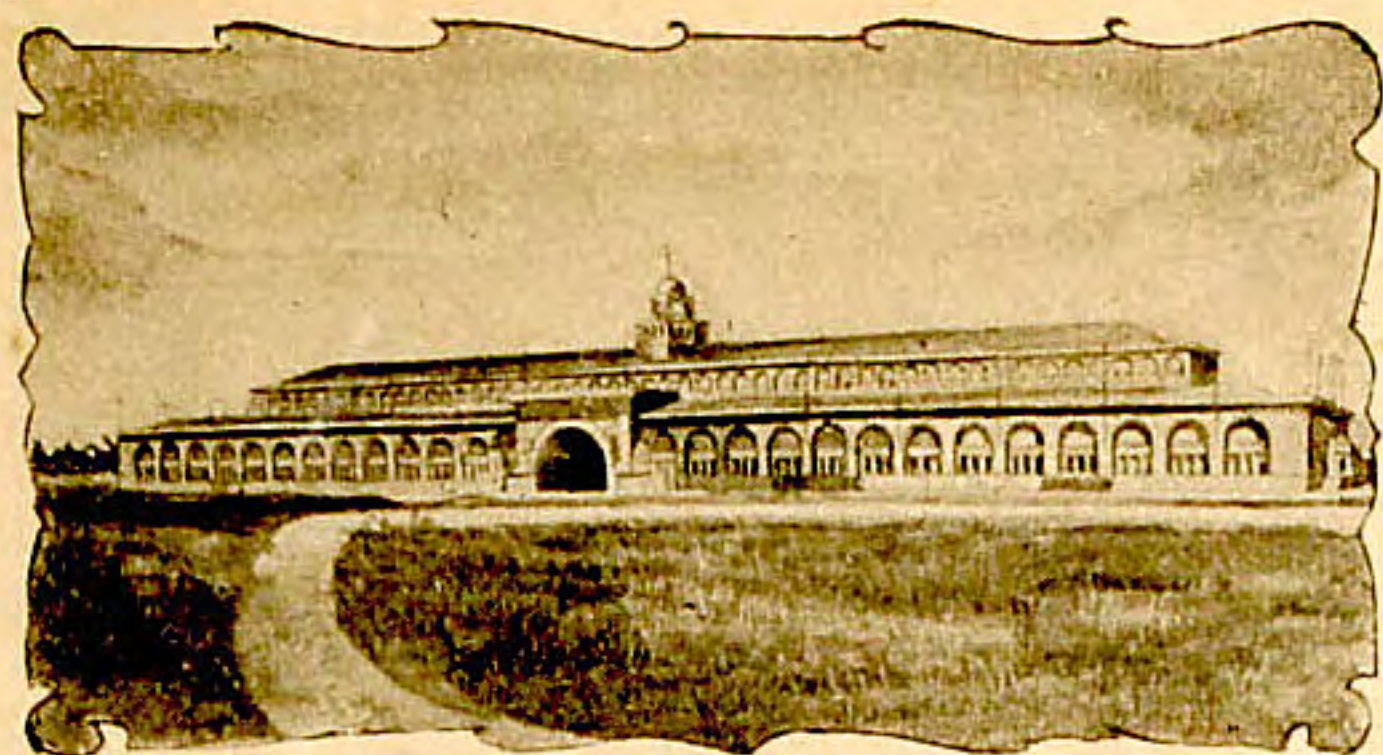

Explanation of the Currencies of the various Countries.

AUSTRIA AND RUSSIA.—The Paper Currencies are continually subject to important fluctuations.

In FRANCE, BELGIUM, SWITZERLAND, AND ITALY, 1 franc=100 centimes. GERMANY, 1 mark=100 pfennig. HOLLAND, 1 florin or gulden=100 cents. NORWAY, SWEDEN, AND DENMARK, 1 kroner=100 öre. UNITED STATES, 1 dollar=100 cents. SPAIN, 1 peseta=100 centavos. AUSTRIA, 1 florin=100 kreuzer. PORTUGAL, 1 milreis=1000 reis. GREECE, 1 drachma=100 leptas. TURKEY, 1 piaster=40 paras. RUSSIA, 1 rouble=100 copecks.

Italian notes and silver are not current in France, Belgium, and Switzerland, but the silver of these countries passes current in Italy.

SUN. JAN. 1, 1893 *Wep.* THER.

Home Near Haulin Ste.

Weather was very unfavorable and spent the entire day at home.

Studied Sabbath School lesson for today and also for next Sabbath. Thought some of going to Eldersville to church last night but the inclemency of the weather prevented.

Read the Wesleyan Methodist almost through at night about to change its form.

WEA.

MONDAY 2 *Snowing* THER.

Home Near Haulin Ste.

Lillie helped me with the Chores. I took the sled to the road in the sled then went to Kiddle's and got some lumber to put bottoms in sled-box. Put a new tongue in the sled in the afternoon.

Read an hour or more at noon. Weather not very cold but snowing some during day.

Made out our milk account at night 437 gallons for last month.

WEA. Cloudy TUES. JAN. 3, 1893

THUR.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Slept until fifteen minutes to six and then we were hurried to get the milk off in time.

I handed water in cans for Helen to wash with. She did a small washing in the afternoon.

I made a bottom for our sled-bed. We were late getting through with milking in the evening.

Sledding not very good.

WEA. Cold Snowy WEDNESDAY 4

THUR.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

I took the milk to the station in the morning and did not get home until noon.

I forgot something and went back after I had started home then lost the mail and went back from Cold Spring into Gate's place. Mr. McCreight found mail.

Repaired Stauncheon in cow stable and went to D. S. Patton at night to get help to butcher beef tomorrow. Weather blustery.

WEA. Wind Stormy THUR. JAN. 5, 1893

THUR.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at four o'clock and did usual chores. Went to Province's for help to butcher beef. He dressed a beef that weighed about 828 lbs. Did not get through until three o'clock.

And then I took a hind quarter of beef weighing 212 lbs to Collins to Crep Brothers.

Got home about 7 1/2 o'clock and after supper I found that Helen and the children had done the milking.

WEA. Cold Snowy FRIDAY 6

THUR.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Spent the forenoon doing usual chores and did some ridding up after butchering beef. Took a load of corn to Florence in the evening to get ground for feed.

Was very late getting milking done. Ebbie did most of the feeding and went to Hamilton School House at night to literary. Gracy did not go to school.

WEA. Cold SAT. JAN. 7, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin St.

Arose at four o'clock and did usual chores. Lillie took pain in his breast while feeding and had to quit. We went to Will. Melvin's in sled and attended Family Reunion with Robert and Annie Hamilton. We did not get there until after one o'clock. Thirty-six persons ate dinner. Had a very pleasant time. Got home about dusk. Helen helped me to milk. Lillie not feeling well.

WEA. Cloudy Cold SUNDAY 8 THER.

Home Near Haulin St.

Did not attend church anywhere during the day. After doing feeding in the morning I harnessed the team and went to Riddle's and brought Grand Ma Haulin home with me in the sled. Met Lillie Haulin at Riddle's. Ate dinner there. Studied Sabbath School lesson some in the afternoon. Threatening snow at night.

WEA. Snowing MON. JAN. 9, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin St.

Arose at 4 1/2 and milked nine cows and fed and hayed them and shod horses before breakfast and harnessed two horses. Took the milk to the station and went to Eldersville and paid John Crippen \$1.50 on a note. Went to Florence in the afternoon and got some grinding that was there and did not get home until dusk. Did our milking after night. Got very stormy in the evening snow drifting around us.

WEA. Very Cold TUESDAY 10 Stormy THER.

Home Near Haulin St.
Grandma Haulin was with us in the morning and when I got through with chores I took her in Sleigh to Bergetstown and was quite cold when I got there. Called on Dr. Redelle and got some medicine for liver-trouble. Did not get home until dusk. Then had nine cows to milk after supper. Water froze in our trough and quit running.

WEA. ^{Very Cold} WED. JAN. 11, 1893 ^{morning} THER.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

Gellie helped me to do the feeding in the morning and get ready to go to the station. I took the milk to the station and did not get home until near noon. Learned that Mr. Boles jr. had died last night in Pittsburgh. Spent the afternoon watering stock and getting the water trough spout into horse trough but at bed time it was closed up again. Snowing very fast at nine o'clock. Suffering with cold in my head.

WEA. ^{Cold Stormy} THURSDAY 12 ^{Deep snow} THER.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

Found the snow very deep in the morning and still snowing. Spent the day sweeping paths and shutting up the milk house so as to keep water in the horse trough. Cutting holes in ice for cattle to drink to and later in the evening I partly cut up 2 quarters of beef. Gracy was not feeling well and did not go to school. Gellie walked through the snow.

WEA. ^{Cold} ^{day} ^{now} FRI. JAN. 13, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

Arose at five and Gellie & I attended to usual chores. I went to Mrs. Needham's in the morning and engaged Willie to help me haul hay in the afternoon, but I was so unwell that we only got two loads in. I finished cutting up one. Lay at night and was still much troubled with pains in my bowels. Snow was too deep and weather too cold for Gellie to go to literary at night.

WEA. ^{Cold} ^{morning} SATURDAY 14 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Stn.

I felt quite unwell when I arose but got better during day. I took the milk to the station. Train was late. Will. Medham helped us to haul hay in the afternoon. He and Gellie put the loads on and brought them in and I helped them to unload. We put in five loads and finished the stack. Some snow falling nearly all day enough to make it disagreeable hauling.

WEA. Cold. Snow on the ground
SUN. JAN. 15, 1893

THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.
Slept until almost eyes
a clock. Did not attend church
or Sabbath School any place during
the day. After I got through
with chores I read some in
the Wesleyan Methodist. Gracey
commenced reading the Bible
through by course and read
through Genesis. Weather quite
cold and snow pretty deep.

WEA. Clear Cold
MONDAY 16

THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.
Hurried about in the morning
and attended to feeding and chores.
I took Mrs E. J. Riddle in sleigh
and attended the funeral of John
McConnell Sr. Quite a good turn
out at the house but not a very
large procession to the graveyard at
Lawrence perhaps on account of the
cold weather. Rev. Storer of the M. E.
Church officiated. It rained
not very deep.

WEA. Clear Cold
TUES. JAN. 17, 1893

THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Gillie rendered good service, attending
to feeding and harnessing the horses while I did
the milking. After I had taken the milk to the
road I kindled a fire and carried some
coal and put on the heat for washing.
Took the children to school in the sled.
Helped Helen to wash in the afternoon
and went to school and brought the
children home. Gracey was not well.
Weather quite cold, snow deep and
shedding pretty good but slavish on horses.

WEA. Clear for some
WEDNESDAY 18 Snowy evening
THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Gillie got out very readily in the
morning and helped me to do chores. I took
the milk to the station. James Carothers
and Maggie Riddle were with me.
Carothers went to Pittsburgh. Spent the
afternoon doing more chores, opening
holes in ice for cows to drink from,
cleaning tables, mixing cow feed
&c. Gracey was not well during day.
As I did not get to school. Weather
milder in the evening & snowing.

WEA. Cold ^{knowing} THUR. JAN. 19, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Arose at usual time and
Billie was easily soothed and
helped manfully with the feeding.
I mended a broken biddle
in the forenoon and carried
up our cans. In the afternoon
I attended to opening up pools
for the watering of Cattle and
tried to repair my sled bed some
but found I had not bolts
long enough. Weather fair

WEA. Clear Cold FRIDAY 20 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
After Chores were done in
the morning and the milk taken
to the road, I took the children
to school in the sled and went
from thence to Gal. Smith's bank
and brought home 25 bushels of
Coal in the sled. Went for Gracey
again in the evening. Billie remained
at the school house for literary.
Alice was not well during the
day. Snow melted a little where the
sun shone.

WEA. Moderating SAT. JAN. 21, 1893 ^{Snow on} THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Nothing unusual during
day. I took the milk to the
station and when I came home
I spent some time reading.
In the afternoon I did the usual
amount of breaking ice to get
water for Cattle, cleaned out the
water trough and buried it with
snow. C. M. Haulin's family and
Eliza Haulin came and stayed until
bed time. Alice sick all day.
Billie quite poorly with cold.

WEA. Clear SUNDAY 22 THER.

Snow on the ground
Home Near Haulin Station.
After doing Chores, I went in sleigh to Eldersville
to attend church and was there for Christian
Endeavor there being no preaching. Was well
pleased with the exercises. Miss Anna
Stephenson, leader. Rem home for dinner
and went back to Eldersville at night.
Maggie Middle with me. We heard
Rev. Taylor preach from I John IV 14-17
& "God is Love." Good sermon. One
forward for prayers and four joined the
Church. Eleven O'clock when I got home.

WEA. ^{Soft Snowing} MON. JAN. 23, 1893 THER.

Home Near Hankin Stw.

After taking the milk to the road as usual, I felt very unwell and did not do much in the forenoon. After dinner I mended a coal shovel and Ellie's little sled and Alice's little rocking chair and went to meet Gracey with the sleigh in the evening. She had ear ache after she came from school. Ellie and Alice both very poorly with cold.

WEA. Moderate TUESDAY 24 THER.

Home Near Hankin Stw.

Attended to chores as usual. Ellie not able to be out to help. I took the children to school in sled. Alice quite poorly had earache at night. I went to Dal Smith's bank and got 25 lbs of coal. Sledding good. Made three copies of a letter at night from Frankfort Springs a chair raising money to build a parsonage.

WEA. Clear WED. JAN. 25, 1893 ^{Thawing} THER.

Home Near Hankin Stw.

Attended to usual chores in the morning. Ellie was able to help me to hitch up the team. I took the milk to the station, and afternoon started to Smith's bank for coal and when I got as far as Brown's learned that there was no coal out. Came home and filled up a sled load of wheat to take to the station.

Ellie brought home a puzzle in the evening, - a piece of pasteboard cut in four pieces and put together one way made 64 sq. in and another 65 square inches.

WEA. Snow melting THURSDAY 26 THER.

Home Near Hankin Stw.

Arose at usual time, fed and milked nine cows, fed and harnessed the team before breakfast.

After I had taken milk to the road Ellie and I loaded a little over 27 bushels of wheat on the sled and I took it to the station. Jas. A. Beall came in the evening and got 13 1/2 bu of wheat which I had borrowed and he and I took a load each to the station in the evening. I spent some time looking for a bell lost off our string.

WEA. ^{Cloudy damp and freezing} FRI. JAN. 27, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Nothing unusual in the morning. Took the children to school in the sled and went to Dal Smith's bank and brought home 13 bushels of coal. Showed a puzzle to Smith, Geo. Cassidy and James Provis. It was pasteboard cut to represent 54 inches square when put together one way and 63 in. when another way.

WEA. ^{Shawing} SATURDAY 28 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

I took the milk to the station in the sled in the morning. Russell Wilson and D. S. Fulton and his wife went with me and Russell and Miss Ella Russell came home with me. In the afternoon I went to Dal Smith's bank and got 17 bushels of coal and cleaned off the scaffold. Put up some forks in the stable on which to hang our harness. Snow melting off lively in the afternoon.

WEA. ^{Snow melting off} Warm Clear SUN. JAN. 29, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Slept until after seven o'clock. Spent the entire day and evening at home. Did not feel just comfortable not attending Divine service anywhere. Sabbath School at Haulin Sta. seemed to have dwindled to very small proportions, and being at an hour which caused me late evening chores especially on the evening of preaching service, which was every two weeks I concluded not to go although I was Supt.

WEA. ^{Warm} Morning Cold. Snowed some. ^{Warmer in evening} MONDAY 30 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After usual morning chores I cut some wood, skinned a pig, prepared some tallow and rendered it in the afternoon. Cleaned out the troughs in the milkhouse. Weather was very unpleasant in the afternoon. Snowed considerably and the snow was quite soft at night. Did our milking after night.

WEA. ^{Cool} TUES. JAN. 31, 1893 ^{Snow on the ground} THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

After chores I took the children to school in the sled then went to Smith's bank and brought home a load of coal before dinner and another 25 bushels in the afternoon and did our milking after night as usual. Not very much snow on the ground but sledding pretty good.

WEA. Wet. WED. FEB. 1 ^{Foggy} THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Ellie helped me with the chores in the morning and I took the milk to the station on the sled although the snow seemed nearly gone. Helen was very poorly all day and in bed most of the time. Had a severe cold and something like Rheumatism in left lower limb. Gracey stayed home from school and did the work and got along very well. Rained nearly all afternoon.

WEA. Dry Rain and freezing THUR. FEB. 2, 1893 THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Helen was unable to rise in the morning and was quite unwell all day. Gracey and I did the housework. Jim Carothers and Bella came in the afternoon and Mrs Wilson in the evening to see her. She was better in the evening having sat up all afternoon.

It was very uncomfortable getting about over the ice all day but was getting some when I got through with the evening chores.

WEA. Clear Warm FRIDAY 3 THER.

Children gave me birthday present ^{Helen wrote all night} taffy & pop corn
Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Arose at 4 1/2 o'clock and did usual chores. Gracey got breakfast. Helen not able to be about. Maggie Riddle came in the morning and did the washing and baked some mince and did other work. I took some corn to Florence in the afternoon to get ground for cow feed, but mill was not running. Did not get evening work done until nearly nine o'clock. Ellie remained at the school house to attend literary. Got quite cold and windy in the evening.

WEA. *Clear Cold* SAT. FEB. 4, 1893

THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Arose at 4 1/2 o'clock and Gillie and I attended to Chores as usual then I took the milk to the station in the spring wagon. John McCalumot rode with me. Had a heavy load and the road was quite rough. Maggie Riddle was here visiting. I went to Florence in the afternoon for wood and gave a poor family their usual food, a bucket of corn meal. Did our milking after night. ~~Went to mine~~
~~at 10 o'clock when I got through~~

WEA. *Clear* SUNDAY 5

THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Spent the day at home. Was too late to go to church when I got through feeding. Studied Sabbath School lesson some for today and read in bible and Wesleyan Methodist. Did milking after night as usual.

Helen feeling pretty well recovered from her peckfell. Threatening snow in the evening.

WEA. *Wet* MON. FEB. 6, 1893

THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

When I awoke in the morning I found it raining. Took the children to school in the spring wagon. Went to Carothers' and got some buttermilk for our pig. Cut out a puzzle from paper. Went to A.M. Hamilton's and got my hair cut. Did milking after night as usual. Rained nearly all day.

WEA. *Clear & Stormy* TUESDAY 7

THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Woke at usual time and Gillie helped me to do the morning chores. I took Gracey to school on horseback and stopped in the school house before school commenced. James Beall helped me to haul four sled loads of hay in the afternoon. Snowed some during the day but did not make sledding.

WEA. Clear Cold WED. FEB. 8, 1893

THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Arose five minutes before four o'clock. Took the milk to the station on the sled. Mrs. Wilson went with me. Rana got off going down, and coming back spoiled the run badly. James Beall came in the afternoon, we put on an old hole and hauled four loads of hay to the snow. Did our milking after dark. Got the pay for our wheat at station \$36.30

WEA. Changeable THURSDAY 9th Stormy afternoon THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to usual chores at usual time. Gillie took the milk to the forks of the road. I put holes on the sled in the mosses and James Beall and I hauled a sled load of hay for us, the last of a stack. And went to haul hay for Beall on our sled. Mr. Wilson raised objection to Beall hauling a stack and after a considerable crop talk, we ate our dinner then hauled two loads of hay from the barn. Rained in the evening.

WEA. Clear FRI. FEB. 10, 1893

THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to usual chores at usual time. After I had taken milk to the road I went to Mrs. Wilson's and attended to a sick cow for him. Went to Eldersville and thence to Mill Melvins. Took dinner with Grandma. Got home about dark and found Dal. Smith here. Paid him for \$37.00 of coal.

Gillie went to Literary Society at night.

WEA. Cloudy Cool SATURDAY 11th

THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

I took the milk to the station in the big wagon in the morning and was hurried for time. Bought a barrel of sugar from John V. Shipley at a cost of 4 7/8 cts per lb. \$16.44 freight and all. Spent part of the afternoon reading. Repaired one swirl barrel and went to Beall's and Carothers' and got some of their Spair butter milk to feed to our pig. Took an old cow, Lady, to Shovins at dusk and had trouble getting her home. Milked very late at night.

WEA. Clear ^{Warm} SUN. FEB. 12, 1893

THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Arose a few minutes
after seven o'clock and spent
the day entirely at home. Did
not know whether there were
Sabbath School sessions or
not. Spent most of the day
studying Sabbath School
Lesson and reading in the
Wesleyan Methodist. Weather
was fine.

WEA. Snowing MONDAY 13

THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Arose at 4 o'clock and fed
and milked nine cows before breakfast.
Ellie fed the horses and harnessed
Hannie. After taking the milk to the
road I spent most of the day
cleaning up milk cans and cauldrons.
Snowed nearly all day. Snow wet
and heavy.

WEA. Clear ^{Warm} TUES. FEB. 14, 1893

THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

After usual chores in the morning
I went and helped James Beall at
Hugh Wilson's to haul hay. His hay
almost done and he and Wilson not
"kicking it well". I wrote letters
at night to Wesleyan Methodist
and Youth's Companion enclosing
ten dollars. Rained in the evening
and was very unpleasant. Helen
did a washing during the day.

Morning Afternoon
WEA. Warm ^{Wet} WEDNESDAY 15 Clear THER.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Raining when I got up but quit
before we were through with breakfast.
I took the milk to the station in the
big wagon. Maggie Kiddle went with
me. Brought them a barrel of sugar
and brought a pair of turkeys
for C. C. Fulton. Scoured some
rusty milk cans in the afternoon.
A little cooler in the evening. Roads
quite muddy.

WEA. Clear fine THUR. FEB. 16, 1893

THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
After usual chores I took
five of our Milk Cans to Provinces
and spent most of the day
rodding them. I learned while
there from Andrew Provinces that
Robt. Barber had told him that
Alex. Low of Paris had told him
that the string of sleigh bells stolen
from me at Tucker's Church 26 years
ago were hidden in the old tan yard at
Paris. Mr. Lockett came and got 8 lbs. lard.

WEA. Stormy snow FRIDAY 17

THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
After taking the milk
to the road I finished the
morning chores turned the cows
out and gave them fodder and
changed the stables then took
the horses to Paris and had
them shod. Stormed very hard
all day - saw snow and sleet.

WEA. Stormy Snowy SAT. FEB. 18, 1893

THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
I took the milk to the Station
in the morning on the sled and in
the afternoon I took a load of corn
to Florence to get ground for cow-
feed. Came home past McConnell's
coal bank and got twenty bushels
of coal for Liz. Riddle and took
it to her. Lillie had the feeding
done when I came home at dark
and I did the milking afterward
and got through at 9 1/2 o'clock.

WEA. Stormy Snowy SUNDAY 19

THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Arose at seven and hurriedly did
the feeding. I went in the sleigh to
Eldersville and heard Mrs Colburn give
a Missionary from Japan, preach from
Mat. 28th 19th 20th. She gave some very
interesting facts concern her work
in that Country and exhibited a
small idol of bronze an image
about 3 inches tall. Got home
about three o'clock. Weather very stormy
Wind high and snow drifting.

WEA. Clear Cold MON. FEB. 20, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Arose at usual time and found kitchen considerably the worse of soot from chimney with top blown off and wind had been high during night. Lillie took milk to the road and I mended his shoe. Took children to school, then went to Florence and got sled load of grinding. Went back in the evening and brought the children home. Studied some on an exercise in arithmetic at night.

WEA. Stormy Snow TUESDAY 21 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Lillie took the milk to the road and then mended my gloves and did some other repairs.

There was no school on account of election held in school house.

Lillie & Tracy at home

Brought some buttermilk from Carothers. Wrote two letters at night. Snowed heavily in the evening.

WEA. Clear Cold WED. FEB. 22, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

Lillie went with me to the station in the morning with the milk. We came home by Province and got Jim's soldering iron and I used it in the afternoon to mend some cans with Lillie. Went to D. S. Suttons in the afternoon and got some butter. D. S. Sutton was here and pronounced my snow in condition to make good meat and I concluded to kill her provided I could sell three quarters of her.

WEA. Snowy Rain THURSDAY 23 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta

After usual chores I took the children to school on the sled and hauled 25 lb of coal from McConnell's bank and 25 lb from Griffiths bank. Past after we were through eating dinner Mrs John Lawther and old Mrs. Lawther John's mother, stopped in John's broggs in the sled and came after them at night. Raining when they went home. Tracy sick in the evening.

WEA. Clear FRI. FEB. 24, 1893 ^{Snow on ground} THER.

After taking the milk to the road and watering the horses in the morning a shower of rain stopped me from doing farm work and I took Gracey to school and called at J. A. Gillie and Gracey attended literary at Hamilton School House.

Waxed wind to cow oats and he hauled manure from stack bottom in sod field where we were plowing for corn. Got cooler in the evening.

Received a letter from Mrs. Katy stating that their clock had arrived safely. Gracey got a letter from Charly. Ellie and I set out some peach trees in the evening and pruned some apple trees.

WEA. Cool and Cloudy TUES. APRIL 11, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Attended to usual chores in the morning, then John Provinces gave me return from Pittsburg for milk and eggs, and it took me about an hour to count out what was coming. Each of our neighbors who had shipped eggs with us. We finished hauling manure on corn field and hauled off two loads of stone. Followed six pounds after four o'clock. Felt very sore about my back and sides.

WEA. Cloudy, Morn'g wet WEDNESDAY 12 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Thunderstorm in the morning at time to rise. Took Ellie with me to the station and he brought team home and I went to Benzettown and paid John Crippen \$7.50. Walked home. Got home about two o'clock. Took Lucy to the shop in the afternoon and got a shoe driven and the mattrack sharpened.

Was almost ten o'clock when we got through milking. Ground very wet.

Home Near Hamlin Sta

I spent the day doing Chores and husking Corn. A shower at night had made the fodder in pretty good shape. Cut up 85 lbs of beef in the evening received from D. S. Lutton. I went to the station at night to prepare music for Thanksgiving. Holton was had taken away steps from School house and Mrs Allender fell from porch and sprained her knee badly. I took her home on Old Lucy behind me.

WEA. *Wet* SATURDAY 4

THER.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

I took the milk to the station in the morning and went to Mrs Crip to get the young folks to help us to sing at Thanksgiving entertainment. In afternoon I call at Mrs Roena Hamlin for the same purpose and did not do much work during the day. did not feel well in the evening. Rained nearly all day.

WEA. *Clear* SUN. NOV. 5, 1893

THER.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Slipped until quite late. Gillie helped me to do the morning Chores. Studied Sabbath School Lesson "The resurrection" until time to go to Sabbath School when Gracey, Alice and I went in the buggy.

A good turn out at school and we tried some of our new music for Thanksgiving. Mary Crip performed on the Organ. Gillie went to Eldersville to church at night.

Foggy forenoon
WEA. *Afternoon Clear* MONDAY 6

THER.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

I attended to usual Chores in the morning. Went to John and Bill Hamlin's and to John and Bill Hamlin's and found Mrs Elizabeth Hamlin still in bed and very weak from dysentery. Tried to hire some hands to husk Corn. Gillie got the promise of the Mc Calmoot boys for tomorrow. Weather was very frosty and foggy in the morning but very clear and fine in the afternoon.

WEA. Cloudy TUES. NOV. 7, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Usual chores in the morning. John and Dr. McCalmont and Andrew Lutton husked corn for us all day and Louis Haulin husked part of afternoon. I went to the election to Hamilton School House in the morning and Ellie and I hauled in corn. At night Gracey and I went to Haulin Station to prepare music for Thanksgiving day. Quite a good turn out and we did not get home until eleven o'clock.

WEA. Clear WEDNESDAY 8 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

I took the milk to the station and called in to see Mrs Allender who had a sprained knee and found her much better. Heard in the morning that Mrs Jane Tucker had died suddenly and would be buried at Tuckers' graveyard at two o'clock. Went to the graveyard and got there just after the coffin was let down. Ellie husking corn. Helen and I went to Carothers at night. Bell quite poorly.

WEA. Clear THUR. NOV. 9, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After attending to the usual chores I got some wood and water ready for Helen to wash with. I husked twelve shocks of corn and covered it up with the fodder. Gracey and I went to the station at night to attend a meeting appointed to prepare music for Thanksgiving day. There were but few there and our music did not amount to much.

We got home about eleven o'clock.

Quite foggy and damp.

Arose as usual time and attended to usual chores. I hauled in a load of corn in the forenoon. Gas Russell came about half past 12 o'clock and I took our team and helped him to haul three logs from middle woods on two wagons and left two of them on the wagon to take to sawmill. Recd a letter from Charley stating that Flo was not well. Did not get our milking done until quite late.

Called on Aunt Margaret Haulin and arranged with her to bake an old fashioned corn pone in a Dutch oven for Thanksgiving.

Home Near Haulin Ste

I took the milk to the road in the morning after feeding and milking, cleaned stables ~~and~~ then husked fifteen shocks of corn - and Lillie helped me to do the feeding in the evening.

Gracey and I sang some in the evening practicing music for Thanksgiving service. Was cloud in the morning and rained a little but soon cleared off.

WEA. Cloudy ^{old} TUESDAY 14

THER.

Home Near Haulin Ste

After usual chores, I husked seven shocks of corn and was working hard to get the remaining four done, when Sammie Sharley came and I had to go with him to castrate a colt for Kate Haulin, but found when he got there that it could not be done. Packed two boxes of canned fruit in the evening to send to Charley and Flo. and wrote a letter. Change of weather, threatening snow.

WEA. Cloudy ^{Getting snow} WED. NOV. 15, 1893 THER.

Home near Haulin Sta.

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock as usual. Did feeding and milking before breakfast. Took milk to the station in big wagon and took some canned fruit and sent to Charley and F. L. Hauled two loads of coal from Parton's bank the full amount still due on two pigs which Mr. Burrows had bought of me. Weather was quite cold, ground frozen and some snowfall.

slippery with a little snow.

When I took the milk to the road I went to Provins & Riddle's and got the beam to weigh beef with. Hauled a load of fodder for cattle. Cleaned the stables. Rec'd a letter from Jas. Cochran of Columbus directing me to send his mail to Harry Fulton Columbus O. Went to station in afternoon via John Lawther's and brought home 23/8^{lb} bran and emptied it after night.

WEA. Clear WEDNESDAY 6 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

I took the milk to the station in the morning and loaned John Provins our team to haul two tons of bran from the station and I bought his horses home. Bought our beef cow home from Riddle's and killed her in the afternoon. James Provins, James Carother and James Fulton helping us. We got the meat carried in about half past four o'clock. Cleaned about six hundred pounds. Cut up part of a quarter at night. Weather very fine.

WEA. Clear THUR. DEC. 7, 1893 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

After usual chores I went to James Carother's and helped to butcher a beef. Came home in the afternoon and took a quarter of beef to Mrs. Rene Haulin's and paid John Lawther \$19.50 for bran. At night Lillie and I cut up part of a quarter of beef and weighed out forty pounds for John Provins. Did not feel well in the evening.

WEA. Clear FRIDAY 8 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Spent the forenoon doing feeding and chores, getting the cans and mail &c. In the afternoon I cut up two quarters of beef and took some beef and tallow to Riddle's and helped them to put their young cow in the stable. Lillie went to Hamilton School House to Literary at night and Gracey and I packed the beef in the barrel ready to salt.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

I took the milk to the station in the morning and found that I had started late and was almost too late for train. Took some grinding to Florence in the afternoon for ourselves and Piddles. Got it all ground and home a little after dark. Gillie had fed day all done when I got home a little after night. Rained on me as I came home. One of our fattened hogs died.

WEA. Clear SUNDAY 10 Warm THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Slept until quite late. Did usual chores and then studied Sabbath School lesson. Gracey, Alice and I went to Sabbath School and heard Rev. Allen preach from Mat. ~~28~~ 28th 29th. Congregation quite small and about 30 in attendance. Was after night as usual when I got through milking.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

After we had attended to chores, Gillie helped me to put a rope on our young sow and I took her to Uncle Frank Haulin's house. Did not get back until 4 1/2 o'clock. Spent the night writing business letters to Jo. Cochran and Ida concerning their interest in their mother's estate. Weather fine but roads somewhat muddy.

WEA. Clear TUESDAY 12. THER.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Spent the forenoon doing chores about the house, cleaning stables &c. Hauled away a dead hog and covered it with leaves and chunks. Helen did a washing in the afternoon and I helped her to finish it at night. Cut some wood in the afternoon to make fire for butchering.

Did not feel well in the evening. Ground soft all day but freezing at night.

WEA. Clear WED. DEC. 13, 1893

Home Near Haulin' Stw.

I took the milk to the station in the morning. Sadie Fulton went down with me to go to Steubenville but was too late for train and came back with me again. James Carothers came over in afternoon and helped me to haul wood and prepare for butchering. Heard in the morning that Mrs Harriet Crippen of Eldersville had died sometime last night.

WEA. Cloudy Wind. Snow. Rain at night THURSDAY 14 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Stw.

After milking was done I kindled butchering fire. Gullie took Hannie Cow to Wilson's. James Carothers brought his two hogs over and we dressed them first. Then dressed the hog we had at home and Gellie and D.S. Fulton went to Mrs Rene Helmink and killed and brought home a hog I had traded beef for. We got through butchering about three o'clock.

We hauled a little load of hay after we were done. Was quite cold when we began. Rained down in the evening.

Home Near Haulin' Stw.

I took Alice to school in the morning on horseback. Spent forenoon doing chores. Cut up our two hogs in the afternoon and salted our meat. Jas. Carothers got sausage cutter in evening and cut their sausage. Gracey and I cut our sausage after lights and I made it. We did not get to bed until midnight. Gellie went to literacy.

WEA. Wet. SATURDAY 16 THER.

Home Near Haulin' Stw.

I took the milk to the station in the morning and brought a Gasolin stove and fluid from station for H. H. Poveries and stained my pants badly. Liz Middle was here during day helping Helen to fix away sausage. Gellie and I hauled a little load of hay in the evening, and Gellie cut some wood. Weather colder and snowing some.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Arose at daylight and attended to the usual chores.

Spent part of forenoon studying Sabbath School lesson.

Gracey and Alice both having very bad colds, did not go to Sabbath School and I went alone on horseback. There were in attendance and lesson very interesting. Light snow falling nearly all day and not much on the ground at night.

I took the milk to the station in the morning. Agent not in good humor because we were not there earlier with milk and marketing and threatened to close ticket window ten minutes before train time. James Russell came in the afternoon and he and I hauled four sled loads of hay, one load fell off. Read some to the children at night from my diary of 1864 concerning the war.
