.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 17, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Station

Arose a few minutes after five o'clock and had my feeding and milking done before sunrise.

We butchered eight hogs during the day. Robert Kiddle and J. S. Fulton helping us. We got through a little before five o'clock and after attending to my feeding, I went to Eldersville and attended a very interesting young folks' prayer meeting at John Robertson's. Young converts mostly out and all took part in the exercises. Day fine. Snowed some at night.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 18, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Sto.

Arose a little after six O'clock and attended to feeding and milking. Robert Riddle and I took three hogs to Aunt Jone Provins and Rebecca Tagerst weighing 663 lbs. Sold at $3\frac{1}{4}$ cts per lb. Spent the evening and night or part of it cutting up and salting our meat. We put up 776 lbs and Stewart put up 328 lbs. Sold one to Mrs Cochrane weighing 188 lbs. at 3 cents. Snow on the ground and weather cold.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 19, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Sto

Attended to feeding as usual, then spent the day cutting up and rendering lard. Got through about ten O'clock. Robert Riddle helped me and Stewart to cut our sausage at night. Cut 26 lbs. Weather fine with a little snow on the ground.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 20, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

While I was feeding in the morning Robert Riddle came to take some grain to mill. Helped him to load his grain and shelled two sacks of corn for him to take to mill.

I spent part of the day cutting up our hog heads and riding up butchering. Attended young people's prayer meeting at Mrs. M. C. Lewis. Quite a good turn out and nearly all the young converts took part in the exercises. I was appointed as leader but asked James Scott and he called on the persons present to speak and pray.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 21, 1878.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

The day was very wet and disagreeable. After feeding I spent the day cooking hog-heads for wolf and cleaning pig's feet. Helen was working sausage and putting it away. Cal helped her some at night. Got through about eleven o'clock. Mrs. Isabella Cassidy buried.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 22, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Ste.

Slept until late in the morning and as it was very stormy I was rather unusually late getting through with my feeding and did not attend church anywhere during the day. Spent the day and evening at home reading in the bible, the Wesleyan and the Methodist Recorder. Snow on the ground and quite cold. Spent the evening singing some of Moody and Sankeys Gospel Hymns.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 23, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Ste.

After attending to feeding at the stable harnessed ~~two~~ horses and Robert Riddle and I hauled about 190 bushels of coal on two sleds. Helped Riddle to haul a little load of straw in the evening and took our butter there to ship. When about to start home I fainted and fell senseless to the ground. Was carried in and remained quite sick for more than an hour when Robert came home with me. Got better during the night. Weather quite cold and snow on the ground.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 24, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Store

Did not feel very well during the day but attended to usual feeding and milking. Cut some sled-ropes and fastened one of the old ones on the sled again. Helen, Stewart and Cal preparing to go with Robert and Liz Kiddle to Midway tomorrow to spend Christmas, but so very cold that they talked of giving up. Mr. Robert brought his sled up and left his team to be taken to the station. Annie Kiddle with us over night. It rather very cold and stormy.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 25, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Store

Arose at four o'clock and helped Stewart to get Robert Kiddle's team ready and he and Cal. went to the station and thence to Midway to a turkey roast. I spent most of the day feeding and milking. Annie Kiddle helped me to attend to the milking. It rather so very cold that we had to keep up a fire in the cellar to keep things from freezing. Some snow on the ground.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 26, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Arose at five, kindled
fires and attended to
feeding and milking the cows
and fed the horses before
daylight. Went to Steuben
ville on the cars.

Saw an oil boat that
had blown up and was
burning. Bought goods
and settled bills to the
amount of almost \$21.⁰⁰
Got home just at
dusk. Arnie Riddle
and Charlie had done
our milking. Feeding
all done when I got
home. Weather very
cold but moderating
during the day and
snowing some in the evening.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 27, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Attended to feeding and
milking as usual, then
took my horses to Paris and
got them shod all around.
Spent about an hour
in John Hobbs's school.
Came home and did my
feeding then went to
Eldersville and attended
prayer meeting at James
Robertson's. Good turnout
of the young folks and
they nearly all did their
duty. Luther Buxton,
Rebecca and Samtha
were at Stewart's over
night. Sledding pretty
good. Weather quite
cold. Robert Riddle and
Stewart took our cows to Lee
Jackson's bar.

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 28, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Sta

After doing our feeding Robert Reddle and I hauled three sled loads of hay to the stable, then put a pole on the sled and made some other small repairs. Stewart and Luther Brynton out hunting Rabbits and went to the station for the mail and brought our market boy from Reddle's. Stewart and family and his visitors visited at Alex Culbertson's at night. Sledding good and weather cold.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 29, 1878.

Home Near Haulins Sta Pa.

Spent the day at home reading &c. Took the team and sled at night and took Cal. Hauling, Sif, Reddle and Annie to Eldersville to Church. Youngmen's Christian Association met in the Wesleyan Methodist church. Quite a number there from Cross Creek village. Services quite interesting, but not very lengthy. We were home a little after nine o'clock. Sledding pretty good.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 30, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta

Arose a few minutes before seven and attended to feeding as usual. A few minutes before twelve O'clock father and mother came in the sleigh and spent the afternoon and night with us very pleasantly. Father went with me to see all our sheep. Sledding pretty good and weather fine. Stewart went to Tree Jackson's and brought cran rows home from the bar.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 31, 1878.

Home Near Haulin's Sta

Father and mother took breakfast and dinner with us. Father was out with me while feeding and put some hoops on our feed buckets. They started home near three O'clock. Stewart and Cal. went to Florence and brought us some groceries. Sledding pretty good with great appearance of fall of snow at night. Considering the matter of renting the Haulin farm for another year. Stewart talking of selling his stock. I had some thoughts of buying from him if he should not ask too high a price.
