MONDAY 1.

1883.

Horn Near Hankin Sta Pa.

Arose at five and did the milking before breakfast. Children seemed to enjoy richly their candy and raisins. Took a rough fence rail to Providence for repairing a log sled. Mended Willie's boots in the afternoon. Planted some bushes for a rug at night and greased all our boots and shoes and did not get to bed until near eleven o'clock. Mr. Hardy brought me some stock to make him a pair of checklines. Snowed nearly all day. Sledding pretty good. Routes tolerably smoother.

JANUARY,

TUESDAY 2.

1883.

Home near Hankin's Station

Arose a few minutes after six
attended to feeding and
milking as usual.

Cleaned out the spring and
ice out of water trough for
cows. Sealed up barrel with
red corn in it.

Went to Robt McCready's
in the evening and got
two dollars on his thrashing
bill of 1875. Sett 1.63 back.

Went to Proves at night
and got \$66.20 milk money
which John brought from
Pittsburgh for me.

Helped Charley down with
his arthritic after
dinner.

Weather cold, some snow
on the ground. Sledding
not very good.

JANUARY,

WEDNESDAY 3.

1883.

Home near Hankin's Stn.

After doing the morning
chores Robt Riddle and
I spent the day hauling
hay from G. S. Hankin's to
our house. Robt's upset
with his first load and
we righted it up with
the horses by putting
a rope to the boom hole
and hitched to it.

Got through at dusk.
Not very much snow
but ground pretty
smooth and weather
very fine.

JANUARY,

THURSDAY 4.

1883.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to feeding
and milking as usual.
Went to Provinces and
measured their holdings.
Spent most of the
afternoon putting up
cash accounts.

Planted some hucks
at night for a rug.
Weather fine all
day. Snowing at
bedtime.

JANUARY,

FRIDAY 5.

1883.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to feeding and
milking as usual.
Charley spilled nearly half
a can of milk taking it
to the milkhouse on sled.
I went to John Lawther's
and got 203 lbs of beef
and brought it home. Cut
it up and put it in
the barrel at night.
Put soles on Gillie's shoes.
Bedding pretty good.
Snowed some during
day and misted some
and froze as it fell.

JANUARY,

SATURDAY 6.

1883.

Home Near Hankin Stw.

After doing the milking and feeding, I went to Caldwell's bank and got ten bushels of coal and ten bushels of slack and Willie and Charley shelled three sacks of corn which I took to the mill in the afternoon and got ground.

Sledding pretty good.

Put soles on Charley's boots at night. Snow melting some.

JANUARY,

SUNDAY 7.

1883.

Home Near Hankin Stw.

Charlie and I attended to feeding and milking as usual they got ready and went to Eldersville in the sled and heard Rev. Wallace preach from Psalms. 17th "Tolerably good Congregation". Sledding pretty good. Rev. M^cThee and Mr. Scarlott went with Riddle's folks to Paris where M^cThee preached for Rev. Cooper of the U. P. Church. Scarlott and M^cThee both ho over night.

JANUARY,

MONDAY 8.

1883.

Home Near Laurin Stn.

Rev. Mr. Shee and Mrs. Scarlott took breakfast with us and I took them to G.D. Laurin's in the sled then went to Florence and got a shoe driven and got some things from the store. Took our eggs to Riddles in the evening. Planted some hucks at night and sewed some at a key. Sledding pretty good with appearance of more snow.

JANUARY,

TUESDAY 9.

1883.

Home Near Laurin Station

Arose at key and did the usual chores. Went to Riddles and got some stuff of Hillie's pants. Went to Caldwell's bank and got 20 bushels of coal. Mended a blind bridle and bellstrap in the afternoon and finished sewing up a huck rug at night. Weather fine. Sledding tolerably good.

JANUARY,

WEDNESDAY 10.

1883.

Geo. Rofs Buffalo Township.

Arose at five and Charley and I did the milking and feeding, then I took the team and sled and took the boys to school and Geo. McHardy and I went to Buffalo township on hunt of a fresh milk cow. Stopped in Croft Creek Millage and bought a rope and a cattle leader. Stopped at John Roney's and took supper, then went to Geo. Rofs' and spent the night. Broke a single tree and Roney made us a new one. Seeding tolerably good. Weather fine. Spent the night pleasantly.

JANUARY,

THURSDAY 11.

1883.

John Roney's Buffalo Tp.

Took breakfast at Geo. Rofs. Went to Roney's to see about purchasing a cow he not being at home we started with the expectation of meeting him but failed. Got Hardy's grindstone at Roney's and hauled it around all day. Met some of my old scholars, J. A. Caldwell and his sister Mrs. Blay and also. Will and Howard Mc. Day. Stopped at McConnachie's where I had boarded and was glad to renew old acquaintances. Heard of nearly all my old school. Not finding any cows for sale we returned to John Roney's and spent the night very fine. Evening quite cold.

JANUARY,

FRIDAY 12.

1883.

Home Near Hankin Stw.

Took breakfast at John
Roney's. Felt quite unwell.
Bought a cow for fifty dollars
and started home about
ten o'clock. Geo. W. Hardy
with me. Cow very nearly
gave out and laid down
several times on the road.
Got home a little after
sundown and found
father and mother here.
Weather moderating some.

JANUARY,

SATURDAY 13.

1883.

Home Near Hankin Stw.

Did not send our morning
milk to Pittsburgh as we
slept late. Father and
mother here until after
dinner. I did not feel
very well, but did some
chores during day.
Rained and snowed
alternately almost all
day and was raining
at bedtime. Had a
bill to a lawyer at
Still Point's left Monday
night.

JANUARY,

SUNDAY 14.

1883.

Home Near Haulin Sto

After attending to feeding and milking in the morning Charley and I went in the sled to Eldersville to church. Annie and Maggie Kiddle went with us and Rev. McEwen and Mr. Sear. Got home late with us as far as Sam Johnson's.

Heard Rev. McEwen preach from Exodus 11 vs. 13. Spent the evening at home. Weather quite cold and roads icy.

JANUARY,

MONDAY 15.

1883.

Home Near Haulin Sto

After attending to feeding and milking I harnessed the team and went in the sled to Sarah McConnell's and borrowed one hundred dollars with which to pay interest, having bought a cow with what I had on hand. When I came home in the evening Maggie Kiddle came with me and we found Mr and Mrs Joseph Bell here. Helen getting a bath filled. They went with us to John and Mrs. Hamilton's for old folks singing and we had a good time about eight or nine small and great there. I stayed about midnight. Went in the sled and I left the children with Siff Kiddle. Roads icy. Weather fair.

JANUARY,

TUESDAY 16.

1883.

Home near Haulin. Stw.

Attended to feeding and milking as usual then cut the ice out of the water troughs for the stock. Turned the cows and horses out then spent the rest of the forenoon reading.

After dinner went to D. S. Walton's and paid Widow's dower interest \$81.38. Went to Dal. Smith's and got 3 $\frac{7}{8}$ lbs. butter a 28th for lb.

Spent the evening at home reading in the Youth's Companion. Weather fine. Snow melting.

JANUARY,

WEDNESDAY 17.

1883.

Home near Haulin Stw.

Milking and feeding as usual. Spent the forenoon doing chores. Made a handle for the Chockhammer and a creaser. Made some pickle and put on our pork. Put hinges and a fastener on the transium above the kitchen door.

Put a piece on one of my boots. ~~last~~ night. Rained nearly all day. Snow and ice melting off.

JANUARY,

THURSDAY 18.

1883.

Home near Haulin' Stn.

Attended to milking and feeding as usual,
Spent part of the day making a set of check lines for S. W. Hardy. Helen was washing and Grace was getting Amwell and very crop and I had to take care of her in the evening. ~~Hardy~~ was very lame. Windy in the evening.

JANUARY,

FRIDAY 19.

1883.

Home near Haulin' Stn.

Arose at six. Did milking and feeding before breakfast. Ground very icy had rained in the night and frozen on the ground. Rained some during the day. I finished making Mr. Hardy's lines and sewed up cow wagon whip. Put up a rack to feed a cow hay from and mixed some cow feed. Read some at night.

JANUARY,

SATURDAY 20.

1883.

Home near Hartin Sta Pa.

Arose at five O'clock
and did the milking and
cooked the milk to send to
Pittsburgh. Felt quite unwell
and spent the forenoon in
the house. Charley and
Willie shelled some corn
and Charley and I took it
to mill in the afternoon
and got it ground.
Rained most of the day
and took off the ice
and snow. Rained
hard at night.

JANUARY,

SUNDAY 21.

1883.

Home near Hartin Station.

Arose as usual and Chellie
and I did feeding and
milking then went to Hamilton
School House where we heard
Rev. Huff preach from Rev.
III. 18th Ch. Ch. Church was
finished. Paint not dry.
Weather quite cold, quite
a sudden change.
Spent the afternoon and
evening at home.

JANUARY,

MONDAY 22.

1883.

Home Near Hamilton Ste.

Arose a few minutes after five and did the usual chores before breakfast. Harnessed the team and went to Caldwell's bank and got 20 bushels of coal. Stopped at Lockhart's and got the promise of Hat (Mr) Ornell to see a few days for us. Helped Robt Riddle to fill up the wheat which he intended taking to the station. He was quite poorly. Took our row to McCalmont's in the evening and took our eyes to Riddle's to send to Pittsburgh.

Weather quite cold. A little snow on the ground.

JANUARY,

TUESDAY 23.

1883.

Home Near Hamilton Ste.

Arose at the usual hour and did the usual chores. Helped Robt Riddle to haul 37 bushels of wheat to the station and hauled a load of coal from Crisp's bank for him. Got home about sundown and Helen and Ed Riddle and I went to Jim Martin's to an old folks singing. Crowd not very large and no very good singing as some others. Hurt my foot some in the evening and at night it pained me so that Helen had to get up and put hot salt to it. Called home but got relief from the salt. Weather cold.

JANUARY,

WEDNESDAY 24.

1883.

Home Near Hardin Stn.

Up well all day. Slept until breakfast was ready. My feet somewhat painful. Annie Riddle and Charlie did the milking.

Hot. McConnell came to see for us.

Annie Riddle here over night. We caught some chickens for Call in the evening after they had gone to Goss.

Day fine.

JANUARY,

THURSDAY 25.

1883.

Home Near Hardin Stn.

Arose at six. The usual chores being done, harnessed the team and took a dozen chickens to the station and sold them to Ross Shields at 60¢ per pair. Hauled up twelve sacks of bean for Robt Riddle. Hot. McConnell here sewing for us.

Snowed most of the day. Slidding getting pretty good in the evening.

Mr. Hard, came and got his check lines which I had made for him.

JANUARY,

FRIDAY 26.

1883.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Attended to chores as usual in the morning. Put a pole on the little sled.

Cut down a dead tree at the forks of the road.

Took Bob's Riddles by home.

Took Charlie, Willie and

Gillie in the sled to father's at night and came

home about one o'clock.

Sledding pretty good.

Rev. Cooper's youngest child

buried. Hat. Mc Connell

went from here to the

funeral. Clyde Chelwin

Came home with us at

night

JANUARY,

SATURDAY 27.

1883.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

After doing the feeding and milking in the morning Clyde and Charlie shelled some corn and

we took our Cherry Cow to

S.S. Hamlin's this ball.

Rev. Mr. Ghee came and

spent the night with us

Rained all day so that I

concluded not to go to

mill.

JANUARY,

SUNDAY 28.

1883.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Arose at six and did
the usual chores, Rev.
Mr. Ghee, Chyde Melvin
Charlie and I went in the
wagon to Eldersville to
Church and heard Rev.
Mr. Ghee preach from Acts
XVII 17. Took dinner at
C. M. Stephenson's and brought
some apples home with us.
Snowed most of the day
and melted.
Wrote a letter to Fannie
Stephenson at night
to tell her what was
the middle verse of the
Old Testament as found
in Hildricks Analysis
III Chronicles XX 17

JANUARY,

MONDAY 29.

1883.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Did usual chores during
day and hauled 35 bushels
of coal from Caldwell's
hayk.

Dr. Carothers came over
at night with petition
to Legislature to enact
an Amendment to Consti-
tution to prohibit Man-
ufacture and sale of Alco-
holic liquors as a bever-
age in Pennsylvania.
He had a good time with
our boys. It rather fine.

JANUARY,

TUESDAY 30.

1883.

Home Near Hamlin Sta

Arose as sif, and did
thy usual chores.

Robt Riddle came before
we got through breakfast
and talked an hour or
so. I went to Burgittstown
and got some medicine
from Dr. Riddle for
Charley's breaking out.

Did not get home until
dark. Weather fine.
No snow on the ground.
Roads a little muddy.

JANUARY,

WEDNESDAY 31.

1883.

Home Near Hamlin Sta

Arose at five O'clock
and milked three cows
for milk to fill out three
cans. After attending
to our feeding I helped
Robt Riddle to haul a
load of hay, took dinner
at Riddle's and finished
part of the afternoon with
John Riddle and his wife
there. Hulled some
ground cherries in the
afternoon and evening.
Harriet McConnell here
evening. Snowed some
during day. Some
snow on the ground
but sledding not good.

FEBRUARY,

THURSDAY 1.

1883.

Home Near Haulin Stw.

Arose about five O'clock
and milked one cow
and cooled her milk
to fill out a can of milk
to send to Pittsburgh. Attended
to milking and feeding as
usual. Helped Robt
Kiddle to haul three
sled loads of hay.

Kiddle's young folks
at our house until
bed time.

Weather cold. Some
snow on the ground.

FEBRUARY,

FRIDAY 2.

1883.

Home Near Haulin Stw.

Arose a few minutes before
six and did the usual
chores before breakfast.
Finished hulling ground-
cherries in the forenoon.
Took some wheat and
some corned to the mill
in the afternoon.

Kiddle's girls, Annie & Haulin
Fat, McConnell, Charlie, and
a number of young folks
from Paris went to
G.S. Haulin's at night.

We were invited to
an Old folks' singing
at Mass Haulin's but
did not attend. Helen
thought she had no way to
leave the children.

FEBRUARY, SATURDAY 3. 1883.

Home Near Hardin St.

Arose a few minutes after five o'clock and did the milking and sent the morning's milk to Pittsburgh. Took our whole family to C. M. Stephenson's on a visit. Cyrrus not at home.

Rained on us as we came home in the evening.

Maggie Riddle and Hewlett McConnell kept house for us while we were away.

Did our milking after night.
My 44th birthday.

FEBRUARY, SUNDAY 4. 1883.

Home Near Hardin St.

Arose about eight o'clock and did the usual chores before breakfast. I attended church at 9 o'clock and heard Rev. Huff preach from Isaiah ~~XLV~~ Lt. cl. 15. Paper of ceiling gave way and caused a stoppage in sermon until it was propped up and lamps taken down.

Attended church again at 11 o'clock and heard same man from Eph. V 14. Congregation large and very attentive. The church had rather a neat appearance since it was repaired. Freezing some at night.

FEBRUARY,

MONDAY 5.

1883.

Home Near Haulin Stn.

Arose a few minutes before six and did usual chores and greased some boots before breakfast. Went to Province and got our milk money for last month. Took dinner then then went to John Lawlter's for butter but did not get any. Paid for our beef. Attended church at Tuckers at night and heard Rev. Huff preach from Numbers 32 & 23. Congregation tolerably large and very attentive. Some snow on the ground. Ground rough and frozen.

FEBRUARY,

TUESDAY 6.

1883.

Home Near Haulin Stn.

Arose a few minutes before six o'clock and did chores as usual. Got some mending done. Went to Jos. Lyons' and took dinner there. Got some butter. Bought a shirt and a fine comb from a peddler. Attended church at Tuckers at night and heard Rev. Huff preach from the words 'I have fought a good fight &c.' Did not get there in time to hear the text announced. Rained all evening. Congregation small.

FEBRUARY,

WEDNESDAY 7.

1883.

Home Near Haulin Stw.

Did Chores as usual in the morning. Went to Provinces and Riddles and got some sacks & take to Steubenville for bran. Took dinner at Riddles. Went to Fulton's in the afternoon and got four sacks.

Spent the evening at home. Charley went to Tucker's church at night alone (we were very uneasy at ten o'clock as he was still not home and I had been getting home about half past nine. Weather cold Roads somewhat icy.

FEBRUARY,

THURSDAY 8.

1883.

Home Near Haulin Stw

Arose at 4-10 and kindled the fires and did the milking before breakfast. Went to Steubenville on train and bought 2000 lbs bran for \$16.00. River so high that the waterworks could not supply the town with water. Heard in the evening of the death of Willie Gracy and made some preparations to attend his funeral at Seemison on Saturday. Helen and Gracy work at night and I feared to leave them. Weather fine.

FEBRUARY,

FRIDAY 9.

1883.

Home Near Harlin Sta

Arise at six and did
 chores as usual. Did not
 go to Dennison to attend
 the funeral of Willie Gray
 on account of Helen and
 Grace being poorly with the
 cold. Shelled some corn
 during the day. Went to
 Riddles in the evening
 for the market money
 but they had not
 returned. Borrowed ten
 dollars from Ross Riddle
 intending to attend the
 funeral tomorrow if Helen
 and Grace should be better.
 David Hutton brought me
 meat saw home.

Weather very fine.

FEBRUARY,

SATURDAY 10.

1883.

Home Near Harlin's Station

After doing my feeding in
 the morning I took our horses
 to the shop and had their shoes
 sharpened. Borrowed some
 sacks from J. P. McCalmont
 and took about ten bush-
 els of corn to the mill and
 got it ground and
 home with me. Rev. Mr.
 Stue called at our house
 a short time in the after-
 noon then went back to
 Riddles and spent the night
 there. Weather fine during
 the day but snowed at
 night and then rained.
 I had intended to have attended
 the funeral of Willie Gray
 at Dennison, but Helen and
 Grace were so poorly that I
 could not go.

FEBRUARY,

SUNDAY 11.

1883.

Home Near Hardin Stn.

After doing feeding and milking in the morning I took the spring wagon and went to Eldersville Church. Rev. Mc Ghee and Willie Morrison went with me. Heard Rev. Mc Ghee preach from Luke ~~XXIII~~ ^{XXIV} ch. pt 54. Rev. came home with us for dinner and we went up to church at Tuckers at night and heard him preach from Exodus ~~XXX~~ ^{XXXI} 80. Very good sermon and he was complimented by some of the members. Took Miss Scott to Hardys and Angie. Home in our wagon. Night stormy. Helen quite poorly and scarcely able to speak above a whisper. Rained nearly all day. Rev. Mc Ghee with us over night.

FEBRUARY,

MONDAY 12.

1883.

Home Near Hardin Stn.

After doing our feeding in the morning I saddled a horse for Rev. Mc Ghee and he started to a birthday party at A. J. Purley's I went to Middle's to grind an axe and took dinner there. Found some on stone at Provine's. Got home between two and three o'clock. Attended church at Tuckers Church at night and heard Rev. Huff preach from Mat ~~XX~~ ^{XXI} 12. Congregation large and attentive. First interest seeming of the meeting manifested on the part of the members. Rev. Mc Ghee attended Hammaker Purley's birthday party at Mrs. Mclellan's. Weather fine.

FEBRUARY,

TUESDAY 13.

1883.

Home Near Hankin Stee.

Attended to feeding and milking as usual, and spent part of the forenoon talking with Rev. Mr. Shee.

Loaded Jas. Martin our log sled. Hauled twenty bushels of coal from Caldwell's bank. Took our cow "Spotty" to the bull at Alex Hankins.

Attended church at night at Luckers and heard Rev. Mr. Shee preach from John 14 and 2 Cl. 3. "I go a fishing" Good congregation also. Weather fine.

FEBRUARY,

WEDNESDAY 14.

1883.

Home Near Hankin Stee.

Attended to Chores as usual. Run was very light in the morning and I went down to see if Charlie had got across going to school. Took out a parcel of fence at the crossing to help it from turning water over road.

Put wheat and oats into smaller forms in milk house to put brany away.

Rained all day and Willie did not go to school. I did not go to church at Luckers at night.

FEBRUARY, THURSDAY 15. 1883.

Home Near Hamlin Stn.

Did the usual amount of feeding and milking, harnessed the team and went to station for bran. Went to fathers and got some medicine for Charles's scratches. Brought home eighteen sacks of bran.

Did not go to church at night because I was too late getting home. Roads muddy, waters high.

FEBRUARY, FRIDAY 16. 1883.

Home Near Hamlin Stn.

Did the usual chores in the morning. Harnessed the team and took Helen and the children to Riddle's. Robt and I went to station and brought home a load of bran. At dinner at Riddle's, I took Rev. McShu to Eldersville and heard him preach from Mat. VII 12. Congregation small and some misbehavior. Rev. came back home with me. Roads very bad. Weather very warm.

FEBRUARY,

SATURDAY 17.

1883.

Home Near Hanlin Stw.

After doing feeding and other chores, I put the new landside on the plow and then plowed part of our potato patch and we hauled four loads of manure and put on what was plowed.

Rained and I put a rivet in Charles's knife.

Ground scarcely dry enough for plowing. Mungie Riddell here in the afternoon

1883.

Home Near Hankin Sta

Morning chores as usual. Put shovels on our meat. Shelled some corn to take to mill. Dug up some potatoes for Robt. Riddle. Finished plowing our potato patch and put on four wagon loads of manure making eight in all then harrowed it after dusk.

Weather very fine with some appearance of rain.

APRIL,

SATURDAY 14.

1883.

Home Near Haulin's Ddw

After doing feeding in the morning, filled up a load of corn and sent Charley to mill. Cut and planted a bushel and a half of early potatoes, and planted one row of sweet corn. Repaired the double trees of the spring wagon, sent Charley to Smith's shop and to Lyons' for butter.
Weather fine.

SUNDAY 15.

1883.

Home Near Haulin's Sta

Arose a few minutes before six and we did the feeding and milking as usual then Charley, Gillie, Liz, Riddle, and I went over to Eldersville and heard Rev. Wallace preach from Rev. ~~11th~~ ps of 10. We heard that the doctors had taken the lump out of Willie Coopers breast and he went to see him and did not get home until dark. Rained in the afternoon and as we came home we found Riddle's two girls and Rebecca Proving on the bridge and brought Thompsons with us.

I heard in the evening that Mrs. Mary Auburn was buried today weather fine.

Weather cloudy.

FRIDAY 17.

Hugh Cassidy's.

Father and mother took breakfast. After doing morning chores we got the bed on the wagon and I went to Caldwell's bank and got 25 lbs of coal. Spent the afternoon binding oats. Went to Mr. Cassidy at night and sat up all night. Mr. Cassidy not expected to live. Weather fine. Fred Cosgrove and Clyde Melvin fire over night and helped us remove the oats in the afternoon.

AUGUST,

SATURDAY 18.

1883.

Home Cow Haulin' etc

Left Mrs Cassidy's at four
o'clock and did usual
chore. Could not easily
keep awake while milking.
Went to bed and slept

AUGUST,

TUESDAY 21.

1883.

Went Cassidy's.

Attended to chores in the morning and Charley took the milk to Riddle's. I went to Mr. Cassidy's and found him still getting weaker. Got there just in time to help change his bed. Finished tying our oats and I went to Cassidy's at night to sit up but as they had some company I slept until two o'clock then got up until four when I came home. Mr. Cassidy not expected to live. Weather very warm.

AUGUST,

WEDNESDAY 22.

1883.

Home Near Haulin Sta

After doing the morning work as usual I spent most of the day repairing my razor ladders.

Went to the station in the evening and met Will Melvin and Thompson Crisp with the threshing-machine, helped them to get about three enough cats for horsefeed.

Great appearance of storm in the evening and rained nicely all night. Received a long letter from Rev. F. M. Cyle.

AUGUST,

THURSDAY 23.

1883.

Home Near Haulin Sta

After doing the chores I went to Mr. Cassidy and found him still living but very low. Asked Amanda to apply for our school and circulated a paper among the patrons and got 32 names on it. Annie Riddle carried it around. I spent the afternoon putting in culverts to haul out to over, and preparing to thresh. Machine came at dark. John Stephenson with Thompson Crisp and Will Melvin. Some appearance of rain at night.

AUGUST,

FRIDAY 24.

1883.

Home Near Haulin St

Arose at four O'clock
and did chores. We spent
the day threshing 282 bu
Oats and 114 bu wheat
and a lot of timothy and
suegrass. Mr. Hardy and
Wm. Fulton had a team
and Robt Riddle had his
team and hauled the
grain and hay in out

Grace was a little better about three o'clock and asked for something to eat. but was worse again in the evening and Lay. Riddle stayed with us over night. Heard in the afternoon that Hugh Cassidy had died about 3 A.M.

Home Near Haulin Station

Attended to Chores as usual. Grace much better but still not entirely well. Father and Mother came about nine o'clock. I waited until the Doctor came to see Grace then I took my horse and buggy and went to the funeral of Hugh Cassidy, but being chosen a pall bearer. I sent the horse back with Will. Haulin and I went in G.S. Haulin's wagon. Did not get home until five o'clock. Grace much better when I came home. But father and Mother on their way home. Weather fine and roads quite dusty.

Arose a few minutes before five and did the chores. Charley went to John Lawther's to help to thresh and I took the milk to Riddle's to meet John Provine. Gracy was very poorly all day and had to stay in the house a good share of the time. Frank Carothers here in the afternoon. He cleaned some timothy seed. S. S. Fulton called in the evening to see Gracy. Rained some at different times through the day.

AUGUST,

WEDNESDAY 29.

1883.

Home Near Hanlin Station

Arose a few minutes before five and after doing the morning chores I put a bundle on the plow and when Charley came from the station we spent the remainder of the day cleaning timothy seed. Frank Carothers went to Stewart Hanlin's for us to help to thresh. Weather very cloudy. Gracy getting considerably better and seemed quite lively at bedtime. We looked for the doctor to come some time during the day but he did not come.

AUGUST,

THURSDAY 30.

Arose at the usual time
and did the usual chores
before breakfast!

Charley took the milk to
Kiddle's and then we took
the bed off the wagon and
put the grain carriage

Arose a few minutes before five and kindled fires and attended to milking. I took the milk to the station then went to Mrs. Hayes' and got a basket of plums for which I paid three dollars. Spent the afternoon sifting timothy seed. Found that he had about seven bushels. Charley helped Provines' to thresh. Rained in the evening and they did not get done. Engine off the track at the station in the morning. Broke heart.

SEPTEMBER, THURSDAY 13. 1883.

Home Near Hankin Sta.

Arose a few minutes before five and got the milk ready to sent to Station and Charley took it. Helped Proving to finish threshing. Came home after dinner and commenced to flow. Lightning rod men came and put rods on our house. Contract called for \$20. and it was understood that 81 feet rod was to do the job but instead the contract was constructed to mean 63 1/2 cts per foot discounted \$40, 36 and the job cost \$66. Could see no way to get out paid \$20 and gave a note for \$45 payable in ~~three~~ months.

SEPTEMBER, FRIDAY 14. 1883.

Home Near Hankin's Station

Arose a little before five as usual and did the milking before breakfast. I took the milk to the station, borrowed forty dollars from John Alende and started to Eldersville to meet Lightning rod men but met them near the forks of the road and left my note.

Skinned a Coon that Robt Riddle had killed and a groundhog which two hunters got for Charley. Plowed some in the afternoon. Charley away at picnic at Pucker. Charley and Arthur's boys went out to hunt Coons at night.

SEPTEMBER, SATURDAY 15. 1883.

Home New Haven Sta

After doing the usual ~~hours~~ hours
Charley went to the ~~cells~~ cells
with the milk and I
borrowed our wagon and
horses to go to Florence.

Charley and I took horse
went to Proctor and
cleaned it and Charley went
to mill. I mended a collar
for one of the horses and
blowed some in the
afternoon.

Weather quite warm.

Weather fine. Got J. D. O'Connell to alter two pairs for us.

After doing chores we attended Church at Duckers and heard Rev. Hough from Heb. VIII 27 28. Annie and Sis Riddle with us at Church and took dinner with Mr. Dept for Robt. Riddle and he came in the evening and relieved a cow that had calved and failed to clean. I treated her in the evening.

SEPTEMBER, MONDAY 24. 1883.

Home near Hamilton Sta.

Usual chores in the morning and did some doctoring to cows some feet. Charley took the milk to the station went to C. M. Stephenson and got some butter and came home past the mill and got some grinding. Rained most of the day and I worked some in the shop making a cart for coal milk. Sis Riddle here during the day putting up fruit.

SEPTEMBER, TUESDAY 25. 1883.

Charley took the milk to Riddle as usual. We spent the forenoon doctoring cows, sore feet and repairing some fence. I planted some seeds of fruit trees.

Congregation very small.
Weather fine.

Charley and I attended prayer meeting at Tucker's in the forenoon and I attended again at night. Charley remaining at home with his mother and the smaller children. Congregation at night larger than in daylight. Weather very still. Freezing some at night.

After doing the milking I took the milk to the station. Bought some nails went to the mill for some chopping. Boiled and skinned the pickle of our beef. Dug some dirt out of the shade by the cowhouse to put a floor in it.

We all attended church at Tuckers at night and heard Rev. Hough preach from Mat. VII 24 & 27 inclusive. House full.

Singing was changed to five o'clock and a great many came to attend the singing, not knowing anything of preaching at seven. The usual hour occupied by Prof. Steward's class. Weather very fine. Much like fall.
