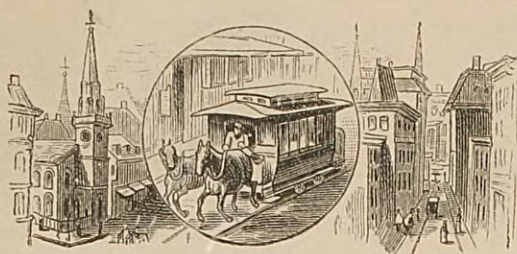

JANUARY, WEDNESDAY I. 1890.

Home near Haulin Stw.  
 We retired about twelve O'clock  
 After coming from exhibition at  
 Hamilton school. I spent the  
 forenoon doing chores. Cut  
 up a hog in the afternoon.  
 Helen did a washing during the  
 day. I felt quite unwell in  
 the afternoon. Rained  
 considerably during the day.  
 Quite warm and landilions  
 were in bloom through the  
 fields.

THURSDAY 2.

Home near Haulin Stw.  
 Arose at four O'clock and on  
 time more than half an hour  
 fast. Spent the forenoon  
 doing feeding &c. Cut some hay  
 and had a troublesome time  
 with a dull cutter. Dora  
 McCready came in the afternoon  
 to try to hire for the coming  
 summer. Did not engage him.  
 Did not feel well during the  
 day. Weather damp and roads  
 muddy.

JANUARY, FRIDAY 3. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.

Spent the day doing chore  
and hauling hay and corn  
fodder. I covered a  
hall for Gillie at night.  
Weather fine.

SATURDAY 4.

Home Near Haulin St.

Spent the forenoon doing  
chores and reading some.  
In the afternoon Gillie  
and I hauled three loads  
of pots for the fence  
along the road. Alice  
burned her head a little  
in the fire at night.  
Remained home after night.

JANUARY, SUNDAY 5. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.

Slept until after sunrise.  
Spent most of the forenoon  
doing feeding and milking.  
Studied Sabbath School lesson  
but the weather was so very  
unfavorable, so much appear-  
ance of rain that we did  
not go to Sabbath School, but  
it did not rain after all.  
Did more reading than usual.

MONDAY 6.

Home Near Haulin St.

Alarm clock stopped in the night  
and had to be twice started to announce  
rising time. After doing the feeding  
I took the watch and clock to  
Sunderville for repairs. Stopped  
at Holliday's Cove and paid R.S.  
Elihu balance for my teeth.  
Got home a little before dark.  
Helen and Gillie had most of the  
feeding done and Helen helped me  
to milk. Rained considerably  
during the day.

JANUARY,

TUESDAY 7.

1890.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

I attended to the usual chores in the morning and took the milk to the station in the spring wagon. Shoveled out some drains about the stable. Put a piece to the end of the wagon whip. Mrs Barber came in the afternoon and paid for three calves. Weather very unpleasant. Snowed considerably during the day. Very hot snow.

WEDNESDAY 8.

Home near Hanlin Sta.

Had no alarm clock. Helen woke me at 20 minutes after four o'clock. Attended to usual chores. Went to kiddles and got the beam and to Carothers' and got the gun. Killed big Riddle and Andrew Proomes helping. Took beef to Proomes and to Paris. Did not get started until 4-15. Helen and Gillie helped with the feeding and we got through with the night work at nine o'clock. Evening quite stormy.

JANUARY,

THURSDAY 9.

1890.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Slept until ten minutes of five because we had no alarm clock. Had the milk at the road in time. Did chores. Cut up our beef and put it in the barrel. Weather quite fine and cooler. Ground frozen in the morning and some snow on the ground.

FRIDAY 10.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Arose at 4-20 and did chores. Took milk to station in big wagon. Took care of eggs. Did not get home until noon. Talked with John Melvin and Will Hosley. Took five boxes of oats to Alex Hanlin's which I had borrowed. Got my hair and whiskers trimmed. Cut some apples at night. Weather warm.

JANUARY, SATURDAY 11. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Woke a few minutes after  
three o'clock and sat and  
slept by the fire until time to  
do chores. Went to S. & Fulton  
and paid widow's interest.  
Went to C. Fulton and paid  
for three cans and took dinner  
over there. After doing evening  
chores I went to the station  
for cans and got them home  
about 8 1/2 o'clock. Weather  
cloudy and damp.

SUNDAY 12.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Slept until almost eight  
o'clock and spent nearly all  
forenoon feeding. Spent some  
time studying Sabbath School  
lesson. Hitched up the team to  
go to Sabbath School, but before  
we got ready it commenced rain-  
ing and we did not go. Read  
some at night concerning Dr. Salmad  
his trip in Asia, and Lillie became  
very much interested concerning the  
Holy Land.

JANUARY, MONDAY 13. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Arose at 4 1/2 o'clock and did  
usual chores. Intended to have  
hauled some hay but it was  
so windy did not do it. Wrote  
a letter to Charly in the  
afternoon. Did the feeding  
and milking early and  
went to the station for  
cans. Roads are muddy but  
freezing a little at night.

TUESDAY 14.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Took the milk to the station  
in the spring wagon and found  
it a terribly rough trip. Ground  
frozen on top and broke through.  
Brought home two cans of  
McAlmunt's milk returned as  
having been lower when received  
in Pittsburgh. Helen received a letter  
from Charly. I hauled a load of hay  
in the afternoon and helped Helen to  
make a bottle of Apple butter. Weather  
fine.

JANUARY, WEDNESDAY 15. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Intended to have attended the sale of the McWha property at Holiday Cove (The married woman's effects) but it rained all day and I did not go. Put hoops on vinegar barrel and took rotten apples and pumpkins out of cellar and helped Helen some with mince meat & apples for pies. Raining at night.

THURSDAY 16.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.  
Slept until almost five o'clock and then was obliged to hurry about to get the milk ready but got it to the gate in time. Weather was stormy during the day and I did not do much out of doors. Put the new chains in harness. Carried water for Helen for washing and did other chores. Put the sled on the sled in the evening preparatory to going to station in the morning.

JANUARY, FRIDAY 17. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Took the milk to the station in the morning on the sled. Very little snow on the ground and road very bad. Spoke off of Lee and I took her to the shop in the afternoon. Liz. Reddle came and spent most of the afternoon here. Helen finished her washing in the afternoon. Her throat troubling her considerably. Weather very fine for winter.

SATURDAY 18.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.  
Ellie and I hauled Corn fodder in the forenoon and hauled a load of hay for the horses in the evening. Spent a good portion of the afternoon reading the newspapers. Read the Pittsburgh Commercial Gazette's account of the death of Rev. Johnson of W. Va in a Masonic initiation, and read at night of the death of Rev. D. S. Kinney, Agent of the American Wesleyan Association of Churches.

- JANUARY, SUNDAY 19. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Stn  
Attended to usual chores  
in the forenoon Gillie doing  
most of the feeding while I did  
the milking. Studied Sabbath  
School lesson, Zechariak's Song.  
Gillie and I attended school  
at the station. He walked  
and I rode on horseback. Good  
attendance for the kind of  
weather and roads. Attending  
lesson.

MONDAY 20.

Home Near Haulin Stn  
After taking the milk to the road  
I took Gracey to school and  
finished up feeding before  
dinner. Went to where Sawmill  
had been on Kiddle's place and set  
slabs. Put up a slab in fullons  
field for children to crop the  
run going to school. Repaired  
a culvert. Copied David  
Shorley's will at night.  
Roads quite muddy.  
Weather warm and damp.

JANUARY, TUESDAY 21. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Station  
C. C. Sullton and I joined  
teams and took milk to station.  
He helped me plow down a bank  
on road near station. I did  
some feeding and cleaning stables  
in afternoon and took a  
bucket of borrowed flour to  
Carothers. He claimed I owed  
two buckets full and I left with  
the understanding that I should give  
in. Weather fine somewhat stormy  
at night.

WEDNESDAY 22.

Home Near Haulin Stn  
After attending to usual chores  
taking milk to the road I  
filled up a load of corn and  
oats and took it to Paris and got  
it ground. Got Road tax settled  
Got a shoe driven on cow  
and got home over the rough  
road a little before dark.  
Gillie had the feeding almost  
done and I did the milking  
after night. Coldest weather of the  
season and roads very rough.

JANUARY, THURSDAY 23. 1890.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
Attended to usual chores  
and took milk to the sale  
Pulled up fifteen bushels  
of wheat and took it to  
the station and shipped  
it to Midway for exchange.  
While milking in the even  
Lammie Thoby came and  
spent the night with us.  
Did not retire until  
midnight. Ground frozen  
and a little snow on.

FRIDAY 24.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
Arose a little before  
four O'clock and milked  
eight cows and harned the  
horses before breakfast. Lammie  
Thoby and Lillie finished  
the feeding after I had gone  
to the station. Took a  
barrel of flour to Middleville  
for Mary Stephen. Took  
a bucket of borrowed flour to  
Janus Carothers. Weather fine  
and cool. Ground frozen.

JANUARY, SATURDAY 25. 1890.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
Overslept in the morning and  
did not rise until 6 1/2 O'clock  
but managed to get the cows  
milked before breakfast in  
time to take the milk to the  
station. Spent the forenoon  
doing chores and reading.  
Lillie and I hauled three  
sled loads of hay into the  
the old barn for the horses.  
Weather fine. Ground frozen.

SUNDAY 26.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
Slept until late in the  
morning then hurried about  
and did our chores and  
attended Sabbath School before  
going over the Child Jesus.  
Lillie and I went to the  
station on horseback and  
attended Sabbath School.  
A good turn out and large  
collection. Lesson interesting.  
Weather very mild and  
roads muddy.



JANUARY, MONDAY 27. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Ste.

Felt quite unwell in the morning but managed to do the chores. Took our ax and saw to Paines to get sharpened, helped Jim to make a hardy for his Anvil Hauled a load of fodder in the evening. John Freshwater came to try to lease our farm to the Bridgewater Oil Co. I wrote a letter at night to the Commercial Gazette to have it stopped. Weather fine.

TUESDAY 28.

Home Near Haulin Ste.

Attended to milking and all the feeding in the morning and took the milk to the gate. Went to the station on foot. Went to Midway and took dinner at S. Haulins. He and I looked through the mill. He was very lame. I attended the Sale of Alex. Morrison's Personal property in the afternoon and bought Hauls, Sacks, and a Cultivator to the amount of \$25.87. Goods did not sell very well. Milked after night. Day very fine.

JANUARY, WEDNESDAY 29. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Ste.

After doing the usual chores in the morning I rode to Stenbenville for our alarm clock and watch. Roads very bad. Got home just at dark and found that Lillie had the feeding almost done. Helen helped me to do the milking after we had eaten supper. Rained on me all the way from town but no track.

THURSDAY 30.

Home Near Haulin Ste.

Did not do much but the chores in the forenoon and helped Helen to do a washing in the afternoon. Greased the wagon in the evening. Weather very pleasant.

JANUARY, FRIDAY 31. 1890.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
I took the milk to the  
station in the morning in  
the roadwagon and got home  
a little before noon. John  
E. Freshwater came and we  
closed a lease for fifty acres  
of our farm for all purposes.  
Did our set through milkin'  
until it was late. Weather  
warm and roads muddy.

FEBRUARY, SATURDAY 1.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
Milked and fed. Ripped cows  
fed the horses and rimped  
me before breakfast. Attended  
to usual chores. Went to  
Florence in the afternoon  
and got some Corn Meal  
and got Lillie's boots  
half soled. Helen set up  
until after midnight  
mending Lillie's pants.  
Weather fine and roads  
quite muddy.

FEBRUARY, SUNDAY 2. 1890.

Home Near Hamlin  
Slept until late then  
did the feeding and milking.  
Studied Mr. Sabbath's good  
lesson Jesus brought into  
the Temple. Lillie and  
I went to Sabbath School  
on horseback. Pretty good  
turn out and lesson very  
interesting. Rained some  
in the evening. Roads muddy.

MONDAY 3.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.  
Usual chores in the morning.  
I took the milk to the station  
in the roadwagon to make up for  
once taken for Mrs. McCalhoun's.  
Went to see Mr. Hutson and those  
of his family who were sick and  
found them all better. Weather  
cloud and damp and rained  
some during the day.

FEBRUARY, TUESDAY 4. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
After usual chores took the  
milk to the station spent the  
afternoon doing some chores  
putting an iron on the wagon  
for slider and did the feeding  
and milking early and we  
visited at Hugh Wilson's  
until bedtime and all had  
a good time. Weather very  
warm.

WEDNESDAY 5.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
After taking the milk to  
the gate I hauled two loads  
of Corn fodder for the cattle.  
Joe Anderson was with us  
for dinner, bringing to sell  
farming implements. I went  
to Paris in the afternoon  
and got Crank of Cornsheller  
mended. Weather consider-  
able cooler.

FEBRUARY, THURSDAY 6. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Arose a few minutes before  
four o'clock and did the milking  
and feeding. Walked to the station  
and went to Pittsburgh. Did not  
get our milk money as Mr. Syster  
was not ready to pay. Took dinner  
with Charly & his bunchman  
under the Market house. Visited  
the Milk inspector and examined  
his figures and found that our  
milk stood very fair with a next  
loss. Lillian met me with horse

FRIDAY 7.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
I took the milk to the station  
in the morning on the sled and  
brought home the Cultivator  
and barrels & Ducks which I  
had bought at Morrisons sale.  
Read some in the afternoon  
and did the chores.  
Did not feel very well in  
the evening. Rain in my  
bowels. Snowed and sleeted  
in the afternoon.

FEBRUARY, SATURDAY 8. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.  
After usual chores in the  
evening I spent most of  
the time reading in the  
Oreer. Gillie and I hauled  
a load of hay in the afternoon.  
Weather was stormy in  
the forenoon some snow  
fell. Clear at night and  
freezing

SUNDAY 9.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

Slept until late and then I had all  
the feeding and milking to do myself  
as Gillie had a very sore eye  
right eye. Gillie Tracy and I  
attended Sabbath School at the station  
We went with sled. There was but  
little snow on the ground. Helen  
went to Carothers in the afternoon  
to see Ed. who was suffering with  
boils. Weather fine

FEBRUARY, MONDAY 10. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

After usual chores I went to  
Mrs. Reedham's and secured  
the services of Nellie who came  
in the afternoon and we  
hauled a stack of hay into  
the cow house now. Weather  
very fine with a little snow  
in the ground. Roads very  
bad

TUESDAY 11.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

After usual chores Gillie  
went with me to the station  
with the milk. Put sled on  
the sled in the afternoon and  
took the white milk cow to  
Wilson's in the evening.  
Snow melting off some and  
ground somewhat muddy.

FEBRUARY, WEDNESDAY 12. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' Sta'

Arose at four o'clock and did usual chores. Filled up a load of corn and oats and Billie and I took it to Paris on the sled and waited until it was ground. Did not get home until sundown. Snow all off the road. Helen helped to do the feeding and milking in the evening. Billie was not feeling well.

THURSDAY 13.

Home Near Haulin' Sta'

Hurried about in the morning and did all the feeding and milking and put on fire and hauled water for washing. Went to Eldersville and paid John and Mrs Criffen two years interest then went to the old homestead and paid Mother some interest and renewed her note. Got home after dark and Helen had most of feeding done. Billie and Lucy not well.

FEBRUARY, FRIDAY 14. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' Sta'

Commenced to rain when I went out to milk in the morning and rained most of the day. I took the milk to the station in the big wagon I da Cochran had been home to see her mother and was returning to Collier. Rode part of the way with me. Called in to see McCallum's folks and found them better. Mrs Cochran suffering with a broken right arm.

SATURDAY 15.

Home Near Haulin' Sta'

Attended to usual chores before breakfast. Took the milk to the gate. Spent most of forenoon feeding and preparing to mend milk cans and mark them and spent the afternoon doing it. Read some during the day in a book entitled "On the Wolf" or the Coming Conflict. Read some in the Weekly also. Weather fine. Cleared off in the forenoon. Breeding about.

FEBRUARY, SUNDAY 16. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
A little before two O'clock  
Alice waked us up with a  
very Crampy Cough and we  
spent an hour getting her relieved.  
I slept until almost sunrise.  
Then did the chores and studied  
Sabbath School lesson. Gillie and  
Gracey both so bad with the cold  
that they could not attend  
Sabbath School. Pretty good turnout,  
Alec also very poorly. Walter  
Very fine

MONDAY 17.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Nothing unusual in the  
forenoon. After attending to  
usual chores, I read two  
chapters in a book entitled  
"In the Coils or The coming  
Conflict, An Antimasonic  
book of rare interest. Took  
our meat out of the bin  
in the afternoon and hung it  
up. Read two more chapters  
in the book at night. Took a  
Coat to Wildon in the evening

FEBRUARY, TUESDAY 18. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Arose at usual time and was  
ready at seven O'clock and took  
the milk to the station. Saw Stuck  
Haulin at Riddle's. Gillie took him  
a bottle of Feverdrink for his leg.  
Cut a small hickory tree in the  
afternoon and put smoke to our  
meat. Hauled a little load of hay.  
Read some in the book, "In the  
Coils." Gillie could not sleep after  
hearing it and I had to sleep with  
him in the after part of the night.

WEDNESDAY 19.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Arose at four as usual  
Took milk to the gate.  
Cleaned out stables. Finished  
reading "In the Coils" Gillie  
had been so interested and  
excited over the book last night  
that he could not sleep and got  
up and put his pants on after  
midnight. I slept with him after.  
Took Lucy to Parr's and got her  
shod. Took book home. Rained  
in the evening

FEBRUARY, THURSDAY 20. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Attended to usual chores in the morning and then spent the day talking with Stewart J. Haulin who came to visit us. He remained with us over night and we had a very pleasant visit. His ankle was so lame that he was obliged to use a crutch. Weather quite cloudy.

FRIDAY 21.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Arose at four o'clock and had the chores done by seven and took the milk to the station on the sled. Ground dry and the sled ran heavily. Took Stewart J. Haulin over to Carothers in the sled in the afternoon. Did not work any day at feeding and milking. Weather quite cold but shining.

FEBRUARY, SATURDAY 22. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Slept until almost five o'clock and then was obliged to take the milk to the road before breakfast. Spent most of the forenoon feeding and reading. Hauled two of the old logs of the old bridge up for our stable and hauled a little load of hay to the horse stable in the evening. Stewart Haulin started back to Midway. I got a letter from Harley. Weather very fine.

SUNDAY 23.

Home Near Haulin Sta

After attending to chores spent the forenoon studying Sabbath School lesson "Temptation of Jesus". Billie and I attended Sabbath School at the Station and there was quite a good turn out and the lesson was very interesting with considerable of discussion concerning the origin and personality of the devil. Weather a little cloudy, rained at night.

FEBRUARY, MONDAY 24.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Just after the alarm sounded  
at four o'clock lightning struck  
our strawstack and burned it.  
I had just awoke and when  
I first saw the light thought it  
was the stable that was struck.  
Straw burned all day. After  
chores were done I spent part  
of the afternoon preparing a  
stable for our horses. Cleared  
off in the afternoon.

TUESDAY 25.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Very heavy rain in the  
morning before daylight. I  
took the milk to the station  
in the road wagon and did  
not get home until the  
middle of the day. Cleared  
out all the stables, repaired our  
bridge and cleaned out the  
ditch at the Crothers Culvert.  
Rained again in the evening.  
Did our milking after night.

FEBRUARY, WEDNESDAY 26.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
After the milk was taken  
to the road in the morning,  
I went to the woods and got  
a pole for cart tongue and a  
crooked stick to make tongue  
for hand-cart. Spent most  
of the day making a hand cart.  
Cut and hauled in the factory  
for smokewood and  
Billie and I hauled a sled  
load of hay to the farm in the  
evening. Weather fine.

THURSDAY 27.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
After usual feeding and  
milking I took the milk to the  
gate. Spent forenoon helping  
Helen to prepare to wash, trilled  
fire, carried water, cut wood  
for smokehouse, pruned  
grapevines, and in the after-  
noon I cleaned out the privy  
vault and scraped out  
some mud out of the shade  
preparatory to making a stable  
floor. Weather warm like spring.



FEBRUARY, FRIDAY 28. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.  
Arose at usual time  
and did the chores and then  
took the milk to the station  
and there learned that John  
P. Lawther was married to  
Miss Price of Leesville, Wis.  
Spent part of the afternoon  
putting sleepers in the stable.  
Went to Crothers' at night  
and cut Ed's hair. Ed suffering  
with something like Dippe

MARCH, SATURDAY 1.

Home Near Haulin St.  
Arose at usual time and  
did usual chores. Called on John  
Provia and secured from him  
enough money to get five dollars  
worth of tickets and he brought  
them for me. Spent most of the  
forenoon reading. Lillie went  
to Paris and got his boot patches.  
Put two sleepers in the new  
stable in the afternoon.  
Greased boots and shoes at  
night. Weather cold and stormy.

MARCH, SUNDAY 2. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.  
Arose between daylight and  
sunrise and did the  
feeding and milking. Tried  
to study my Sabbath school  
lesson but was so very  
drowsy that I did not  
succeed well. Lillie and  
I walked to Sabbath school.  
Only thirty odd there. Weather  
quite cold and ground frozen.

MONDAY 3.

Home Near Haulin St.  
Usual chores done at usual time  
and I took the milk in the  
big wagon to the station, then  
took the wagon to Eldersville  
and helped to move Mary Ste-  
phenson and family out of the  
Robertson house into the house  
which they had bought of Thos.  
Walker. Got home at dusk  
and did the milking after  
night with Helen's help.  
Weather cold and roads rough.

MARCH,

TUESDAY 4.

1890.

Home Near Haulund Sta

While I was doing the feeding in the morning Ed. Freshwater came and wanted to hire with me for the season. Engaged to visit him in Paris tomorrow. Helped D. & Fulton to butcher a beef and went all night and brought home 54 lbs. of front quarter. Snowed considerably during the day. Snow on the ground at night.

WEDNESDAY 5.

Home Near Haulund Sta

After the morning work was done I filled up some grain and took it to Paris in the afternoon to get it ground. Found the mill out of repair and doing no good. Did milking after night. Snow storm in the evening. Weather said to be the coldest of the season.

MARCH,

THURSDAY 6.

1890.

Home Near Haulund Sta

Arose at usual time and had some trouble milking a cow that had one teat closing up. Repaired sled bed and went to Porters bank and got twenty bu. coal from Thos. Martin. Almost three o'clock when I got home. Went to Paris for grinding but it was not done. Weather very cold. Sliding not good.

FRIDAY 7.

Home Near Haulund Sta

Hurried about in the morning and did the usual chores with Mercury about zero. Took the milk to the station on the big sled and brought home twenty bushels of coal from Porters bank. Went to Paris in the afternoon and got two shoes driven and brought home some grinding from the mill.

Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup>

MARCH,

SATURDAY 8.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Ed. Freshwater helped me  
to do the milking in the  
morning and he took the  
milk to the gate. We went  
to the road near gates and  
shovelled out some drains  
and put some slabs up to  
keep people out of the drains.  
We worked some on the  
wester load of our stable  
in the evening. Ed went to Paris at night.

Thursday 13<sup>th</sup>

SUNDAY 9.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Raining most of the day.  
Ed. Freshwater helped me  
do the milking and took  
the milk to the gate. Assorted  
our potatoes. I repaired  
a milk cart in the after  
noon and wrote a letter  
to Charley at night. Helen's  
mouth swelled badly with  
toothache. Alice not  
well.

MARCH,

MONDAY 10.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Arose at usual time and  
did usual chores. Ed. Freshwater  
came to work for us and  
he and I hauled in a large  
stack of hay during the day  
and felled the mows. Ed  
not feeling very well but  
did good work. Snowed  
some in the forenoon but  
all melted off still having  
at bed time and misting  
rain.

TUESDAY 11.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Arose at usual time and  
Ed. Freshwater helped me to do  
the feeding. I did the milking  
and he took the milk to the  
station. We hung up our  
melts in the pokes in the

After usual chores took the milk to the gate and left it for Carothers to take to the station. Spent the forenoon cleaning out stables &c. Felt quite unwell about noon. Gillie and I hauled some straw and some hay in the afternoon. Snow melting some where the Amstone. Weather cold.

Sunday 9<sup>th</sup>  
~~THURSDAY 13.~~

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Arose at sunrise and attended to morning work. Studied Sabbath School lesson for about half an hour or more. I attended Sabbath School at the station. Children did not go. Only two teachers there. I had a very large and mixed class. Was through with the evening work soon after dark. Snow nearly all gone and weather getting considerably warmer.

MARCH,

FRIDAY 14.

1890.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Ed. Freshwater was with me in the morning and helped to do the milking and feeding and took the milk to the station and brought my milk and egg money. I did a washing and some chores. While we were milking in the evening Cow kicked Ed over and bruised bucket. He went to Paris to literary at night.

SATURDAY 15.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

At the time the milk was taken to the road there came on a heavy snow storm and it was cold and unpleasant all day. I spent most of the forenoon reading the Proice. In the afternoon Ed. Freshwater and I ground the ax. Ed went home after he had done the feeding last, and I did the milking. Weather cold.

MARCH,

SUNDAY 16.

1890.

Home Near Hamilton St.  
 Arose a few minutes after  
 six and attended feeding  
 and milking. Found the young  
 mare having loose in the  
 stable and kicked on the  
 right hind leg near stifle joint.  
 Bathed the leg with hot water  
 Gillie and I attended Sabbath  
 School at station. No snow out.  
 Frank Crothers called on us  
 in the evening. Weather cold.

MONDAY 17.

Home Near Hamilton St.  
 Ed. Freshwater helped me do  
 the milking and feeding in the  
 morning and took the milk to the  
 gate. He hauled ports in the  
 forenoon and hauled forty bu  
 of coal to Mrs. Cochran in the

 found the ground covered  
 with snow and snowing fast.  
 Snow was probably five or six  
 inches deep. Ed. Freshwater took  
 a load of chopping to Paris and  
 got it home in the evening. I  
 went by Mr. Patton's to Hamiltons  
 Reformatory and visited Miss  
 O. R. Todd's school. Got home about

Sent Hiram to smithshop and  
store. I went to Riddle's for  
papers. Made out an affidavit  
for Helen at night for Shan-  
dick to procure pensions.

John and I hauled 625 + Will 475. Roads very bad. Sometimes had six horses to a load. I got home a little before 12 O'clock.

SUNDAY 6.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

I left until seven O'clock. Hiram and Gillie did the milking and feeding. I attended Sabbath School at the station. A good turn out for the day. Did not get home until almost sundown and felt much worried. Weather fine and roads drying fast. Fire from Cars burned over Cottagers field near Rail Road.

APRIL,

MONDAY 7.

1890.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Nothing unusual in the morning. After chores we spent the forenoon scraping about the stable to carry water away &c. In the afternoon we commenced grading down a bank in the Cornfield. We plowed some with Fanny in the afternoon - the first work she had done since last December. Hiram went out at night and Gillie and I did the milking.

TUESDAY 8.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Hiram did not get home until four O'clock and I did the milking and let him sleep. I spent the forenoon and part of the afternoon helping Helen with the washing. We plowed and scraped some during the day on the bank in the Cornfield. Rained several showers during the day.

APRIL,

WEDNESDAY 9.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Station  
 Awoke at usual time but  
 as it was thundering and  
 lightning I went asleep again  
 and slept until almost six  
 o'clock. Hiram and I ground  
 my axes. I wrote a letter to  
 Jas. Senny, one to C. P. Melvin  
 and one to W. B. Lindsay.  
 Nellie went with Hiram  
 to Prayer meeting at night.  
 We dropped some fence posts  
 and put on a few panels of rail.

THURSDAY 10.

 town and spent the day as it

 me a Spring tooth harrow and

 but I did not buy. We spent  
 the day cultivating in oats.  
 We got in about 11 1/2 bu.

 Weather tolerably fair  
 but cool.

FRIDAY 18.

 evening. I sowed some Clover  
 seeds. Heard at noon that  
 Rome McCabe was dead. Had  
 bought store goods from him on  
 Saturday before he went to Burgett's  
 town where he died.

TUESDAY 22.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

 cooler.

THURSDAY 24.

 Miller's school house and  
 bought two sections at  
 ten and seven dollars respec-  
 tively. Took dinner at George  
 Cassiday's and tried to get him

 Lawther's new wife. Borrowed a  
 sled load of hay from A. M. Haulin  
 and expect him nearly home. Day very wet.

 and Heram helped me to do  
 the milking. He went to  
 Paris to church through the  
 rain I did not feel well  
 and spent the day at  
 home. In the evening Anne

Arose as usual time and did usual chores. Hiram spent the day plowing for corn. I made a bow for a yoke and prepared it for service. Went to Florence in the evening and got a new yoke and brought home some shoes and boots that were repaired. Had some men examine Sammie's eye leg. All said there was no pervert.

TUESDAY 13.

1890.

Home Near Hardin Station

After usual chores, took the milk to the station and two bushels of wheat to bend to Midway to mill. I plowed in the afternoon and Hiram ditched. Charley Morrison came in the afternoon and he and Hiram caught a flying squirrel in the evening and made a cage at night & put it in. Rained in the evening.

WEDNESDAY 14.

Home Near Haulind St.

Charley Morrison helped us to do the milking in the morning. Ellie took Lucy to the shop and got two shoes driven. Charley and Hiram set 24 fence posts. I plowed in the afternoon although the ground was quite wet. Charley and Hiram went to Paris to Prayer meeting at night. Healed the weason.

THURSDAY 15.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
 Attended to usual Chores  
 before breakfast. Took  
 the milk to the Station  
 and brought home our flogs  
 Brought some milk from  
 Carothers after dinner and

 quit Chewing Tobacco.

 Parkhill and got through 15-  
 minutes after sunset and  
 brought the machine home

 Hiram at home to milk in the  
 evening then went to prayer meeting.

JULY,

THURSDAY 10.

1890.

Home Near Haulin St<sup>o</sup>

While milking in the morning Hiram told me that he did not propose to work any longer by the month because he could get \$1.25 per day. I told him I did not propose to pay him any more than I had agreed to. He went to Paris without his breakfast and came back before noon and we settled owed him \$3.18. I hauled Riddles a load of coal from Griffith's 5<sup>th</sup> & commenced morning.

FRIDAY 11.

Roff Riddles

Home Near Haulin St<sup>o</sup>  
I took the track clear of the mower to Florence for repairs. Took dinner with Geo. Senn. Got home about two o'clock and found Sammie Palma Tholey here. We put up 29 stooks of hay in the evening and I went to Riddles at night and helped to take care of Roff and let Siff go to bed. Riddles somewhat out of his head.

JULY,

SATURDAY 12.

1890.

Home Near Haulin St<sup>o</sup>

I brought in the Coas as I came from Riddles. Hazy Wilson Needhams and Charley and I hauled in Riddles wheat and stacked it. Charley was to Florence at night on horseback. Received a letter from Wm. Morrison concerning Hiram's leaving and asking me to hold the balance of his wages for him. Masquite unwell during the day.

SUNDAY 13.

Home Near Haulin St<sup>o</sup>

After the morning chores were done Helen and I went to Riddles and helped to take care of the sick man. Attended Sabbath School at Station and after evening work went back to Riddles and worked with him until midnight. Rev. Garland there and talked with him and understood him to answer that he felt that he was saved and was trusting in Jesus. Could only whisper

JULY,

MONDAY 14.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
I called in at Keddles  
and found him resting easy.  
Charley and I hauled and  
stacked part of our wheat  
although we were both  
feeling quite unwell.  
I feel some better in the  
afternoon. Left Ellie  
at night to learn if there  
was any particular change  
at Keddles.

TUESDAY 15.

Robt Keddles Mar Haulin Sta  
Charley took the milk to  
the station. I attended at  
Keddles until he returned.  
Geo Carothers rode in our  
wagon without violation  
and caused me to work. Finished  
stacking our wheat. Took Charley  
to the station. Mailed train.  
McAlmough brought word  
from McKnight that he might  
remain. Robt Keddle very low.  
Sat up all night with him.

JULY,

WEDNESDAY 16.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Station  
Came from Keddles shortly after  
daylight. Took off some honey.  
Went to Paris. Took dinner at  
Wm. Morrison's. Paid Horrus  
wages \$13.00. Slept some in  
afternoon. Very unwell. Sam.  
Thosly and Alma here for Ted.  
Charley tried to babble bird in  
wheel. Charley visited Oak  
field. I brought some meal  
from Florence & went to Keddles  
at night.

THURSDAY 17.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Attended to chores then went  
to Keddles and found there was  
no man person to take care of  
Rest during day and I stayed  
with him. Billy Parkhill came  
in afternoon. Rest. Sermungly  
sinking in the evening. Several  
men in at night. Two Grand  
Army men Pry and Hartford to sit  
up. Rained in the evening and  
I came home at night.

FRIDAY 18.

Home Near Hamlin St  
Spent the day doing  
chores and attending to  
Robt Riddle who was  
lying very low seeming to  
be almost powerless.

Had not moved hand

SATURDAY 19.

Home Near Hamlin St  
Was roused in eleven  
hours of pay partly helping.  
I went to Riddle's in the  
afternoon and found him  
still sucking and lying in  
same position taken at  
ten O'clock Thursday night  
and unconscious ever since.  
I took Charley to the station  
in Riddle's cart on his way  
to Pittsburg. Robt Riddle  
very low only just breathing.

JULY,

SUNDAY 20.

1890.

Home Near Hamlin St  
Arose at sunrise milked  
Dre. Went to Riddle's and found  
that Robt had died at one O'clock  
having lain motionless for 7 hours.  
Packed away without a struggle.  
Went with Maggie Riddle and  
others to pick out place for grave.  
Doctor made post mortem examina-  
tion and found two pieces of  
bone in Riddle's left lung and  
found ball encased in bone at  
end of ~~spine~~ ~~to~~ on backbone.

MONDAY 21.

Home Near Hamlin St  
Arose at 4 O'clock and milked and  
I did two milking. Borrowed Mr.  
Wilson's wagon and went to  
station for friends attend Robert  
Riddle's funeral. Met funeral  
of Davis Buxton at the station.  
Rev. Garland and Rev. Alexander  
spoke at Riddle's and highly  
eulogized him as a citizen,  
a soldier and a Christian. 22  
C. O. R. Men there. Read their  
service at the grave.

JULY,

TUESDAY 22.

1890.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.  
Helen was quite unwell with  
something like dysentery and  
I got Sammie McCalmont to  
take the milk to Station. Helen  
better and I spent most of  
today mowing. Old Cora  
took sick and I did not  
know what was the matter  
with her. She vomited about  
all day and ate nothing. Took  
a drink in the evening.

WEDNESDAY 23.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.  
When I went out for the horses  
at five o'clock I found Cora  
dead. She was nineteen years  
old and capable of doing  
considerable work. Helen quite  
worse, but still working.  
Sammie McCalmont and  
Whe Fulton helped me to  
put up hay. Aunt Jane  
Provins, Aunt Kate Gracy,  
Liz Riddle and Belle Carothers  
here on visit.

JULY,

THURSDAY 24.

1890.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.  
Arose a few minutes after  
four o'clock and did chores.  
Called at Riddle's and harnessed  
their horse for Liz to take Aunt  
Jane Provins on a visit across  
the creek. Spent the afternoon  
burning Old Cora. Amanda  
Cochran did a washing for us.  
I went to Paris at night and  
got some butter. Musted  
rain during day.

FRIDAY 25.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.  
I borrowed Carothers' wagon  
and took the milk to the  
Station. Took Aunt Kate  
Gracy from Riddle's and  
had quite a chat with her  
about some differences that  
had occurred. I took our  
spring wagon to Florence for  
repairs and got some

Called time up by rapping on board

when I arose. Gillie Gracy

Griffith's hand came and we  
employed for them to help  
to mow tomorrow if weather  
were favorable.

TUESDAY 29.

Home Near Haulin Stn  
Arose at four and milked  
seven cows and fermented  
two horses took the milk  
to the station in Crocker's wagon.  
Took Elmer Morrison to station.  
John Griffith mowed for  
us during day and his hand  
came about two o'clock  
and raked and put up  
hay. Weather not very favor-  
able. Threatening rain.

JULY,

WEDNESDAY 30.

1890.

Home Near Haulin' Sta  
 Gellie went to Paris before  
 breakfast for butter.  
 Griffiths and Stansbury  
 helped us all day with our  
 hay. Sammie McGinnis  
 and James Fulton in  
 the afternoon and John  
 McCaughey hauled all  
 day. Put up one large  
 stack and another one  
 ready to top out.

THURSDAY 31.

Home Near Haulin' Sta  
 Slept until five in the  
 morning. Had now slept until  
 after one. Bill Dorman helped  
 me to rub a top on a  
 hay stack and put a little  
 hay in the snow. Left  
 nineteen stacks still in the  
 field. Cut some oats for  
 Kiddle's in the afternoon.  
 Did groceries here. Ate our  
 supper and did milking after

AUGUST,

FRIDAY 1.

1890.

Home Near Haulin' Sta  
 After I had taken the  
 milk to the road we rather sent  
 Gellie I mended some karnes  
 then went and cut out Kiddle's  
 oats at Watson's. Took dinner  
 at home. Took the machine  
 to Parkhill's and cut oats  
 for Griffiths. Ate supper with  
 Mrs McCabe Mrs Hartford and  
 May McCabe of Washington D.C.  
 Did milking after night.

SATURDAY 2.

Home Near Haulin' Sta  
 Arose about half past four.  
 O'clock and Gellie brought in  
 the horses and cows. After the  
 milk was taken to the road  
 Gellie and I went to Parkhill's  
 and finished cutting Griffiths  
 oats. Gellie took Kiddle's  
 mare home and stayed over  
 night. Weather very hot.  
 Griffiths dinner very late  
 coming to the field and Griffiths  
 angry on account of delay.

AUGUST, SUNDAY 3. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Slept until eleven  
O'clock. Did Chores.  
Gillie at Kiddle's until  
I had milking pers done.  
Studied Sabbath School  
The Prodigal Son. Did not  
feel very well, horses were  
tired and buggy harness  
not in readiness for use  
so we did not go to Sabbath

MONDAY 4.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Waked Gillie up at 4 1/2  
O'clock and sent him to Billy  
Boles' and got three balls  
of binder twine. He got  
there before they were out of  
bed. John Griffith brought  
his horse and helped me  
to cut our oats. Fed the  
the chickens and did it  
very poorly. We got through  
between Cendora and  
dark and brought the machine

AUGUST, TUESDAY 5. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Waked Gillie at 4 1/2 O'clock  
and started him to Paris for  
butter but he got none. I was  
very unwell and Ed. Brothers  
went to the station for me.  
Spent most of the day in the house.  
Slept some. Took Kiddle's mace  
home in the evening. Was  
still feeling quite unwell  
at bedtime. Rained some  
during the day.

WEDNESDAY 6.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Gillie helped me with  
the milking and morning  
chores. He and I went to Hor-  
ence and brought home the  
spring wagon. I spent the  
afternoon putting it in  
shape for use. Went to Paris  
at night for butter but  
got none. Did not feel  
well during the day - but  
better than I had been.



AUGUST, THURSDAY 7. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

I brought in the horses and cows and did the milking before breakfast and let cattle sleep.

Had a letter from Charley. Helped Wilson to haul Riddle's oats. Did milking after supper. Griffith came to see about helping me tomorrow with oats and hay. Appearance of rain at night. Helen answered Charley's letter.

FRIDAY 8.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

I took the milk to the station in the morning and Belle went to Florence and got Helen's shoes.

Mr Griffith came in the afternoon and we put up a small stack of our oats and hauled in the last two little loads of our hay. We did our milking all after night.

AUGUST, SATURDAY 9. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After usual chores, milking and so forth, John Griffith came and helped me finish hauling our oats and we cut some timothy in the afternoon for seed. Cut with the binder until rain came on and undertook to load the machine and got the big wheel perpendicular too low and dropped out of place. Heard that Oil had been struck in the Scott well.

SUNDAY 10.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Attended to usual chores. Took family to Eldersville to church. Communion service. Took dinner at Will Thorley's stayed for service in the afternoon. Rev. Rosh did not state where his text was to be found. Heard of the death of Thos Hartner killed by a horse. Mrs Saml Creswell and others. Weather fine.

AUGUST, MONDAY 11. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Attended to usual chores  
in the morning. Borrowed  
McCalmonts. buzzsaw and  
and Helen and attended  
the funeral of Thomas Haster.  
Went to Buzcettstown and  
got our first rental for oil  
purpose \$16 for first month.  
Came home through Florence  
and paid Mr. Cully 3.25 for  
wagon repairs. Weather Cool.

TUESDAY 12.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Ellie helped me with  
the chores in the morning  
I took the milk to the  
station and put a small  
load of hay into the mow  
for kiddles. Ellie and  
I hauled our punnets to  
Griffiths to thresh. Griffiths  
not at home. We ate

 and James Carothers came  
 in just about the time  
 dinner was ready. John stayed  
 with us over night. Hear  
 again Alvin & McCabes child  
 died.

MONDAY 18.

Home Near Haulin Stw  
 John Scott took breakfast  
 with us. I took the milk  
 to the road. Dora McCready  
 came by the morning to  
 work for us. Sent her to  
 G. S. Haulin's to thresh. Spent  
 there and arranged for Riddley  
 and our threshing on Wednesday.

Home Near Haulin Stw.

THURSDAY 21.

Go. Babe waked us up at  
25 minutes before four

time. 80 bu. wheat and  
125 bu. oats. Threshing cost  
us eight dollars. Dora McCready  
was home to a gathering at

grain got wet.

 our wet grain.

SUNDAY 24.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
 Lillie and I did the  
 milking in the morning.  
 Spent the forenoon studying  
 S. L. Lesson. Grace and I  
 attended Sabbath School at  
 the station. So in attendance  
 Lesson quite interesting  
 Subject. Prevailing Prayer.  
 Weather fine and cool.  
 Grace rode Lucy to the  
 station on her mother's saddle.

AUGUST,

MONDAY 25.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
 Attended to usual chores.  
 I took the milk to the  
 station and got our great  
 horse from Midway. Got Riddle's  
 plow home also which they got  
 in return for wheat that they  
 claimed at the mill was musty.  
 Took Riddle's mare to the shop at  
 Paris and had her shod. Went  
 to McAlroy's for butter but got  
 none. Lillie got some at Fulton's.  
 Called at Carothers' at night.

TUESDAY 26.

170 Sevillica St. Pittsburgh Pa.  
 Did usual chores. I took the  
 milk to the road. Did plowing.  
 Lillie and I went to Pittsburgh  
 in the afternoon. Jas. Carothers  
 took us to the station in his  
 one horse road wagon. Met Charley  
 at the depot. Took baskets to Kern's  
 drug store. Visited Cyclorama  
 and saw picture of battle of Gettysburg.  
 Got back to 170 Sevillica St. about eleven  
 o'clock. Rained heavily most of the after-  
 noon.

AUGUST, WEDNESDAY 27. 1890.

1700 Devillier St. Pittsburgh Pa.  
Took breakfast with Frank and  
Joe Carothers, Gillie & Charley.  
Gillie and Charley and I attended  
our regimental Reunion on board  
the steamer Mayflower quite a goodly  
number present both gentlemen and  
ladies. Some dancing on boat. Went  
down to Sewickly. Got back at  
six o'clock. Gillie and I ate lunch on

to the road I washed the  
Spring wagon come and  
we attended the funeral of  
Rachel Boles. Funeral quite  
large. Rev. Bush spoke from  
Isaiah 52. 1st and 2. We took  
supper with Mary Jackson and  
Grandma. Dora McCreedy helped  
Prigmes to thresh. We got home  
a little before nine O'clock

SEPTEMBER, TUESDAY 2. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Sore took the milk to  
the Station. I borrowed  
Kiddie's Luce mare tried  
to drive her in the cart but  
she did not work well. Rode  
her over to Will. Hulon's and  
led her colt. Put her to wagon  
to haul grain from Machine  
she did not work well and  
refused to pull. Had not been  
harnessed since 28<sup>th</sup> of May. Got  
some butter from Aunt Creedy.

WEDNESDAY 3.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Soon as milk was taken to the  
road we hitched up and  
commenced hauling manure.  
After dinner I got Kiddie's  
Luce mare and hauled  
manure with her and our  
two in the afternoon. She  
made a bad move twice as  
though she would not pull but  
finally pulled out. Dora rode  
her to Prigmes meeting at night.

SEPTEMBER, THURSDAY 4.

1890.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.  
After milking and break-  
fast. Dora took the milk to  
the gate, we hitched up the  
team with Riddie's Lucy, and  
our two year old, Bob, and  
hauled manure during the day.  
Hauled in the manure spreader  
after dinner. In the the  
evening two men came and  
bought Lucy and her colt  
for 9 dollars. James Moore  
was called a short time.

dance. Grand Margaret Hanlin sick  
and not there. Floyd Liggett sick

& little shower during the day.



SEPTEMBER, MONDAY 8.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.  
After usual chores  
Lillie and I went to  
A. M. Hardin's and cleaned

seed. Took dinner at  
Hanlin. Gora hauled

refused to work for him

Came out after five  
o'clock. Lillie helped me  
to get in the cows and horses  
and Gora helped me to  
milk. Gora took the milk  
to the station. Lillie with  
him. I cleaned out drift  
from pen and we put  
up a dozen pannels of  
fence in the afternoon  
and repaired manure spades.  
Weather cloudy and damp.

SEPTEMBER, WEDNESDAY 10.

1890.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.  
After usual chores  
Dora and I repaired the  
line fence between Melch  
mont and us to keep our  
cows out of his corn then  
we spent the day while  
dry putting up fence  
along the road. Rained  
considerably after noon.  
Dora went to Wray meeting  
at night.

THURSDAY 11.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.  
After usual chores, I moved the  
vinegar from one barrel into  
two others and we spent  
the day making fence along  
the road. Killed five snakes.  
Wrote a long letter to  
Charley at night. Weather  
so very wet that we  
could not get our manure  
hauled out or feeding done.  
Rained in the evening.

SEPTEMBER, FRIDAY 12.

1890.

Home Mar Haulin Std.  
Arose at five and  
attended to chores. Gillie  
and Dora got the horses  
and cows in. Dora took  
the milk to the station. I  
borrowed some wire from  
Mr. Salmon. Called at  
Fultons in the afternoon  
and paid W. H. \$35  
for harvesting. We put  
up a corner stone and  
a few panels of fence.

SATURDAY 13.

Home Mar Haulin Std.  
After the milk was taken  
to the road I borrowed Riddles  
Mare and Gillie and hauled  
a load of coal from Griffiths for  
ourselves and one to Riddles  
in the afternoon. Rained  
considerably during the day.  
I cleaned out the drain  
on the side of the road  
in the evening and read  
some at night.

SEPTEMBER, SUNDAY 14.

1890.

Home Mar Haulin Std.  
Slept until near seven  
O'clock. Gillie and I did  
chores. Spent forenoon  
studying Sabbath School  
Lesson. Gillie, Brucey  
and I attended Sabbath  
School at station and  
heard Rev. Allen preach  
from Heb. XIII 12.  
Did not get through with  
my evening work until  
8 1/2 O'clock. Day fine.

MONDAY 15.

Home Mar Haulin Std.  
After usual chores Dora  
and I spent the forenoon  
repairing fence then spent  
the afternoon hauling  
manure. Gillie and  
Brucey started to Ocher to  
Hate Haulin at Hamilton  
School house and seemed to  
be well pleased when they came  
home. Rained in the evening  
and night.

SEPTEMBER, TUESDAY 16. 1890.

Home Near Haulm St.  
Took the milk to the  
Station in the morning  
and took a calf for  
Brothers. He went with  
me. In the afternoon  
took a sack of flour to  
Mary Stephenson in Elders-  
ville and got two shoe  
driven on Lug. Took supper  
with Mary. Got some butter  
from Fannie McCreedy.  
Rained some.

WEDNESDAY 17.

Home Near Haulm St.  
After Chores we took some  
wheat to Provinces and  
cleaned it for seed.  
In the afternoon we hauled  
three little loads of lumber  
from the sawmill for E. J.  
Riddle and took supper  
at Riddle's. Maggie's rooms  
again with acute rheumatism.  
Weather fine and clouds  
disappearing.

SEPTEMBER, THURSDAY 18. 1890.

Home Near Haulm St.  
Attended to usual chores in  
the morning and then spent  
the day hauling manure.  
The ground drying off some  
and Carothers commenced  
cultivating what ground he  
had left, mottled of his  
wheat field preparatory to  
drilling it. The other part  
of his field quite green with  
wheat drilled before the rain.

FRIDAY 19.

Home Near Haulm St.  
Dora took the milk to  
the Station. I kindled fire  
and helped to do part of the  
washing. We hauled out  
some manure. Hatched up  
the Colt and Fanny to the  
Spring wagon and went to  
A. M. Haulm's and brought  
home our timothy seed.  
Rained hard in the evening.

SEPTEMBER, SATURDAY 20. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' St  
arise at usual time  
and after chores are done  
we finished hauling manure  
In the afternoon Ellie and  
I went to Paris and got  
some groceries and dry  
goods amounting to \$5.85  
Weather quite cloudy.  
Dora harrowed over  
wheat ground over  
creek. A little too wet  
for good work.

SUNDAY 21.

Home Near Haulin' St  
Ellie Tracy and I  
attended Church at Elders-  
ville and heard Rev. Mc  
Cormie preach from Revela-  
tion 10 & 11. Took dinner at Mary  
Stephenson's with Harry Haulin  
and the McCormick family.  
Attended Church at Leithel  
and heard Saml. Haulin  
preach from Joshua 11 and 2. Rather a comic  
preacher quite young but  
interesting.

SEPTEMBER, MONDAY 22. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' St  
We spent the day on  
our wheat field. Harrows  
in the forenoon and  
drilled some in the  
afternoon. I went to  
Griffitt's and had the drill  
brought home and Dora  
did the teaming. I went to  
J. D. Sutton's place and  
got some butter. Day fine

TUESDAY 23.

Home Near Haulin' St.  
Jno. Griffitt came in  
this morning while he had a  
breakfast for our harrow.  
He finished our harrowing before  
he left we got through with the  
drill after dinner and Dora  
went and helped him to finish  
seeding. I worked some repairing  
our milk cart. Two sewing  
machine men with us for dinner.  
Operated very fine

SEPTEMBER, WEDNESDAY 24.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
I took the milk to the  
gate and brought some  
grapes that Griffiths son,  
I repaired the milk cart  
Dora dug potatoes all day  
and I helped in the after-  
noon. Fell quite unwell  
at night. Dora went to  
Ayer meeting and did not  
expect to be back tonight.  
Weather fine.

THURSDAY 25.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Dora was not with us  
during the day. Cullie and  
I did the milking & I dug  
potatoes during the day.  
Dora came back from  
Stevensville in the evening.  
Weather was fine during  
the day but rained at night.  
Papered twelve dozens of  
eggs at night & send to the  
cush.

SEPTEMBER,

FRIDAY 26.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
I took the milk to the  
Station in the morning  
and spent the afternoon  
hauling lumber and stone  
for Liz. Riddle. Dora  
mowed a brush pile in the  
hollow and attended church  
at Paris in the afternoon  
and helped to do the milking  
in the evening. Weather damp  
and cloudy threatening  
rain at night.

SATURDAY 27.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
After the milk was started to  
the station I went to Paris  
and got Luey shod and got  
some dry goods and groceries.  
Spent most of the afternoon  
repairing the bottom of the  
manure cart. Took a window  
to Riddles in the evening.  
Dora went to Paris & church  
in the afternoon. He grubbed  
four locust trees in the forenoon.

quite cool.

MONDAY 29.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.  
After usual chores I  
took the team to Riddles  
and spent the day hauling  
and peling lumber while  
McLough and Medham were  
putting up a chicken house.  
Dora spent the day digging  
potatoes. Weather very  
favorable with some appear-  
ance of rain in the evening.

SEPTEMBER, TUESDAY 30. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.  
Attended to usual chores  
in the morning and took  
the milk to the station.  
We finished digging our  
potatoes and had perhaps  
26 or 30 Bu. Dora went  
to Paris at night.  
Made out milk account at  
night. Em. Gracey came  
with me from the station  
as far as Riddles.

OCTOBER, WEDNESDAY 1.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.  
I took the milk to the  
gate in the morning then  
Dora and I ground two  
axes, hauled in some stuff  
for a culvert. Went to  
the slab pile at Riddles  
and got load of slabs. Went  
to station and brought Charley  
and Co. Parothers home. Dora  
went to prayer meeting at  
night. Weather cloudy.

OCTOBER, THURSDAY 2. 1890.

Home Near Hanlin St  
Eillie brought in the  
horses and he and I did  
the milking. Took the milk  
and Jo Carothers and Cheryl  
to the station. They were going  
to the Burgett's camp.  
I hauled a load of rails  
and repaired some fence  
in the afternoon. Rained all  
afternoon and threatening  
rain at night.

FRIDAY 3.  
Home Near Hanlin St  
Dora took the milk and  
only to the station for Grothers  
and brought my rats.  
Ercey and Em from Riddle's  
I spent most of the day  
visiting with them and  
then took them to the station.  
Maggie Riddle here with  
them. I went to Paris at  
night and got some butter.  
Weather very fine.

OCTOBER, SATURDAY 4. 1890.

Home Near Hanlin St  
I spent the day repairing  
the fence to keep the salt  
in the field building a  
curel across the spring  
run and grubbing some  
locust sprouts or trees to  
make a new road out  
from our spring house.  
Weather very fine.

SUNDAY 5.

Home Near Hanlin St  
Eillie and I did usual  
chores. Studied Sabbath School  
lesson until time to go to S.  
S. Had some argument with  
Mrs Margaret Hanlin on Free  
Ordination. Heard Rev.  
Allen preach from I Samuel.  
17" 22" 37-49. Very good  
sermon but spoiled by being  
read. Appearance of them  
in the evening.

OCTOBER, MONDAY 6. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.  
We did not ship any  
milk in the morning. It  
was raining and I took  
the children to school and  
spent the forenoon at the  
School House Miss Kate  
Haulin Teacher. Was  
well pleased with the  
School. Spent the Afternoon  
grubbing locust trees &  
shrub out of road. Rained  
in the evening.

TUESDAY 7.

Home Near Haulin St.  
I took the milk to the  
Station and Mr. Gordon  
came from the station with  
me. Dora and I repaired or  
changed a colver and finished  
grubbing for road and bought  
scraper. I prepared old saw  
to put on scraper. Rained  
several showers during the  
day.

OCTOBER, WEDNESDAY 8. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.  
After doing the usual  
chores Dora and I ground  
two Corn catts and went  
to the Cornfield but found  
the corn too wet to cut.  
Repaired Road scraper and  
commenced grading new road  
from water trough to gate.  
Scraper turned over and lever  
fell on my foot and sprained  
it. - and laid me up for the  
evening. Weather clearing.

THURSDAY 9.

Home Near Haulin St.  
After usual chores Dora  
and I took the team and  
tools and went to Riddles  
and dug their potatoes. Got  
through about sunset  
and Willie and I went to  
Gordon for a calf but found  
that it was sold any one.  
My foot did not hurt me  
very much during the day  
but I was careful of it.



OCTOBER,

FRIDAY 10.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Dora took the milk to  
the station and brought  
home our milk money.  
I assorted our potatoes  
and found some rotting.  
We worked on our new  
road in the afternoon.  
Borrowed Riddles mare  
because Samy seemed  
sick with cough. Rained  
in the evening. Dora went  
home.

SATURDAY 11.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Lillie and I did the  
milking and chores.  
I went to Riddle's and  
got their cart and went  
to Burgettstown and got some  
drugs and wire and nails  
&c. Came home through  
Florence and got some  
school books. Was cloudy  
and damp all day. Dora  
away at exposition. Alice  
sick in the night.

OCTOBER,

SUNDAY 12.

1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta  
Had not slept in the fore-  
part of the night on account  
of Alice's sickness. Slept until  
late in the morning. Lillie  
and I did the chores and  
attended Sabbath School at  
the station in the evening.  
Spent nineteen there.  
Rained nearly all day  
and rained very heavy  
in the evening before we  
got home.

MONDAY 13.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
I did the milking and  
took the milk to the road.  
Took the children to school  
in the big wagon and hauled  
a load of coal from McDowell's  
bank for Mrs. Cochran. Took  
ten bushels of wheat to the  
Coop and traded for flour  
and feed. Left 20 lbs. flour  
with Mrs. Cochran. Got home  
after night. Dora cut some corn  
and did evening chores.

OCTOBER, TUESDAY 14. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Stn.  
Sammie McCalmont took  
the milk to the station in  
no place in the morning  
and forgot to put it on the  
train. I notified Mr. McCal-  
mont and he brought it home  
The ears of corn during the  
day. Weather cloudy with  
occasional small showers  
Geo. H. Smiley took supper  
with us came to see our cat.

WEDNESDAY 15.

Home Near Haulin Stn.  
Hauled Chores in the  
morning. Alice sick when  
I came in from sending milk  
Nursed her all forenoon she  
was better in the afternoon  
and I helped Dora to cut  
corn. Rec'd a diagram from  
Miss Kate Haulin of Luke 23  
and 32 did not think it right  
and wrote a note to A. H. Tuller  
for his views. Weather fine.

OCTOBER, THURSDAY 16. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Stn.  
Dora and I finished cutting  
corn in the lower field at noon.  
Rained all afternoon. I went  
to Kiddle's to haul coal but found  
they still had some I did not  
take out. Met the children with  
umbrella coming from school.  
Wrote a letter at night to  
Charley. Lillie a Kiddle's while  
Aunt Liz was away at Pittsburg.  
Dora away at night.

FRIDAY 17.

Home Near Haulin Stn.  
Dora took the milk and a  
calf to the station. I helped to  
do a washing and we went  
to Greffill's bank for coal  
but got none. Brought  
home a sack of cabbage.  
Worked some on road in  
afternoon. Wrote a  
card to Charley at night.  
Weather very fine.

OCTOBER, SATURDAY 18. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.  
After usual chores I took  
the team and went to Griffiths  
bank and took 26 bu of  
Riddles and brought 25  
bu home in afternoon. Sent  
Ellie to Paris for butter.  
Dora cut off some corn  
fodder husked some corn  
for the hogs and worked on  
the road. I went to Florence  
in the evening and came  
home in rain storm.

SUNDAY 19.

Home Near Haulin St.  
Spent most of the  
forenoon feeding and milking  
and studying Sabbath school  
lesson. Attended S. S. at  
the station and heard  
Rev. Kelley preach from  
I saith 42 and 44  
Not a very large turnout  
on account of bad weather.  
Remained considerably in the  
evening. Did our milking  
after night.

OCTOBER, MONDAY 20. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.  
I took the milk to the gate  
after usual chores. Went to  
U. M. Haulin, Mrs. Jno. Haulin  
and John Lawther to sell beef.  
Spent the afternoon working  
on one road and went  
to bring the children from  
school. Went to Carothers'  
at night and had the pigs  
cut out of Ellie's boots.  
Weather cloudy and wet

TUESDAY 21.

Home Near Haulin St.  
After usual chores Dora  
took the milk to the station  
and I went with John  
Provine and John Lawther  
to fix the road near  
Gates and spent the  
day working in the mud.  
Did not accomplish  
very much. Dora went  
to Paris at night. Weather  
very fine.

OCTOBER, WEDNESDAY 22. 1890.

Home Near Hamlin St  
Appendix took the milk  
to the road Dora and I  
went to the road leading  
to the station and hauled  
six loads of stone to  
fill up mud holes. Six  
teams hauling in fore-  
noon and eight in the  
afternoon hauled 42 loads  
and could hardly see.  
What we had done.

THURSDAY 23.

Home Near Hamlin St  
Weather wet all day  
Took the children to school  
in the morning and brought  
them home in the evening.  
Dora and I put some glass  
in our windows. Spent the  
evening singing in the  
book Peace Love and  
Joy.

OCTOBER, FRIDAY 24. 1890.

Home Near Hamlin St  
Dora and I attended to  
chores as usual. We both  
went to the station and took  
the milk and a calf.  
When we came back I went  
to Mr. Fulton's and Mr. Mc  
Creight's to see about beef and  
we killed in the afternoon.  
D. S. Fulton and Gas Brothers  
helping. Alice was sick all  
afternoon and evening. High  
fever on her. Weather cloudy.

SATURDAY 25.

Home Near Hamlin St  
Spent the day doing our  
chores and cutting up and  
distributing beef. Dora took  
beef to D. S. Fulton's, McCreight's  
A. W. Hamlin's, Lautner's and  
Mrs. Cochrane, and took the hide  
to Paris. I carried beef to Brown  
and Billie to Kiddle's. Mrs.  
Morrison came in the evening  
and I took her to Carothers at  
bed time. Weather fine.

OCTOBER, SUNDAY 26. 1890.

Home Near Hanlin St. D.  
Lillie and I did the  
chores. I was very dull and  
sleepy in forenoon and could  
not study very well. Lillie  
& went to Sabbath school on  
horseback. Grace could not  
go for want of dentable  
clothes. Did not get milk  
done until half past seven.  
Ocheking. Weather quite  
cool with indications of rain.  
David Tucker died about 2 P.M.

MONDAY 27.

Home Near Hanlin St. D.  
After feeding and milking  
we took the team and  
hauled stumps on the road  
near Jake Gates. I spent  
the day breaking stone  
and felling pines. Road  
very muddy and a very  
disagreeable job. Several  
teams at work at it.  
Rained considerably  
during the day.

OCTOBER, TUESDAY 28. 1890.

Home Near Hanlin St. D.  
Dora took the milk to  
the station in the morning,  
and husked corn in the  
afternoon. I husked corn  
for the boys but tallow on  
to render it. Attended the  
funeral of David Tucker  
Sr and then went to Flo-  
rence and settled a black-  
smith bill with Andy Poe of  
\$8.30. Brought home a party  
of shoes for Helen. Weather very damp.

WEDNESDAY 29.

Home Near Hanlin St. D.  
After chores I took the children  
to school in the spring wagon  
and called in at John McWannell's  
to see the fowling child and  
found him better. Did some  
soddering of cays and other  
things. Went to Kiddles at  
night and found them at  
Crovanes. Dora attended  
Prayer meeting at night. Rained  
and snowed nearly all day.

OCTOBER, THURSDAY 30. 1890.

Home near Haulin Std  
After usual chores I am  
to the road near Lake Gates  
and spent today pining  
down flat, pass safe over  
a mud hole. When Andy  
Hovine, Thos. Cole, Sam,  
Crisp, and myself the boys  
I did not get through.  
I wrote a letter at night  
to Charley. Snowed consider-  
ably during the afternoon.

FRIDAY 31.

Home near Haulin Std  
Spent the day pining  
strangers over the flat  
on mud holes at gates.  
When I came home I  
found that Alice had been  
sick all day and Lillie  
had not gone to school  
until after dark. I am  
home from station. Alice  
was better when I came  
home. Weather fine.

NOVEMBER, SATURDAY 1. 1890.

Home near Haulin Std  
After doing the morning  
chores I sent Lillie to Paris  
for butter and soda and  
spent most of the day filling  
over our culvert at the Spring-  
house. Buried about 88 heads  
of cabbage in the evening  
as there was some appear-  
ance of further freezing.  
But cleared up about  
sunset.

SUNDAY 2.

Home near Haulin Std  
Lillie and I did the  
milking and other chores  
in the morning intending to  
go to Eldersville to church but  
rain stopped us. We attended  
Sabbath School at Station and  
heard Rev. Allen preach from  
Luke 28 and 49. Did not  
get home until dark and did  
our feeding and milking after

NOVEMBER, MONDAY 3. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Gora took the milk to  
the station and brought Mr.  
Calmont's folks home. He hauled  
a load of slabs from Riddle  
a load of coal from Griffiths  
and some pumpkins from  
Tultra's. I did a washing  
during the day and made out  
some bills for road work for  
Geo. Province at night.

TUESDAY 4.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
After usual chores I took  
the children to school in the  
spring wagon and went to  
Delroyce to the election and  
took some corn to the mill.  
Dora McCready went to the  
election in the afternoon and  
cast his first vote. I cut  
two logs for a Culvert, cut them  
at Province's place without  
permission. Weather cloudy and cold.

NOVEMBER, WEDNESDAY 5. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Arose at usual time  
and attended to chores  
Gora and I hauled two  
Culvert logs and placed  
them. Helen and I went  
to Paris in the afternoon.  
She bought \$3.26 worth of  
goods. I got four shoes  
driven on horses. Took Mrs  
Cochran a barrel of flour.  
Weather very fine.

THURSDAY 6.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
After usual chores, Dora  
spent the day husking corn.  
I hauled a load of coal for  
Mrs Cochran and one for Mrs.  
Riddle. Brought some lumber  
from Riddle's in the evening  
and hauled in a lot of corn.  
Dora had husked during day.  
Weather very fine. Felt  
very unwell about my back  
at night.

NOVEMBER, FRIDAY 7. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Std.  
After several chores Dora  
took the milk to the station.  
I spent the forenoon  
putting in a culvert and  
we spent the afternoon  
scrapping on our new  
road past the milkhouse.  
Told the children of some  
franks in the evening  
before bed time. Weather  
fine.

SATURDAY 8.

Home near Haulin Std.  
After chores I took one  
of Riddles Cows out of our  
Cornfield took her to Melan's  
Dora and I spent most of the  
day working on our new road  
and got it almost finished.  
Took Helen to Florence in the  
evening and got some stone  
sods for Gracey to wear to  
Sabbath School. Weather day

NOVEMBER, SUNDAY 9. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Std.  
Lillie and I did the  
milking about eight o'clock  
and I spent most of the  
forenoon studying for  
Sunday School Lesson Jesus  
before Pilos and Herod.  
Lillie Gracey and I attended  
Sabbath School at Station and  
School was unusually interesting.  
We did not get home until  
dark and did our milking  
after night.

MONDAY 10.

Home Near Haulin Std.

Dora and I attended to  
the Chores and spent the day  
putting the floor in the cow-  
stable in better shape took it  
all up and put two new  
sleepers under. Lillie and  
Gracey at home. No School.  
Institute week. Alice quite  
poorly all day. Her neck and  
jaws swollen like mumps.



NOVEMBER, TUESDAY 11. 1890.

Home Near Hardin Stn  
After usual chores, Gillie  
and I took the milk to the  
Station. When we came home  
Dora was husking Corn and  
we all husked in the  
afternoon and hauled in  
the load. Corn thrown out  
slain. Gillie commenced  
writing a letter to Charley at  
night. Weather cloudy.

WEDNESDAY 12.

Home Near Hardin Stn.  
Did the chores in the  
morning then Dora and I  
went to D. S. Fulton's and  
helped to kill a pig. I  
went to A. M. Doolin's at  
night and to J. P. Luther's  
for our milk money and  
for money for two calves.  
Got the calf money but  
not the milk money. Alice  
quite poorly with shelled  
glaucoma of neck.

NOVEMBER, THURSDAY 13. 1890.

Home Near Hardin Stn  
Gillie and Dora spent  
today husking Corn. I went  
to D. S. Fulton's in the morning  
and got some yeast. I  
Helen attended a party  
at Carothers; I took her  
over on horseback. I spent  
part of the day in the house  
taking care of Alice and  
Grace, and mending shoes  
and soldering tinware. Caught  
some chickens for sale at night.

FRIDAY 14.

Home Near Hardin Stn.  
I took the milk to the  
Station in the morning and  
took some chickens also.  
Sold 12 fair chickens to James  
Gillispie for 50 cts per pair.  
Dora spent the day husking  
Corn and I hauled it in in  
the afternoon. Weather very  
favorable. Spent the evening  
reading in Reddies paper.

NOVEMBER, SATURDAY 15. 1890.

Home Near Hamilton Sta  
After several chores in the  
morning I put one bay  
in the barrel for pickle.  
We finished husking corn  
during the day and got our  
last load in just as it  
commenced raining. Lord  
McCready thought he could  
not stay with me any longer  
and I paid him off. Paid him  
\$15.66, total hire \$4.65.

SUNDAY 16.

Home Near Hamilton Sta  
Billie and I attended to  
chores and he attended church  
at Eldersville and then did  
the feeding in the evening  
while I attended Sabbath  
school and preaching at  
the station. Heard Rev.  
Allen preach from Philip  
ans 1st & 2nd. Very good  
and practical sermon.  
Was after dusk when he  
got through Evening Service.

NOVEMBER, MONDAY 17. 1890.

Home Near Hamilton Sta  
I did the milking and  
fed and harnessed the horses  
before breakfast. Took the  
milk to the road took the  
children to school in the  
Spring Bayou. Went to Mr.  
Cuffel's bank for coal and  
got some slack. Took a cow  
to Mr. Wilson's put up some  
hay to dry and made a dram  
on the road. Rained in the  
evening.

TUESDAY 18.

Home Near Hamilton Sta  
Arose at 4 1/2 o'clock and  
milked six cows and fed  
and harnessed them and the horses.  
Took the milk to the station.  
Went to Cuffel's bank in the  
afternoon and brought home  
twenty five bushels of coal  
with the horses. Had quite a  
pleasant time singing in the  
evening from the old book called  
The Jubilee. Evening very clear  
and pleasant.

NOVEMBER, WEDNESDAY 19. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock.  
And did the usual chores  
before breakfast. Spent  
the day putting a hop cut-  
vert in our new road and  
dig and shoveled some  
to drain the water off  
the road. Fanny seemed  
to be sick when we were  
feeding in the evening but  
better later. Spitting snow at  
bed time.

THURSDAY 20.

Home Near Haulin St.

Arose 5 O'clock and  
found that I had not  
heard the alarm. Helen  
and Ellie helped me  
to get the milk off. I  
spent the day making our  
new road near the milk  
house. Mr. White of Wells,  
Chicago was with us over night  
trying to sell soldiers magazines.  
We caught and digens chickens.

NOVEMBER, FRIDAY 21. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock.  
Mr. White of Wellsburg  
took breakfast with us.  
Stok the milk to the station  
and two dozens of chickens.  
Eammie Hooley took dinner  
with us. I attended Kiddle's  
corn husking in the afternoon  
at Barber's and hauled a load  
of corn for them. Got through  
husking about three O'clock.  
Edora milking after night.

SATURDAY 22.

Home Near Haulin St.

Arose at usual time and  
did usual chores. Ellie  
went to Paris and got some  
coffee. I took Ellie and  
Grace to Florence and got  
some shoes and some  
clothing. Lewis Amund  
and Grand Haulin here  
until bedtime and we had  
a good time.

NOVEMBER, SUNDAY 23. 1890.

Home near Hamlin Stn  
Slept until late.  
Spent the forenoon feeding  
attending to stock and  
preparing my Sabbath  
School lesson. Lillie  
Grace, and I went to  
the station to Sabbath School  
at mid O'Clock. Pretty good  
turn out, and lessons  
were quite interesting.

MONDAY 24.

Home near Hamlin Stn  
After usual chores I  
spent an hour or so reading,  
then took our hoghead to  
Paris and got two hogs  
put on it and got two  
shoes driven on Lucy.  
Bought a set of cups and  
saucers and a new lantern.  
Hauled a load of wood for  
butchering. Went to D. S. Fulton  
for help for butchering. Weather  
fine.

NOVEMBER, TUESDAY 25. 1890.

Home near Hamlin Stn  
Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and  
milked six cows and fed the  
horses and humped one before  
breakfast. We killed three  
hogs during day. D. S. Fulton and  
J. Carothers helping me. Fred  
Carothers shot and made squeal  
hog. Carothers shot it and stuck it  
and afterward it got up and  
ran away. Got the hogs carried in  
and heads cut up. Weather fine

WEDNESDAY 26.

Home near Hamlin Station  
Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and  
attended to usual chores.  
Cut up three hogs in the  
forenoon and prepared the  
lard for rendering. I took  
the spring wagon to the station  
and brought J. Carothers and  
Charley home. Had to drop  
milking after night. Weather  
quite cool. Spitting snow  
some during the day.

NOVEMBER, THURSDAY 27.

1890.

Home Near Haulin St  
Charley fed and harnessed  
the team for me in the  
morning and then he spent the  
day hunting with "Nick Dambury"  
and J. Carothers. Took the  
milk to the station. Dressed  
our sausage in the afternoon  
and cut it at night.  
Charley and J. went back to  
the burg in the evening.  
Got snow some.

FRIDAY 28.

Home Near Haulin St  
After several chores I  
took the milk to the  
station and Lillie went  
to visit friends in Jefferson  
Township. I repaired some  
cans in the afternoon and  
went to Kiddle on an  
errand. Tracy and I found  
some passage at night  
and had a very tedious time  
as the grinder did not  
work well.

NOVEMBER, SATURDAY 29.

1890.

Home Near Haulin St  
Lillie being away I had  
all the chores to do myself.  
Went to Griffiths bank for  
coal for kiddles and got only  
12 bu coal and about 10  
bu slack. When I got home  
I was too late to go to  
Flora's. Lillie got home  
at dusk after feeding was  
done. Read some at night.  
Weather fine & warmer.  
Retired about eleven o'clock.

SUNDAY 30.

Home Near Haulin St  
Left until eight o'clock. Had  
been retiring late for several  
nights. Lillie did the feeding  
and cleaned up the flatts. I  
did the milking. Attended  
church at Eldersville and  
heard Rev. McCornick preach  
from Luke 20 & 28. Took  
dinner at Mary Stephensons  
and attended Sabbath school  
at the station. Came home for  
fore preaching to attend to two fresh  
cows and the other chores.

DECEMBER, MONDAY 1. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' St.  
Arose at 4 $\frac{1}{2}$  O'clock. Milked eight  
Cows and did usual feeding. Tried  
to repair a bed stid but failed.  
In afternoon went to Barbara's &  
disposed of a calf. Went to Florence  
and settled school tax and stove  
bill and was accepted. Brought  
Gracey home from school.  
Snowed nearly all day but did  
not accumulate much on  
the ground.

TUESDAY 2.

Home Near Haulin' St.  
Arose at 4 $\frac{1}{2}$  O'clock.  
Milked eight and milked eight  
Cows fed and harned four horses  
and harned two of them before  
breakfast. Took the milk  
to the station and brought  
Liz. Riddle from the house.  
Helped Proomes and Riddle's  
to put on their hay and  
had to do over milking after  
night. Weather cold.

DECEMBER, WEDNESDAY 3. 1890.

Home Near Haulin' St.  
Took the milk to the gate  
then went to Carothers' and  
helped him load a calf into the  
wagon. Helped Riddle's & cut  
up and salted their pork and  
mix their sawsage. Did over  
milking after night. Rained  
nearly all day and turned cold  
in the evening. Ellie and  
I killed a pole cat at night.

THURSDAY 4.

Home Near Haulin' St.  
Arose at 4 $\frac{1}{2}$  O'clock Milked  
and fed eight Cows fed the horses  
and harned one took the  
milk to the road and spent the  
forenoon helping Helen to prepare  
for washing cleaning out stables  
foddering cow etc. Hauled  
two loads of coal from Griffiths  
bank. Left five bushels at  
Mrs. Cochems of last load. Left  
the last load at the bottom to take  
to Riddle's. Recd payment for Riddle's

DECEMBER, FRIDAY 5. 1890.

Home Near Haulm St  
Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and  
arranged the pens milked  
and fed eight cows fed and  
harnessed the horses before break-  
fast. I took the milk to the  
station and learned that J.  
McCalmont was making arrange-  
ments to change our farm for  
hauling milk. Hauled a load of  
coal & kiddles in the afternoon and  
took a cow to Williams. Did our  
milking after night. Weather  
fair.

SATURDAY 6.

Home Near Haulm St  
Attended to usual things  
before breakfast took the  
milk to the road. Filled  
up some wheat said took it  
to Holliday's mill  
and learned that wheat was  
only worth 90cts per bushel  
while bran and shorts were at  
1.25 per hundred pounds and  
the miller was grinding wheat  
for chop feed. Got home  
near dark. Weather wet.

DECEMBER, SUNDAY 7. 1890.

Home Near Haulm St  
Was quite late when we  
arose. Gillie helped me to  
do the feeding and milking.  
Gillie Gracey and I attended  
Sabbath school at Haulm  
Station. Good turnout and  
lesson quite interesting. Quite  
a number of strangers present.  
We got home about dusk  
and had to do our milking  
after night as usual.

MONDAY 8.

Home Near Haulm St  
Arose at usual time  
and did usual chores.  
Morning was rough and  
stormy with a snow on the  
ground and still snowing.  
Took the children to school  
in the spring wagon, not having  
the sled ready. Went to the woods  
in the afternoon and got a pole  
for a tongue. Borrowed Kiddle's  
sled and brought the children  
from school.

DECEMBER, TUESDAY 9. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St  
Arose at usual time and  
attended to usual chores.  
Took the milk to the station  
and Smith & Creight went  
with me. I took some grinding  
to Quax Mill for Kiddle's  
and came home past school  
house and brought load of  
children on their way home.  
Weather fine but some-  
what windy.

WEDNESDAY 10.

Home Near Haulin St  
Arose at four o'clock and  
did the chores before breakfast.  
Took the milk to the station  
on the sled. Filled up a  
load of grain and took it  
to Quax Mill and brought  
Kiddle's grinding home.  
Learned that Jim Griffith  
had been thrown from a  
load of hay and badly hurt.  
snow melting

DECEMBER, THURSDAY 11. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St  
Arose at usual time  
and did usual chores.  
Took train and sled to Griff-  
fitts and brought home some  
slack. Griffiths in bed suffering  
from his fall of sled load  
of hay. Tied up some trees  
to keep rabbits from them.  
Was very low after spring  
corns. Snow nearly all  
melted off.

FRIDAY 12.

Home Near Haulin St  
Arose at usual time and  
did usual chores. Was  
stormy that I thought that  
Caroline would not fetch  
and I took the milk to the  
station. When I came back  
found him and Mr. Fulton at  
work on the hay, and I went and  
helped them. Made some prepara-  
tion at night to attend Teacher  
Institute tomorrow in Smith  
township



DECEMBER, SATURDAY 13. 1890.

Home Near Hamilton Sta  
After doing the morning  
chores I went to D. S. Fulton's  
and he and I attended a  
Teacher's Institute at the  
Senan School house and had  
a good time. Came home past  
John McLaugh's and paid for  
our colts and Kiddle's.

Did our milking after  
night. Nellie paid the  
feeding nearly all day  
I got some weather fine

SUNDAY 14.

Home Near Hamilton Sta  
Slept until late and  
after chores were done,  
I spent some time studying  
Sabbath School lesson  
Nellie Grace, and I at-  
tended Sabbath School at  
Hamilton Station and heard  
Rev. Allen preach from Luke  
20: 41-42. Good sermon  
and weather very fine.  
Wagon, Kiddle and Becca pro-  
vide and home with us.

DECEMBER, MONDAY 15. 1890.

Home Near Hamilton Sta  
After usual chores I  
took the milk to the station  
in the spring wagon. P.  
McCalmont with me on his  
way to Pittsburg. Went to  
the mill in the afternoon for  
chopping. Grace sick and  
could not go to school, was  
better in the evening. I greased  
the boots and shoes at night.  
Some appearance of snow at  
night.

TUESDAY 16.

Home Near Hamilton Sta  
Arose at four o'clock  
and did usual chores.  
Went to Griffiths bank  
and brought home 25¢  
of coal. Called in to see  
Mr. Griffith and found him  
somewhat better. Helped D. S. Ful-  
ton to butcher pigs in the  
afternoon and Nellie had  
the feeding done when I got home  
Wrote to Charley at night.  
Snowing.

DECEMBER, WEDNESDAY 17. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Found quite a deep snow  
on the ground and still  
snowing when I got up. Snowed  
all day. Mr. Wilson took all the  
milk to station. So stormy our  
children could not go to school.  
I did some little harness  
mending. After supper I  
went to Kiddle's to see how  
they were getting along and  
found them quite comfortable.  
Snow about knee deep.

THURSDAY 18.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Arose at four o'clock and  
trilled fire and shoveled  
snow out of paths and milked  
cows before breakfast.  
Spent nearly all the day  
shoveling snow about the  
house and on the road to  
the gate. Snow almost  
knee deep and weather quite  
mild. Felt quite tired in  
the evening.

DECEMBER, FRIDAY 19. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Arose 20 minutes before  
five o'clock - later than  
usual and did the usual  
chores. Took the milk to the  
station. John Provins and  
Hugh Wilson both went  
and I had small load. Went  
to Paris in afternoon and  
got some shoeing done. Lillie  
went with me. Called in to  
see Griffith and found fine  
home better. Snow very deep.

SATURDAY 20.

Home Near Haulin Sta.  
Arose a few minutes after four  
o'clock and attended to usual  
chores. Sammie McCalmont took  
the milk to the station. I shoveled  
snow from clothesline, shoveled  
out a load of coal. Had a very  
serious time getting the cows fed  
down in the deep snow. Took  
the team to Griffith's and got the  
old sleigh I had traded for. Helped  
Mr. D. to move onto another bed with  
his crippled hip. Went to Paris for

DECEMBER, SUNDAY 21. 1890.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.  
Slept until quite late.  
Lillie and I did the feeding  
and milking. Was raining  
heavily all day and we did  
not attend church or sabbath  
school. Spent most of the day  
studying over Sabbath school  
lessons preparing for review  
next Sabbath. Snow very  
deep but soft and sinking  
quite rapidly.

MONDAY 22.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.  
Arose a few minutes after  
four o'clock and did usual  
chores. I took the milk to the  
station in the sled. When I got  
home I took Helen and Alice to  
Wilson's in the afternoon and  
got two posters we then went  
to Reddell's and made a call before  
feeding time. After I ate supper  
I took six and a half dozens of eggs  
to Wilson's to ship to Pittsburgh.  
Weather very fine.

DECEMBER, TUESDAY 23. 1890.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.  
After usual morning  
chores I took the team and  
took the children to school on  
the sled. Hauled 50 bushels  
of coal on the sled for Reddell's  
which was paid for on the scaffold.  
I went to Paris and bought some  
little things for Christmas.  
We did our milking after  
night. Snow melting off some  
but sledding pretty good.

WEDNESDAY 24.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.  
Arose at usual time and did  
usual chores before breakfast.  
I took our milk, Provines &  
Wilson's to the station, it's first  
time in the new company.  
Brought Ell. ~~Wilson~~ to Wilson's  
and took Mrs. M. Calmont  
and Rob. to Mr. Calmont's. Went  
to the school house in the evening  
and brought the children  
home from school. Weather fine.

DECEMBER, THURSDAY 25. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.  
Arose at usual time and did the usual chores before breakfast. Took the milk to the forks of the road to John Provinces. Hauled some fodder during the day. Children seemed to be enjoying Christmas very much. Jo Carothers and Frank got home from Pittsburg and brought something from Charley for us.  
Snowing at night.

FRIDAY 26.

Home Near Haulin St.  
After usual chores I took the milk to the forks of road to Mr. Wilson. Snow very deep and still snowing. Spent most of the day talking to Ed. Carothers and Frank. Did not feel well in the afternoon. Back hurting and was quite nervous and trembly.

DECEMBER, SATURDAY 27. 1890.

Home Near Haulin St.  
Attended to usual chores in the morning then took the milk to the station. Helen made some chicken cheese and I took it to Carothers and Frank took it with him to Pittsburg. Spent most of the afternoon putting a tongue in our sled and did not get through. Was quite stormy all day, snowing and snow very deep.

SUNDAY 28.

Home Near Haulin St.  
Arose a few minutes after seven o'clock and Gillie and I attended to feeding. I took a horse and dragged out fodder for cows. Gracey and I went to station in sleigh to Sabbath School. School not very large. There was no preaching. Snow so deep and drifted that it was almost impossible for preacher to get there. Getting colder in the evening.

DECEMBER, MONDAY 29. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Stn.  
Arose at four O'clock  
and attended to usual  
chores. Took the milk to  
Provine's forks. Broke road out  
team. Took Lillie part way  
to school in sleigh. Sluck in  
snow drift and shoveled  
out. Finished putting  
tongue in sled. Weather  
not very cold. J. Carothers and  
Mary and their father are a short  
time ago started back to Redbank.

TUESDAY 30.

Home Near Haulin Stn.  
Arose at 4 O'clock. Did usual  
chores took milk to Wilson's.  
Went to Needham's and got help  
to haul hay. Mr. Needham and  
Jas Carothers helped me to haul  
five sled loads. Carothers took  
the children to school and brought  
them home again. Weather was  
fine but snow too deep for  
comfortable getting about.

DECEMBER, WEDNESDAY 31. 1890.

Home Near Haulin Stn.  
Attended to usual  
chores in the morning  
and took the milk to the  
station in the sled.  
Willie Needham and  
James Carothers came to help  
me haul hay. We got one  
load hauled in before dinner  
and then it rained so that  
we did no more. Went to  
school after the children,  
and brought them home in  
the sled. Snow still  
melting off at bed time and  
seemingly danger of a great flood.  
The year closed and not  
much in this book of any  
great account to myself or  
any one else.
