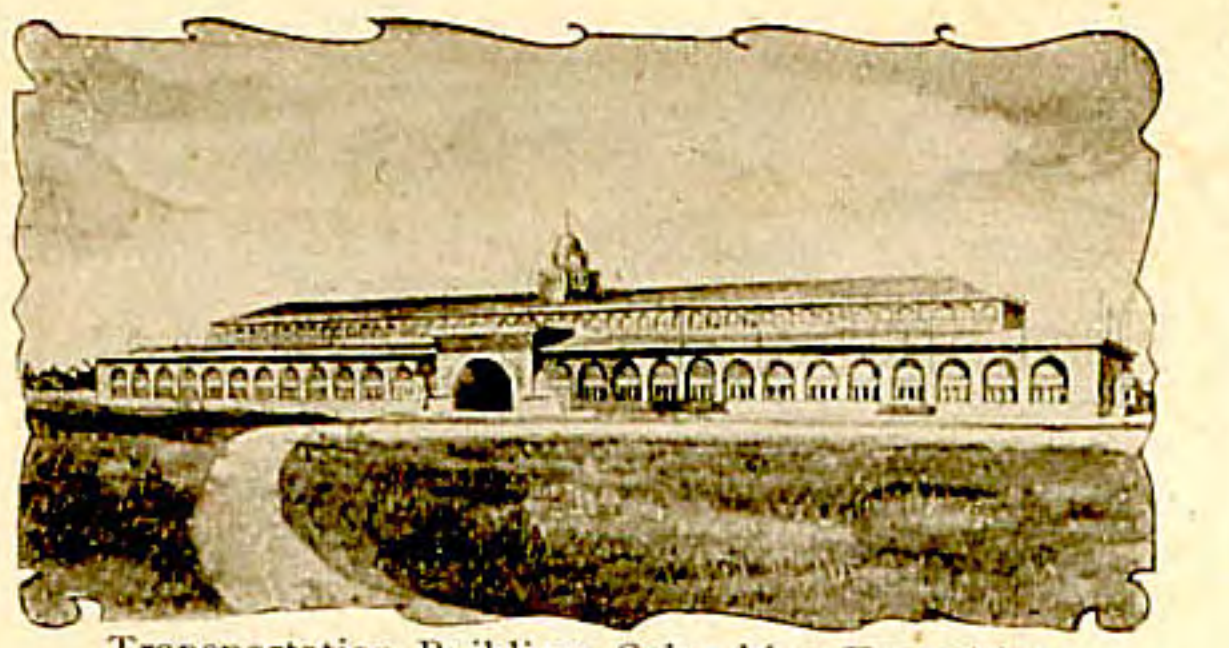

Wea. Clear MON. JAN. 1, 1894 Warm Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta
 Drove at 4 1/2 O'clock and did Chores
 Milked five cows, fed cows and horses
 before breakfast. Took Helen and
 Grace to station in spring wagon and
 they went to Steubenville. Grace got
 one tooth taken out and two filled.
 Helen had her impression taken for
 new teeth. Geo. Schallars the dentist
 filled several blocks of
 Cornfodder in the afternoon. McCalumant
 had our wagon borrowed hauling pit-
 posts and they brought our women
 home in the evening. Roads very
 rough. Wrote some for "Enterprise Call"
 at night.

Wea. Clear TUESDAY 2 Warm Ther.

When I took milk to load in
 the morning I brought two dozens
 of eggs from Wilsons to send to
 Pittsburgh. Mended some milk cans.
 Prepared box to ship chickens
 Took eggs to Riddles in the
 evening. Prepared an item
 for the Bourgetstown Call and
 copied Aunt Margaret Haulin's
 Poem, which she recited on Thanks-
 giving day at Haulin Station.
 Very open winter weather. Roads
 muddy.

Wea. Cloudy WED. JAN. 3, 1894 Warm Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta
I took the milk to the station on the sled although there was no snow. Took six pairs of chickens and a case of eggs. Mr. Jackson and his wife rode from the station with me on their way home.

Repaired our bridge with a slab. James Carothers here at noon. Wrote a letter at night to Jos. M. Cochran of Columbus Ohio concerning his interest in his mother's estate. Roads quite muddy.

Wea. Cloudy THURSDAY 4 Warm Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Spent the whole forenoon doing chores and reading, as I did not feel very well. Received a card from Charley and the diary by mail. In the afternoon I mended some milk cans and attended to babies in the evening and we had quite a time moving chickens out of coal house and wagon shed to roost in stable. Was late with milking at night. Tended my diary for four days.

Wea. Morning ^{loc.} Afternoon Clear FRI. JAN. 5, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Station

After taking the milk to the road I took Gracy to school on horse back and repaired the road some to prevent washing.

Read some in the voice unit dinner was ready. Spent most of the afternoon preparing an article for publication in the Enterprise Call, containing an original poem by Aunt Margaret Haulin. The had quite a time driving chickens from coalhouse. Gracy and Lillie attended literary at Hamilton School House at night.

Wea. ^{Slightly} Clear SATURDAY 6 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at 4 1/2 o'clock and did the morning chores hastily. Gillie harnessed the team and when I took the milk to the station I took Helen and Lillie with me and they went to Stubbenville where Helen got her new teeth and Lillie got a filling drilled out and tooth treated. Mr. McAlmont and James Rovine rode with me from the station. When I went back in the afternoon I bought a package of stamped envelopes. We got home a little before dark. Did not feel very well during day. Helen brought home an inkster.

Wea. *Very fine* SUN. JAN. 7, 1894 *Colder* Ther.

Home near Hankin Sta.

Slept until 7 1/2 o'clock and after chores were done, studied Sabbath School lesson until noon. Helen, Gracey, Alice and I attended Sabbath School and preaching at the station. Our lesson, "The first Adam". Tolerably fair turnout at Sabbath School. Heard Rev. Allen preach from Philipians 1st part of 13 & part of 14 verses, a very good and practical sermon. Aunt Margaret Hankin not out on account of the mud. Freezing again at night after a long warm spell.

Wea. *Clear* MONDAY 8 Ther.

Home near Hankin Sta.

Attended to usual work in the morning and forenoon. In the afternoon I made some preparations for separating or culling as to have a stall in which a cow could be housed loose to calve. When I was watering the horses in the evening James Stephenson came and spent the night with us and we had a good time chatting. He was looking at Riddell's farm and thinking of buying it. He did not return until midnight. Weather cool and ground frozen.

Wea. *Cloudy & Cold* TUES. JAN. 9, 1894 Ther.

Home near Hankin Sta.

James Stephenson took breakfast with us and spent the forenoon here. He was thinking of buying Riddell's farm. We spent a portion of forenoon looking over our farm. James left for home a little after two o'clock. I hauled a sled load of hay in the evening. The air was very chilly all day and somewhat frosty.

Wea. *Clear* WEDNESDAY 10 Ther.

Home near Hankin Sta.

I took the sick to the station on the sled, the road being very rough and no snow on it was a hard trip. Mrs. Koena Hankin called in the afternoon on her way to Carothers. I spent the afternoon doing chores such as repairing castors on tables, repairing back wall of room fireplace &c. Weather remarkably fine for the time of year.

Wea. ^{Changeable} THUR. JAN. 11, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and did usual chores in the forenoon and fiddled up some wheat which I took to Hindman's mill in the afternoon and exchanged for flour and bran. Got home a little after sunset. Stopped in Paris and had a shoe tightened at the Smith's shop. Stopped in store and got soap and got some soda. Weather became quite cold and stormy in the evening. Roads a little muddy in top.

Wea. Clear Cold FRIDAY 12 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Attended to the feeding as usual, and took the milk to the forks of the road to Mr. Wilson. Went to D. S. Fulton's and helped to dress a beef. Got home between three and four O'clock.

Saw an article in The Enterprise Call concerning Thanksgiving at Hamlin Station with Aunt Margaret Hamlin's Thanksgiving poem attached. Wrote two letters at night, one to Mr. Morrison and one to Dickson Bros. Rec'd letter from Sam Morrison.

Wea. ^{Ground frozen} Very fine SAT. JAN. 13, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

After usual chores I took the milk to the station in my wagon over very rough road. Learned as I passed Kiddle's that they had sold their farm to James Stephenson for \$2680. Met Dave Lyndon on his way to station after Sam Jackson whose child was reported very sick. He sent word on with Stewart Hamlin and returned with me. Lillie and I hauled three sled loads of hay in the afternoon.

Gracey read to me from the Companion as night a story entitled "A Cold Snap". A very good story. Weather beautiful and open. Afternoon warm and fine.

Wea. Clear Warm SUNDAY 14 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

After doing the usual morning chores I spent the remainder of the forenoon studying Sabbath School lesson "Cain's Sin and God's Grace". Gracey and I went to Sabbath School on horseback. Put few there and Mrs. Walker taught the class. None of my class there at beginning of school. Was coughing considerably in the evening with fresh cold I had taken. Aunt Margaret Hamlin not out of school. They having moved to the mill-house.

Wea. *Clear*. MON. JAN. 15, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After attending to milking, feeding, taking milk to the road etc. I had a fresh cow and calf to attend to and carried the cans from the road before noon. Helen was doing a washing and I repaired some cans in the afternoon and helped Helen some with the washing after night. Rained nearly all day and was quite warm.

Was suffering some with a cold which caused me to cough in the evening.

Wea. *Cloudy*. TUESDAY 16 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Washed Chores in the morning and took Gracey to school on horseback then went to Paris and had Fannie shod all around.

In the afternoon I secured a can that had become much rusted, and attended to the chores earlier than common. Roads quite muddy.

Wea. *Clear*. WED. JAN. 17, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After doing up morning Chores I took the milk to the station in large wagon and met Van Morrison and Alex who came home with me. Liz Riddle came with us also and took dinner. Did not do much in afternoon but clean stables.

At night Gracey and I attended Church at Tuckers and heard Rev. Carey preach from John III 36.

Congregation not very large. Preacher claimed that meeting was increasing in interest. Roads very muddy.

Wea. *Warm*. THURSDAY 18 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at 4 o'clock and did usual chores. Van Morrison took breakfast with us and then went to Carothers' when the children went to school. I spent forenoon reading and doing Chores and in the afternoon I set few fenceposts, preparing a place to keep calves in. Intended to have gone to Tuckers Church at night but had to attend to a fresh cow in that it was too late. Rained some in the evening.

Wea. Clear ^{Warm} FRI. JAN. 19, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After usual chores and taking milk to the road &c I took our young cow to the trough. Got home a little after noon. Hauled a load of slabs to build a calf shade. Attended Church at Truckee at night and heard Rev. Carey preach from 2 Cor. III 11. Quite a good turnout. Music good and good sermon. Nan Morrison and Alex came from Wyo. John Haulin at bed time and spent night with us.

Wea. Clear ^{Warm} SATURDAY 20 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at 4 o'clock and milked eight cows and fed them and a young calf. Fed the horses also before breakfast. Nan Morrison and Alex. here. Alex with us nearly all day and then they went to Kiddle's in the evening. I took the milk to the station and brought Mrs. Mary Hicks to Kiddle's on her way to Shovins. Lillie and I hauled five sled loads of hay in the afternoon.

Lillie and Grace went to Litter at night. Weather fine Roads muddy.

Wea. Clear SUN. JAN. 21, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Slept until quite late and when morning chores were done I did not have much time to study Sabbath School lesson.

Grey and I went to Sabbath School on horseback. Heard Rev. Allen preach from Samuel VIII 3. Congregation small. Miss Ida B. Porter came home with Grace on her way to school. They rode on Lucy and I walked home and was considerably overheated with my heavy overcoat on. Roads muddy.

Wea. Clear ^{Warm} MONDAY 22 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Miss Ida Porter took breakfast with us and went from here to school. After chores are done I dug two post holes. Carried can and mail from wash. Read some at noon. Scoured some cans in the afternoon.

Felt as though I could not accomplish much. Aching all over and coughing.

Ground frozen in morning. Roads muddy in afternoon.

Wea. Clear TUES. JAN. 23, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock
kindled fire, fed and milked
eight cows, fed two calves, fed
the horses and harnessed one before
breakfast. Mrs Mary Hicks and
Mrs Adela Provine and Mrs Han
Morrison took dinner with us. I went
to Riddles on an errand. Ellie Reed
a letter from Charles. I cut two posts
for calf shade. Alex Morrison came
in afternoon. Gracey and I attended
Church at Tucker at 7 1/2 and heard
Rev. Carey preach from "Mat. III 9"
Good congregation and good attention but
no one forward for prayers.

Wea. Wet Snow WEDNESDAY 24 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
I took the milk to the station
in big wagon in morning. James
Carothers went with me. He got so
angry talking on tariff legislation that
he used profane language and I told
him he should not ride with me if he did
not forbear. He behaved better and
coming home talked sensibly. I wrote
two copies of an article for Mrs. E. J.
Riddle for sale of her farm. About
noon it commenced to snow and was
stormy all afternoon.

Wea. Cold ^{Snow on} THUR. JAN. 25, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Morning was quite cold
and I did not attempt to
do out door work during day.
Mended two Milk Cans. Did some
calculating in the afternoon.
Han and Alex Morrison came
in the evening and took supper
with us. Han went to Riddles
and Alex went back to
Carothers at night. Had
intended to go to Church at Tucker's
at night but learned that
there was no service on account
of absence of the preacher.

Wea. Clear Cold FRIDAY 26 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Attended to usual chores at the
usual time. Went to Riddles on an
errand in the forenoon and in
the afternoon I repaired a leaking
can, greased my boots and went
to Paris and got Gracey a pair of
lumber boots and Ellie a pair of
jane overshoes. Alex Morrison
was here when I came home and
remained with us over night.
Ellie preparing a declamation at night
"The Battle of Tewkesbury"

Wea. Clear Cool. SAT. JAN. 27, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Usual morning chores. Took
the milk to the station on the
sled. Took a crate of eggs also.
Alex Morrison and Ellie
went to ~~Paris~~ in the forenoon
to exchange rubber shoes. James
Russell helped us to haul hay
in the afternoon. Put in four
sled loads. Alex Morrison went
with Ellie and Gracey to
Library to Hamiltons school house
at night. Roads rough
Weather fine with snow on the
ground.

Wea. Clear Snow on ground SUNDAY 28 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Slept until seven. Alex Morrison
here and he and Ellie went to
Puckers Church at night.
After doing morning chores
I spent part of forenoon studying
Sabbath School Lesson "Gods
Covenant with Noah." Went to
Sabbath School alone. School
not very large. Did not attend
Church at night. was too late
when I got through milking.
Weather very fine and roads
improving

Wea. Snowing with snow MON. JAN. 29, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Usual chores in the morning.
Alex Morrison took breakfast with
us and went to Paris in the forenoon
and did not return as yet.
Snow commenced falling a little
before noon and it ~~continued~~ ^{continued} during
the day. Snow very wet and not
much sign of freezing at night.
Still snowing at bedtime. Helped
Helen to do a washing during the
day. Did not begin until
afternoon. Felt unwell and
could not keep awake in the
evening long enough to write ~~what~~
is here written.

Wea. Cold, Snow TUESDAY 30 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
After doing morning chores
I took the sled and took the
children to school as there was
considerable of snow on the ground,
and went for them in the evening.
In the mean time I did chores.
At night Ellie took the sleigh
to Paris expecting Alex Morrison
to come home with him, but he
was not through with his visit
and did not come. Quite cold
at night, but calm.

Wea. Clear WED. JAN. 31, 1894 ^{Evening} ^{Morning} Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

I took the milk to the station in the sled and Lem Tucker rode home with me. Alex Morrison came from Paris in the afternoon and spent the night with us.

I repaired a saw and spent most of the afternoon restringing our old sleighbells and did not get through until ten o'clock at night. Snow melted considerably during the day but commenced freezing at sunset and was snowing at bedtime.

Wea. Fine Snow on THUR. FEB. 1 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Alex Morrison took breakfast with us. When I took milk to road I went to Riddle on errand. Liz could not go with us to Haulin. Alex Morrison, Alice Helen and I went in sled to Uncle Frank Haulin's. Uncle Frank and I went to John Stephenson's for Etty Jackson. We had a very pleasant visit and Uncle seemed very much pleased and said that we were the only persons who had come to visit him for a long time. We stopped at school house and brought the children home in the evening.

Wea. Clear Cold FRI. FEB. 2, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Station

Morning was very cold and frosty after doing my chores in the morning I took the children to school in the sled and brought them home again in the evening. Miss Ida Porter, teacher, went to Crothers. Children went to Hamilton's to Litrary at night. I wrote a letter in the afternoon and night to J. P. Miller concerning Cochran settlement. Snow melted some in the afternoon but blinding pretty good at night and quite cloudy.

Wea. Cloudy Snow melting SATURDAY 3 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

I took the milk to the station on the sled in the morning. Learned that Ag. Holt was dead and that Sam. Provinces had the Typhoid fever. Ellie and I hauled three sled loads of corn fodder in the afternoon and I put a pole on the sled which kept me busy until almost eight and did milking after eight.

Wea. Snowy SUN. FEB. 4, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Slept until after seven o'clock. Studied Sabbath School lesson, "The beginning of the Hebrew Nation".

Gracey and I went to Sabbath School in the sleigh. But few there. Heard Rev. Allen preach from 77th Psalm 122. of 3rd verse. Very good sermon.

Lillie had most of the feeding done. Open fire came home in the evening. Snowed some during day and was growing colder at night.

Wea. Clear with MONDAY 5 Ther.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

I hurried around and did the morning work then hitched the team to the sleigh and took Mrs. E. F. Kiddle to Berrettstown to make arrangements for her sale. Ordered 25 bills struck and three insertions in Enterprise call for four dollars. They got home about four o'clock and then after doing our chores Helen and the children and I went in the sled to Mr. M. Calhoun's where we spent the fore part of the night very pleasantly. Got home about midnight.

Snow Melting
Wea. Clear TUES. FEB. 6, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

When I took milk to the road I went to Mr. Fulton's and secured his services to assist in dressing a beef which we did in the afternoon.

Andrew Provines goes with us. Had but little politics. I cut up one quarter of beef at night to have at ready to deliver in the morning. Lillie and Gracey wrote a letter to Charley at night. Slideling almost gone.

Snow Melting
Wea. Cloudy WEDNESDAY 7 Rain Ther.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

As I took the milk to the station in the morning I took fifty pounds of beef to John Provines and fifty to Mrs. Kiddle. I cut up some beef in the afternoon and took some to Carothers and some to S. S. Huston. Got into mischief and the evening and we had some place to repair before milking in the evening.

Wea. Foggy Cloudy Damp Raining
THUR. FEB. 8, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Spent forenoon doing chores and reading. In the afternoon I cut off some beef and packed it in the barrel and pickled it. Trimmed facing of cellar door so it would shut.

Wea. Warm and Clearing
FRIDAY 9 Ther.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Spent the entire forenoon doing chores, kindling for feeding stock, cleaning stables, &c. and read some in the paper. Took Gracey to school on horseback. Spent most of the afternoon taking the flesh off of a white beef hide to make a robe of it. Took some eggs to Riddle's in the evening to ship to Pittsburgh. Ellie and Gracey went to Hamilton's school house to literary at night. Evening very pleasant.

Wea. Cold Windy SAT. FEB. 10, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamilton Sta. Pa.

I took the milk to the station in the morning in the big wagon. Had a few words with the ticket agent because he charged 30¢ freight on crate of eggs. Hunted some feed for E. J. Riddle.

Raymond Melvin spent most of the day with us and Ellie went home with him in the evening. I spent most of the afternoon preparing a beef hide for a lap robe.

Roads very muddy. Did not freeze any during the day but wind was strong and cold.

Wea. Clear SUNDAY 11 Ther.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Arose at six o'clock and Ellie not being at home Gracey helped me to do the feeding and we got through in time for me to go to Tucker's Church. Heard Rev. Carey preach from Rom 8:4. Remained after sermon and they organized an Epworth League. I was asked to join but declined. Seemed to me not just the right thing to organize a "Chapter" inside the church and arranging for a name for it. Ellie remained at church until after night service.

Snow & rain
Wea. Stormy MON. FEB. 12, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta

When the milk was taken to the road in the morning snow commenced falling and it was quite stormy all day so much so that Gracey did not go to school. I intended to have taken the horses to the snits shop but did not go. Sum Crisp came to get some straw from us for his stack. He took dinner with us and did not leave until evening. Made out our milk account at night.

Wea. Cold Snowy TUESDAY 13 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Slept a little later than usual but succeeded in getting milk to road in season. Took Lily and Gracey to school in sleigh then went to Paris and had the horses shed all around. Got Helen's shoes mended. Took Alex. Morrison & Keddle's on his way to Pittsburgh. Brought the children home again in the evening. Gracey milked one of the cows in the evening. Snowing some in the evening. Received a good letter from Charley and Flo.

Sliding
Wea. Sliding WED. FEB. 14, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta

I took the milk to the station in the morning. We had orders to hold off every other day and I did not take our milk this morning. Took 25 chickens for Keddle and sent them by express. Went to Burgettstown in afternoon and made some exchanges. Came home through Florence and got some underwear for Helen which she could not get in Paris, Burgettstown or Station. Was just four hours making the round. Sum Crisp hauled three sled loads of straw from our place. Snowing some at night and very cold.

Wea. Stormy Cold THURSDAY 15 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Woke at four and a half o'clock and with usual chorus I swept paths in the snow that had fallen during night. James Carother took the children to school in the sled. Sum Crisp helped me to haul hay during the day and we got the remains of the stack in at sunset. Was almost nine o'clock when I got through with evening work. Gracey had sick headache and Carother brought her and Ellie up home in the evening.

Good Sledding
Wea. Clear FRI. FEB. 16, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta
Arose at usual time
and attended to usual chores.
Did not ship milk in the morning
because our milk dealer could not
find scale for it. Went to Riddles
in forenoon and got seven little
Brown Leghorn hens for ourselves
and two roosters for Carothers. Went
to school in afternoon and brought
children home. There twenty five of us
on sled at once. James Carothers
took the children to Peteray at
night but he came home and left them
to walk home as per arrangement. He churned
a churning at night something very unusual.

Wea. Cloudy Thawing SATURDAY 17 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta
I took the milk to the station
in the sled. Alice went with
me as far as Riddles. Lillian and
I got in some hickory wood to
smoke our meat with. I took our
old sleigh to Proomes' and had
a clevis repaired. Snow melted
nearly all day. Rained some in
the evening and snow likely all
to go off.

Was late getting last load in and just as we were done eating supper Geo and Mary Cassidy, Mary and Becca Provins came in sled. Geo. helped us to milk. They left about eleven o'clock.

Stephenson folks were prospering.

After feeding was done in the
morning and we were about to
eat breakfast if Mrs suggested that
the whole family attend church.
Accordingly we got ready to go to Eldersville
but Ed Stephenson came and told
us there was no preaching there and
we went to Paris and heard Rev.
Allen preach from I Lusk 33-4-10-9
Lizzie went with George & Florence.
I did not feel well in afternoon and
did not go to station. Lizzie and
Grace went to Suckers at night to
Epworth League meeting. Maggi Riddle
stole better

Wea. Clear MONDAY 16 Warm Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta

Usual chores. James Lytle came in
the morning and commenced work for
us. He did us a good days work ditching.
Gillie and I spent most of the
day hauling logs to fell up old pumbed.
Gillie plowed some sod in the
morning. He and James Lytle went to
Mrs Haulin's at night and got some butter
and I went to D.S. Fulton's and
paid widows interest. Did not get
to bed until after ten o'clock. Weather
quite fine and warm.

Wea. Clear warm TUES. APRIL 17, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Harlin Sta.

We spent the forenoon cleaning up the garden and plowing it and in the afternoon I prepared some of it for seeds. Some onions put in in the evening. Gillie and Jimmie Lytle spent the afternoon shoveling for oats. Maggie Reddle did the dinner dishes the first work she had done since the 1st of March. James Carothers came in of an errand in the evening. Weather was very favorable for gardening and ground in splendid order.

Wea. Clear warm WEDNESDAY 18 Ther.

Home Near Harlin Sta.

Gillie took the milk to the station and bought various things for the house, garden seeds, &c. James Lytle spent the day ditching and went home at night. Had not made any bargain with him as to price for work per day and he said he would tell me tomorrow morning what he would take for seven months.

I made some garden, and sowed our clover seed. Some appearance of rain at night.

Wea. Cloudy ^{North} THUR. APRIL 19, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Harlin Sta.

Attended to usual chores and Gillie finished plowing stalk ground. James Lytle spent forenoon filling up ditch. I split some fence posts. Rained after dinner. James Stettenson and I measured our line fence. I took supper with them and when we got through measuring he came home with me to see Maggie Reddle. Heavy rain & shower while he was here and we did not get milking done until after night. Rec'd a letter from Charley.

Wea. Showery FRIDAY 20 Ther.

Home Near Harlin Sta.

Gillie took the milk and eggs to the road in the morning. We spent the day putting logs into the old runnel in the cornfield. In the afternoon Gillie and Charley Medlam helped us with their team. We did not have good luck. Broke chains and double and single trees. Gillie and Grace went to Eldersville at night to a literary society exhibition in the W. M. Church. Jimmie Lytle helping us.

Wea. Cloudy SAT. APRIL 21, 1894

Ther.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Attended to usual chores. Gillie took the milk to the station and got some articles of merchandise. Nedham's boys with their team helping us to haul logs for ditch. In the evening I engaged Jimmie Lytle to help us on farm for fifteen dollars per month. Broke some chains. Borrowed Doubletree and log chain from Provinces. Number of neighbors helping Mr. McCalmont to haul his lumber from the station.

Wea. Cloudy damp SUNDAY 22

Ther.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Left until after six o'clock. Gillie had a bad cold and was very lame and I did not wake him to help with the morning work. I spent most of the day studying Sabbath School lesson. Got my clothes on to go to the station but a pain & fever stopped me and I did not attend service anywhere. Maggie Riddle getting still better and able to sit up nearly all day. Elizabeth Riddle not very well and not able to be out to help with milking as was her custom.

Wea. Cloudy MON. APRIL 23, 1894

Ther.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.
Gillie took the milk to the station for John Provinces in the morning. Charley Medlam was here during the day hauling logs and brush to fill up old runbed in cornfield. We got along well during the day. It felt better than I had for a long time and worked with comfort and seemed to accomplish something. Jimmie Lytle here at work. I took forty two lbs of Carpet rags to Barbers at night to get woven. Evening quite cool and cloudy.

Wea. Clearing TUESDAY 24

Ther.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.
Attended to usual chores. Gillie took a doubletree to Provinces' and had the chps fastened on, and in the afternoon he harrowed out ground. Jimmie Lytle and I hauled logs for the ditch in the forenoon and set ten posts in the line fence between us and Stephensons in the latter part of the afternoon. The boys burned some brush in the orchard at night. Helen walked over to Barbers to arrange for weaving a carpet.

Wea. Clear WED. APRIL 25, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and attended to usual chores. John Provinces took the milk to the station. Lillie harrowed our oats ground and I sowed fifteen bushels of oats in the evening. Jimmy Lytle dug postholes for link fence. George Stephenson and Carothers youngfolks were here in the evening and we did not get to bed until near eleven O'clock. James Carothers got a bushel and a half of oats for seed.

Wea. Clear THURSDAY 26 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Arose at 4 1/2 and after usual chores were done, we planted some potatoes in the oats field. James Lytle and I spent most of the day putting up post and wired rail fence. Charley Stephenson came along in the evening and borrowed our sprayer to spray fruit-trees. Helen and Alice visited at Stephenson's and Provinces. Weather very fine. Lillie took the horses to shop and had them shod.

Wea. Clear FRI. APRIL 27, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
I went to James Freshwaters' Coal bank in the morning and got 25 bu of coal, then went to S.S. Fultons and got the road scraper to level down banks in the corn-field. Lillie and I hauled a load of logs and some straw for the ditch, borrowed James Stephenson's hillside plow and commenced plowing down a bank. Did not feel well all day. James Lytle digging post holes.

Wea. Clear SATURDAY 28 Even fair Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
When Lillie went to the station Ely Bidelle and Gracey went to Stephenson's to visit until he came back. I spent most of the day filling in ditch, plowing in the afternoon and scraping. Fire broke out in Stephenson's woods and we went to help put it out. Did not particular damage. Boys killed a black snake that had a full grown screech in it. James Lytle spent the day setting posts. Took bath at night.

Wea. Clear SUN. APRIL 29, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta
Slept until six o'clock. After
Chores were done Lillie went to
Eleberville to Church. I studied S. S.
Lesson. Gracey, Alice, and I attended
Sabbath School at Station. Heard
Rev. Allen preach from 103 Psalm
13 vers. When Chores were done
in the evening, Jimmy Lytle came
to be here ready for work in the
morning. E. J. Riddle and Maggie
here. Maggie's health much improved.
Lillie not home at bedtime.

Wea. Clear MONDAY 30 Warm Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta
Independent of Chores we spent
the day plowing down bank in
the cornfield. Lillie and
Jimmy Lytle spent the day
taking out rocks. Maggie
Riddle walked over to Carothers'
in the afternoon, her first walk
away from home since she was
sick. Gracey went with her.
We got Riddles lawn mower from
Thomas and Gracey used it some
on our yard. Dogwood's blooming.
Stephensons planting corn.

Wea. Clear TUES. MAY 1, 1894 Warm Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta
Mrs E. J. Riddle went to Burgetts-
town in the morning. We spent
the day plowing down a bank into
an old run bed in our cornfield.
Found quite a number of rocks
and found it hard plowing.
Two horses not able to handle the
road scraper to good advantage.
Filled up 10 1/2 bushels of wheat
at night to send to Midway
to get ground.

Wea. Clear WEDNESDAY 2 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta
Lillie took the milk to the
station in the big wagon and
took 8 1/2 bushels of wheat and
sent it to Midway. Elizabeth
Riddle was over night at Uncle
Charley Haulin's and came home
with Lillie. Jimmy Lytle
set fence posts during the
day and Lillie and I spent
the afternoon scraping down bank.
Stephensons Cows got into the wheat
field on their place and I went
and put them out. Felt very well

Wea. Clear THUR. MAY 3, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Stn
Lillie and I spent the day plowing and scraping down a bank in our cornfield. We had come on plenty of rocks and did not come much speed. James Little set some fence posts and helped us some in the evening with stone. I cleaned out our spring vault in the morning. The boys went to the run at night to fish with Stephensons two boys. Stephensons finished planting their corn at Carothers.

Wea. Light showers FRIDAY 4 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Stn
Usual chores in the morning. Light shower of rain while we were milking and another at noon. Spent the day ^{scraping} down bank in cornfield and made a finish of it about dusk. I worked at it after supper and Lillie and Jimmie Little and Gracey milked the cows and then they went to Carothers with Stephensons' young folks.

Forenoon Clear
Wea. after Oct. SAT. MAY 5, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Stn
Lillie took the milk to the station in the morning and brought some home flour shipped from Midway. Jimmie Little and I spent the forenoon repairing a chicken coop, putting rails on fence posts &c. The afternoon was wet and I did not feel well and did not do much but fodder a can. Jimmie and Lillie tightened up some bolts on the spring wagon to stop the rattle and I went to the station in the evening and met Charley and Flo. Who came out from Pittsburgh took Sil's Kiddle and her mother to Carothers' at night.

Wea. Showery SUNDAY 6 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Stn
Charley and Flo were here and we slept late. I spent some time studying Sabbath School lesson and gathered a large bouquet of wild flowers for Charley and Flo. to take to town. I took them to the station at time for Sabbath School. School very small only twelve there rained in the evening and one of the brightest rainbows I ever saw. Maggie Kiddle and her mother still at Carothers.

Wea. Clear MON. MAY 7, 1894 ^{evening} Shower. Ther.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

After taking the milk to the road in spring wagon Lillie brought slip Riddle from Carothers'. We spent the forenoon clearing stumps off our cornfield and I spent most of the afternoon plowing. Lillie and Jimmie Lette cleaned some brush off the meadow and put up a few panels of fence and did the evening chores while I plowed. Gracy tried to fool me at supper time by coming in with her mother's silk dress and a bail on and thought I would not know her. Sold C. A. Russell eight bushels of wheat.

Wea. Clear TUESDAY 8 Ther.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Lillie and Jimmie Lette spent the day putting rails on posts and did the milking in the evening and spilled considerable of milk. I tried to plow during the day and came very poor speed, mended the line in the morning. Broke plow in the afternoon and went to Proves and borrowed one that I could not use and took it home again. Proves planted their corn without sowing rest left. None of our neighbors called on us knowing we were behind.

Wea. Clear WED. MAY 9, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Lillie took the milk to the station and when coming home an axle of the spring wagon broke. Sammie Phorley came over and he gave him a strong strap to hold the rail, which they put under it. Sammie was driving a colt and named him after supper. Lillie and Jimmie Lette put in forks and a pole for a flood gate and put on a few panels of fence and did the milking in the evening and then went to D. S. Futton's to borrow a horse to work our colt with. He was in mischief through the day.

Wea. Clear THURSDAY 10 ^{Evening} Shower. Ther.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.

Lillie got a horse from D. S. Futton's in the morning and I plowed with him and Lucy during the day and Lillie and Jimmie hauled of stones and rails of the plowed ground. Lillie went to McCalmont's at night to a social. Gracy did not go on account of appearance of rain. James Carothers offered us the use of their team, but we did not take it because we could not use it to advantage.

Wea. Clear FRI. MAY 11, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
Gillee got James Carothers' team and harrowed with it during the day and Gimmie Lette harrowed and hauled off stones with our colts and team. I plowed until middle of afternoon when James Gibson came with a team to represent my brother Will and he plowed until after sunset then he and Gillee took Mr. Fulton's horse home. I mended a trace at night which Gibson had broken on Will Fulton's harness and did not get to bed until after eleven o'clock.

Wea. Clear SATURDAY 12 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
Found Lucy sick in the morning when I went out for the horses and cows, and spent part of the day doctoring her for Cholera and kidney trouble, and could not get corn ground marked as fast as I wished. Will Melvin came shortly before noon to allow James Gibson to go to a fishing party but James remained and helped us to plant corn. James Lette harrowed with Carothers' team. Marked with three horses in afternoon. Quite a large boom after supper, 12 in all. James Stephenson for a while when they got through a little before sunset. Gillee went home with uncle Will.

Wea. Clear SUN. MAY 13, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
Gillee was away at his uncle Will's and Elizabeth Riddle helped me to do the milking. I felt very unwell or rather worn out, with a very sore corn on my left foot. Went to bed in the forenoon and slept a good portion of the day and did not attend church or Sabbath School. My Aunt Ada Stephenson called in the evening as she was going home from Epworth League. Gimmie Lette came in the evening about the time we were through milking.

Wea. Clear MONDAY 14 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
After usual chores in the morning we spent most of the day planting corn on ground that was not well prepared and then we commenced filling in more ditch and getting ready to plow the remainder of the field. Worked late in the evening and while we were milking, Pat Riddle came to tell Aunt Liz and says that Mrs. Ella Miller had died. Weather smoky, smell of fire and some appearance of rain.

Wea. Clear TUES. MAY 15, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Nothing very unusual in the morning. After chores were done I went to James Stephenson's to see about top paying between him and E. J. Riddle. I spent the day plowing down banks and creeping dirt into old rumbled. Felt very tired in the evening. James Stephenson called in the evening to arrange with Mrs. Riddle about which of them should pay the tax on the farm which Stephenson had bought from her. Some appearance of rain in the evening, very dry.

Wea. Showery WEDNESDAY 16 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Gillie took the milk to the station in a shower of rain. After rain was over I went to Florence and paid for state and county tax which was very high $3\frac{1}{2}$ mills. only 2 mills last year. Bought some dry goods and notions.

Gimmie Lytle made some doors for chicken coops and he and Gillie repaired spout to spring. I did some scraping into the ditch in the evening. Gracey went to Barber's for tomato plants. Gimmie went to station in evening.

Wea. Showery THUR. MAY 17, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Colts caused us trouble in the morning on account of jumping out of their field and we kept them in stable during the day. I spent most of the day plowing and scraping in the cornfield. About half past three o'clock rain storm drove me to the house and we had rain nearly all evening. Gillie and Gimmie Lytle put up a flood gate at the cornfield fence and put the rails on the fence back of the cow stable in the afternoon. Rain was very much needed.

Wea. Showery FRIDAY 18 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

In the morning James Lytle and I shelled five bushels of corn and took it to Tomax's mill and had it ground. Went to field to plow and was driven in by the rain. Got a few pounds plowed. Gimmie and Gillie spent the day building a calf shade and pen and repairing the gate at the road. Gillie went to Haulin in the morning and got some butter which they should not receive pay for until they should learn market price.

Wea. Wet. SAT. MAY 19, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
Lillie took the milk to the station
in the morning and Alf Riddle rode
with him to the forks of the road and I
carried her luggage to Provinces where she
met L. L. Gracey and his wife and Sam
Provinces and children. I repaired some
milk cans and a shovel handle.
and in the evening I took Maggie
Riddle to G. S. Hamlin and went to
Barbers and bought some 43
yards of new carpet which cost
us \$15.75. Rained nearly all day
and became very cold at night.

Wea. Cloudy Cool SUNDAY 20 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
Slept until very late
and after chores were done
tried to study Sabbath School
lesson but felt very dull
and stupid. Gracey and I
attended Sabbath School at the
station, only ten there. Was
very cool and no fire in the
stove. Lillie attended Epworth
League at Tuckers in the evening.
James Lytle came in the
evening as usual. Some danger
of frost.

Wea. Showery MON. MAY 21, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
We spent the day making a new
water course through our cornfield
and meadow and filling up the old
one, and plowed a little in the
evening when a rain stopped us
at supper time and after we
had done milking we commenced
to repair our South Bend plow
which had given out but did
not get through. Rained
several showers during the day
but rained heavily in the
evening.

Wea. Wet Cool TUESDAY 22 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
Weather was quite heavy and
cool. I spent the forenoon mending
our South Bend plow and plowed
some in the afternoon but it rained
so frequently that we got but little
done. Lillie and Jimmie hauled off
some stones and shoveled some dirt
into the old ditch. Henry from Hamlin
brought Maggie Riddle home in
the morning and in the evening he
came and showed double team Corn
Creeper, intending to buy it if it
started him.

Wea. Showery WED. MAY 23, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Ellie took the milk to the station in the morning. Jimmie Lytle cut some brush to stick peas with. I prepared a girth to put on Colt to keep it from jumping. When the team came home I finished plowing a part of the Cornfield near the old sheep shade and in the afternoon we filled some old pails into the ditch. and in the evening moved a little piece of fence and plowed up a high place on side of road to a crape into low place. Ellie and Jimmie went to Paris at night to get Ellie a pair of shoes.

Wea. Showery THURSDAY 24 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

After chores were done I spent some time padding the straps which we had on colts to keep them from jumping. Then spent the day plowing and scraping dirt into old sun bed when it was not raining. We went to the slab pile at Hamlin and got a few slabs to cover some blind ditch.

Ground very full of water and reports of damage done by high rivers. Sun set red.

Afternoon
Wea. Showery FRI. MAY 25, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Nothing unusual in the forenoon. We spent the forenoon and part of the afternoon covering ditch and then a heavy rain shower stopped us and Ellie went to Paris after supper and got a chore driven on Lucy. I mowed some of the grass off the yard with the Laron mower after supper, and Jimmie Lytle Gracey and I did the milking. Mirta Sips Riddle nocher mother feeling very well.

Wea. Dry SATURDAY 26 Cloudy afternoon Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.

Usual chores in the morning and Ellie took the milk to the station in the big wagon. Jimmie Lytle and I put a pair of bars in the Cornfield fence while he was away and took the team when he came home and brought 25 bushels of coal from James Freshwater's bank. We spent most of the afternoon filling up old ditch. Ellie went to the station in the evening for cans and only got one - a little five gallon one. Aunt Lizzie Riddle helped me to milk.

Threatning rain at night
Wea. Clear SUN. MAY 27, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hardin Sta.
Arose about seven o'clock
and attended to chores. Gillie
Went to Eldersville to Church and
took dinner at John Melvin's and
attended Church at Station. Gracey
and I attended Sabbath School at
Station and heard Rev. Allen
preach from Eph. III 18".
Congregation larger than common
and sermon quite interesting.
Subject "The Trinity". Met with
Robt. Osburn and wife at the
Cool Spring and had quite a
chat with them.

Evening wet
Wea. Afternoon Cool. MONDAY 28 Ther.

Home Near Hardin Sta.
It was raining hard when I awoke in the
morning. Forenoon, Cloudy dusk and cool.
John Hardin came and had a bond
signed concerning Eliza Hardin's interest.
I took spring wagon to Florence and got
new axle. Saw a man named Lilly buried
who died in Montana, killed by electricity.
Boys mowed the yard and cut socks
during day and Gillie went to station for
cans in the evening and got five. I finished
our sod plowing in the afternoon and the
ground was rather hot for the work.

Frost.
Wea. Clear TUES. MAY 29, 1894 rain Ther.

Home Near Hardin Sta.
Quite a frost in the morning.
We spent the day leveling up old
runbed and preparing to plant corn.
Got almost through with the filling
and it rained again at supper time
and stopped us. Seemingly very
late for planting corn, but much
of the corn in the ground growing
very slowly and many fields badly
injured with cutworms.
Heard in the morning of the death
of Mrs. Sam. Bigger who was to
be buried at 2 1/2 o'clock today.

Wea. Wet. WEDNESDAY 30 Ther.

Home Near Hardin Sta.
Gillie was not feeling very well in
the morning and I took the milk to
the station, and in the afternoon
I went to Burgettstown and got
some fencing wire and some
other things. And when I got
home in the evening the boys and
Gracey were about milking and
I did not have any job to do.
Learned at the station of a man buying
a ticket to Paris Road and Return and
scratched it and wrote another station, and
traveled on it. Conductor returned it to agent.

Wea. ^{wet Cold} Cloudy, THUR. MAY 31, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

In the morning Mrs Redelle and Sis went to Pittsburgh, took them to the forks of the road in big wagon and they went with John Provins. We cut some post stuff and made a few posts. I helped Haden to do part of a washing during the afternoon, and the boys cut down a tree for fence posts, trimmed it and sawed off two cuts.

Rained a heavy shower at supper time and weather was quite cool all day.

Wea. Clear FRI. JUNE 2 Warmer Ther.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Woke the boys in time to bring the cows for me in the morning. I took the milk to the station, watched Stephens moving a hen house, went to Lawrence in the afternoon and brought home our spring wagon, and helped the boys to put rails on the fence in the evening. Fannie and I did the milking after Jimmie had gone home. Weather seemed settled after more than two weeks of cold rain and our fire was let die out of the grate at night for the first in ^{that time.}

Wea. ^{Friday Evening wet} Cloudy SAT. JUNE 7, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and kindled fire in stove and also in our fireplace and put on wash water. After usual chores. I spent forenoon washing and did some hauling on the sled in afternoon. Hauled posts and firewood. Bought a porcelain washboard from Charley Drubson for fifty cents. Rained in the evening. Had fire in our grate. Had been having fire like nantestome for nearly three weeks.

Wea. Clear SUNDAY 3 Ther.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Arose at 6 1/2 O'clock and attended to the morning chores. Tried to study my Sabbath School lesson but was too sleepy to do much good. Gracey, Alice and I attended Sabbath School at the Station. School some larger than it had been for some time and lesson quite interesting. "The Passover" the last played. Talked of election of officers and some talk of having a festival to raise preachers salary. Fannie attended Epworth League at Tucker's.

Wea. Cloudy ^{drizzle} MON. JUNE 4, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
I spent nearly all day harrowing
Corn ground in our lower field where
we had filled an old rumber. In the
evening I went to John and Mr. Austins
and got some potatoes for seed,
and did not get home until after
ten o'clock. Gillie and Gemmie
Lytle put up nine panels of
post rail and wire fence between
us and Stephensons. Weather
very unfavorable for corn. Rained
two or three little showers in
the forenoon which dampened the
ground considerably.

Wea. Cloudy ^{drizzle} TUESDAY 5 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
We finished planting corn and
planted some potatoes and
pumpkins during the day and
finished filling our old rumber.
Gillie and Lucey went to
Paris at night to attend a ^{session}
for the benefit of the U. S. Church.
Gemmie Lytle and I did the
milking and covered up the
garden at night for fear of
frosts as it seemed to be very cold.
Wire in our gate felt very
comfortable.

Wea. Clear ^{Frost} WED. JUNE 6, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Gillie took the milk at the station
in the morning and brought Maggie
Riddle and her mother from the station.
Frank Lytle came about noon
and helped us to set posts in the
afternoon. We put up sixteen
panels. Some posts set a little
too far apart and we had
trouble getting rails long enough
and we did not get through
milking until after nine o'clock.
Weather very cool and cleared
off in the evening. Good fire in
the grate. Fared first.

Wea. Clear ^{Frost} THURSDAY 7 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Came a little earlier than
common. Mrs. J. Riddle took Lucy
and the buggy and went to Paris on an
errand and took Fanny with her and
got her shod, and went to John Fresh-
waters and got us some tomato plants.

forenoon and we tied it up
in the afternoon 40 day altogether.

went to Haulins for butter and
found some of our horses in
Haulin's field. We repaired
the fence again and did not get
milking done until after night
Sowed out of wheat stubble and
we had to put her back again.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
When I arose at six o'clock I
found the young mare Nellie getting over
the fence at Corncrib and we had
to repair fence some to keep the
stock in. Pasture exceedingly scarce
on account of dry weather.
Grace and I got ready and started
to Eldersville to church but it was
so cloudy that we turned back
and we had a light shower. Was
not at church any where during the
day. Did not feel well, nasal catarrh
bothering me and lungs feeling stopped.

Wea. Clear MON. JULY 30, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
We spent the day cutting our
oats. Frank Little cradled in
the forenoon. Gillie and I
got out the binder and we
got through shocking a little after
sundown and put the machine
in the shelter. Our oats crop
very poor. All the oats in
the country stood up nicely -
a pretty good evidence of light
heads. Dry weather injured
them very much; and not
very much sign of rain although
it thundered some at noon.

Wea. Clear TUESDAY 31 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
We spent the day hoeing potatoes
cutting weeds out of the
corn and watered our potatoes
in the evening. Ed. Carothers
and Wagon were here a little
while in the evening and
Etta Morrison had with us
over night. Weather very
dry and not very much
appearance of rain.

Wea. Clear WED. AUG. 1, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Hamlin Sta.
Gillie took the milk to the
station in the morning and brought
Mary Stephenson and Etta home with
him and Etta Morrison was here.
In the afternoon Etta Morrison went
with Gracey to Hamlin's when she went
to take her music lesson. We spent
the day pulling weeds in our
cornfield. In the evening Frank
Little had completed a month and
James Little came to take his place
and I paid Frank fifteen dollars

Etta Morrison and Gracy gathered a few Black berries on Haulin's place. Cleared off very Cool in the evening and no sign of more rain although very much needed.

Wea. Clear Cool SATURDAY 4 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Gillie took the milk to the Station and brought home some mill feed which cost at the rate of \$1.75 per ton while wheat was only worth 80cts per bushel. I put some farming tools in shelter went to Paris and got Willie's sled then went to Eldersville and had Sammie stoked all around and had two tires set on wagon and got home at dusk. Etta Morrison here. Weather quite Cool all day and especially Morning & evening.

Wea. Clear Cool SUN. AUG. 5, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
Arose at 6 1/2 Clock and a few we had attended to the chores. Etta Morrison, Gracy, Etta and I went to Eldersville to Quarterly Meeting and heard Rev. G. C. Westfall preach from 1st Cor. 11" 23-25" inclusive. Four preachers present. Westfall, Scott, Taylor, and Berean. Took dinner at Will Melvins. Child of Gora and Al. Mc Murry buried. Heard Rev. Westfall preach again in the evening from 1st Cor. 4" 13-14. When we came home found that the cows had been in the Corn and had eaten part of it.
Wea. Clear MONDAY 6 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
After usual chores in the morning the boys repaired some fence to keep our cows out of our Corn. I did some tinkering about the wagon and harness and went to James Freshwaters Coal bank and got 33 bushels of coal. Gillie went to Lewis Haulin's to thresh and I went and got some butter. Took some bugs off the potatoes in the evening and hoed and watered our Cabbage. Everything suffering for rain. James & the wife Panny to Station.

Wea. Clear TUES. AUG. 7, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin' Sta
Lillie helped Bill and John
Hardin to do their threshing.
And James Little and I
hauled stones to make founda-
tion for Chickentouse.

In the evening I carried water
and watered two rows of
potatoes. Weather very dry
and very little appearance
of rain. Etta Morrison
with us on a visit.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.
Lillie took the milk to the
station in the morning and brought

their threshing and got home before

He helped repair the spreader and to square the foundation of the house.

Did not have enough milk to chop a can in the morning. Lillie took Provines' and Wilson's milk to the station and hauled manure after he got back. Arose at usual time and did usual chores. Took the milk to the station and took Annie and May to Eldersville and Becca Provier to the station. Got a little blacksmithing done in Eldersville, went to Pattersons mill and bought two barrels of flour at \$2.75 per barrel and over 1500 lbs of millfeed at 90 cts per hundred or \$18.00 per ton. Attended to usual chores in the morning before daylight. Husked some corn for hogfeed and cut off four shocks of corn in the forenoon. In the afternoon I went to Eldersville and brought home the wheels of our grain drill which I had at the shop getting two sets. Bought some peaches at Gillispie's store at one dollar per bushel. I supposed to be three pecks of them but would not hold out. Stephens one young filk here at night & brought us some fruit.

Gracey and I attended Sabbath School and Church at Eldersville in the evening and heard when we got there that Mrs James Stewarts (Suzannah Stewart) Gracey's Sabbath School Teacher had died yesterday and we came that way to see her. Heard Rev. Taylor preach from Jer. Vth 16 "Congregation Small".

Arose at 4 1/2 o'clock and attended to our usual chores and Lillie and I washed the old buggy and Gracey and I attended the funeral of Mrs Susan Stewart. I acted as one of the pallbearers with John Anderson, James Magnus, W. E. Steen, Mr Dunkey and Crew Walker. Rev. Williams of Crop Creek and Rev. Allen of Holiday Cove delivered addresses and Rev. Taylor of Eldersville prayed very large turn out of the community. Gracey and I got home about three o'clock. Weather very fine.

Home Near Hamlin Sta
Slept until half past seven
o'clock. After chores were done
I spent what time I had studying

evening work I read over next
Sabbath's lesson and tried to
study it some but had to sleep

I took the milk to the station in the morning and did not get back until near noon. Brought with me eight sacks of beans bought from C. C. Hutton. Sam Crisp came in the afternoon and we husked a load of corn and put it in the crib. I wrote a letter at night to J. P. Miller and enclosed \$5.68 due Geo. Haulin heir of Estate of Alex Haulin Dec.

Wea. *Fair* SUN. NOV. 25, 1894 Ther.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

After attending to the morning chores I spent about 2 1/2 hours studying Sabbath School lesson and in the afternoon I attended Sabbath School at the station and we had quite an interesting lesson although there were but few in attendance. I was the only teacher there. A. S. Walker supposed to have gone to Burgelstown to dedication of Westminster Presbyterian Church. Heard Rev. Allen preach from St. John's 37 & 42. Only 25 persons in attendance at public preaching.

Workman had agreed to take them but did not send crops.

While digging out some locust bushes on the road side I got some thorns in my hand and one in my front finger was so painful that I could not milk with any comfort. Gillie and Stephenson's boys were out coon hunting a short time at night but missed some Haulin and were soon home again.

I beat Charley and Gillie shooting at a mark and then took Charley and Flo to the station on their way home. When I arose in the morning I found it raining and peeping. Gillie had been out late at turkey and I did not wake him to help me with feeding. Gillie and Grace started to Literary but Grace came back and Gillie burnt on horseback. Mud on milk account at night.
