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JANUARY, 1901.

TUES. 1. Ther. Weather, Fair. Cold

Home Near Faulmisto
 Arose a few minutes before five and
 attended to chores. Took Alice to
 Miller's school in buggy. I mended some
 buggy harness during the afternoon
 and in the evening Calhoun went to
 Paris and brought Gretta Melvin home
 with him and ate turkey with us and
 remained over night. Gracey at home
 and they had some music at night.
 My head very uncomfortable with catarrh.
 My hearing not good. Retired before
 the other members of the family.

JANUARY, 1901.

WED. 2. Ther. Weather, Clear & Cold

Home Near Haulin Stn.

Arose a few minutes after four o'clock. Eliza Melvin took breakfast with us and Galbraith took her to her school in Paris and he visited the oil well being drilled on Martins place. I went to station expecting check for milk but did not get it. Went to Burzettstown and paid off note for binder. We cut some fodder in the evening. Maggie Riddle came in the evening and spent the night with us. Gracey did not return to school during the day. Weather fair

THUR. 3. Ther. Weather, Clear & Cold

Home Near Haulin Stn.

Maggie Riddle took breakfast with us and went with Galbraith to the station on her way home. Mended a shoe for Alice in the morning and spent most of the day cleaning chicken house and repair roofs. Weather clear and cold.

No snow on the ground. Felt quite well in the evening.

JANUARY, 1901.

FRI. 4. Ther. Weather, Very fine

Home Near Haulin Stn.

Arose at 4 1/2 o'clock and attended to chores. Milked six cows before breakfast. Galbraith took for three loads to Eldersville and had all their shoes sharpened and was home about one o'clock. And we cut some fodder for the cattle. I spent part of the day mending the wagon.

Francis Finnegan Esq. came and made out my Pension papers. A young man brought \$6.50 and paid the taxes note to Mr. Adams. Galbraith brought a letter from Paris and took her and Gracey to social at Chas.

SAT. 5. Ther. Weather, Exceedingly fine

Home Near Haulin Stn.

Slept unusually late, clock having stopped, but by a little extra haste we succeeded in getting milk away in time. We spent most of forenoon cutting fodder and in the afternoon Galbraith went to D. M. Fulltons bank and got 25 bushels of coal. Weather very beautiful and roads in good case. Galbraith went to Eldersville at night to choir practice. Gracey spent some time at night singing and playing on the organ.

JANUARY, 1901.

SUN. 6. Ther.

Weather, very fair

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Alice and I attended church at
Tuckers and heard Rev. Philips
preach from Luke XIV 15-24 in which
Parable of the great supper. Mr Philips suffering
with a cold. Sermon monotonous.

Spent afternoon and evening at
home. Galbraith and Gracey
attended Church at Eldersville
at night. Weather very fair
and roads good for bugging.
Religious interest seemingly at a
very low ebb in the community.

MON. 7. Ther.

Weather, Cloudy.

Home Near Haulin Sta.

I took Gracey to Haulin Sta.
on her way back to Iron City
College after her holiday vacation.
Galbraith sharpened the bandsaw
and in the afternoon he cut
corn fodder making the largest pile
we had ever cut at one time.
Weather rather moist and
roads smooth as summer time.
Pains in my limbs and chest
and left hand.

JANUARY, 1901.

TUES. 8. Ther.

Weather, Cloudy moist

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose at five o'clock and
attended to usual chores. We spent
most of the forenoon putting up a
baracation to prevent Lucy from picking
the weatherboarding off the stable. In the
afternoon Galbraith took the crop cut
paw to Proovies and had it pointed.
I did some repairing to window door,
put a hip in an umbrella and
cleaned stable as of forth. Galbraith
at home at night and cleaned
Marlan Rifle.

WED. 9. Ther.

Weather, Stormy

Home Near Haulin Sta.

Arose about five o'clock and
attended to usual chores. As it was
wet and roads muddy I took Alice to
school in the buggy and came home by
Tuckers church to look for an umbrella
which Galbraith had left there but did
not find it. In the afternoon we
made some calculations preparatory to
putting an enlarged pulley on our horse
power. Went to the woods and sawed
some stuff for Pit post. Galbraith and
Alice attended an Oyster supper at Pop. Duttons.

JANUARY, 1901.

THUR. 10. Ther.

Weather,

Wet.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Weather wet and road muddy and I took Alice to school and brought her home again. Galbraith took the milk to the station in the morning and took some lumber to Provines to make a pulley for our power for cutting machine.

I spent most of the afternoon poddering lanterns. Did not feel well in the evening.

FRI. 11. Ther.

Weather,

Wet.

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Galbraith went to Provines in the morning and spent the day making a pulley for our horsepower. He and Alice attended literary at Millers School House at night. Alice having remained at S. J. Haulin's for supper I took Alice to school in the morning then went to C. J. Dillons and got a short piece of rope for our machine and spent part of the afternoon leathering it for coupling purposes. Evening still moist.

JANUARY, 1901.

SAT. 12. Ther.

Weather,

Cold blustry

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

After attending to feeding in the morning I smoothed up our walk around our power as the ground was freezing and likely to be rough. Went to Collias and paid W. S. Dwoings \$12.10 for threshing our crop of 1900.

Rec'd from O. J. Brashear \$40 on a note for S. S. Adams. Galbraith spent the day at Provines working on a pulley and did not get through. Weather cold and stormy.

SUN. 13. Ther.

Weather,

Fair

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Arose about seven o'clock and attended to chores. Galbraith went to Eldersville to church, and I walked to Duckers. Was there in time for part of Sabbath School, lesson "The triumphal entry into Jerusalem." Robt. Criswell, teacher, expressed the thought that the same people who cried "Hosanna" at the time of the entry, exclaimed "Crucify him" shortly afterward. I took the ground that it could not be proven by the scriptures at least I had not seen the proof.

JANUARY, 1901.

MON. 14. Ther.

Weather, Damp

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

After doing up morning chores, I went on horseback to S. W. Closes and paid him \$31.84 for bran and interest. Went to Ann Thorley's and tried to arrange to trade a quarter of beef for a small hog. Did not meet John A. Thorley on way home and did not get bargain consummated. Got some hooks and rivets at the blacksmith shop in Eldersville and carried an iron wedge to station for Dal. Smith. Evening wet.

TUES. 15. Ther

Weather, Fair

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Galbraith took the milk to the road then went to Provinces and helped to finish the great pulley which we brought home for iron to be painted. We put it in place and tried it and found it worked well. I took Lucy for Alice's ride from school then went to McQuig's woods and got four nice hoop poles to put hoops on our beef-barrel. Galbraith went to Eldersville to church at night. Weather favorable for our door work.

JANUARY, 1901.

WED. 16. Ther.

Weather, Morning wet. Cleared off

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Rained in the morning took Alice to school on horseback. Umbrella turned inside out. Galbraith painted new pulley, and when dropping a wedge for splitting posts struck the corner of the ax through the flesh at root of his left thumb. I put four hoops on our beef-barrel. Succeeded very well to be so much out of practice. Received a long letter from Gracey. Said she had earned her first 75-cents by her new profession. Helen Alice and I went to Widow Hamilton's at night and found folks all poorly with the cold except Sam.

THUR. 17. Ther.

Weather, Cold. some snow.

Home Near Hamilton Sta.

Arose at 4:15 and attended to all the feeding and milking as Galbraith had a very sore hand. I took the milk to the station. Learned that Filmore Hamilton was very sick and Uncle Charley unable to do their chores. I went to their assistance and did their buying and cleaned cow-stable. Wrote a postal card to Florence Johnson. Spent part of afternoon leathering drive rope of gutter power. Snowed some in afternoon. Ground freezing up. Quite rough.

JANUARY, 1901.

FRI. 18. Ther. Weather, Very Cold

Home near Hamilton Sta. Pa.
Alice walked to school although it was
rough and equally, slippery. I suffer
at 10:30 and attended literary at
Miller's and I went to ~~see~~ home
Alex Morrison came on the evening
train. Galbraith met him at the
station and took him to Elders-
ville and back. He was
visiting Anne Torley. I attended
literary at Miller's to see Alice have
some very good performances and a
debate on "Conversions" written
Saturday night when almost asleep

SAT. 19. Ther. Weather, Cold & stormy

Home near Hamilton Sta.
Arose at usual time and attended
to chores. Alex Morrison here having been
to visit Anne Torley last evening. Arose
at 5:30 ate breakfast and went to station
for early train. I felt fine in forenoon
and did not do much. Went to Fulton's
bank in afternoon and put 25 bu of
coal on sled and tried to bring it through
the wood. Snow too tight and stuck and
had to get the wagon and divide the
load. My cow some fodder in the
evening. Saw Cully worked very well.
Weather quite cold. Not feeling well.

JANUARY, 1901.

SUN. 20. Ther. Weather, Fair warmer

Home near Hamilton Sta.
Slept until seven o'clock and then
attended to all our chores. Galbraith
having a sore slept until breakfast
was ready and when that was over
it was too late for us to go to church.
Was still feeling somewhat un-
well and being drowsy could not
read all the time. Read some
in Wesleyan Methodist and studied
sabbath school lesson for next
sabbath, "Christ silences the Pharisees".
Galbraith went to Eldersville to church
at night. Snow melted off during the day

MON. 21. Ther. Weather, Fair.

Home near Hamilton Sta.
After usual chores we filled
up some corn and Galbraith took
it to the plow and had it
ground and did not get home until
after three o'clock. I sharpened the
knives on our fodder cutter and filled
the groove in pulley some to fit the rope.
Brought Alice from school in buggy.
Read in Pittsburg times that Queen
Victoria was at the point of death.
My eyes very blurry. Could not see
to write well.

JANUARY, 1901

TUES. 22. Ther.

Weather,

Fair

Home Near Haulin Sta.
 After breakfast I went to
 Haulin and invited Louis and
 Sam to help us to dress a beef.
 Expected to have had D. S. Fulton but
 he went to Ryeftown to Prestey.
 After carrying the beef in I went to
 Mr. Stephenson's and witnessed the
 signing of a paper to be sent to
 Washington for Mrs. Kiddle.
 Maggie Kiddle came home with me
 and spent the night with us.
 Galbraith went to Eldersville church
 Victoria Queen of England died: 6:30 P.M.

WED. 23. Ther.

Weather,

Shower evening

Home Near Haulin Sta.
 After usual chores Galbraith and I
 built a crate to haul a hog in and then
 we took a quarter of beef to Ann Thorlop
 and brought home a hog of which we
 proposed to make pork. Galbraith
 returned to Eldersville at night to
 attend preaching. Having heard that
 there was a United States warrant out for
 the arrest of Gaylord C. Melvin he wrote
 Gaylord a letter informing him of the fact.
 Rained nearly all evening.

JANUARY, 1901.

THUR. 24. Ther.

Weather,

Stormy. Rain. Snow

Home Near Haulin Sta.
 Arose at usual time and Galbraith
 took the milk to the station and did
 not get home until noon. I cut up
 three quarters of beef and in the
 evening helped Galbraith to cut
 some corn fodder. Weather was
 very disagreeable in the afternoon.
 Alice walked to school and came
 home in the rain. Galbraith was
 just starting for her as he saw
 her coming. Getting colder at night.
 Snowed in the evening.

FRI. 25. Ther.

Weather,

Cold Stormy

Home Near Haulin Sta.
 Weather was cold and stormy
 and the most that I accomplished
 during the day was to carry three
 quarters of beef from the
 cellar to the milkhouse and
 put pickle on it. Galbraith went
 to station and sold beefhide. He also
 took some beef to Thomas and Charles
 and brought Alice from school for
 the sled. He went to Eldersville
 Church at night.

JANUARY, 1901.

SAT. 26. Ther. Weather, Cold. Snow.

Home Near Haulin Ste.

We spent most of the forenoon doing chores fixing a halter and harness &c and in the afternoon we cut Cornfodder and made pretty good speed. Was cloudy all day and snowed some in the evening. Feel somewhat rheumatic

SUN. 27. Ther. Weather, Snowing

Home Near Haulin Ste.

Arose about seven O'clock and attended to usual chores.

I walked to Puckers Church and heard Rev. Alf under preach from Mat. III. 2. Congregation quite small. Snow on the ground, and still snowing but sledding not good. Galbraith went to Eldersville to church at night. My health not good. Feeling of rheumatism and drowsiness and lack of energy.

JANUARY, 1901.

MON. 28. Ther. Weather, Cold Stormy

Home Near Haulin Ste.

Arose at 4 1/2 O'clock and attended to usual chores before breakfast. Galbraith took Alice to school in the sled and brought 24 bushels of coal from Dal. Smith's bank. He did not get home until after one O'clock. We hitched up and cut a little fodder but our rope gave way and Galbraith went for Alice again. He went to Eldersville to church at night and did part of the repairing of our drive rope. Sledding not good. Roads rough.

TUES. 29. Ther. Weather, Fair. Snow.

Home Near Haulin Ste.

Galbraith took Alice to school in the sled in the morning, and I repaired the drive rope of our cutting machine in the forenoon. In the afternoon we did a pretty good job of cutting fodder but did not get quite through. We let Alice walk home from school. Galbraith received a long letter from Gracey in Pittsburg. She said she was getting along pretty well. Galbraith went to Eldersville to church at night. Weather somewhat threatening.

JANUARY, 1901.

WED. 30. Ther. Weather, Cloudy. damp. Snow

Home near Haulin Sta

Found snow falling in the morning
and Galbraith took Alice to
school in sleigh and brought her
home so, and he went to Eldersville
to church in sleigh at night. He finished
cutting our fodder in the afternoon.
Had quite a large pile when done.
Received through the mail a paper,
The Indianapolis News. Supposed it
have come from State Senator J. Lindley.
Spent the evening reading in it.
Weather was misty during the day.

THUR. 31. Ther. Weather, Snow.

Home near Haulin Sta

I helped to do morning chores. Galbraith
took milk to the station on sled.
I took Alice to school on milk sled
and felt so unwell that I sat in the
house remainder of day. Troubled with
diarrhea. Heard in the morning
that James McEwen was dead and funeral
expected at Eldersville today. Gas had been
borrowed on Bob sled. Hugh Wilson's arm
broken by break of a horse. Wrote a letter
at night to Gracey.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

FRI. 1. Ther. Weather, Fair. Snow

Home near Haulin Sta.

Galbraith took Alice to school in
the sleigh in the morning after taking
milk to the road and in the evening
he took the sled and brought the teacher
Miss Kimberland and Maggie and
Gladys Curry home with Alice to supper
and took them to literary in the sled.
Sam and Rob. McLaughlin and Russell
Wilson were also in the sled. We
expected Gretta Melvin to come from
Paris to spend the night with us
but she did not come. She was not
at literary. Fleming McDowell came to

SAT. 2. Ther. Weather, Fair

Home near Haulin Sta.

Galbraith and I did the morning
chores then I went to Perry Station in
sleigh and renewed a note at the bank.
Got home about two o'clock. Got my
watch home repaired and running.
Margaretta Melvin walked out from
Paris in the evening and spent the
night with us. Sleighting not very
good but threatening snow all
night. Helen not well during the
day - taking cold.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

SUN. 3. Ther.

Weather,

Damp, Snow, rain.

Septuagesima Sunday
 Home Near Haulin' Sta.
 Margaretta Nelson took breakfast
 with us and she and Galbraith attended
 Church at Bethel, went in pley
 and then attended at Eldersville at
 night. I went to Haulins about
 noon and found Eliza very bad
 with Pneumonia and Bell and
 John both very poorly with bad colds.
 I went back again at night and
 Horace and I sat up and took
 care of Eliza, Kitty, Banforth and
 Elizabeth. Haulin' got up twice and
 attended her.

MON. 4. Ther.

Weather,

Cold Stormy

Home Near Haulin' Sta.
 I took breakfast at John and
 Wm Haulins. Eliza seems some
 better. Came home about eight o'clock.
 Galbraith took Gretta to school
 and they attended the funeral of
 John Wilson and repaired some
 wheelbarrow some and attended
 to feeding and milking. Did not feel
 very well in the evening. Weather
 getting quite cold. Cold lands said
 to be booming. Farms sold.

FEBRUARY, 1901

TUES. 5. Ther.

Weather,

Fair. Cold

Home Near Haulin' Sta.
 Arose at usual time and attended
 to usual chores. Spent the day doing
 Chores. Mended a pair of shoes for
 Alice and mended my working gloves.
 Horace Haulin' came in after
 noon and Helen went home with
 him to help to care for Eliza Haulin'
 who was suffering with Pneumonia
 I wrote a letter to S. S. Adams to
 notify him of the collection of \$86.74
 of his sale notes. Weather cold and
 clear.

WED. 6. Ther.

Weather,

Clear & Cold

Home Near Haulin' Sta.
 Helen was at Haulins helping to care
 for Eliza who had Pneumonia. Alice
 got breakfast and did morning chores.
 before going to school. I felt quite
 unwell and spent most of the day
 in the house. Scoured a pesty milk
 can. Helped to do the feeding in the
 evening. Galbraith burned some
 brush in the clearing in the afternoon
 just three weeks after cutting his hands
 with the axe. Helen still at Haulins.
 Weather clear and cold.

FEBRUARY, 1901

THUR. 7. Ther. Weather, Fair

Home Near Haulin Sta.
 Helen not being at home Alice made a very good effort at getting breakfast and doing morning work. In the afternoon I went to see the sick people at Haulin and found that Helen could not get home for lack of help there. I cut in out of troupe for them. When I came home found Mr. McDonnell and his mother here to see about buying the farm. They offered \$5000 for it \$3000 down. Alice and Galbraith's suffer for them on very small preparation. But we got along well. Was well impressed with style of our guests.

FRI. 8. Ther. Weather, Fair

Home Near Haulin Sta.
 Helen being away I took some flour to Provinces to get some baking done. Went to Haulin and found Helen about starting house. They had secured Florence Johnson for house help. Galbraith Broth. Greta Melvin from Paris and took her to Millers to Literary at night. Alice went to Oliver Curry's for supper. Wrote a letter to Charley and flew at night. Evening some what windy.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

SAT. 9. Ther. Weather, Cloudy. Ice.

Home Near Haulin Sta.
 Found ground icy and raining some in evening. And was very unpleasant all day. We consulted during the day about selling the farm and cleared up some farm work. Found it very difficult getting about. Galbraith wrote a letter at night to Gracy telling her about the offer. Mr. Donnell had left on our farm. We were thinking that it might be best for us to sell out and go to town to accommodate the children who wished to enter professions.

SUN. 10. Ther. Weather, Cloudy Spet snow

Home Near Haulin Sta.
 The ground being covered with ice and our horses very smooth. I thought it imprudent to try to go to church and all remained at home during the day. Galbraith walked over to Haulin in the evening to see the sick folks. I spent most of the day reading in the Wesleyan Methodist Ram Horn and Bible. Galbraith remained with the sick people over night and set up Florence Johnson assisting him to care for Eliza Haulin who had heart disease & Pneumonia.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

MON. 11. Ther.

Weather,

Much fair. Snow

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Arose at usual time and attended to chores. Galbraith was at Haulin' helping to care for Eliza who was down with Pneumonia & heart trouble. He got home just as we were through breakfast. Will Melvin stopped as he returned from taking Lilla to Paris and he remained until after three o'clock.

We consulted with him about the propriety of selling our farm. Campbell Hulton came and got Galbraith to take a load of printing to station for them as they were nearly all sick. Snow evening.

TUES. 12. Ther.

Weather,

Fair. Cold

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Galbraith took Alice to school on the sled. Came by Dr. Crip's and found him down with Grip. He helped Mr. Smith to haul straw some hay. He went to Station in afternoon and got groceries for them. Storekeepers gave flour, coffee and crackers, and we gave them soap, coffee and mustard. I helped some with washing during day and at night Galbraith and I counted up our indebtedness as far as possible and concluded that it would reach \$2,700.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

WED. 13. Ther.

Weather,

Fair Cold

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Galbraith took Alice to school and came home by Crip's and found sick folks better. I helped to do the washing. Wringer got out of order and I tried to repair it but did not succeed well. Rec'd letters in the afternoon from C. P. Melvin, Coshocton Ohio and from Flo and Gracy in Pittsburg, all favoring the sale of the place. Charles and his firm just commenced foundry business in Coshocton. We were thinking seriously of accepting McDonald's offer of \$5,000 for our farm. Galbraith went to Haulin' at night to see the sick folks.

THUR. 14. Ther.

Weather,

Fair

Home Near Haulin' Sta.

Galbraith took the milk to the station. About half past twelve o'clock Mr. Hanley Taylor and Fleming McDonald came and we bargained with McDonald for \$5,000 for our farm about 74 acres and agreed to go to Burgettstown on next Tuesday to write an article. Wrote a letter at night to Charley in Coshocton and one to Grace in Pittsburg. Grace intending to come home to help get ready to move. Galbraith got a little load of coal in the evening.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

FRI. 15. Ther. Weather. Fair. Roads good

Home near Haulin Sts
 Arise at usual time and did chores
 Galbraith took two horses to Eldersville to
 get shod. I did some repairs on manure
 spreader and in the afternoon I went
 to Paris and got Lucy shod. Visited Gretta
 Milvins school. Went to Sam Jacksons
 and engaged them to bale our hay.
 Brought Gretta Milvins home with
 me to attend Teachers institute tomorrow
 at Millers. Galbraith went to Haulins
 to sit up with Eliza. Heard that Mary
 Haulin had given birth to an illegitimate

SAT. 16. Ther. Weather. Fair

Home near Haulin Sts
 Galbraith did not get home from Haulins
 until after I had milking done. Milk
 taken to the road. Helen remained
 at home and the rest of us attended at
 Teachers Institute at Millers School
 House and had a good time. House
 was full and had a good dinner.
 None of the directors there. Nearly
 all of the teachers of the Township,
 there and some others. Wrote an article
 of agreement at night concerning sale
 of the farm.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

SUN. 17. Ther. Weather. Cloudy light snow

Quinquagesima Sunday.

Home near Haulin Sts Pa.

Galbraith went to Eldersville to attend
 Quarterly meeting. Alice and Helen went to
 Haulins to see Eliza who was in bed sick,
 and found her improving some although
 not rapidly. I attended Church at Tuckers
 and heard Rev. Mr. Philips preach from
 Hebrews 8th Chapt and later clause of 4th verse
 "And by it, he being dead yet speaketh".
 Frode part of way home with Rev. Philips
 and had a chat with him. He told me
 that Rev. Island, his first Preaching Elder, was now
 in Coxsonton, pastor in M.C. Church in Coxsonton

MON. 18. Ther. Weather. Fair

Home near Haulin Sts.

Galbraith took Longhorn to station and
 got it ground. I threshed some beans
 and Helen and I hung up our beef to
 dry. I received a picture, an ugly
 picture of a woman with a padlock
 on her lips and her husband with the
 key in his hand saying "now I have
 peace". Rec'd a letter from Charley at
 Coxsonton and a note from Eliza Jackson
 stating that he would be on with his hay
 bales on Wednesday. Letter from Grace to "Hance"
 Wrote an article at night for sale of farm

FEBRUARY, 1901.

TUES. 19. Ther. Weather, Cold Snow & gales

Home Near Hanlin Sta.
Helen Alice and I went to Puzgetleton
where Alice got three teeth taken out and
Helen and I went to McDonald's and
signed articles of agreement for sale
of our farm. I took dinner there and
Alice and Helen at Riddles. We all
ate supper at Riddles and got home
about eight o'clock. Sam. Jackson and
Elroy brought Hay baler to our barn and
set it. Galbraith helped Russell Wilson
to haul some hay. Wrote note to Gracey
that Helen intended going to Pittsburg
Thursday evening.

WED. 20. Ther. Weather, Stormy
Ash Wednesday.

Home Near Hanlin Sta.
Overslept and was obliged to hurry
about our morning work. I greased the buggy
and took it and went to Oliver Lewis
and paid off a \$300 note with interest
and paid \$1.50 for its entry on books.

to Pittsburg. Alice was suffering
with a sore jaw caused by the
extractions of teeth. I visited the sick
at Hanlin's and found Olga getting up.

Helen being in Pittsburg, Alice got up
and got breakfast for us. Her
jaw still swollen as the result of having
a tooth extracted. She spent the day in the
house. Galbraith and I spent most of
the day getting the Timothy seed from
the barn in the old stable and cleaning
it. Had a two bushel sack almost
full at evening. My bowels somewhat
troublesome in the evening and did
not feel very well. Weather still
quite cold.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

SAT. 23. Ther.

Fair. Cold

Home near Haulin Sta.

Felt unwell during the night and had to be roused. Spent some time in bed after calling Galbraith up to attend to feeding and milking. Spent most of forenoon sitting by the fire. Felt better in afternoon and we cleaned up some Timothy seed and in the evening I took the spring wagon and went to station and met Helen and Grace coming home from Pittsburg. Sam McCalmont rode with us from station. Road good.

SUN. 24. Ther.

Weather,

Cold Blistery

Home near Haulin Sta.

Quadragesima Sunday
Arose about seven o'clock. Helen did not feel very well and concluded not to go to church. Grace, Alice and I attended church at Tucker and heard Dr. Mechem preach from Kern. II. 16. Not a very large turnout. Galbraith and Grace went to Clatsville at night. Helen was quite poorly all evening with pains in her stomach and bowels and troubled with diarrhoea.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

MON. 25. Ther.

Weather,

Moderating

Home near Haulin Sta.

Helen was quite unwell during the night and we did not get usual sleep. She was unable to work during day. We were cleaning some Timothy seed when Jacksons came to bale our hay and we dropped all and baled 3300 lbs straw and over three tons of hay. Galbraith did two hands work throwing the hay down out of the mow and baling it back into the mow when baled. Balers quit some at night. Helen was feeling some better at night.

TUES. 26. Ther.

Weather,

Blistery Cold

Home near Haulin Sta.

I took the milk to the road in the morning and got Sam McCalmont to help me to bale hay. We spent the day baling and at night had about 12 tons of hay and straw baled in two days. In the evening I went to the station with the spring wagon and met Charley and Joly and brought them home with me. Did not retire until after twelve o'clock. Talking about going to Coshocton Ohio. Galbraith talking of going with them tomorrow morning to arrange for a place for us to go to.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

In the evening Gracey and Galbraith went to Eldersville for preaching and Mary remained with us over night. Roads getting quite muddy and raining at night.

Mary Stephenson took breakfast with us and about ten o'clock Will Melvin came having taken Quetta to Paris. He took Mary home with him after dinner. I wrote a letter to J. P. Was so cold and stormy that I was obliged to stop and warm.

I took it down and cleaned the jam off the verge rod, put a little carbon oil on it and started it going again and it seemed to be doing well when we left. Evening was quite cool. We had a very pleasant visit.
