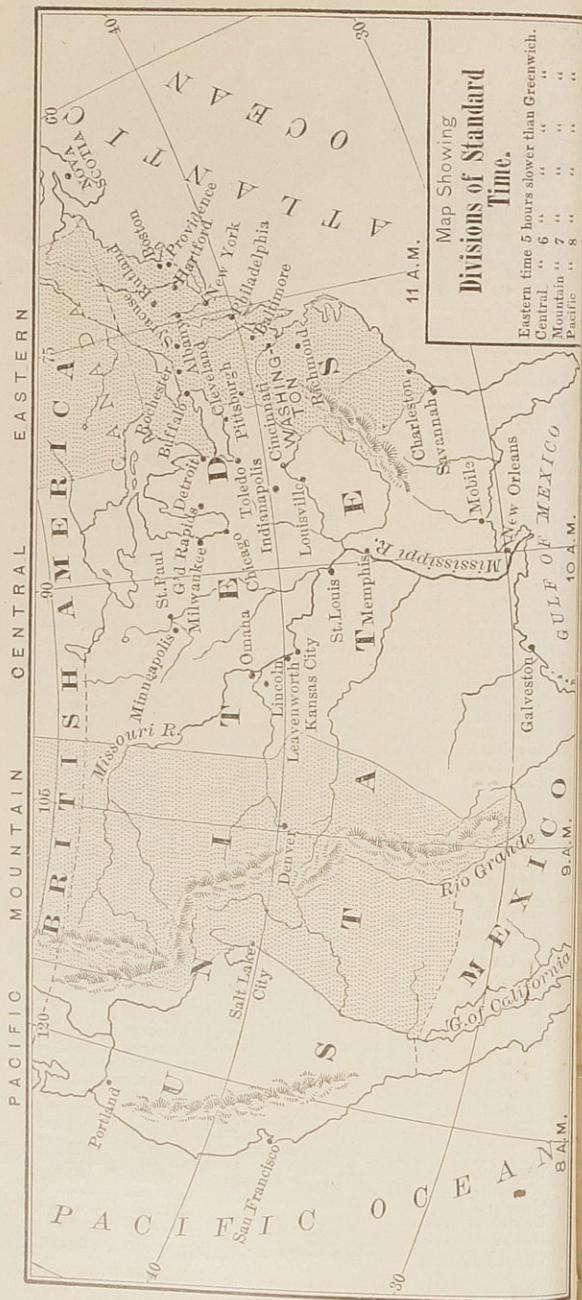


*The Diaries of

*1886*



JANUARY, <sup>1st</sup> FRIDAY 1. Clear 1886.

Home near Haulin Sta.  
 I took the milk to the station  
 in the morning. Hashed ten  
 shocks of corn in the afternoon.  
 Maggie Jackson and Annie  
 Stephenson came in the afternoon  
 and went with Charley to  
 Literary Society at night to  
 Hamilton's Schoolhouse.  
 I helped Helen to scrub  
 the kitchen while they  
 were away.

SATURDAY 2.

Home near Haulin Sta.  
 Maggie Jackson and Annie  
 Stephenson took breakfast  
 with us. I took the milk  
 to the forks of the road before  
 breakfast. Took some grinding  
 to mill. Took a calf to C. M.  
 Stephenson's. Got home about  
 dark and helped Charley to  
 do the milking. Studied  
 Sabbath School lesson about  
 King Josiah at night.

JANUARY,

SUNDAY 3.

1886.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Spent the entire day at home as it was wet and not suitable weather to attend church. Spent most of the afternoon studying Sabbath school lessons about King Josiah and also about the prediction of the Babylonian Captivity. Slept late in the morning and returned early at night.

MONDAY 4.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Spent the day doing chores. Weather too wet to work out doors. Mended Gillie's boot and neckyoke of spring wagon. Helped Helen to wash.

JANUARY,

TUESDAY 5.

1886.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to usual chores in the morning. Charley and I carried our milk to the gate. I hauled some cornfodder in the afternoon and brought in the last of our corn. Spent most of the evening reading in Miss Dora McCorkles Autograph Album. Snowed some during the day.

WEDNESDAY 6.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

I took the milk to the station and it was so stormy and cold that I did nothing but chores. Spent most of the afternoon in the house reading.

JANUARY,

THURSDAY 7.

1886.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Attended to manual chores in the morning, hauled 35 bushels of coal from Krovin's bank. Spent the entire evening assisting Charley in writing some verses in Miss Sara McCorde's Autograph Album, and helping him to prepare a declamation for Friday night.

FRIDAY 8.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

Arose at the usual hour and did milking and harnessing before breakfast with Charley's assistance. Took the milk to the station and brought home some grinding from the mill. D. S. Hutton called in the afternoon to borrow some sacks and showed me some prohibition literature and we had some talk on the subject. Heavy snowstorm at night.

JANUARY,

SATURDAY 9.

1886.

Home Near Haulin's Sta. Pa.

Kindled fires in the morning and swept paths in snow before milking. Took milk to the gate, and we hauled one sled load of hay. So stormy that we did not deem it best to haul more. Mended my gloves. Snowed all day. Snow very deep. Charley working on an essay on "Originality".

SUNDAY 10.

Home Near Haulin's Sta.

The day was so cold and stormy and the snow so very deep that I did not think it prudent to attend church or Sabbath school (my wife) during the day. Snow perhaps fifteen inches deep and more falling at night.

JANUARY, MONDAY 11. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Attended to some feeding in the morning and took our team and went to station to break the road through snow which was much drifted. McCalmont took milk. His mare got down in the run.

Helped to shovel snow out of road near Johnson's.

Hauled some hay in the evening, very cold.

TUESDAY 12.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Usual chores before breakfast. Took the milk to the station. Snow very deep and weather very cold.

Out some ice out of the run in the afternoon.

And shoveled some snow out of the <sup>drift</sup> road in front of the house. Snow badly drifted and roads closed.

JANUARY, WEDNESDAY 13. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Took the milk to the road in the morning. Hauled a load of fodder for cattle. Mended overshoes.

Shoveled snow drifts in the afternoon and drove team ahead sled through. Jas. Larother helped me home. Helped Charley home at night to prepare a dialogue for Literary Society.

Weather somewhat moderated.

THURSDAY 14.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at 4 1/2 o'clock as usual and kindled fires and Charley and I did milking and ramped horses before breakfast. Took the milk to the station. Stalled some corn in the afternoon.

Charley attended a singing at S. S. Fulton's at night. Snow very deep. Hauled a little in afternoon.

JANUARY,

FRIDAY 15.

1886.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
 Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock  
 and Charley and I did the  
 milking, I took the milk  
 to the gate. We hauled  
 a load of fodder for cows.  
 I prepared some chopping  
 and Lillie and I took it  
 to mill in the afternoon.  
 Hauled a little sled load  
 of hay in the evening.  
 Snow deep and appearance of  
 more.

SATURDAY 16.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
 Charley and I did the  
 milking at the usual  
 time and took the  
 milk to the forks of the  
 road. We hauled a  
 load of hay, I did some chow  
 and started to Suckers bank  
 for coal but learned there  
 was none out. Rained  
 nearly all day and snow  
 melting off.

JANUARY,

SUNDAY 17.

1886.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
 Spent the forenoon at  
 home feeding and studying  
 the Abbott School lesson  
 about the Faithful  
 Hechabites. Charley attended  
 Church at Suckers and  
 the rest of the family atten-  
 ded Sabbath School at Station  
 in the afternoon. Charley  
 went to Station to Gospel  
 Meeting at night.

MONDAY 18.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
 Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and  
 did usual chores before  
 breakfast. Finished the  
 feeding after Charley had  
 gone to school. Went to Suckers  
 bank and got fifteen bushels  
 of coal. Hunted a pair of hogs  
 for the little sled and put  
 them on in the afternoon. Took  
 Charley's hots to get Lockhart to sell  
 them. Snow on the ground. Roads  
 not good.

JANUARY,

TUESDAY 19.

1886.

Home Near Hanlin Stw.

Arose at the usual  
hour and attend to usual  
chores before breakfast.

A. M. Hanlin took our milk  
for us to station in place of  
Geo. Provier. Went to  
Pucker's bank in afternoon  
and got 15-bc of coal.  
Half soled Gillie's boots at  
night and filled up some  
apples and potatoes to take to  
Arkle's family in the morning.

WEDNESDAY 20.

Home Near Hanlin Stw.

I took the milk to  
the station in the morning  
and took some apples, potatoes  
and meat to Mr. Arkle.

Broke sled in turning at  
the station make some bars  
for it in the afternoon.

D. S. Fulton and wife  
visited me until bedtime.  
D. S. had headache,  
Weather getting damp.

JANUARY,

THURSDAY 21.

1886.

Home Near Hanlin Stw.

I took the milk to the  
forks of the road in the morning  
and attended to most of the  
feeding. Shelled corn and  
miped with oats and took  
to the station in sled.

Two bars of sled broken  
when I came home. Charlie  
did the feeding and milking  
in the evening and went to a  
party at Tom Strain's.

Threatening snow at night

FRIDAY 22.

Home Near Hanlin Stw.

Arose at usual hour  
and we did our milking  
before breakfast. After  
doing chores I spent most  
of the forenoon repairing sled.

C. M. and Mary Stephenson  
came about noon and spent  
a few hours with us and took  
a calf home with them. I  
worked until after eight  
o'clock repairing light sled.  
Mrs. Cochran here most of day.

JANUARY, SATURDAY 23. 1886.

Home Near Hardin Sta.

I took the milk to the station in the morning and went to mill and brought home some chopping. Maggie Kiddle with me. We hauled three sled loads of hay and a load of fodder in the afternoon. Weather cold. Sledding not very good.

SUNDAY 24.

Home Near Hardin Sta.

Arose about five O'clock and we attended church at Luckers and heard Rev. Geo. Hudson preach from I Timothy III 8. Very good sermon. Charly, Gillie and I attended Sabbath School at the station and had but a small school. Sledding not very good. Did our feeding after night.

JANUARY, MONDAY 25. 1886.

Home Near Hardin Sta.

Arose at usual hour and did milking before breakfast. Took the horses to the chop and did not get home until four O'clock. Some Gracey and his wife and Mag. Province here on a visit while I was away and went just leaving when I came home. I took our eggs to Kiddles in the evening. Snow melting.

TUESDAY 26.

Home Near Hardin Sta.

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and did usual chores. I took the milk and market box to the station. Brought some grinding from the mill and put some sleds on the sled in the afternoon. Weather moist and cloudy.



JANUARY, WEDNESDAY 27. 1886.

Home Near Haulin' Stn. Pa.  
Charlie took the milk to the  
road & did some of the  
feeding, then hauled three  
sled loads of coal from  
Sucker's bank about 40 bu.  
Sledging getting very slim.  
Cloudy all day and  
thawing. Threatening rain.

THURSDAY 28.

Home Near Haulin' Stn  
I took the milk to the  
station, and as I came  
home I exchanged some  
wheat flour for some buckwheat  
flour at Mr. Ciss.  
Hauled about 12 bu of  
coal from Sucker's bank  
in the afternoon in the sled.  
Rained considerably during the  
day. Snow melting off slowly.

JANUARY, FRIDAY 29. 1886.

Home Near Haulin' Stn  
Arose at the usual  
time feeling quite unwell.  
A boil on my neck and pain  
in my stomach and bowels.  
Hauled one load of coal from  
Sucker's bank and spent the  
rest of the day in the house.  
Retired early and slept  
pretty well. Weather some-  
what stormy. Snowing some  
but not very cold.

SATURDAY 30.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.  
Felt some better in the morning and  
assisted with feeding & milking  
as usual. He hauled some fodder  
and a little hay during the day. Did  
not feel like doing days work.  
Charly acted somewhat shy and  
disobedient. He wanted to go to Killers  
at night to hear music or violin & songs  
I thought better he should study his  
lessons, but he failed to look at  
a lesson and retired before  
worship.

JANUARY, SUNDAY 31. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Charley attended Church at Tucker's in the forenoon and we all attended Sabbath school at the station in the evening. Sled sled over the road with us on the way. No harm done.

FEBRUARY, MONDAY 1.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After doing morning Chores I hauled three loads of coal from Provines' bank and broke down the little sled while hauling the third, and took it to Provines' for repairs. Robt Riddle brought the girls at night to help Helen prepare for visitors and for singing tomorrow night.

FEBRUARY, TUESDAY 2. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Attended to usual chores in the morning. Charley and I carried the milk across the lot to G. M. Haulin's sled. Got the sled repaired. Riddle plated the runner and Provines' put the pins in one side. I brought it home in the evening. Singing at night. Quite a number of young folks and had a good time. Did not get to bed until after one o'clock. Sledding good.

WEDNESDAY 3.

Home Near Haulin Sta. This

I took the milk to the station in the sled in the morning. Sledding good and weather so cold that I did nothing during the afternoon but put a pair of standards in the small sled.

Charley attended church at Tucker's at night. My 47<sup>th</sup> birth day. Night very cold.

FEBRUARY, THURSDAY 4. 1886.

Home near Haulin Sta.  
Attended to usual chores.  
I took milk to forks of road.  
Visited Miller's School and  
spent most of the day. Some of the  
school quite ready. Sent Char-  
ley to Dr. S. Fulton's at night with  
Widow Haulin's money for interest.  
Weather so very cold that I  
did not feel inclined to turn  
out.

FRIDAY 5.

Home near Haulin Sta.  
Usual chores. Sent with Jno.  
McCormell for glass for School  
house. Hauled a little load of  
hay. Shelled some corn and  
took some chopping to mill.  
Berst. Wright came with  
Charley from school and they  
attended a party at A. M.  
Haulin's. Weather very cold.  
Snowed some in the evening.

FEBRUARY, SATURDAY 6. 1886.

Home near Haulin Sta.  
Berst. Wright took break-  
fast with us. I took milk  
to the station and brought  
grinding from mill. We  
hauled three sled loads of  
hay during the evening.  
Weather something warmer  
and snowed some in  
the evening.

SUNDAY 7.

Home near Haulin Sta.  
I did the milking and most of the  
feeding in the morning. Attended  
church at Lucker's and heard one Mr.  
Somerville preach from "Mat. V 44"  
and heard him again at night  
from "Romans VIII 7". He  
preached two pretty good sermons.  
Lillie and I attended Sabbath  
School at the station. Only eleven  
there. Mrs. Andrew Porter buried  
at Paris. Quite a large funeral.  
Seeding good.

FEBRUARY,

MONDAY 8.

1886.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to usual chores. Did not ship any milk in the morning by request. Repaired sled during day and hauled down the load of coal which I had broken down with. Found in the evening that our young mare had got kicked and I had to hitch up the old mare again. Snow melting.

TUESDAY 9.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

I did the milking. Charley had toothache. I went to the station with the milk took old Doll in sled without shoes on road in young mare lame from a kick. Took Doll to the shop in the afternoon and had her shod. Charley went to Paris at night with Fulton's young folks to a singing. Snow nearly all gone.

FEBRUARY,

WEDNESDAY 10.

1886.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

I took the milk to the road in the morning. Attended to dressing the young mares sore leg. Greased the wagon and Robt. Riddle and I double teamed and hauled us 100 bushels of coal from Provinis bank. Got home with the last load after sundown. Did our milking after night. Snow melting off and road getting muddy.

THURSDAY 11.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

I took the milk to the station. Gathered horse hoarhound on Crip's hill for Helen to make syrup of. Hung up our meat in the afternoon. Robt Riddle brought Hickory wood. Hauled some fodder. I attended church at Luckers at night and heard Rev. Hudson from Heb. III 3 & 4. They going persons forward for prayers. Roads quite muddy.

FEBRUARY,

FRIDAY 12.

1886.

Home Near Haulin' Ste.

After usual mornin' chores, I made a shout to carry water into trough and cut some wood for smoking meat. Helped Helen some with her washing did feeding early and attended church at Tuckers. Heard Rev. Hudson from Acts III 19, three forward for prayers. Congregation small night very wet.

SATURDAY 13.

Home Near Haulin' Ste.

Charley went to his Grand father's in the morning. Took the milk to the forks of the road. Got old Doll down in the ditch when I went to Sammie McCallm out relief where he had broken a chair. Did fires during day. Mended boot. Went to Riddles for mail did feeding and milking &c. Weather very unpleasant. Roads quite muddy.

FEBRUARY,

SUNDAY 14.

1886.

Home Near Haulin' Ste.

I attended to the feeding and milking in the morning, then Gillie and I attended Sabbath School and praying at Tuckers. I attended Sabbath School at the station in the afternoon and church at Tuckers at night and heard Rev. Hudson from Haggai II part of 5 "Consider thy ways. Angeline Haulin' and Herbert Wright gave their names to the church."

MONDAY 15.

Home Near Haulin' Ste.

Spent the forenoon doing chores and in the afternoon I took out a pair of rockers for a chair. The weather was quite stormy and snowed considerably in the evening. Charley attended church at Tuckers at night. No one forward for prayers.

FEBRUARY, TUESDAY 16. 1886.

Home near Haulin Sta.  
Attended to chores,  
in the morning and carried  
the milk to the gate.  
Put rocks on chain in  
forenoon and hauled  
manure in the afternoon.  
I attended church at  
Lickers at night. Rev.  
Hudson went home during  
the day and there was just  
preparmeeting. Weather cold.

WEDNESDAY 17.

Home near Haulin Sta.  
Arose at usual time.  
I took the milk to the station,  
took a load of chopping to  
the mill in the evening and  
wrote a letter to J. P. Miller  
concerning the Carothers  
culvert. Did not get home  
in time to attend church at  
Lickers. Snow on the ground.  
Sledding not good.

FEBRUARY, THURSDAY 18. 1886.

Home near Haulin Sta.  
I took the milk to John Proves  
in the morning and send to him  
two letters from J. P. Miller concerning  
Jim Carothers Culvert. Helped Robert  
Kiddle to haul some straw during  
the day and learned of his conver-  
sation with Carothers. Carothers  
used profane language and  
refused to fix the Culvert or  
allow any one else to fix it.  
Attended preparmeeting at  
Lickers at night. Weather fine.

FRIDAY 19.

Home near Haulin Sta.  
I carried the milk to the  
gate and spent the forenoon  
doing chores and putting poles  
on the big sled. Rec'd a letter  
of instruction from J. P.  
Miller concerning entering  
suit against James Carothers  
for obstructing watercourse  
on side of road. Went to Proves  
in the evening and learned that  
he had softened and agreed to put  
the culvert in right.

FEBRUARY, SATURDAY 20. 1886.

Home Near Hanlin Stw.  
Charley took the milk  
to the station in the morning.  
I did chores, went to Riddle's  
on an errand, shelled some  
corn and hauled some  
manure in the afternoon.  
Weather cold and frosty.  
Some snow on the ground.

SUNDAY 21.

Home Near Hanlin Stw.

Helen was very poorly all  
day with Cholera. Charley went  
to Traker's church but the  
preacher did not come. I  
could not leave home to attend  
Sabath School. Charley went  
to the station at night but  
Mr. Anderson did not come.  
Horace and Louis Hanlin's  
came in the evening on their way  
to Chuck but there was snow.

FEBRUARY, MONDAY 22. 1886.

Home Near Hanlin Stw.  
Usual chores. Charley  
took milk to gate and I met  
J. Provines at forks of road. He hauled  
some corn fodder and hay and  
helped Robt Riddle haul two  
logs for James Carothers culvert  
over side drain of road. I took  
the eggs to Riddle's in the  
evening and wrote a letter  
at night to Sammie Thorly.  
Weather fine

TUESDAY 23.

Home Near Hanlin Stw.

I took the milk and the  
market to the station in  
the morning. While paying  
Mr. Trimmer for some coal, I  
forgot the boy and our can  
of milk and left them on  
the platform until the train  
was gone. Hauled two loads of  
hay and Mr. Hanlin and I  
picked out some rail timber.  
Weather very fine

FEBRUARY, WEDNESDAY 24. 1886.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
Usual chores. Took the  
milk to John Provine. Spent  
nearly all day hauling manure.  
Robt Kiddle dug out the drain  
to put in culvers in Carothers  
road. Ed. Carothers helped some  
but Jim did not assist.  
Weather very fine and ground  
frozen some.

THURSDAY 25.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
Usual chores in the morning.  
I took the milk to the station  
and brought the market boy  
home. Learned at the station  
that Rev. Wilson was dead.  
Helped Robt Kiddle and John  
Provine to put a culvert in  
Jim Carothers road to keep down  
a lawsuit. Went to Rev. Pagers  
and told them about Rev. W. S.  
Wilson's death. Cloudy and wet.

FEBRUARY, FRIDAY 26. 1886.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
Weather quite cold  
and stormy. Did usual  
chores. Took milk to gate.  
Spent part of day reading.  
Blocked out an ax handle.  
Spent the evening at home.  
Charley attended Literary  
Society at night as Secretary.  
Had intended to attend funeral  
of Rev. Wilson but learned that  
they had concluded to bury at Pitts-  
burgh.

SATURDAY 27.

Home Near Hamlin's Sta.  
We carried the milk to the  
gate in the morning. Jo. Cochran  
Robt Kiddle, Charley and I cut a  
Covintree and John McConell  
and two of McAlmonts boys  
came to us and we cut a second  
one but got no coons. We knocked  
down our corn stalks and I took  
a load of chop to mill and got it  
home with me. Weather clear &  
cold Mrs Lutter Noah buried  
(Her disease Syphilis).



FEBRUARY,

SUNDAY 28.

1886.

Home Near Hamlin Sta

Attended to feeding as usual in the morning and Charley did it in the evening. I walked over to Eldersville and heard Rev Sturm in the forenoon from Isaiah 53<sup>rd</sup> 11" and at night from James 3<sup>rd</sup> 11"

Took dinner at John Melvins and attended Sabbath school at this station. Stopped at Mrs. Culp's until Church time. Weather cold & roads rough.

MARCH,

MONDAY 1.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Usual Chores, Carried milk to the road. Spent day doing chores. Mr. Cochran cutting rail timber for us. I spent part of the day putting in an ax handle. Took eggs to Ridders in the evening and ate supper there.

Made out milk A.C.K. at night. Weather quite cold and ground bare.

MARCH,

TUESDAY 2.

1886.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

After usual Chores, I went to Provine & Ridders to borrow a crop cut. Saw Mr. Cochran and sawed some rail cuts in the afternoon.

Charley attended Singing School at Paris. I spent the evening preparing review of the Sabbath School lessons for the quarter. Felt unwell during day. Boil on my neck and had rheumatism. Weather cold.

WEDNESDAY 3.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

I took the milk to the station in the spring wagon in the morning and feeling quite unwell and having a boil on my neck I did not feel like working. Went to A. G. Hamlin's and got some butter. Helped Mr. Cochran to grind an ax in the evening and studied Sabbath School lessons for review. Weather quite cold.

MARCH,

THURSDAY 4.

1886.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Usual chores. Spent most of the day sawing rail timber with Jo. Cochran. Spent the evening preparing review of the Sabbath School lessons.

Charley went to McCreights to a social party. Weather very pleasant.

FRIDAY 5.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

I spent the forenoon getting & smoke wood and doing feeding. Got lockbar of wagon mended and hauled out a load of manure in the evening. Sammie, Charley, Will, Melvin and Clyde with us over night. Boys went to literary and Will and I filled up some wheat to take to mill.

MARCH,

SATURDAY 6.

1886.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Arose at four o'clock and did chores. Borrowed Robt. Kiddle's team and Will and Clyde Melvin and I went to Stuberwille to mill. Got home about eight o'clock.

Weather very fine and roads pretty good.

SUNDAY 7.

Home Near Hamlin Station

We attended to the usual chores in the morning.

Charley went to Paris with Willie Morrison to church and the remainder of the family attended Sabbath School at the station. Weather most beautiful and roads very good.

MARCH,

MONDAY 8.

1886.

Home Near Hardin Stn.  
 Took milk to road. Gave  
 Mrs. Provier acct of work on  
 Sam Johnson's section of road. Took  
 Charley's hoots to Lockhart's to get mended.  
 Helen sent Gilly after me the two  
 colts from Station and mare having  
 got together in the field she feared  
 the mare being shot might hurt the  
 colt. No harm done, but both were  
 very warm. Took eggs to Riddles.  
 Snowed in the evening.

TUESDAY 9.

Home Near Hardin Stn.  
 Attended to usual chores.  
 Charley took milk to station.  
 We killed a calf. J. Cochran  
 and Robt Riddle helping us.  
 Took a quarter of beef to J.  
 P. McCalmont and one to Mrs  
 Cochran. Sold the hide to  
 John Mc Cornell at 5¢ per  
 pound. Weather fine.  
 Snowing some at night.

MARCH,

WEDNESDAY 10.

1886.

Home Near Hardin Stn.  
 We carried the milk to the  
 road in the morning. I cut up  
 some beef in the morning and  
 helped Hardin's boys to cut a tree for  
 coons but got none. Took some beef  
 to Riddles and to John Melvins Mill in  
 the afternoon. Packed our beef  
 at night and studied Sabbath  
 school lessons review. J. Cochran  
 making rails in the afternoon.  
 Weather quite cool.

THURSDAY 11.

Home Near Hardin Stn.  
 Attended to milking as usual.  
 Before breakfast I took the  
 milk to the station. Spent  
 the afternoon rendering tallow  
 and drying an Ar handle.  
 J. Melvin took dinner  
 with us as he was on his  
 way to see Mr. Hardy about  
 some money that Hardy owed  
 on a note to father. Weather  
 very fine. J. Cochran making rails.

MARCH,

FRIDAY 12.

1886.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.  
Jo. Cochran and I carried  
the milk to the gate in the  
morning. The day was wet  
and I did chores. Helped  
Helen to do a washing.  
Charley attended Literary  
Society at Hamilton's School  
house at night.

SATURDAY 13.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.  
Attended to usual chores.  
Took the milk to fork of  
road. Helped Helen to rinse out  
some clothes. Helped Robt.  
Reddle to load some straw which  
he was hauling from our stack.

Attended to milking as usual and Charley took the milk to the gate. We finished planting our corn before noon and helped D. S. Fulton take two logs to the station in the afternoon and kept Fulton's horse home at night.

Weather very fine and warm.

MAY,

FRIDAY 21.

1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta. Pa.

Charlie took the milk to the station in the morning. I spent the day setting posts and building rough and ready fence at the haulin line. Frank Carothers called a short time in the evening. Maggie Jackson here cleaning house. Weather fine and dry.

SATURDAY 22.

Home Near Haulin Sta. Pa.

Charlie took the milk to the gate then went to Burgeltstown and got the oar and lead to pain our horse. I spent the day making fence. Prepared posts for two sets of bars and after Charley returned we nailed on some board rails. Threatened rain in the evening and at night.

I spent the forenoon at home. Charley attended at the W.P. Church Paris.

We went to the Station to Sabbath School in the afternoon. 57 in attendance & 25 collection. Hildbert Metcalf came home with us intending to go to Paris to Church but it was too late when we got through milking.

After milking nine cows in the morning with Charley's assistance I took the milk to the Station and took with me a calf for father. Will meet me at the Station and take it. We finished our tin fence and commenced plowing a patch for beghun and potatoes.

Maggie Jackson here suffering with toothache. Fine pain in the evening.

MAY,

TUESDAY 25.

1886.

Home Near Haulin Sts. Pa.

Usual chores. Charlie took the milk to the station. Jas Carothers came upon loan a little informed me that Geo. Morrison had died suddenly last night. Cleaned up shop. Finished plowing lot in front of house. Hauled off some horseradish and sundrick roots & did some burrowing. Charlie took Lucy to the shop and got a shoe on. Took trays to Haulin to get carpets woven. Weather cool.

WEDNESDAY 26.

Home Near Haulin Sts. Pa.

Arose at 4 o'clock and we did our chores and Charlie and I went to the Station to attend the funeral of Geo. Morrison. Weather was quite cool and some suffered with cold. Creswells and Braekin's took dinner with us. Also Etta Morrison & Gray. Provinces. I took Etta Morrison to the station in the evening and had a short talk with Steward & Cal. Haulin.

MAY,

THURSDAY 27.

1886.

Home Near Haulin Stn Pa.  
 Charlie took the milk to  
 the station and some chop-  
 ping to the mill. I built the  
 fence across the lot for a  
 Corn and potato patch. Planted

Evening very cool.

SEPTEMBER, THURSDAY 30. 1886.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.  
Usual chores. Charlie Morrison  
brought our rye straw to forks of  
road. We cut a few shocks  
of corn. Gathered in some  
corn to shell when dried some  
for horse use. Weather  
very fine.

OCTOBER, FRIDAY 1.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.  
After milking, feeding  
&c Charlie and I cut  
forty five shocks of corn.  
Corn very heavy and  
rather green. Charles  
attended Literary Society at  
Hamiltons Schoolhouse at  
night. Weather very  
cool and cloudy.

OCTOBER, SATURDAY 2. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
After usual chore  
Charlie and I took the milk  
to the road and Jas. Carothers  
took us to station first  
trip in our farm, he and  
Hugh Wilson having quailed.  
We cut corn most of the  
day and got but comparatively  
little done. Corn very heavy  
& odder length. Weather fine  
Dropt in the morning rather  
fast.

SUNDAY 3.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
After chores I took  
Cullie and Gracie to Suckers  
to Church. New preacher  
did not come, we had  
prayer meeting. Charlie, Lillie  
and I attended Sabbath  
School at the station.  
Congregation small,  
Helen suffering with  
a cold. Heavy frost in  
the morning.

OCTOBER, MONDAY 4. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta,  
Arose at usual time  
and did milking. Helen  
not able to get breakfast  
and was not well all day.  
Very severe cold. Charlie  
helped D. E. Fulton to thresh

milk to the station expecting  
to meet Uncle Rob. Gracey,

the afternoon. Helen better.

 & Carothers had corn plowing.

WEDNESDAY 13.

 Took a load of Rorghum  
 to D. S. Futters in the  
 afternoon. Mrs. A. M.

Arose a few minutes after four and Charlie and I did the milking as usual and I took the milk to the station. Went to father's and took dinner. Called at Sholeys and brought Ahnd home with me to do some sewing. I attended prayer meeting at Amekers at night. But few out and very spiritless.

FRIDAY 29.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After usual chores I took the milk to the station in the big wagon & J. Carothers went with me and took two chev. I brought home a load of coal from Redbo bank. Clyde Melvin came in the afternoon and he and Charley and I went to Bargett's train to Prohibition Meeting and heard Rev. Brownlee Smith deliver a good address at 8 o'clock. Rained on W.

OCTOBER, SATURDAY 30. 1886.

Home Near Hamilton Sta  
Went to Keddles of an  
Grand in the morning. After  
noon we hauled in two  
loads of corn in the afternoon.  
Clyde and Charley went to  
Grand pas in the evening.  
Alma & Charley here sewing.  
Kined some in the evening.

SUNDAY 31.

Home Near Hamilton Sta  
Charlie not being at home  
I attended to Chorus in the  
morning. Spent the forenoon  
at home. Attended Sabbath  
School at the station in  
the afternoon. Ida Cochran  
gave me behind me to ride  
Home man kicked up broke  
the girths and we both fell  
off but were not hurt.  
Weather fine.

NOVEMBER, MONDAY 1. 1886.

Home Near Hamilton Station  
Arose a few minutes after  
four, and as Charley had been  
suffering with toothache did not  
wake him but did the milking  
alone. Took the milk to the station.  
We killed a hog after dinner.  
Charley went to Eldersville and  
got a tooth drawn. Weather  
warm. Ida Cochran and  
Alma Spoley here. Took some  
off to Mrs. Cochran.

TUESDAY 2.

Home Near Hamilton Sta

six and Charley and I did

down in cart. Helen went

John Provines at Keddles  
and got my milk money.  
Went to Lawrence at night to  
get election returns. 401 votes  
polled 16 of which were for  
Prohibition of Liquor traffic.

the milk to the road. We husked  
a few shocks of corn during

Ladder very dry. Rained in

I took the milk to the Station.

Charley husked one shock at Carr in the forenoon and we milked twice in the afternoon and hauled it in although somewhat uncomfortable on account of the cold. Ground frozen hard and thawed but little.

NOVEMBER, TUESDAY 9. 1886.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

After usual chores, we spent the day husking and cribbing corn. Only got 20 shocks in. Ground frozen and weather cold. Alma Sholey has sewing. Olla Russell and John R. Wilson made a short call in the afternoon. Charley went to Carothers' of an errand at night.

WEDNESDAY 10.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and did usual chores before breakfast. I took the milk to the Station and took Alma Sholey home. Called a few minutes at father's. Stopped at C. Boles' Blacksmith shop and got spring wagon back repaired. Got home at dusk. Rained nearly all day.



NOVEMBER, THURSDAY 11. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Arose at 4 1/2  
Attended to milking as  
usual. I took the milk  
to the station. Brought  
home 2 bu of coal for  
Robb's bank. Rained on  
me and road muddy.

We husked a few shocks  
of corn in the afternoon  
and cribbed it. Charley went  
to Prayer meeting at night.

FRIDAY 12.

Day very stormy all through.  
Rain, snow and sleet.

I took Gillie, Jim, Hilda

a cylinder in the afternoon  
and filled up ten bushels of  
wheat.

TUESDAY 16.

Arose at 4.15 and we  
attended to our feeding and  
chores and Charley and I went  
with our team to Carothers.  
We took ten bushels of wheat  
and he took ten and a half to

after night. Wind very  
high and freezing. Snowing a  
little at night.

NOVEMBER,

FRIDAY 19.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.  
 Chores as usual and Charley  
 took the milk to the station.  
 I husked, ten shocks of  
 corn during the day. He  
 shelled some corn at noon  
 and Charley took some  
 grinding at the mill in  
 the afternoon. High  
 winds during last night  
 and today had made the  
 fodder very dry.

SATURDAY 20.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.  
 After usual chores  
 we spent the day husking  
 and cribbing corn. Got but  
 little done on account of  
 sore hands and dry fodder.  
 Heard late at night that  
 Moses Metcalf had been  
 killed on the Railroad.  
 Charley and Ed and Co.

 music. Day fine.

NOVEMBER,

SUNDAY 21.

1886.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.  
 After doing our morning  
 chores I went to Moses Metcalf's  
 and found that his mangled remains  
 had been brought home. Funeral  
 tomorrow at eleven o'clock. Went  
 with John to Eldersville & heard Rich.  
 from D. John, 1 Ch. pt. 4. Good  
 sermon. Took dinner at John's  
 and attended Sabbath School at  
 station. Very interesting lesson.  
 Turn out good. Weather fine.

MONDAY 22.

Home Near Haulin' Stn. Pa.  
 Arose at the usual time  
 and we did all our chores before  
 breakfast. Then took the  
 milk to the station and Charley  
 and I attended the funeral  
 of Moses Metcalf. Took Mrs  
 Campbell and Miss Clemens sister

WEDNESDAY 24.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at usual time and did usual chores before breakfast.

Helen was very unwell and spent most of the day in bed.

I did not get out to do anything but feeding. Took care of the children. Charley helped Robt. Riddle to finish husking his corn, about ten hands at work there during the day. Helen some better in the evening. Weather very fine.

NOVEMBER, THURSDAY 25. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Charley took the milk to the station and Liz. Riddle came home with him and did housework during the day as Helen was still very poorly. At night I had quite a spirited discussion with her on the subject of the liquor traffic. She became very angry even at the mention of the subject and refused to be convinced that the evil lies on the increase. ~~It did not retire until~~ midnight.

FRIDAY 26.

Home Near Haulin Station.

Charley took the milk to the station and I did the chores. Put our old mowing machine in better and got out our sled, went to Caldwell's bank and got ten bushels of coal. Took Liz. Riddle home and borrowed Riddle's beam. Took fifty pounds of flour to Mrs. Cochran at night. Charley sang at literary society at night. Weather cold. Snow on the ground.

NOVEMBER, SATURDAY 27.

1886.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Immediately after breakfast Charley took the horses to the chop and had them shod. I did chores during the day. Repaired stable some.

Weather rather fair. Charley made a call at Carothers' at night. He intended to have gone to Fulton.

SUNDAY 28.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Attended to usual morning chores and studied the Sabbath School lesson. Charley and I walked to the Station to Sabbath School in the afternoon. Some snow on the ground and melting some in the evening.

Weather very fine.

NOVEMBER, MONDAY 29.

1886.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Charley took the milk to the station. Miss Laura McCalumet went with him on her way to Washington to Teachers' Institute. He husked and culled 13 shocks of corn and prepared a pen for some pigs.

Charley went to Miller's School House at night to assist in organizing a literary society. Went to Coltrane's to get Ida to do house work. Jo and Ed Carothers came and ground an ax. Rained in the afternoon.

TUESDAY 30.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Arose at usual time and attended to chores before breakfast. Went to Kiddle's and got milk. Annie Stephenson came from Station with Ed. Carothers. I went to Caldwell's bank and got 20 lbs. of coal. Charley attended wood chopping at Robt. Barber's and he and Annie Stephenson and Ida Lockran attended party there at night. Snowed nearly all day, very disagreeable.

DECEMBER, WEDNESDAY 1. 1886.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.  
Attended to the feeding in  
the morning. Charley took the  
milk to the station and Annie  
Stephenson with him. Took her home.  
Repaired our hoghead some per-  
ferring for butchering. Snow  
on the ground and snowing  
at night. Read over some of my  
Army experience in my diary  
of 1864. Ida Cochran here.

THURSDAY 2.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.  
After usual chores I sent  
Charley for Riddle's kettles and  
we butchered our three hogs in  
the afternoon weighed 60 lbs.  
John Provinces and Robt's  
Riddle helping us. Weather  
cold and snowing on the  
ground. Ida Cochran  
helping Helen. Retired  
about eleven o'clock after  
cutting up our hogs.

DECEMBER, FRIDAY 3. 1886.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

two pigs from Robt's Riddles.

not get through. Charley  
went to Literary Society at  
night. Weather still  
cold and snow on the ground.

& will be the afternoon.

School lesson. Attended  
Sabbath School at the  
station at five o'clock.  
My Anderson was not  
there to hold Gospel  
Meeting. Congregation was  
very large. Weather cold

and I helped Robt. Kiddle  
to butcher. Brought some

I took the milk to the station, took dinner at Ann Shorley's, went to father's and got some butter, got a shoe driven in town, got some mulling at the mill and got home about dusk. Brought home the cradle in which I was rocked, to rock Alice in.

FRIDAY 10.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

Attended to usual chores before breakfast. I took the milk to the station and a sack of corn to the mill.

Did not get much done but feeding in the afternoon.

Helped Helvid to cook the hog feet. Charlie went to L. France for some schoolbooks. Weather very fine. Snow melting off.

DECEMBER, SATURDAY 11. 1886.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

Arose at usual time and we did milking as usual and Charley got the breakfast. After the milk was taken to gate we hauled a load of corn fodder. Charley went to Provins' Cornhusking. I went to S. S. Linton's shipporing they were having a husking but they were out and I helped Provins'. Charley went out at night to shippite George's hands to help us to husk on Monday. Weather very fine.

SUNDAY 12.

Home Near Haulin' Station

Attended to usual chores in the morning and spent most of the day studying Sabbath school lesson. Gillie and I attended Sabbath School at the station. Teachers all present and good turn out of scholars.

Charley did the feeding and attended church at Paris and heard Dr. Blough preach. Weather fine and warm.



DECEMBER, MONDAY 13. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Stn  
Arose at usual hour and  
did usual chores. Intending to  
have a corn husking I invited  
neighbor Wilson he not having been  
invited before. Emmie Haulin &  
Ed Carothers husked one shock when  
some came on and stopped operation.  
Wm Haulin came and spent most of  
day. Rained all day. Charley attended  
literary society at Miller's School House.  
I spent evening reading in of her diary.

TUESDAY 14.

Home Near Haulin Stn.  
Arose at usual hour and  
did usual chores. We had our  
corn husking during the day.  
Did not get quite done. Had  
eleven shocks left. Considerable  
appearance of snow in the  
evening. About 10 hands here  
in the forenoon and fourteen a  
short time in the afternoon.  
Charley took the milk to the  
station in the morning.

DECEMBER, WEDNESDAY 15. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Stn.  
After milking taking  
breakfast and taking the milk  
to the road Charley and I made  
some weatherboarding on the  
shade before he went to  
school and I made a door for  
the shade in the afternoon.  
Hauled some fodder for  
the cows and we took old  
Reddy to C. Wm Haulin's to the  
kill at night. Snow on the  
ground. Snowed in the forenoon.

THURSDAY 16.

Home Near Haulin Stn.  
Attended to milking before  
breakfast. Colt got at the corn pile  
and we thought it might be foundered.  
Gave it some milted land. Took milk  
to station. Bought tin bucket of coal  
and sack of meal from mill. Broke  
slid down when almost home. Had  
quite a lively controversy with E. S.  
Haulin on the present road law. He claimed  
that he had enforced it when he was  
missioner. I claimed he had not. He  
was to see Mrs Cochran at night. I  
found her very poorly but some better.

DECEMBER,

FRIDAY 17.

1886.

Home Near Haulin' Sta. Pa.

Spent the forenoon doing up the  
chores and shelling corn. Took  
some shopping to the mill. Charley  
and I attended Literary Society at  
Hamilton's School House at night.

Discussion on the resolution, "Resolved  
that the present road law should be  
maintained. Discussion interest-  
ing. Large audience of old men and  
nearly all favorable to the present law.  
Weather stormy at night. Raining some.

SATURDAY 18.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Charlie and I carried the  
milk to the road in the  
morning. We hauled two  
sled loads of hay and he  
went to mill in the evening.

Helen did some washing  
and I attended to the baby.  
Charley went to S. S. Fulton's  
at night. Rained most of  
the day. Night clear and  
not cold.

DECEMBER,

SUNDAY 19.

1886.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to feeding and  
chores in the forenoon and  
studied Sabbath School lesson  
some. Charley and I attended  
Sabbath School at the station  
in the afternoon. Pretty good  
turnout. Lesson in the  
last Chapter of Revelation.  
Charley attended church at  
Perris at night and I did  
the milking after night.  
Snowing at night.

MONDAY 20.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to usual chores  
in the morning. Carried the milk  
to the road. Helped James Parothers  
to butcher a beef and hunted  
a couple of sled poles. After  
I came home Charley attended  
Literary Society at Miller's  
School House at night.  
Weather very fine during  
the day. A little snow on  
the ground and not very cold.

DECEMBER, TUESDAY 21. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Slept but little on account of Helen's tooth-aching. Arose at three o'clock and made a chard of black bread and drew the tooth. I took the milk to the station and brought 20 lbs of coal home from Robt's bank.

Borrowed a brace & bit from S. Robt and put a sled on our sled. Weather fine, threatening snow in the evening.

WEDNESDAY 22.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

We carried the milk to the gate. I husked eleven shocks of corn, the last of our crop in the forenoon. Hauled in corn and hauled fodder in the afternoon and put a sled on the sled. Charley took some eggs to Keddell's at night to send to Pittsburgh. Made out a constitution and bylaws for Miller's Literary Society. Snowed some in afternoon.

DECEMBER, THURSDAY 23. 1886.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at usual times and did milking before breakfast. I took the milk to the station in the big wagon and brought home about 20 lbs of coal.

Rained nearly all day. I spent most of the afternoon attending the baby while Helen was doing some washing.

FRIDAY 24.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After usual chores, I took some things to Keddell's & got a cake baked. Stopped at M. Calmerts with Robt Keddell & Doctor a sick cow. Went to Stubbenwell and got stock for Christmas. Weather very unfavorable. Rained and snowed in the afternoon. Stopped to see Mrs. Cochran and found her very poorly. Got home after dark. Children well pleased with presents.

DECEMBER, SATURDAY 25. 1886.

Home near Hamilton St.  
attended to chores as usual  
and spent most of the forenoon  
attending to baby, while Helen was  
preparing clothing for children  
to go to station to treat. We attended  
Christmuffs Sabbath School treat at  
station at one o'clock and had  
good time. Helen and baby did  
not go. Turnout not very large.  
Day very fine. Had plenty  
for all who were there. Snow

SUNDAY 26.

Home near Hamilton St.  
After doing up the morning  
chores I went to see Mrs Cochran  
and found her in bed but some  
better. Attended to worship at  
the request of the family.  
Charley and I attended Sabbath  
school at the station.  
Review lesson very interesting  
pretty good turnout. A Mr.  
Ben. Davis there for the first  
time. A Christian gentleman.

DECEMBER, MONDAY 27. 1886.

Home near Hamilton St.  
Attended to chores as usual  
and Charley and I carried the  
milk to the gate. I hung  
the door on the cow shade  
in the forenoon and shelled  
some corn in the afternoon  
take to mill. Stewart  
Hamilton and Belle Carothers  
came in the evening and set  
until bedtime the first time  
Stewart had visited us since the  
settlement of estate very pleasant  
day. Helen here over night.

TUESDAY 28.

Home near Hamilton Station.  
I took the milk to the station  
in the morning. Stewart Hamilton with  
me. Ed. Carothers and Harry Hamilton came  
with me as far as Redelles. Charley  
Clyde Melvin and I attended the sale  
of Moses Metcalf's property in the  
afternoon. Good turnout there  
and goods sold as well as could
