Home Near Hamlin Sta

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and
 Charley and I did our
 milking and most of our
 feeding before daylight.
 We milked seven cows and
 I took the milk to the station
 to send to Pittsburgh. We
 spent the afternoon putting
 things in shelter and hauled
 a few rails to fence our
 strawstack for the cows.
 Rained hard in the evening
 and froze as it fell.
 We came home at
 night. Still raining
 at bedtime.

JANUARY, WEDNESDAY 2. 1884.

Home Near Hanlin Sta

Arose at 4 1/2 and Charley and I did milking and feeding as usual. Charley took the milk to Riddles and I finished the feeding. We changed the fence to let the cows at the straw. Caught some chickens to sell. Made a stall in the barn for the colt and weather boarded one end of the cowhouse. Charlie attended singing at Tuckers as night. Prof. did not come. Night very cold and stormy. I wrote a letter to F. J. Lindly. Expected Prof. Stewart home with Charley but he did not come. Late retiring.

JANUARY, THURSDAY 3. 1884.

Home Near Hanlin Sta

Arose at 4 1/2 o'clock and we milked seven cows before daylight. I took the milk to the station. Got our milk money from John Proomes. Took Mr. Calmarts money to him part of an brand to John McConnell's chance to bring John Hanlin's. Got my hair cut and got home in time to help to milk and feed some. Day very cold and stormy. Wind blew very cold all day.

JANUARY,

FRIDAY 4.

1884.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and
 Charley and I did the milking
 and feeding before daylight
 and Charley took the milk
 to Kiddles and waited
 until John Prooms
 returned from Station
 with the cans.

Sold two dozens of
 Chickens to John McDonald
 for \$6.00. Spent most of
 the day weatherboarding
 Chickenthouse and
 chinking the barn to
 keep storm out.

One of our cows refused
 to eat and seemed sick.
 Snowed fine frosty snow
 all day. Snow about
 an inch deep in the
 evening.

JANUARY,

SATURDAY 5.

1884.

Home Near Hanlin Sta

Arose at 4 1/2 and did the
 milking and feeding
 as usual. I took the
 milk to the station.

Met Maimie Sawcett and
 her family starting home
 took P. Bayer up to
 Eldersville in sled. Called
 in to see Bill Sholey &
 found him better.

Eine Swearingen came
 home with me from
 Kiddles. Weather very
 cold and I cut a
 hole in the floor
 in cellar and put
 fire in the stove.
 Water frozen in
 cellar. Put little
 snow on the ground

JANUARY,

SUNDAY 6.

1884.

Home near Haulin Sh

Left until after daylight,
Charley and I attended to
feeding and milking
and Charley walked over
to Eldersville Church
and I went to Tuckers
to Prayer meeting.

I did all the feeding
and milking in the
evening. Read some
in Good Words to the
Children. Read in
Bible Wesleyan Methodists
and New Testament
Glean of Hell.

Weather very cold
some snow on the
ground.

JANUARY,

MONDAY 7.

1884.

Home near Haulin Station

Arose at 4 1/2 and attended
to feeding and milking
as usual. Charley took the
milk to Kiddle's before
he went to School and
I went to Kiddle's for a
after I had finished
feeding. I spent part
of the afternoon husking
ground cherries.

J. P. McCalmont came
in on an errand and
left for an hour or
more. Weather quite
cold but not so cold
as for the last two
days. Charley attended
singing at Tuckers at
night.

JANUARY, TUESDAY 8. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Ste

Attended to milking
as usual before
daylight and I
took the milk to
the station. Train
was very late I got
but two empty cans.
Went to McAlmon's
and told him I could
not furnish him
a can. Did chores in
the afternoon such
as sweeping roads
and stuffing cracks
to keep snow out of
the stables. Snowed
very fast all day.
Snow very deep at
night and still
snowing.

JANUARY, WEDNESDAY 9. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Ste

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock
and kindled fires and
swept snow out of
path. Charlie and I
did milking before
breakfast. I took
the milk to Riddle's.
Snow so very deep that
it was very difficult
to get about. Covered
a wagon-hip during day.
Charlie did not go to
school. He brought cans
from Riddle's and took
two to McAlmon's.
Snowed some during
the day.

JANUARY, THURSDAY 10. 1884.

Home Near Haulin St.

Arose at the usual hour
and Charlie and I milked
seven cows and fed before
daylight. I took the milk
to the station on the sled.
Snow very deep and
sledging heavy. Took
Provine's cane to them
and drove almost to the
schoolhouse to break
the road for Charley to
go to school. Finished
making a wagon whip
in the afternoon and
helped to milk and feed.
Was raining a
bed time

JANUARY, FRIDAY 11. 1884.

Home Near Haulin St.

Having rec^d notice not to send
any milk in the morning
we slept until late and
milked and fed after
daylight. I took the
sled and took Charley
and Co. Carothers to
school. Spent an hour
or two in school. Straightened
the tongue in the sled
and stilled some corn
and mixed some cow feed.
Attended to feeding and
milking as usual in
the evening.
Snowed some in the
afternoon. Snow very deep.

JANUARY, SATURDAY 12.

1884.

Home near Haulin Sta.

Arose a few minutes before five and did milking and feeding as usual before breakfast. Took the milk to the station and some grinding to mill and got it home with me. We hauled two sled loads of hay in the afternoon.

Snow very deep and still blowing.

JANUARY, SUNDAY 13.

1884.

Home near Haulin Sta

Slept until late and after we got our feeding done I attended church at Tuckers. Rev. Hugh Rick and did not come.

Had prayer meeting.

Spent the afternoon and evening at home reading in the Bible and attending to feeding and milking. Snow very deep but melting some in the afternoon and night.

JANUARY, MONDAY 14. 1884.

Home near Hamlin Sta

Awoke at 4 1/2 O'clock
and after milking as
usual I took the milk
to Riddles to meet John Pro-
vine. Called at S. S. Sul-
ton's to pay widow's interest
but learned that he would
rather I would hold it
until next month. Went
to Silaence and got some
boots mended. Called in
to see Rev. Hough and
found his health somewhat
improved. Did chres
in the evening.
Cherley attended singing
at night. Snow melted
some during day.

JANUARY, TUESDAY 15. 1884.

Home near Hamlin Sta

Awoke 15 minutes before four
O'clock intending to take the
family to Grandpa's but found
it storming and they did not
go. I took milk to the station
Called at C. M. Stephenson's
& Will Thorley's. Will still
quite poor. Took dinner
at Will Melvin's. Borrowed
ten bushels of wheat and
brought it with six bu-
ful father's to Hamlin's
mill. Sledding good.
Weather cold but day
fine.

JANUARY, WEDNESDAY 16. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at the usual time
and did the usual chores.
Charley took the milk to
Kiddles. I finished the feeding
shoveled the snow from the
clothesline put a sledge on
the sled and put a bar
in it and cut the
ice at the fording
to improve the crossing
and mended one of
Lillie's shoes at night.
Sledding very good.
Weather tolerably cold.

JANUARY, THURSDAY 17. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at 4 o'clock and
did usual chores before
breakfast. I took the
milk to the station.
Repaired sled some
and hauled forty bushels
of coal from Cold-
wells bank in the
afternoon.

Sledding here good.
Snow deep and crust-
ed. Weather not very
cold.

JANUARY, FRIDAY 18. 1884.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Felt quite unwell all day. Threw up some in the morning. Took the milk to Riddles. Took Deck and Rhone Cows to Alex Haulin's butch and was nearly done out when I got home the second time as the snow was very deep and crusted. Shelled some corn and mixed with oats to take to mill. J. P. McCalmont and family visited us at night and we had a very pleasant visit. Weather very fine. Snowing at bedtime

JANUARY, SATURDAY 19. 1884.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Arose at the usual time and did the usual chores and then took the milk to the station. Took a load of chopping with me to the mill. Got home between nine and ten o'clock when Will, Melvin and family and Thos Walker family came and spent the remainder of the day with us and Charley went home with them at night. He had a good time singing in the old Christian Whistrel, Patent notes. Snow deep and snowing more.

JANUARY, SUNDAY 20. 1884.

Home near Hamlin Station

Arose a few minutes before eight and did all the feeding and milking as Charley was away at his Grandpas. Got ready and went to Church at Eldersville and heard Rev. Sturm preach from Mark. ~~XX~~ 21-22. Sledding good and congregation large. Weather cold. Spent the afternoon and evening at home reading Bible and Wesleyan Methodist.

JANUARY, MONDAY 21. 1884.

Home near Hamlin St.

Arose at the usual hour and did the usual chores. Took the milk to Riddle's. Took some of the scholars to school. Went to mill. Took dinner at Riddle's. Spent most of the afternoon reading the trial of Jim Hunt for the killing of N. L. Dukes of Amvontown, Fayette Co. Took Helen and the children to Carothers' at night and Charley and I attended pinks at Tuckers church. Sledding good. Weather cold.

JANUARY, TUESDAY 22. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Ste

Arose at 4 1/2 and did the milking before breakfast. We had been late getting to bed and I did not wake Charley to help milk. took the milk to Kiddles. Attended the funeral of Sallie Miller from the house of B. McCurrell. Got home about three o'clock. Sledding very good. Weather not very cold. Snow drifting some. Read trial of Jim. Matt at night.

JANUARY, WEDNESDAY 23. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Ste

Arose at 5 o'clock and did the usual chores, then I took the milk to the station. Hauled sixty lbs. of coal from Caldwell's bank. Just when we sat down to supper Mr. Haulin and family came in and sat until bedtime. Maggie Kiddle with us over night. Snow on the ground melting all afternoon & snowing at night.

JANUARY, THURSDAY 24. 1884.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

I let Charley sleep until breakfast was ready. I did the milking and he finished the feeding while I was gone to the station with the milk. Spent the afternoon doing chores. Robt. Kiddle brought the children home from school in the sled and Miss Amanda Cassidy the teacher came with them and spent the night with us. Snowed all day and was very disagreeable.

JANUARY, FRIDAY 25. 1884.

Home Near Haulin's Station

About three o'clock Gracy waked us up with cough. Worked with her until daylight and did not attend to milking until after I had taken the milk to Kiddle's. Took Charley and Amanda Cassidy the school teacher to Kiddle's to go to school in their sled. Spent most of the afternoon doing chores in the house. Repaired some of the dog latches. Weather very cold said to be 32. ^(supposed to be erroneous) Below zero at Haulin's Station. Warmer through the day. Gracy got better in the afternoon. Gilly poorly with the cold.

JANUARY, SATURDAY 26. 1884.

Home near Haulin' Sta

After doing the milking
in the morning I took the
milk to the station.

Train behind time and
I waited for mail train
but got no mail
Charley and I hauled three
pld loads of hay in the
afternoon and Charley
Went to Dr. Gibsons
and got some butter.
Weather very cold in
the morning but
moderated some in
the afternoon.

JANUARY, SUNDAY 27. 1884.

Home near Haulin' Sta.

Slept until eight O'clock
and when we got feeding
and milking done it was
too late to go to church.

and we all spent the
day at home. I read
most of the afternoon in
a book entitled The
New Testament Ideals of
Hell. Morning Frosty.

Day very peculiar with
rather a frost and foggy
appearance and clouds
indicating a fall
of snow.

JANUARY, MONDAY 28. 1884.

Home Near Hanlin Sta

Arose at the usual time
and greased some boots
before milking. Charley
and I milked seven cows
and did most of the
feeding before daylight.
I took the milk to Biddle,
then hauled three loads
of coal from Caldwell's
bank, 8 bushels on the
sled. Charley attended
singing at Luckers
at night. Weather
quite mild all day
and snow melting.

JANUARY, TUESDAY 29. 1884.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Arose a few minutes before
five o'clock and did the
usual chores before going
to the station with the
milk. Gracey had the
earache in the after-
noon and I nursed
her some. Cut the
ice out of the fording
at the river and hauled
twenty bushels of coal
from Caldwell's bank
in the. Read the
trial of "Jim Gault"
at night. Weather
mild. Snow melting.

JANUARY, WEDNESDAY 30. 1884.

Home near Hanlin Sta

Arose a little before five and Charley and I attended to milking as usual before daylight. I took the milk to kiddles. Did chores in the forenoon. Read the argument of Counsel in the Jim Nutt trial. Put a floor in the place where two of our cows stand in the old barn. Rained considerably during the day and snow melting off.

JANUARY, THURSDAY 31. 1884.

Home near Hanlin Station

Arose a few minutes before five o'clock and Charley and I attended to all the feeding before I started to the station. I took the milk to the station, helped Helen some about her washing, took the horses to Paris and got them shod all around. Snow melting off. Waters getting high.

FEBRUARY, FRIDAY 1. 1884.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Arose at the usual hour and did the usual chores before daylight. Took the milk to Widdle's and met John Provines.

Brought Maggie home with me to make a drop for Gracey. Went back to Widdle's for cans when John came home. Put soles on the sled and shelled about six bushels of corn and mixed both rats & taken to mill.

Snowed some in the morning. Sledding pretty good.

FEBRUARY, SATURDAY 2. 1884.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Arose about five O'clock and Charley and I did the usual chores. I went to the station with the milk and took some coffee to the mill and got it home with me. Learned that Jacob

P. Crip died yesterday evening. We hauled three sledloads of hay in the afternoon. Maggie Kiddle here sewing. Weather fine. Snow melting.

FEBRUARY, SUNDAY 3. 1884.

Home Near Hardin Sta Pa.

My 45th Birthday.
Arose at daylight and
we did our chores.
We went to Eldersville in
the sled to church and
heard Rev. Sturm preach
from 1st Cor. XV 12th Ch.
10th Verse was there in
time to hear the text.
Jacob F. Crisp was buried
immediately after
service. Funeral came
just as service con-
cluded. We took dinner
at the widow Crisp.
Elmer feeling very
badly over an unimpaired
reproof given at Tucker's
church by Rev. Hough.
Weather very fine,
Snow melting. Sliding
Almost gone.

FEBRUARY, MONDAY 4. 1884.

Home Near Hardin Sta

Arose a few minutes
before five o'clock and
Charley and I did the
usual chores before
breakfast which we
ate before daylight.
I took the milk to
Riddle's and spent
the remainder of the
day doing chores.
Repaired a door and
did some chinking
in the cow stable.
Quite warm all day
Snow melting.
Rained in the afternoon
and night.

FEBRUARY, TUESDAY 5. 1884.

Home Near Haulite Sta

Arose at 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ O'clock
and Charley and I did
the usual chores.

I went with the milk
to Kiddles and left my
team there and went
with John and Jim
Provines to the station
in the wagon. Rained
most of the day and
was very unpleasant.

I cleaned out the
stables in the after-
noon and did some
repairs. Charley went
to the singing at Juckers
at night.

FEBRUARY, WEDNESDAY 6. 1884.

Home Near Haulite Sta

Arose at the usual
hour and went
through the usual
routine of milking
and feeding. Took
the milk to the station
and waited until near
noon for the down train
to meet John Provines,
but a slip near
Dunsmuir stopped all
trains until afternoon.
Went to Provines and
got my milk money.
Charley Seik came in the
evening and got a
calf for a dollar and a
half. Rained nearly all day
waters very high.

FEBRUARY, THURSDAY 7. 1884.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

After doing the milking
and part of the feeding
I took the milk to Riddles,
then cleaned out the
stables. Went to Burgetts
town and drew fifty
dollars on a check for
milk. Saw the men
cleaning out the dirt
at Simons tunnel,
a slip from the net and
frost. Charley went
to Riddles at night to
a little party. Weather
clearing and cooler.
Ohio River higher than
ever known before.

FEBRUARY, FRIDAY 8.

1884.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Arose at the usual
time and attended to the
usual chores and took
the milk to the station.
Spent the afternoon
greasing the wagons,
shelling corn &c.
Went to Mr. Hardy's
at night and from
thence to D. S. Puttens
and paid Widows interest
\$81.38. Got home about
eleven o'clock. Weather
cloudy and damp.
Ohio River higher than
ever known before.

FEBRUARY, SATURDAY 9. 1884.

Home near Haulin Sta.

After doing the usual
chores I took our milk
to the station and some
chopping to the mill and
got it home with me.
Charlie and I took Beck
Cows to A. M. Haulin's to the
bull. dug out some
dirt as foundation of
our cow house. Frank
and Dr. Carothers called
in in the evening and
Charlie went with them
to A. M. Haulin's.
Weather quite damp.

FEBRUARY, SUNDAY 10. 1884.

Home near Haulin Sta.

Arose at daylight and
after Charlie and I
had done our feeding
we all went to
Tucker's Church and
found a new made grave
and on inquiry found
that George Jackson
was to be buried.
Waited a long time until
the funeral came and
then the service kept
us until it was quite
late. Roads quite
muddy and heavy.

FEBRUARY, MONDAY 11. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at the usual hour
and did the usual chore.
Took the milk to Kiddles
and then went with
Rob's Kiddle to Buzzetts
town for a load of mill
feed. Maggie A. Kiddle
went with us. She stopped
to see Sam Hayes who
seemed to be going down
with Consumption.
Sam Provine went
with us as far as
Hayes. Rained on
us as we came home.
Charley went to singing
but no teacher there.

FEBRUARY, TUESDAY 12. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sta

I took the milk to the
Station in the morning.
John Provine went
down with me. Mr.
Hardy brought home
- fifteen bushels of corn
he had borrowed from
me. I spent most of
the afternoon making
a foundation for a
floor in our cowhouse.
Rained nearly all
forenoon. Afternoon
fine. Wind rising
at night.

FEBRUARY, WEDNESDAY 13. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Around 4 1/2 and Charley and I did the usual chores before daylight. I took the milk to Riddle's. Went to fatters on Riddle's young mare and found fatter improving. Come after having been thrown under a falling horse and had his ankle sprained and his side hurt on last Tuesday. Met James Jackson moving a sawmill. Roads very muddy. Weather quite warm.

FEBRUARY, THURSDAY 14. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After going through the usual routine of milking and feeding I took the milk to the station and the train was about two hours behind time and I got nothing done in forenoon. Spid part of the floor in the cow stable in the afternoon. Weather turned cold in the morning and freezing afternoon and night.

FEBRUARY, FRIDAY 15. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Ste

Arose at 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ and did feeding and milking as usual. I took the milk to Riddle, left the team came home and finished feeding. Went back aft. team and cans when John Proomie came from Station and brought a calf home with me from Riddle to raise. Spent the afternoon laying floor of cow shed.

Heard in the evening that Mrs. Thomas Cosgrove was dead. Had not heard that she was sick. Weather fine. Ground frozen. Roads very rough. Mrs. Thos. Cosgrove died suddenly about seven o'clock A.M.

FEBRUARY, SATURDAY 16. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Ste

Arose at 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ and did the usual feeding and milking before breakfast. Took the milk to the station on the sled although there was no snow. Learned that Mrs. Cosgrove would be buried tomorrow at ten o'clock. Was not known to be more unwell than usual only from twelve o'clock at night until seven in the morning. Spent the afternoon preparing the spring wagon for running, and weatherboarding the cow shed. Charley went to Gibsons for butter and got 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. Weather fine and warm.

FEBRUARY, SUNDAY 17. 1884.

Home near Hank's etc

Arose a tittle before
daylight and I did the
making myself and
let Charley sleep. Charley
and I attended the
funeral of Mrs Thos
Cosgrove. Weather wet
and roads muddy and
consequently procession
small. Sermon by
Rev. Holt from the Cor
V. Jer 3. Some about
three O'clock.

FEBRUARY, MONDAY 18. 1884.

Home near Hank's etc

Arose at the usual
hour and Charley and
I did the usual
chores and I took the
milk to Kiddles, then
went back again after
cans when John Phoenix
came from Station.
Spent the afternoon
making cow stable.
Weather cloudy and
wet in the forenoon.
River still high.
Accounts of great
destruction of property
and great suffering
along the river.
Charley went to the
camp at Tuckers at
night.

FEBRUARY, TUESDAY 19. 1884.

Home Near Hardin

Arose at usual time and did usual chores before breakfast. Took the milk to the station & Prof. Stewart rode with me from our gate.

Attended the funeral of Nellie Martin in Paris.

She was almost 84 years old. Attended election in Louisa. Weather very fine and warm. Roads very muddy. Rained at night.

FEBRUARY, WEDNESDAY 20. 1884.

Home Near Hardin

Arose at 4/15 and did usual chores took milk to Riddle's and went back after cans in forenoon. Spent afternoon putting up stanchions in cow-house. Weather cold and some snow on the ground.

FEBRUARY, THURSDAY 21. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Arose at 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ and Charley
and I did feeding and
milking as usual. Took
the milk to Riddles in
spring wagon but road
was so rough that John
Provinces went to station
with sled. I finished
putting up stanchions
for the cows and put
all the cows in one shade
at night. Amanda
Cassady and Jo Carothers
called in both
evening. Weather
very fine during day
and freezing at night.

FEBRUARY, FRIDAY 22. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sta

convenient to have the

Sledded in the evening. Sledding pretty good.

MARCH, THURSDAY 6. 1884.

Helen and the children

the appraisement of
the farm of Hugh Chesley

He spurs grass by the day lowering the end of the iron pipe at the head of the middle hollow in our cornfield north of the house preparatory to plowing the bank down. Weather very fine.

Arose at six o'clock and did the milking while Charlie did the feeding. I attended Sabbath School at the station as Superintendent. We had quite a respectable class of older ones and several children. Had quite an interesting lesson 1 Cor. 14: 31. I took dinner at Riddle's as I came home. Maggie Riddle and Anderson Fuller ate dinner here. Weather fine but cool and cloudy in the evening.

APRIL,

MONDAY 21.

1884.

Home Near Hamilton Sta

When I went out at daylight I found Cora very sick and spent most of the forenoon working with her. Robt Riddle held her in the mouth which was the first thing which gave her relief. She had been out on fresh grass a day and a night. Was considerably physiced.

Went to Mr Calmont's to hire a horse but failed. Did some ditching in the afternoon and took some eggs to Riddle's at night.

Weather very cool and light wind from the North East.

brought her over early in the

from the North East.

Arise at four and did the milking. Charley and Clyde took the milk to Kiddles and I mended a broken shovel. I plowed in the forenoon and Charley and Clyde took Helen & Florence in the afternoon to get a tooth filled. I left the children and J. A. Fuller and I put up some fence about the calf lot. Weather quite pleasant with the wind still from the North East. And no rain of any account.

APRIL,

SATURDAY 26.

1884.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

J. A. Fuller helped me to do the milking and I took the milk part way to the station and John Provines took it in while I went to mill. Spent part of the day plowing with old Doll and father's old Jimmie. Doll very weak and slow. Cora's leg badly sprained. We burned some brush in the hollow below the milk house and Fuller built some fence around the calf lot. Annie Reddle here overnight helping Helen to get ready to go to father's on a visit of a week.

APRIL,

Rained in the afternoon and was raining much at bed time.

Ford Haulin' took breakfast
and dinner with us and
he and Charley went to Kings
Creek and caught five
fish. I went to Haulin' to
borrow a corn planter but
it was in use. Helen and
I went to Florence in
the afternoon and she
got a tooth filled. We got
about \$6.50 worth of
goods at Cleland's store.
Weather fine. Father
and mother with us
over night. Did not
retire until after
midnight.

Some appearance of rain before night but cleared off again.

Arose at the usual hour and did the usual chores. Charlie took the milk to the station and I prepared the garden for setting out plants. Just before dinner time Ed. Carothers came over for me and I went over to their house and kind a swarm of bees etc. dinner there. Cultivated some corn in the afternoon. Went to 'Proves' at night and got our milk money. Weather fine.

JUNE,

WEDNESDAY 4.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Did milking before breakfast as usual and Charley took the milk to the forks of the road. I cultivated some corn during the day.

Took \$20 to R. M. Haulin which I had borrowed from him. Took Cora to Robt Riddles and got a shoe driven on her.

Spilled part of a can moving it from the one part of the platform to the stand by the track. Came home and borrowed eleven baskets full of corn from S.S. Fulton about fourteen bushels. Cultivated a little corn in the afternoon. Rain stopped no. Did not rain much. Cloudy in the evening.

JUNE, THURSDAY 12. 1884.

Home Near Hardins Sta

Attended to Chores in the morning as usual then took the milk to the station and met Rachel Brackett who came home with me and spent the day with us and Charlie went back to the station in the evening and came very near missing the train. Learned in the morning that Sam Hayes had died about two o'clock. Worked corn some during day and went to Kiddle's at night to learn how the expected to go to the funeral. Weather quite warm. D. S. chores. Weather fine.

AUGUST, THURSDAY 14. 1884.

by Riddle's. Sent Willie
Needham to help Wilson

Provine and Willie Workman took supper with us. Mag. Melde Gracey a present of a calico dress all ready made. Weather very warm and dry.

AUGUST, SUNDAY 17. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sto

Spent the forenoon at home most of the time studying Sabbath School lesson for afternoon. We all attended Sabbath School at the station in the afternoon. For one persons present.

AUGUST, MONDAY 18. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sto

Arose about 4 1/2 o'clock and did the usual chores. Charlie took the milk to the forks of the road and then we started the plow. We went to Carothers after dinner and helped to put plates on his wagon shade. I broke a plow handle and took it to Riddle's and repaired it. We heard of Edw. Cochran's sickness and Helen and Belle Carothers went there in the afternoon and found very little hope for his recovery. Geo. Lockhart very sick also. Weather very warm and dry.

AUGUST, TUESDAY 19. 1884.

Usual Chores in the morning at the usual time and then spent the most of the day plowing. Willie Needham finished a ditch and helped Charlie dig out a stump &c.

Word from Eda Cochran and Geo. Lockhart that they were both better. Weather very

warm and dry. Boys had to carry their bed down stairs on account of the heat

AUGUST, WEDNESDAY 20. 1884.

Home Near Hamlin's

Arose a little later than common, after Chores, I borrowed a shovel from Currother's and Willie Needham and spent the day ditching and preparing a trough and spent the afternoon in woods. Charlie took the milk to the Station and then helped us.

Weather very warm and dry.

AUGUST, THURSDAY 21. 1884.

Home near Haulin St.

After chores were done I hauled some clay, and set out some before the rain. Spent the forenoon preparing to put in a trough for water. Rained hard in the afternoon and I repaired a long handled shovel. Uncle John Haulin, called in the evening and I paid him $\$57$ interest.

Wrote a letter at night to Geo. J. Haulin, concerning the interest which he owed Uncle John and for which I am security. Very fine rain in the evening.

I took dinner at Crip's then went to Burgettstown and got some fresh beef and some other things. Got home about five o'clock and made some preparation for threshing. Sold a calf to Alex. Haulin for a dollar. Carothers commenced threshing after supper and did not get quite done. (Weather fine)

Charlie did the feeding in the evening and attended the review of the Sabbath School lessons at Fickers at night. Weather quite warm and fine.

OCTOBER, MONDAY 6. 1884.

part of the chaff pile
preparatory to weatherboarding
the shade for the calves.
Weather quite cold.

DECEMBER, WEDNESDAY 17. 1884.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Arose five minutes after
four. Charlie and I attended
to feeding. Hauled a load of
fodder. And spent most
of the day putting chaff
out of the shade into
the manure pile.
Charlie attended singing
at Shakers at night.
Snowed nearly all day.
Snow dry and fine
Ground rough.

DECEMBER, THURSDAY 18. 1884.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Arose at usual time and did
usual chores before break-
fast. I took the milk
to the station in the
sled. Received a Toledo
Blade and did some
reading in the afternoon
and was much pleased
with the paper especially
with its temperance prin-
ciples. Got fifty pounds
Yuckutee from James
Martin. Halted some
boards on shade for
calves. Weather very
cold and could not
stay away from
fire long at a time.

Did usual chores before breakfast. Took the milk to the gate in the cart and McLaughlin took it to the station. Spent the forenoon feeding and doing chores. Shelled some corn in the afternoon, milled it with oatmeal and took it to mill.

Weather very cold. Some snow on the ground but ground rough. Sledding not very good.

DECEMBER, SATURDAY 20. 1884.

Home Gear Haulin' Station Pa.

Arose at the usual time and found it very cold. Charlie and I did milking as usual and I took the milk to the station. Slept a short time at Riddle's. Put soles on the little sled and we hauled a little load of hay in the evening for the cows. Weather cold. Snowing at night.

DECEMBER, SUNDAY 21. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Station

Arose at 7½ O'clock
Did not attend Church
anywhere in the forenoon.
Charley and I attended
Sabbath school at the
Station in the evening.
Arrangements were made
for the Christmas tree.
Rained nearly all day

Went to Florence in the evening and got my new boots. Eda Cochran came in the evening to go with me to the station in the morning. She knit a pair of spall mittens for the children to put on the Christmas tree for Mrs. Robb. Weather cold appearance of snow at night.

DECEMBER, WEDNESDAY 24. 1884.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Arose at the usual hour and after doing some chores I took Eda Cochran to the station with me in the sled when I took the milk. After dinner I went to the woods and got a pine tree and took it to the station with some ferns and woodbine berries. Helped to put up the Christmas tree for the Sabbath School. Did not get home until nine o'clock. Willie Needham helped Charley to do the feeding and milking and went with him to the singing at Tuckers. Snowing nicely at bedtime.

DECEMBER, THURSDAY 25. 1884.

Home Near Hamilton Sta

Arose at the usual hour. Willie Needham helped us do our milking. I took the milk to the gate and brought up a load of fodder for the cows. We all attended Christmas tree at the station, and had a very nice time. Little folks nearly all had something to recite. We were late getting there and consequently late getting home. Clyde Melvin came home with us and Willie Morrison came up to stay until bedtime. Snow on the ground and quite stormy in the evening.

DECEMBER, FRIDAY 26. 1884.

Home Near Hamilton Sta

Chores as usual. Clyde was with us during the day. He hauled five sled loads of hay to the mow. Considerable of snow on the ground, but not very cold during day. Got colder at night.

DECEMBER, SATURDAY 27. 1884.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Arose a few minutes after four
o'clock after doing milking &
took the milk to the station.
Clyde Melvin here and helped
Charles to do the feeding and
stable cleaning. I took
some flour to James Martin's
in the afternoon. His cow
tore up a basket and took
a blanket for me.

Went to H. Gibson's and
got some butter.

Weather fine. Sledding
pretty good.

Clyde and Charly were
very much out because
we would not let them
out to coast at night.
Their feet were wet from
the days riding.

Arose at the usual hour and did the usual chores before breakfast. Took the milk to the gate. Hauled a load of fodder for the cows.

Took our sled to Proovin's for repairs. James and I spliced one runner and took it to Kiddle's and got it plated.

I attended church at Suckers at night and heard Rev. Griffin preach from Matt.

11th 6th. A very good sermon. Weather quite warm. Snow nearly all gone and roads getting quite muddy.

DECEMBER, TUESDAY 30. 1884.

Home Near Hanlin Sta. Pa.

Arose at four o'clock. Kindled fires and Charley and I did milking before breakfast. I took the milk to the station and brought home twenty bushels of coal from Boles' bank.

Helped to saw a log for a roller. Borrowed Kiddle's horses and brought home thirty three bushels of coal in the afternoon. Roads getting muddy. Took Kiddle's horses home after night. Weather quite warm.

DECEMBER, WEDNESDAY 31. 1884.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at four o'clock as usual and Charlie and I did the milking and some of the feeding before breakfast.

I took the milk to the gate and spent most of the forenoon hauling corn-fodder. Put poles on our big sled in the afternoon. Rained in the evening. Charley went to the circus last night with Haulin's boys.
